Pear Comrades,

At the present time the organization is in a state of economic crisis. Funds on hand amount to less than \$100.00. Debts are mounting. Not one letter can be written, not one sheet of paper can be used, and not one stamp can be licked without us being spaced in the face by the material reality of the need for money. This lack of funds severely handicaps our ability to move forward on the ideological, political and organizational fronts.

The critical situation now confronting us is connected in a thousand ways to the "left line that has dominated the organization. On not one occasion has a financial report been presented to the CC or the rest of the organization. The dues policy and fundraising program has always been connected to the most nebulous set of goals, never anything concrete. The dues policy was a reflection of nothing more than pure equalitarianism and sheer idealism. Cadre making \$300.00 a month paid the same dues (i.e., \$20) as cadre making \$200.00 a month. Money has been borrowed from various individuals and districts with grand promises of repayment. With more and more money being needed to finance our expansionist aims, the promise to repay these loans became no more than empty babble. A key question is -- Where has all this money some? It's some to finance grandiose schemes to expand our Iskra to 32 pages. It's gone to build a large organizational bureaucracy called the Mational Center. It's cone to move people from California to Detroit for the primary purpose of pursuing hegemonic desires. It's gone to a thousand different places. Fad not the struggle against the 'left line broke out, even more money would have probably come to build a district in Poston, or to pay rent on a large building to house our ever-expanding Mational Center. When new funds were needed in order to more fully implement the 'left' line, the November fundraising campaign was conceived. The plan was no more than a reflection of the volunteer subjectivist outlook of its designers. Paying no heed to the real situation inside and outside the organization (i.e., low wages, increasing unemployment, rising cost of living, etc.), it was decided that we would do in one month that which we have found difficult to do in one year -- namely, raise \$8,000. Even more ironical is the fact that those responsible for this fundraising program placed great stress on the need to view fundraising as a ploitical task (i.e., that we should go among the masses and link fundraising to political activity). "Ind you, these are the same designers who led us in carrying forth the "left" line, the essence of which is the breach between the subjective and the objective factors. This breach in a number of districts has left our cadres isolated from the masses. Thus to phrasemonger about going to the masses for money at a time when our contacts among the masses (both qualitatively and quantitatively) are at a low point represents either wishful thinking or the desire to manipulate the masses under a political guise. This Wovember call for a super-buman leap by cadre under the slogan Bolshevize the Panks represented nothing less than the substitution of one's fantasies for reality.

Comrades, these are but a few ways in which the "left" line within the organization has led to our financial ruin. We should clarify here before proceeding (lest our dogmatists and nit-pickers jump for joy) that the development of a newspaper, the "ational Center and a fundraising campaign are not had things in and of themselves. Pather it is the idealist conception of the above in conjunction with the subjectivist sonception of the state of the organization that represents the fundamental "left" error.

On the other hand Comrades, there has also been a Right tendency within the organization in regards to dues, fundraising, and the financial policy in general. This tendency though not dominant, is nonetheless dangerous. This Right tendency is reflected in the following ways: 1. failure to pay dues or even report difficulties when encountered: 2. apprehension and thus a reluctance to pay dues during a period of intense internal struggle. 3. failure to search for creative and more permanent methods to raise funds: 4. failure to go beyond the letter of the law and to contribute more than is officially required. 5. failure to take advantage of every possible program of the state, (i.e., food stamps, welfare, etc.), thus at times living in self-induced misery. The light tendency is reflected here in the fear of the state. The "left" tendency is reflected here also, in the "poit-alone", super revolutionary outlook of some Comrades; 6. making a separation between one's personal life and one's political life, thus maintaining private treasures of personal wealth while the rest of the organization and individual cadres are experiencing great material difficulty. Pence, opting to maintain privelage while giving lip service to the "desire to sacrifice all for the revolution." 7. pessimism expressed by the maintenance of private funds to be used just in case "BWC doesn't make it." These are simply a few of the ways in which the Right tendency raises its uply head in the RMC.

From this partial assessment, it becomes perfectly clear that both the "left" and Picht tendencies have led us to the same end---that of financial ruin. What more clear examples do we need to understand why we must smash "left" opportunism while maintaining visilence against the Picht.

In order to solve our economic problems as well as to have the necessary resources to meet ever growing demands (i.e., increased political work, holding an organizational Congress, publish an organizational newsletter, publish an internal journal, purchase a copy machine, etc.), we feel the following three objectives must be immediately accomplished; antelember soul seub of shaper at motissimpro

- in the fear of the state. The "left" tendency is reflected here also. 1. The minimum dues for all cadre who are working or receiving any type of social benefits (e.g., welfare, unemployment, supplementary pay, social security, veteran's benefits, disability checks, money to attend school, etc.) and who make less than \$200.00 per week is one (1) day's salary per month. For persons falling in the above categories but make \$200.00 or more per week, two (2) day's salary per month must be contributed. These dues should be computed on the basis of a persons WWT (i.e., after taxes) income.
- 2. All cadres having savings accounts, trust funds, stocks, bonds, and the like must contribute the full interest, dividends, etc. to the organization on a quarterly basis. who bear to been ew of selective reals ever
- The above represents the minimum amount of dues to be contributed. Upon examination of a cadre's budget, he or she may be assessed more by the Pistrict Committee. the current economic state of the organization
- 4. 60% of all dues and any other money raised must be sent to the Mational Center. The other 40% remains in the district. Districts should also establish cash reserves based on their particular requirements. The national share (60%) of all money collected should be sent to the National Center before extracting money for local needs.
- For the present time, dues should be sent in the form of money orders made payable to the Plack Workers Freedom Convention. All dues should be mailed to the P.O. box. Dues are due in Detroit by the 8th of every month.
- Every district must submit a report by 3/28/75, of their dues payment for the last six months. If you missed paying dues or paid only partial dues

during this period, please explain why. All districts are required to keep two sets of financial records.

- 7. Every district must submit by 3/23/75 a report on the income and economic situation of every cadre within the district or Mational Center. At the minimum these reports should show such things as a solution of annual

- 11. Finally Comrades, in light of the critical nature of our current situation we are asking that if all possible, fundraising activities be taken up that will bring us some immediate return. These are just a few steps that must be taken in order to BEGIN to rectify o our situation. More must be done and suggestions will be coming forward in the future. In closing we would like to say that the most stalwart region in the country in terms of financially supporting the organization has been the southern region. The Pirmingham district deserves special attention here. Though placued by probably some of the lowest wages, worse working conditions, and lowest standard of living of any district in the organization, they have consistently contributed more than their assessed dues. When unable to meet their assessment they have always reported this before the money was due. Their example can serve as a model for the rest of the organization. Thus we say that in matters of finance — LEARN FROM BIRMINGHAM !!!
