## He Is the First New Yorker Convicted Under 1901 Law in 46 Years

William Epton, the 33-yearold Communist who was convicted of criminal anarchy and spreading the Harlem riots of 1964, was sentenced yesterday to a year in jail. In imposing sentence, Supreme Court Justice Arthur Markewich said Epton envisioned himself "as a hero, a leader, a Lenin, a Trotsky, a

"But I can't see that at all," Justice Markewich said of Epton, an electrical worker who headed the Harlem branch of the Progressive Labor Movement, an ultraleftist group. "He didn't lead any great cause."
