# How the Campaign for Angelo Herndon Can Be Broadened

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#### PART II

In the first part of this article, we said of the Herndon signature petition campaign: "It is safe to say that the campaign has only begun, and that its prowing impetus will speed it up tenfold and more in the next weeks."

This statement is based, of course on the assumption that the organizations involved, and especially the International Labor Defense, will themselves increase the speed and intensity of their work, will strain every effort to broaden the campaign and develop the united front around it. This means real hard work, along clearly defined, concrete lines of endeavor, in every city in the country. .

As the campaign develops, new forms of activity and organization will have to be developed with it, and the work among the trade unions must be greatly increased. this direction in New York City. The recent Herndon conference in Philadelphia, and the forthcoming conference in Pittsburgh, offer an excellent basis from which to work. But these are only three cities, and only a beginning even in these. The trade unions are still very little involved even here.

These committees should be set up through a conference of all organizations participating in the campaign in each city, with invited representatives from other organizations, and especially from trade unions. Such conferences can be arranged and called within a very short time.

1. Concrete plans for broadening the campaign in each city, for penetrating trade unions and other organizations and involving them in the activities.

2. The election of an executive committee which will meet periodically to check up on the work done, and develop further activity. 3. Establishment of quotas signatures to be collected by each organization, and of funds to be will have to be the subject of a raised for the expense of the cam-

ors. Judges, etc .- to secure their signatures to the petitions and endorsement of the campaign.

5. Specific assignments for visiting of trade unions, especially those which have already gone on record in the Mooney, Gallup and Scottsboro campaigns, and those who have in the past been supported by the I. L. D., to involve them in the collection of signatures. Similar assignments in regard to other organizations, churches, fraternal groups, clubs, etc.

6. Plans for united action in the form of meetings and demonstrations demanding the freedom of Herndon, on Oct. 1, when the United States Supreme Court reconvenes, with the application for re-hearing of the Herndon appeal before it.

These actions on Oct. 1 should be planned at once, at informal meetings and conferences initiated by the ILD., with the representatives that can be gotten together of the participating organizations. Concrete plans for meetings and demonstrations should be worked out for presentation to the Herndon conferences for endorsement and-
