Powerful Pressure on Governor Is Called the Chief Weapon

The moment that Angelo Herndon hears the prison gate locked behind him, a writ of habeas corpus will be sought to free him at once. the International Labor Defense announced yesterday. The writ will be asked for on the ground that the least seventy-five deputized guards Oct. 8. "insurrection" statute under which he was convicted to from 18 to 20 years on the chain gang.

Because the United States Supreme Court, which has refused to pass upon Herndon's case, has not yet sent its mandate to the officials of the State of Georgia, Herndon will not have to surrender to the Atlanta authorities until Monday.


