WORLD'S BIG BANKERS POWERFUL DURING WAR

By HERBERT TEMPLE

In a gigantic war like the one now on, bankers of the world are as powerful, perhaps more powerful, than rulers of the nations involved.

France already has appealed to New York bankers for a loan of \$100,000,000.

According to recent weekly returns the five great powers now at war have the following amounts of coin and builtion in their banker.

France, \$948,500,000; Russia, \$872,500,000; Germany, \$422,500,000; Austria-Hungary, \$321,000,000; Great Britain, \$201,000,000.

These could only become available as a war chest if their primary function as backing for paper currency and credit were suspended. They are of greatest value when exercising that function.

It is only on the assumption that the great credit system of the European nations at war should fall utterly to the ground, that they would have to fall back upon their gold reserve to pay for the munitions

In such an event, even the vast appro-priations of the countries smalld not go far toward paying the \$54,000,000 daily that is the estimated cost of the big war. President Wilson is to shendon his plan for the government purchase of a number of freight steamships to carry American experts under the American flag to European ports. The decision came after J. Pierpont Morgan, the New York banker, had declared that private capital could be obtained to purchase all merchant ships now offered for sale-by foreign compenses. 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
