The Flynn campaign committee reported that a detailed breakdown of results to date in the signature drive showed the average team of canvassers has been collecting from 2 to 3 times as many signatures as a similar team brought in during the 1954 campaign when Miss Flynn ran for Congress in the

During the Wednesday night night meeting, several canvassers spoke in the discussion exchanging

their experiences.

A woman, who said she had never before canvassed in an election, described the "great interest" among East Side residents in Miss Flynn's program on housing, slum clearance, the fight for political representation for Puerto Rican people, the fight against anti-Semitism, for school integration, a positive program for young people and anti-bias legislation to end discrimination against Negro and Puerto Rican people in housing and jobs.

A number of canvassers, who had earlier expressed doubts about the campaign, reported they were convinced the goal of 3,000 signatures could be reached. They appealed to the canvassers present toreturn to the Flynn headquarters Sunday and bring their friends.
