CRESTWOOD! WHO'S NEXT

Since 1946 the Crestwood Teachers have been either on strike to get a contract of in the classroom without one. In 1970, a one year contract was negotiated before Labor Day, coincidentaly, the board faced recall that September. The years of 1971 and 1973 found teachers on the job with no contract and no increments for both years. In 1972, a strike ended in binding "fact-finding" where the Crestwood board showed that the General Fund Equity would be reduced from \$316,000 to \$84,000 that year. The "fact-finder" chose the board's economic package, and after paying the settlement, the board ended up with a General Fund Equity of \$298,000! In 1974, after attempting to bargain a contract for a YEAR AND A HALF, the Crestwood Teache s defied injunctions and jail threats, paid fines, and finally, 90% strong, voted to remain on strike and were fired.

The MEA began the organization of support strikes in the Tri-County Area and thousands of teachers, many AFL-CIO locals and other labor forces prepared to walk out and stay out until the fired teachers were reinstated.

On Jan. 7, 1975, the day before the Tri-County snowball was scheduled to roll, the MEA leadership, without consulting its rank and file, (who had to approve the strike) decided to rely on the "justice" of the courts rather than the strength of its own membership.

Since then, every legal decision that has stuck has upheld the Crestwood board. The teachers remain fired for engaging in an illegal work stoppage, a handful have had hearings prior to firing, a few have resigned, maybe thirty have found employment elsewhere. There is reason to believe that the board has circulated a "blacklist" in an attempt to deprive Crestwood teachers from employment elsewhere. The MEA has allowed the Crestwood EA to be snashed and no doubt will unionize the scabs. The MEA has, by its lack of action, jeopardized the bargaining power of ALL public employees, and is now placing its hopes in the hands of the Supreme Court. It is unlikely that the law of the land will support the Crestwood Teachers. If there is one thing the state does not want or need in a period of economic crisis and rising fascism, it's another organized sector of the working class standing up to fight for its rights. The fate of the Crestwood teachers clearly shows that inspite of the "professionalism" that is rammed down our throats and the bribes such as good salaries and benefits, teachers are part of the working class whose rights are under attack.

Historically, the state has enforced penalties far more severe than firing for workers who have fought for rights, better working conditions and better living standards. It is only by reliance upon the strength and unity of our membership will we ever be able to fight the state. History of such revolutionary struggle, the study of Marxism-Leninism, testifies that workers need leadership that will not sell their people out. That's why we must build communist teacher groups in every union local who will fight for reform and understand the necessity of socialism before our struggle ends. It is only when we take on the state will we truly be able to set priorities all democratic loving people want---quality education, jobs for all able workers, peace.

Defend and support the Crestwood teachers!

The development of such a Party does not occur abstract! The party must fight side by side with non-party workers in the increasing struggle. It must win the respect of the worke in the increasing struggle. It must win the respect of the workers and convince them of its correctness and leadership. It is only in the daily struggle of the workers themselves that two things absolutely necessary to the development of the Party and the development of the revolution can occur: (1) the fusion of the leaders of the struggle itself and the Party and (2) correctly choosing the path from the direct experience of the masses.

Busing is also a fight against second rate education for all working class children, irregardless of skin color. Why? Because the educational system in this country is based squarely along class lines. Whose children are in the elite private schools or public schools of Bloomfield Hills, Grosse Pointe?. It is the children of national minorities who historically are first attacked and suffer the worst schools in our nation. The working class must unite to fight for not only equal education for all but quality education for our entire class.

All progressive people must rally behind the NAACP's exposure of the Detroit's educational system. How else will we get class size reduced, textbooks and supplies, and enrichment and remedial programs back into our curriculums? Our union certainly gives the struggle up fast enough! Both the state and the school board only despair over the deteriating situation! But the exposure is not a solution and the solution will only come when the community organizes together to put pressure on our government federally to nationalize funding of education to guarantee equal educational opportunities for all children.

We can also support the few gains made by the DeMascio decision while exposing its inadequacies as well. Forces are working hard against even this first step, and not accidentally. Mother's Alert Detroit (MAD), Lobsinger's American Nazi Party, Wallace's American Independence Party and the Ku Klux Klan have all been on the scene organizing to maintain a division and disrupt this fight for equal education among the working class..

Historically we must understand that fascism came into power whenever there was a strong upheaval in a country and "democratic" means could not contain the unrest as the state so desired. The fascists get their way only if progressive people "look the otherway" and there is not a strong communis party clearly pointing out the danger to the working class. The C.L.P. clearly took its stands in northeast Detroit last spring and made it clear that any "fascists" attack would be countered. Thus Northeast Mother's Alert had an unexpected counter demonstration in their territory!

Teachers too must <u>speak out</u>! Students must be shown the difference between defending personal privilege and fighting to defend democratic rights that can be collectively won for all. School boycotts in the northeast or northwest must be exposed for what they clearly are! Teachers can also <u>act</u>! MAD is holding a dinner in East Detroit, Oct. 19th at 6:30 p.m. to build a "freedom" fund. Hundreds of progressive people will be there on the <u>outside</u> from the shops, schools, and churches of Detroit to see who is responsible for this kind of "madness" that jeopardizes children's safety and obstructs our desire for a more decent educational system in Detroit. Act now to keep their hate from organizing more misled, Frightened Detroiters who do not know we can only get what we all want by fighting together instead of each other.

EMPLOYED & UNEMPLOYED: FIGHT FOR JOBS!

Many American teachers were laid off last year and didn't have jobs in September. There are 100 less teachers in Detroit this year than last and we know our class size isn't reducing. Many more graduates from colleges this year are unable to find teaching jobs like those teachers who have graduated in the last ten years. New York teachers struck because the Board of Education laid off 9,400 regular and substitute teachers in a desperate move due to New York's financial bind. But teachers aren't the only victims of unemployment due to economic crisis.

In Michigan there are at least half a million unemployed and in Detroit alone there are a quarter of a million unemployed. The type and amounts of relief offered to victims of this crisis are totally unsatisfactory. This situation stands in stark contrast to socialist countries where unemployment is unheard of and where employment is for all and is geared to the betterment of the quality of life.

Because of this reoccuring crisis under capitalism a Michigan Unemployment Coalition has been set up to fight for reforms benefiting the employed and unemployed and to build a statewide unemployed movement.

Specifically this coalition is presenting two bills. Currently it is contacting legislators to sponsor these bil in the Senate and the House. The first bill will do away w all disgualifications for unemployment compensation if one worked the minimum number of weeks. The bill will insure a end to thirteen week waiting period and an end to disqualit cations for quitting or being fired etc. Also the bill would see to it that people collecting compensation for bei unemployed would receive at least 75% of their regular wage As well the bill would outlaw all forced work programs which are an attack on welfare recipients and the whole labor movement. It will also do away with the discriminatory sur disqualification for unemployed teachers. The second bill place a moratorium on foreclosures, evictions, electrical, gas, telephone cutoffs, garnishments, raising rents or mortgage payments while unemployed. This moratorium would last through the crisis; the definition of crisis would be whenever there is 5% unemployed in a given locality.

We, as teachers must support these bills and publicize them to other working people. We should also get community organizations to support them and demand immediate action. Further, we must contact the members of the Senate and House to solicit their support. We must do all we can to push for reforms that will strengthen the position of working peopl against the ruling class. These reforms will also furthe struggle in our fight for socialism. At the same time, the working ass gains more and more experience from every foray against te capitalists--every strike for better wages, every mass eting for equal rights and every campaign to better the ciety in which we live; each of these offers a naked ample of the limitations of capitalism and a glimmer of our stiny, our future life when the working class will organize roduction for the betterment of the many rather than for the cofits for the few.
