The development of Rhode Island Student Movement has been a long struggle. In the earliest stages of our development, the struggle against "bourgeois hang-ups" appeared in many forms. The most prominent form being anarchism. There were certain people who wanted a "tea-group" instead of a revolutionary student movement, and others from a so-called "left" position who took up the practice of almost hitting pedple over the head if they didn't fit up to their metaphysical standards of what a rev-study and discussion groups which are olutionary was. After the split, serious summing up of the history of our movement began. Public meetings were held to pursue this question. A great deal of discussion and struggle followed about the lessons to be learned from our past successes and failures, and about the tasks at hand.

We saw the main task at hand to have two aspects. We saw the necessity to start from scratch and, under the slogan "divide the forces to arouse the masses," to develope basic discussion groups on the general question of American culture. The experience gained through practice during this time was instrumental in the development of the here today.

The second point is that the anti-fascist struggle of the American working class is our own struggle. The American people have nothing without revolution, and there can be no revolution without a revolutionary political party. The building of such a party, and preparation of public opinion for it, must be our task also.

In January of 1972, the CAMPAIGN TO COM- . BAT CULTURAL FASCISM was announced. This campaign made concrete the general tasks

of the program which were:

-- to wage class struggle in the classroom against all anti-scientific anti-working class ideas as well as fascist classroom restrictions. We saw the necessity for representing the proletarian revolutionary line in the schools and universities. -to support mass democratic, anti-fascist organizations and develope fraternal relations with them, and to develope basic mass democratic study and discussion groups in order to further strengthen our ties among the masses.

-- to hold mass-democratic meetings on political topics in order to popularize and develope our struggle against fascism. -- to distribute works of great communists and support and distribute organs of propaganda of the American Communist Worker's Movement (Marxist-Leninist) and other fraternal revolutionary organizations, and, -- to produce and distribute Rhode Island Student to sum up developments within and report on the growing struggle against fascism in the university and across the country as a whole, in order to raise the level of this struggle.

At this time we began a protracted campaign, the first of its kind in R.I. It is the culture offered to us and perpetuated by all the decaying institutions in this country which have no ties to anyone but United States Imperialism -- the "mass" media, the churches, try is now controlled by US monopoly capitalism. The "freedom of the individual" as promoted in our culture is nothing other than the freedom of the individual to serve this end. Any freedoms taken beyond that point are suppressed by those who depend on US imperialism for their existence. When one accepts and supports the status quo one cannot promote ideas which help to clarify issues, generalize experience and bring about real and long-lasting social change. This cannot be done because these ideas will help us to overthrow fascism, the parasitic rule of US monopoly capitalism.

Fascist culture attempts to prevent us from doing three things. It attempts to prevent us from seeing our own position and the nature of our enemy clearly in the context of history and social progress, it attempts to prevent us from taking any action based on a throughgoing analysis of American class society, and creates cultural roadblocks to unity under the slogan of "bourgeois individualism" --- an individualism based on egocentrism.

The soul of fascist culture is the obscuring and denying of the role of the masses in history. The American working class is rising, and is very willing and capable of seizing state power from the small handful of US monopoly capitalists and their agents. Revolution is an historical inevitability and the only sol-

ution to our problems.

We students and intellectuals can not sit and dream up a genuine people's culture in the midst of modern American fascism. We can prepare the groundwork genuine people's culture only by destroying the decaying culture and ideology of the exploiting classes which have ruled us. This will help prepare material conditions for the final everthrow of fascism in all spheres of American society,

This forum to COMBAT CULTURAL FASCISM could by no means be the final word on cultural fascism. Combatting cultural fascism means taking up the world outlook of the international proletariat as our own-the outlook of just struggle, principled unity on the basis of solving concrete problems, and revoluus and without us. It is particularly interse among students and intellectuals where the old worn out carrot of a bourgeois career is still held out to us. The American Communist Workers Movement (Marxist-Leninist) has called upon us to take up the struggle in the cultural and ideological sphere. This is our own struggle.
