## U. S. RED LEADERS APPEAL FOR UNITY

Voice Worry Over 'Titoism' in Opposing Any Change in Party's Name or Form

A fight among American Com-

munists over the proposed new "Titoist" party line prompted their national leaders yesterday to urge members to adhere to the traditional line. The National Committee of the Communist party of the United States said that it was

deeply concerned over a controversy that included leading figures. Citing fears among sections of

linized course charted for American Communists might "open the way to liquidating essential features of a Marxist organization," the committee came out against changing the name and form of the party at its national convention here Feb. 9 to 12. The committee last September approved a draft resolution outlining the new line. It was embodied in a new constitution, a

draft of which was made public earlier this month and will be submitted to the convention. The new line resembled the independently nationalistic policy taken by Titoist Yugoslavia and lately by Polish Communists. It was fainter and shorter
