### The Election Campaign.

Report by the Executive Secretary [Ruthenberg].

District #1 [Boston]: No nominations made. Expect to conduct campaign and have names written in.

District #2 [New York]: State ticket in field for New Jersey. No State ticket for New York. Local nominations for New York.

District #3 [Philadelphia]: No state or local ticket.

District #4 [Buffalo]: Will have local ticket in field.

District #6 [Cleveland]: No nominations. Will conduct campaign of writing in names.

District #7 [Detroit]: No nominations.

District #8 [Chicago]: No nominations. Special report from district on the political situation read, concluding with recommendation that:

We support the Farmer-Labor Party in the election in November, stating our position in a manifesto, which shall explain the program and position of the WP, expose the weakness of the FLP, give our reasons for supporting them, explain the reasons for our absence from the ballot, call upon the workers to support and join the WP at the same time that they vote for the FLP in this particular election; that the WP is a distinct political party which will in the future make fights with its own candidates on the ballots and program, independent of all other political parties, that we take advantage of every opportunity to use the elections to reach the widest masses with our program and policies on the basis of this course of action.

Motion carried, after extensive discussion, that the decision of the District Executive Committee, as

above outlined, be concurred in.

*Motion carried*, that the manifesto to be issued be prepared by the CEC.

Comrades Bittelman, Engdahl, and Ruthenberg elected a committee to draft the manifesto.

District #9 [Minneapolis]: No nominations. District #10 [St. Louis]: No nominations.

District #12 [Seattle]: Candidate for United States Senator placed on the ballot in Washington state.

District #13 [San Francisco]: Full ticket placed on the ballot in California.

*Motion carried*, that in those districts in which we have no candidates the Party carry on a campaign for independent working class political action.

Birmingham, Ala.: Party branch there organized inside of Social-Democratic League, an independent body. Comrade Walker, member of the WP, nominated as candidate for sheriff on S-D League ticked. After nomination the S-DL affiliated with the Socialist Party in order to secure standing as a political party.

*Motion*, that Local Birmingham be instructed to remove the name of Comrade Walker from the SP ticket.

*Motion:* to table the matter for 2 weeks. *Lost*.

Amendment to motion: that we direct Comrade Walker to remain on the ticket and carry on a campaign on the basis of the WP program, announcing himself as a member of the Workers Party and ignoring the technical fact of his name appearing on the SP ticket.

Amendment to the amendment: that the branch be directed to demand that the S-DL withdraw from the SP and if it does not withdraw that our branch remove the name of Comrade Walker from the ticket.

Vote on the amendment to amendment: Yes: Lindgren and Ashkenuzi. No: Allison, Glassberg, Bittelman, Weinstone, Minor, Wagenknecht, Engdahl, Kruse, Ruthenberg, Amter.

Vote on the amendment: Yes: Allison, Glassberg, Weinstone, Minor, Engdahl, Kruse, Ruthenberg, Amter. No: Ashkenuzi, Bittelman, Wagenknecht, Amter, Lindgren. [Amendment carried.]

*Motion*, that the manifesto be issued by same committee preparing Chicago manifesto. *Carried*.

Election Program: The Political Committee was not prepared to report a program.

Motion carried, that the materials on hand be turned over to the Executive Secretary [Ruthenberg] to write the program and that after approval by the Political Committee it be issued.

### Organization Report by the Executive Secretary.

The Secretary [Ruthenberg] reported that from his experience during recent trip it did not appear that the [Bridgman] raids had in any way affected the morale of the organization. Party work was going on everywhere and the members showing a fine spirit.

In District #1 [Boston] the organizer has expressed his desire to resign. In District #3 [Philadelphia] a paid organizer should be put in the field, the national organization furnishing financial assistance if necessary, in order to build up that district. District 5 [Pittsburgh] is one of the best Party districts. Comrade [Fred] Merrick has shown initiative and energy in putting into effect the Party policies and undoubtedly will build up a strong organization. District 6 [Cleveland] has suffered because of the fact that Comrade [Caleb] Harrison has been in prison. Comrade Marshall [Max Bedacht] has been speaking and organizing in the district for a month, but was arrested last Saturday [Sept. 30, 1922], which will break up his tour. District #7 [Detroit] required a new organizer as Comrade [Cyril] Lambkin has resigned. The DEC recommends Mollenhauer. Plan for an organization tour in the district temporarily held up, will be taken up again. In District #8 [Chicago] Comrade [Charles] Krumbein is acting as DO. Work has suffered because of inability of DO to act previously. Comrade [H.E.] Keas reports that in District #9 [Minneapolis] work is greatly hampered by factionalism, which must be eliminated at all costs. Comrade [Thomas] Sullivan has returned to District #10 [St. Louis] and work will go ahead more efficiently. In District #12 [Seattle] we have no DO and steps must be taken to put an active man in the field. In District #13 [San Francisco] Comrade [Paul] Reiss is acting as DO.

(Vacancies in positions of District Organizers were referred to the Organization Committee for action.)

Federations: The Finnish and South Slavic Federations are carrying on their work efficiently as usual. The German Federation has not made its financial report for August and September [1922], but it is promised in a few days. The Hungarian Federation requests to be permitted to hold its convention November 30, is still pending and action should be taken. The Lithuanian Federation recommends that duplication in sending out Party circulars to language branches be ended; that The Worker carry more news about national party activities; that periodical conferences be held with [Language] Bureau Secretaries by the Executive Secretary. Greek Federation requests permission to send a cable to the Soviet government in regard to the Greek-Turkish war. Italian Federation has been paid a subsidy of \$30 weekly and dues have been remitted. Has now grown to sufficient strength to permit new arrangements.

### Motions carried as follows:

- [1.] That the Hungarian Federation be permitted to hold its convention as requested, inasmuch as the date coincides with that of another convention which will make reduction in expenses considerable.
- [2.] That the Executive Secretary [Ruthenberg] hold conferences periodically with the Secretaries of the Language Bureaus. (The Secretary [Ruthenberg] reported that duplication of communications to language branches had been stopped.)
- [3.] That a cable be sent in the name of the Greek and Turkish Federations of the Party to the Soviet government covering the situation in the Near East. Comrades Bittelman and Ruthenberg were instructed to draft the cable.
- [4.] That the Greek Federation also cable a protest to the Greek government about the persecution of Communists and trade unionists.
- [5.] That beginning November [1922] the Italian Federation must make regular monthly settlements for due s and the subsidy now being paid be continued until the end of the year only.

Czecho-Slovak Federation: The Secretary [Ruthenberg] reported that the Czecho-Slovak Federation, with about 800 members, had affiliated with the Party and would begin paying dues in October [1922].

Scandinavian Federation: The SF has again submitted the question of affiliation to its membership. Comrade Oscar Larson has been engaged by the National Office to make a tour of the branches of the Federation and present the facts about the WP.

### Political Committee Report.

The Political Committee submitted the following report:

Meeting of October 4 [1922]. Present: Bittelman, Minor, and Amter.

- Motion carried, that credentials as Fraternal Delegate of the WP to the 4th Congress of the CI be given to Comrade [Alexander] Trachtenberg.
- 2. *Motion,* that the committee recommends the establishment of a Research Bureau and that Comrade [Jay] Lovestone be placed in charge.
- 3. Notification received that the United Toilers are receptive to the idea of coming into the WP as a body immediately. The Political Committee thereupon drafted a letter urging the United Toilers' immediate entrance into the Party.
- 4. Motion carried, that in view of the possibility of the entrance of the United Toilers into the Party, which appears to be pending, the UT be requested to inform the WP as to the possibility of turning over the subscription list of *The Workers' Challenge* to *The Worker*, if the former is to be discontinued.
- 5. Motion carried, that in case of the success of the foregoing proposal the Political Committee will recommend that [Harry] Wicks of the editorial staff of *The Workers' Challenge* be added to the editorial staff of *The Worker*, and that Works be given industrial work as well.
- 6. Motion passed, to recommend that a defense pamphlet be published for the purpose of clarifying and standardizing the defense propaganda, to be sold for defense revenue. Minor to be instructed to prepare a draft to be completed in collaboration with the Defense Council.
- 7. Motion passed, to recommend that the CEC immediately elect a committee of 5 to meet with a like committee of the United Toilers.

*Motion carried*, to endorse action in relation to the United Toilers and elect a committee of 3 to carry out details.†

†- This and the following motions under the heading "Political Committee Report" are ennumerated as though they were additional actions of the Political Committee on Oct. 4. This appears to be a typographical error and that they were Oct. 7 CEC actions.

*Motion carried*, that Comrades Trachtenberg, [Ludwig] Katterfeld, and Bedacht be designated as fraternal delegates to the 4th Congress of the CI.

*Motion carried*, that we endorse in principle the ideas of a Research Bureau but that the Political Committee submit further details.

*Motion carried,* that the Political Committee furnish further details as to the work Comrade Wicks is to do.

*Motion carried*, that the Political Committee prepare the agenda for the Party Convention.

#### Party Convention.

A letter from the Finnish Bureau urging that the Party convention be held in February [1923] in place of December [1922] so that all the decisions of the 4th Congress of the CI would be available at the time of the convention and also urging that the delegation be limited to 1 delegate from each 500 members or major fraction thereof, we deferred to the Organization Committee for consideration.

#### YWL [Young Workers League].

*Motion carried,* that Comrade Earl Browder be designated as the representative of the CEC on the CEC of the YWL.

Motion carried, that the Political Committee be directed to furnish articles on American conditions requested by Inprecor [International Press Correspondence].

Motion carried, that the actions at the last meeting instructing the Secretary [Ruthenberg] to issue a call for a campaign fund and authorizing the engage-

ments of certain speakers for District 2 [New York] be rescinded.

(The Secretary [Ruthenberg] pointed out that in view of defense subscription lists it would be inadvisable to issue other subscription lists at this time and outlined the "Build the Party Fund Campaign" in connection with the celebration of November 7th [Russian Revolution anniversary].)

*Motion*, that the Political Committee be directed to prepare material for a campaign against SP. *Carried*.

The Secretary [Ruthenberg] read a telegram from Comrade [Bill] Dunne in regard to his return to New York, pointing out that the hearing took place on the 17th and he would be obliged to be at St. Joseph [Michigan] on that date and that he was carrying on work for the Labor Defense Council.

*Motion carried*, that Dunne remain in Chicago on Defense Work until after the 17th and then the matter be given further consideration.

Letter read [from] Godfrey Ebel, IWW prisoner at Leavenworth, asking assistance of the National Defense Committee because the IWW General Defense Committee had refused relief on the ground that he had broken discipline in asking for a parole.

*Motion carried,* that under the circumstances of his having broken the solidarity of his group we are not in a position to grant the assistance asked for.

Motion, that the Education Committee elected to make a report to the convention submit its report at the next meeting of the CEC.

The meeting then adjourned.
