

# 50 Students Back From Cuba; House Anti-Red Panel Calls 10

Fifty American students who defied the United States ban on travel to Cuba returned here last night. Ten were served subpoenas to appear before the House Un-American Activities Committee in Washington on Sept. 12.

Forty-five students refused for more than two hours to pass through immigration procedures in a protest against a move to invalidate their passports.

When the first four students presented their passports, the documents were stamped "Not Valid—Tentatively Withdrawn." All but one of the other students then refused to present their passports for inspection. The exception held a passport that expired last midnight.

The students abandoned their protests when Federal officials decided not to stamp the passports but simply to give the students letters stating that the passports had been tentatively withdrawn.

The students arrived at 6:36 P.M. from Madrid on a plane of the Iberia Air Lines of Spain after an eight-week stay in Cuba as the guest of Premier Fidel Castro.

A squad of policemen watched as process servers for the House committee moved among the group outside the arrivals building at Idlewild Airport. At a recent news conference,

President Kennedy said some among the student group were "definitely Communists."

All the members of the student group did not clear the immigration section until about midnight. One student told newsmen the group had planned to remain inside the restricted immigration enclosure until their right as United States citizens to travel freely was recognized and the invalidating of passports was stopped.

When William T. McConarty Jr., officer in charge of the Airport Section of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service, announced that Federal officials had decided not to stamp the passports, a spokesman for the group called this a victory.

Clark Foreman, director of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, said the change of procedure by the Government would enable the students to use their passports for identification and even for travel abroad. He said it would then be up to the State Department to take the students to court to prove a violation of the department's passport regulations.

Mrs. Mary Kaufman, counsel for the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee, was allowed to enter the restricted area to advise the students. Levi Laub,

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the leader of the group, read a copy of the regulation on which the State Department acted.

Mr. McConarty said the students had not violated any immigration law but a passport regulation of the State Department.

Four of the group remained in Spain. They were identified as Mr. and Mrs. John R. Glenn of Huntington, Ind., James Lee of Daly City, Calif., and Christopher Todd Stuart of Winchester, Va.

While the students were going through immigration, the Student Committee for Travel who made the trip. The statement read in part:

"Our trip to Cuba violates no law and is in the best interests of all Americans."

As the students filed off the plane, one tall, blond youth shouted to reporters, "Hey, fellows," and then dropped to the ground and kissed it.

The statement said the students had found "American citizens are as safe to travel and or visit Cuba as they are to walk the streets of New York City, if not more so."

It said that the Cuban Government had shown them "the failures as well as the accomplishments of the Cuban revolution". The students said the majority of Cubans they had met supported the revolution. But they conceded that they had met people who opposed it. The statement also said that the revolution was secure.

The students, who came home by way of Madrid, are scheduled to tell a public meeting in Town Hall Sept. 15 what they saw.

### Moderator Named

The Town Hall rally will include a panel discussion by up to six of the students. The panel will be moderated by I. F. Stone a writer, according to the Student Committee for Travel to Cuba, 421 Seventh Avenue. Other speakers are to include Maxwell Geismar, critic; Carleton Beals, writer, and James Higgins, assistant editor of The York (Pa) Gazette and Daily.

A letter seeking sponsors for the rally has been sent out by Truman Nelson, Salem (Mass.) novelist and historian, who traveled to Cuba last month with State Department permission.

Mr. Nelson's letter said he had found the Cuban people had "no hostility" toward Americans, and that "nothing could be more absurd than the contention that visitors there need the protection of the American State Department."

Representatives of United States Embassies in London, Amsterdam and Prague had warned the students, while they were on their way to Cuba, that they faced possible penalties of up to five years in prison and \$5,000 in fines. Fifty-nine continued on to Cuba, arriving June 30. One of the group died in Cuba, three have stayed on temporarily, four remained in Madrid and one arrived here Monday.
