New Coal Contract Signed by 544, 221

With the coal season under way, many union members have requested we run the coal contract negotiated last July by Locals 544 and 221 jointly.

The pact is similar to last year's. An important change is that yard workers now receive a 13c hourly increase, or 78c hourly, for the 9th and 10th hours worked

Full text of the agreement is given below. All coal drivers and yard laborers are advised to clip

The coal dealers of Minneapoli The coal dealers of Minneapolis, Minesota, represented by the Coal Dealers Compliance Committee, agree to be bound by the provisions and requirements of this contract to the end that wages and working conditions in the Coal Industry of Minneapolis can be stabilized on a fair and equitable basis. The General Drivers Union, Local No. 544 and Ice and Coal Drivers Union, Local No. 221, as representing its members and certain other employees employed by tain other employees employed by said coal dealers, also agree to ac-cept and to be bound by the terms and conditions of this contract as

set forth herein:
ARTICLE I The wage scales and working conditions regulated by the terms of this agreement shall apply to all employees engaged in the loading, unloading, storage and delivery service of said employers. There shall be no discrimination against any employee because of union affiliation.

ARTICLE II

No agreement or contract will

All time worked on Sundays and on New Year's Day, Memorial Day, July Fourth, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day shall be paid for at double the regular hourly rate, except employees making Sunday and holiday deliveries of emergency public relief coal orders which shall be paid at one and one-half times the regular hourly rate for such deliveries.

ARTICLE IV The following minimum rates of pay shall prevail for the following classifications:

1. Truck drivers not less than 75c per hour for the first 8 hours worked each day; not less than 90c per hour for the 9th and 10th hours

Armistice Day on the Eve of the Second World War

On the morning of November 11th twenty years ago the guns ceased firing and the first World War to make-the-world-safe-for-democracy, otherwise known as the war-to-end-war, came to an end. The soil of Europe was slippery with the blood of the workers.

There hasn't been ONE day since 1917 that war hasn't been going on some place on our planet.

The armistice was a fraud, just as the slogans for which the war was fought were fraudulent.

Today, twenty years later, the rulers of the world are preparing to plunge us into the Second World War. Everyone knows it is coming. The world is poised on the brink. Some slight incident and the war may, literally,

brink. Some slight incident and the war may, literally, break out tonight, tomorrow.

Consider this one fact. During the ten-year period prior to 1914 all the world spent just twenty billion dollars on armaments. IN THE ONE YEAR 1938 THE WORLD HAS SPENT THE SAME SUM FOR ARMAMENTS, TWENTY BILLION DOLLARS. It was 13 billions in 1936, 15 billions in 1937. Next year, according to the estimates of the Foreign Policy Association, the figure will again rise.

figure will again rise.

The masses of mankind are being ground down into the dust under the iron mountain of arms. The billions that an intelligent society would spend for food, clothing, housing, autos, art, recreation, science, are being spent on instruments for mass murder.

The United States leads in the race to pile up armaments. Last year America spent over one billion dellars.

ments. Last year America spent over one billion dollars. Another billion this year. But the war-makers aren't satisfied. The administration is planning to demand an additional supplementary budget to triple the number of army planes, to put automatic rifles into the hands of 400,000 soldiers, to build up the war reserves to a force of 1,000,000, to prepare industry for a quick shift to a war-time basis, to further enlarge the navy. No serious person pretends that these armaments are for defense. No force could attack the United States. Look at the map, study the writings of the militarists. On this twentieth anniversary of the Armistice Day, it is fitting that every worker should study the Resolution against War and the War-makers adopted by the Minneapolis Central Labor Union on March 23, 1938. The full text of that Resolution is hereby printed.

WHEREAS organized labor is aware of the cruel deception practiced upon it in the last "War to Make the World Safe for Democracy," which destroyed millions of lives and brought about reaction instead of democracy; and WHEREAS the world is threatened with another such



"In both men's and women's wards in the jail workers were often packed together so tightly that they found it impossible to sit down, much less to sleep . . . Twelve year old girls were jammed into cells with prostitutes . . . We were informed that on the evening when police raided houses of prostitution in the city that eighteen prostitutes were thrust into this already over-crowded cell . our local physicians declared that at least 90 per cent of these women were infected with a highly contagious ve-

nereal disease . . . there was one toilet and one drinking cup . . . When the workers protested these conditions the Police Chief ordered the fire hose turned on them to 'quiet them down' . . ."

The present contract under which these employees were workng expires on November 1, 1938. The Pocan Workers Local 172 has prepared a contract for presentation which would average the workers about \$3.50 a week. They are prepared to face again the bullets and the tear gas of labor-hating Police Chief Kilday—just as he is preparing to meet again the workers on the field of battle.
