have the shortsighted ratepayers paid in interest on these loans during these 40 years Interest under any trading transaction is nothing short of moral robbery, but to pay interest on what you have not received and for the sum to stand as a debt against you is double robbery See how the interest on the discount on this loan works out Forty years interest at 3% on the \$6422 12 comes to £7680 which is £1258 over the original sum So that we have paid £7680 in interest on a gratuity to the stock holders of £6422 worth of stock and we still owe them the full amount

Take another small case and I am writing small cases to expose a system which spins out over such long periods the repayments of small loans, for the sole purpose of exploiting the workers:

The weighing machine at the top of Derby Road, was purchased for £2000 nett, and discount of £253 17 13 in the year 1876, The outstanding balance of this account on the 31st, March 1919, was £1078 3 9:

That means we have not reduced the real loan by one half in 43 years although we must have paid the total in interest during the past 43 years The discount of £253 17 10 we have paid in full in interest, and still we owe it, shall finally pay this sum to the stock holders although we never had anything of value for it. The Public Park Estate, The Public Bath Estate, in fact all these estates

are crushed down with very old loans such as I have detailed. Some of them should be dealt with to save

our sense of shame.

Take this one as a case in point Disinfecting Station, Windsor Street Loan £550, 15 7 which includes a discount of £50 15 7. on issue. This was contracted in the year 1876. The outstanding balance on the 31st. Mar 1919. was £213 15 2. This means we were so poor as a City that we could mot find £500 to undertake work safeguarding the health of our citizens but we had to borrow it, and give palance on the 31st Mar, 1919 the investors over £50 to lend us £500 226657 2 4 The average life of That is over 43 years back and we loans is about 40 years so that have paid already considerable more ng the past 40 years we have in interest than the original loan and reduced the liabilities on this we still owe £213 15 2. Again I te by £15452 127 How much repeat the constitution of all local

governing bodies has been so framed by the Legistative as to safeguard the capitalist system, and to prevent the possibilty of any action by advanced men of the Labour Movement or theintelligent middle class, from carrying out reforms that would tend to undermine the capitalist system.

Means must be devised by which urgent reforms can be carried out without resorting to this system of borrowing on the capitalist market, which is the cause of nine tenths of our present debt. Municipalities must have greater powers in financial matters by which alone can they relieve themselves of present difficulties. If these facts could be brought home to the vast body of voters I feel sure that the men who understand finance would soon dominate all our councils, Then they could make things hum.

A EXAMPLE FOR BRITISH WORKERS.

A week ago the Italian metalworkers entered upon an astonishing experiment of the first importance. For nearly a month they had been engaged in an obstinate struggle with the employers for increased wages. The employers refused to concede the increased demand, and the men refused to abate their demands, the situation seemed hopeless Then suddenly the workers executed their coup de force. With an astonishing spontane ty they seized practically the whole of the machine shop iron foundries, and steel works in Italy, including the famous 'Fiat" works at Turin.

ITALIAN SOVIET

The directors were thrust outside the gates, and the gates locked, with armed workers to guard them-Red Guards, as they were at once called Then, most astonishing thing of all work was calmly resumed as it nother ing had happened.

A Shop Committee or soviet, was elected in each establishment in the captured industry by a full assembly of all the workers employed in it, even including the engineers, skilled workers, and clerks. who have never before in the history of industrial Italy been known to co-operate with the mass of less-skilled employers.

These Soviets immediately took over the functions of the banished directors and managers, and up to the present have worked admirably Production is proceeding normally and even super-normally. for in some shops and foundries it is claimed that the output under the Soviets is 10% higher than before, owing to

the new eager spirit of co-operation shown by men who feel that for the first time they are working for them-

selves.
