Communist Leaders Meet, Call Party National Convention

AMERICAN COMMUNISTS will hold their sixteenth national convention next December, it was announced yesterday (Wed.) by the party after a four-day enlarged nation-

al committee meeting at its national healquarters. Fifty party leaders from the principal State party organizations attended.

It was the first such full meeting of the national committee since 1951, when most of the committee members were imprisoned under the Smith Act. William Z. Foster, party national chairman. whose case was severed because of a grave cariac ailment, appeared briefly at the meeting.

The convention will be preceded by a 60-day pre-convention discussion and an election conference after Labor Day.
