Further, it may be true, as has been confidently asserted, that when peace is proclaimed it will be impossible for the rulers of any of the European nations to neglect the rising forces of democracy, and these new democrace will be more and more inspired by Socialist ideals and impelied toward the enactment of Socialist measures.

It ian't difficult to accept the view respecting the disastrous effects of the war. They are tremendous and far-reaching. The belligerents are burdening their productive capacity. In this respect Germany is worse off than England or France because her industries are largely gardlysed, due to lack of raw materials, and her commerce is greatly reduced because Great Britain commands the seas.

While, therefore, there may be a supply of food in Germany the people may soon be without the means of buying R. This condition prevails to a much less extent in England and France. Russia is better prepared for a long war than any other one of the belligerents. Further news of the activities of the Socialists is awaited with great interest.
