KISSINGER BANS BLANCO

On Sept. 24th Sec. of State Henry Kissinger decided to ban Hugo Blanco from the U.S. by refusing him a visa for this USLA speaking tour. Blanco was declared "ineligible" for a visa under Section 212-A 28 of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act (amended in 1965), better known as the McCarran-Walter Act, a piece of McCarthy era witch hunt legislation.

According to State Dept. spokeswoman Diane Villard this law denies the right to travel into the U.S. to people who "write, or publish, or advocate, or teach" the overthrow of the United States or any other "organized government"; "communist doctrines"; assaulting or killing cops; "damage, or entry, or destruction of property", or "sabotage". Villard refused to say which category Blanco was supposed to fall under, claiming it was "classified information".

Kissinger's decision came in the midst of mounting protest over the State Dept's months long footdragging on the visa, As the attached list shows, support for Blanco's right to travel to the U.S. and speak has come from a broad range of individuals and groups.

Kissinger's decision doesn't mark the end of the fight for Blanco's right to speak in the U.S., but the beginning of a much larger defense and protest campaign. USLA is launching a four pronged defense campaign to force a reversal of this decision:

1. To step up the flow of protest letters and mailgrams. Send them to: Sec. of State Henry Kissinger, Dept. of State, Wash., D.C. 20515. Attached list indicates the broad range of prominent type individuals and organizations that can be approached.

2. Media work. We must bring this case and the issues involved to the attention of the public if we are to generate sufficient pressure to win. A new press release will be issued shortly. Several areas have already held news conferences to protest the ban with locally prominent individuals. The Helsinki accords violation will probably prove to be the most interesting aspect of the case to the media.

3. Turn the Blanco tour schedule into a protest tour. A national USLA staff person who has been coordinating the protest campaign, Mike Kelly, will tour (see the attached proposed tour schedules and suggested quotas to meet travel expenses). Prominent civil libertarians, Latin Americanists, student leaders, and other prominent individuals should be invited to bring greetings to the meetings to chew the breadth of support for the defense of Blanco's right to trevel (and their right to hear him).
