

WASHINGTON, D. C. - American workers and farmers took a wage cut last week.

Blood brothers!

All along the despotic rulers of Russia and their henchmen abroad have kidded workers, peasants and colonial peoples with the lie that internationalism and non-racism was a cardinal principle of Bolshevism. It took an international crisis to blow that myth to smithereens.

At least Hitler was open and above board about his race theory. Aryanism was his line of propaganda and his foreign bund organizations were limited to people of German extraction. Under the pretense of giving succor to blood brothers, Hitler raided and conquered Austria, the Sudetenland and Danzig. He extended his conquest to take in Bohemia, Slovakia, and now all of Poland, the latter with the aid of Stalin and his "blood brother" policy. These events, like Mussolini's conquest of Ethiopia, prove that racism has nothing to do with the real motives of Europe's tyrants they are imperialists who use the racial issue to camouflage, excite passions and inflame prejudices.

If the Soviet government could not remain indifferent to the fate of its blood brothers, what's to prevent the British, French and Poles in America from getting similarly concerned about their blood brothers in Europe?

What about the millions of Germans in America? Does Molotov, Stalin and other members of the Russian privileged class expect them to be indifferent to the fate of their blood brothers in Germany?

Intelligent American workers will instantly grasp the falsity of the latest Stalinist inven-



Red Fascism on the March

For the second time since the Russian revolution, an army of Russian peasants and workers has crossed the Polish border. The first time it was a revolutionary army, fighting, however mistakenly, for what it considered revolutionary ends. This time it is a red fascist army, joining the Nazis in a simple case of imperialist grab.

Red fascism is a political fact, but only the events of the last few weeks have made this obvious. Until Stalin's troops actually crossed the Polish border, it was still possible to believe that his main concern was to keep Russia out of the dog-fight in order to devote his energy to improving the lot of the Russian masses, and to give China what help he could against the Japanese so that they would have their hands too full to attack him.

When he signed the "non-aggression" pact with Hitler (which has become an aggression pact), many observers believed that Russia was freeing herself in the West so that she would have a free hand to deal with Japan in the East. If the pact with Hitler had been a simple non-aggression pact, and hadn't been coupled with promise of economic aid to the Nazis, Socialists would have welcomed it.

Bolsters Axis

It would have meant that Stalin wasn't going to force the Russian workers and peasants to fight either for England and France's empires, or to get a new one for Germany. It would have meant that they would have been free to help their Chinese brothers in their struggle for colonial independence, and to defend themselves in case of a Japanese attack.

It appears now that the Stalin Nazi pact was made for very different reasons. It was followed by the truce with the Japanese. In the Moscow-Berlin pact, Stalin told Hitler to go ahead against Poland. In the truce with Japan he told the Japanese militarists to go ahead against China. They took him at his word, and for the first time in over a year they have started major military operations against Chiang Kai-Shek.

Thus, both in the East and in the West, it was Stalin who actually let loose the dogs of war, and now must share joint responsibility with Hitler, Chamberlain, Daladier and the

Japanese militarists for the horrible debacle now in progress.

Why the Invasion?

Why did Stalin do it? At first glance, it is incomprehensible. The part of Poland into which the Russian troops marched is terribly poor, inhabited by some of the most backward peasants in all of Europe. It is very sparsely populated, and for a country like Russia with millions of square miles of territory and hundreds of millions of inhabitants, it can have little value, if any.

If it were a highly industrialized area it would be of real economic value to the Soviets. It may have some military value, though well informed observers like Anne O'Hare McCormick and Ernst Henri deny this. As it is, it looks as if Russia had exchanged her valuable and important friendship for China, and what was left of the good will of the capitalist states for which Stalin abandoned the revolution, in order to get a miserable piece of land inhabited by a primitive peasantry.

There are other disadvantages to Stalin's maneuver. He must know that his pact with Hitler is a mere scrap of paper the minute their interests don't coincide. Three weeks ago, they were arch enemies. Three weeks from now they may be at each other's throats again, with this great difference, that where before they were separated by the whole of Poland, today they see the whites of each others eyes.

Baltic in Danger

It is easily possible that Stalin's aggression may not stop at this point. Lithunia, Latvia, Estonia, and perhaps even Finland, are unhappy morsels, ripe for the picking if and when Stalin's appetite is whetted. Rumania has Bessorabia, which once belonged to Russia, and which Stalin might well decide to "free from the "White Terror," "ruthless and barefaced exploitation" and "cultural extinction," from which he is "freeing" the Polish Ukrainians.

Whether all of this has already been agreed upon between Stalin and Hitler we do not know. If not, it presents a great field for possible disagreement. At any rate, mutual distrust is

inevitably present. The one favorable side of the picture is, that with this mistrust present and backed by 4,000,000 Russian soldiers on one side, and 75 German divisions on the other, neither can move without the permission of the

This means that Hitler will have to maintain considerable force in the East, even after Poland is completely subjugated, and will not be able to throw his full might against England and France. This, of course, is on the assumption that Stalin has no intention of fighting England and France. We cannot see that there would be any gain in his doing so. Indeed, it might mean the collapse of his regime.

Which brings us to what seems the most likely explanation for his attack on Poland. Since there is no economic or military object in taking the Polish Ukraine, there must have been a political motive. All the facts point to this answer to the question—that Stalin is going in for foreign adventures because he believes it is the only way in which he can preserve his thoroughly rotten regime in Russia.

Economic Strain

The day before Stalin's attack, Harold Denny, New York Times Russian correspondent, wrote from Paris that he did not believe that Russia would fight because, "First of all, Mr. Stalin's state is already under an almost unendurable economic strain. Naturally, he fears a disastrous breakdown that would jeopardize if not destroy his regime. In the second place, Mr. Stalin would fear to put arms in the hands of the peasants and the ordinary workers. Their living standards are appallingly low and they are now beginning to suspect it."

All of this would hold true for a major war which would strain the overburdened Soviet economy beyond endurance. It does not hold for the conquest of states and areas too weak to put up any kind of a defense. Stalin, as Hitler, is hoping that foreign adventures will unite a dissatisfied people behind him. We hope he has miscalculated, and as he comes to full view in his Red Fascist uniform, the revolutionary Russian masses will arise once more and, destroying Stalinism, march forward again toward the goal of Socialism.

Peace - - But How?

I have just returned to Chicago after several weeks in New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington, D. C. In these eastern cities where public consciousness is probably far more preoccupied with events in Europe than with events in the United States at this time, one finds the same verbal determination to "Keep America Out of War," to maintain a strict "neutrality" that one finds in the mid-

Neutrality has supplanted "democracy" as the most popular word in the American vocabulary today. But like "democracy" it is likely to mean all things to all men. The president and the former proponents of collective security contend that neutrality can only be maintained by revision of the neutrality act and the enactment of the "cash and carry" provision. Others, including the isolationists, most of the pacifists and Socialists, believe that such revision is the quickest way of getting into war.

But it is eloquent of the predominant mood of the American people at this time that the administration which is most determined to intervene in European affairs should have to talk the language of neutrality and of opposition to intervention.

Danger of Apathy

There is a serious danger that the mass of people, including most of the workers, should be fulled into inactivity by this language and accept the president's verbiage at face value.

With this crusading temperament abroad in Washington a few pessimistic wiseacres are convinced that we will be drawn in within six months.

However the most serious danger probably lies in another direction. That is the direction of "war prosperity"—higher wages and more employment for the workers, bigger profits and expansion for business men. They will believe, of course, that the war trade carries with it no danger of American involvement (one can forget a lot in 22 years). In short, that we can continue to coin millions out of the blood of Europe without being expected to participate in the actual dirty work abroad. (The Allies were so delighted with our non-participation in 1914-17 that they made no attempt to drag us in!) The next step, after economic intervention, will be military.

Here is where we Socialists have a job to do and it looks as though we may have to do it pretty much on our own-with some support from certain other radical groups. We must carry our anti-war propaganda, our campaign of education on the real meaning of war-prosperity directly into the labor unions with leaflets, with speeches, with every resource at our command.

Our Special Job

The pacifists—at least the organized pacifists—are not going to do this job. They may do valuable work among the middle classes, the churches, the students, but from what I have seen of their activity in the past few weeks, they either underestimate or ignore the importance of inoculating LABOR against the
