Hence, it is that you find the Socialist Labor Party increasing steadily particularly in the Sixteenth Assembly District where the agitation is strongest.

B.J.—It must be that, because I find the Tammany captains in that district particularly alarmed this year.

U.S.—Oh, that has its good reason.

B.J.—Which?

U.S.—In the first place, these Tammany captains know that Socialist education

is bearing tremendous fruit in the district—

B.J.—And what is the other reason?

U.S.—The other reason is that Tammany Hall is split up this year.

B.J.—Split?

U.S.—Yes; there is the Social Democracy, alias Debs Democracy, alias Hand with the Radish ticket, alias Chimney Brush ticket; now then—

B.J.—Why, I always was under the impression that that was a Republican decoy duck affair. The Brewster letters and Debs' endorsement of the Philadelphia *North American*, besides many other circumstances, pointed to that.

U.S.—So it is. Would the Reps set up a decoy duck ticket against themselves?

B.J.—Why, right you are! That ticket must split up Tammany Hall.

U.S.—And so it does. The funny part of it is that in the Sixteenth Assembly district, Tammany Hall helped the fraud along in the stupid belief that it would smash the Socialist Labor Party. Now they find out their mistake; the fraud has helped the Socialist Labor Party greatly to make its position clear. But it is now too late for Tammany Hall to withdraw that Hand with the Radish ticket. The Tammany Hall heelers in the Sixteenth Assembly District are doing all they can to recover that vote.
