EDITOR ON WORKER SAID TO QUIT REDS

William Z. Foster, honorary chairman of the Communist party in this country, said last night that Joseph Clark, foreign editor of The Daily Worker, had resigned from the party.

Mr. Clark, who has been assailed as a "revisionist" by the Soviet Communist party, was

not reached for comment.

Mr. Clark's resignation reportedly was made in a letter to the party's central committee, a letter said to contain sharp criticism of Mr. Foster and other party leaders.

Informed of reports that Mr. Clark had renounced the party, Mr. Foster said: "I understand that is correct." He declined to

comment further.

Mr. Clark has been identified with the right wing "revisionist" faction of the party, which opposes the pro-Moscow group led by Mr. Forster and former City Councilman Benjamin Davis Jr. This rightist faction is led by John Gates, editor of The Daily Worker.

Last May the national committee voted down motions to remove Mr. Gates and Mr. Clark from their positions on the paper. This was regarded as a stinging rebuff to Mr. Foster. Recently, however, the Gates faction was reported to be losing control of the New York State Communist organization.
