## The Monopoly Investigation

The monopoly investigation ofefore it adjourned is currently ocerpying the attention of the occrpying the atteatitals New Dealers. These Capitals New emen to expect great gentlemen from the investigation and a goolu is being heard in sounding taik is it.
: prominent economist charge of one phase of the inquiry, for instance, has told his staff, "If you have an idea that this is going to be just a monopoly investigation, you had betgation of the entire capitalist system."

And, indeed, an examination of the investigating committee's powers and the scope of its work is very apt to impress the observer With the importance inquiry. That is, until one realizes that neither this commit capitalist New Deal government can hope to arrive anywhere near a soluth which would entail, of course, the overthrow of capitalism.

REAL AMMUNITION
Although realistic Socialists can have no faith in the ability of the investigators to solve any problems, at the same time the committee will undoubtedly gather much factual miormation munition for Socialist ant Sbm.
The investigation is being conducted under the Monopoly Inquiry Act, urged by President Roosevelt in a message to Con-
gress, and passed on June 14. The act set up a Temporary National Economic Committee of 12 consisting of 3 senators, 3
representatiges, and 6 heads of representatiges, and 6 heads of the Committee is-Senator-OMMa hony of Wyoming, who sponsor ed the act in the Senate.

NATURE OF PROBE
The committee is instructed to Investigate "monopoly and concentration of economic power in; and financial control over production and ristribution of goods and services." Statements issued By the commitee's spokesmen directed very largely into the following three channels:

1. Corporate stucture and powers (with special emphasis ing and credit, and corporate ing and
finance.)

## 2. Price fixing policies.

3. The patent system.

ing $\$ 2,000,000$. This is obviously uneconomic, as the steel in dustry is even now running at capacity.

Another interesting sidelight of self-reform, is that, for the time being at least, the Procurement Division of the Treasury

supposedly competing firms. supposedly competing firms. Probably the most important aspect of the inquiry is the financial end, and more particularly, that part of it dealing with credit monopoly.
