## TOKIO PRESS 6 Drastic Sanctions ON SOVIETS By Fifty-Two Nations

MOSCOW, Oct. 14.-While the Soviet government awaited Japan's reply to its strenuous protest over bloody, provocative Japanese-Manchurian border raids, cables from Tokyo tell of a press campaign of threats and vilification inspired by the military clique

GENEVA, Oct. 14. - Six drastic financial sanctions against Italian fascism were to night decreed by the League of Nations large sanctions Committee of Fifty-Two Nations. Italy's allies, Hungary, Austria and Albania, again abstained on all votes.

On the initiative of Great Britain, the deadline for beginning the actual execution of these collective financial penalties was fixed at Oct. 31. Two exemptions were included under the general categories of religious and humanitarian projects.
