## YCL 'LEFT TURN' HIDES STALIN'S REACTIONARY FOREIGN POLICY

The nauseating spectacle of the "left turn" adaptation of the Young Communist League to the needs of the Moscow - Berlin axis has just been completed in the latest issue of the Young Communist

And what an utterly disgusting and shameless sight it is! With what ease do these pen-prostitutes, these youthful candidates for the task of being Stalinist boot-lickers, haul out the old revolutionary phrases which they had long ago discarded, for the purpose of masking the reactionary alliance of Stalin with Hitler.

Yesterday they howled for a holy war for democracy. Yesterday they hailed President Roosevelt as the Saviour himself. Yesterday whoever suggested that a war of England and France would be a reactionary and imperialist war and undeserving of the work-ers support they labeled as a Fasc-ist spy. All this they said because their master, Stalin, was phenagling around with the English and French ruling classes; and the price which Stalin paid for this was to make his lackeys in these countries become loyal supporters of capitalism.

#### Tune Changes

Now their tune has changed. With utter nonchalance, they suddenly discover that this is an imperialist war, that England and France suppress colonies (especially India—but perhaps that is a coincidence, the way their discov-ery of oppression in Poland 2 days before the Red Army marched was a coincidence) and that the workers shouldn't support the war.

We say that this is all hypocrisy, all flowing not from the independent-interests and needs of the working class, but merely and lely from the diplomatic maneucome "revolutionary" in the countries opposing Hitler.

## Hitler and Allies To Continue War

The war in Europe has just about finished its first stage. The stage of preliminary diplomatic maneuvering, the stage of feeling around to see what the lineup in the war is-that stage is about

For the moment, the lineup seems to be pretty clear: England and France against Germany, which has the aid of Stalin. Only one or two countries remain doubtful, such as Italy.

And with this first stage of the war over, we may expect that the actual military fighting will become intensified. The riddle about which American papers have written so much-where is the war?-will soon

It will be solved in a bloody fashion-by unloosening the 2nd World Massacre in grand style.

But why, you may ask, has there been relative quiet so far? The answer to that question is very important. It will help explain what probable future developments will be.

In the first place, there's been plenty of warmaking already, plenty of workers sacrificed to imperialist war.

The invasion of Poland by Hitler-that was "real" war. The constant sea and air skirmishes-that was "real" war.

But, you ask, what about the Western front?

The first reason that there has been relative inaction on this front is that both Germany and France hesitate to unloose a grand offensive against either the Maginot pers at schools or colleges, so the Line or the Siegfried Line. ## Fake Trial Hits Youth Leaders

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. - The third of the now famous "WPA conspiracy" trials has now begun and among the 25 indicted militants who are being prosecuted by the government for fighting against WPA cuts are two outstanding youth leaders, Oscar and Peggy Schoenfeld of the Youth Section of the Federal Workers Section of the Teamsters Union.

In the first two trials of 12 defendants which ended on October 20, the juries returned verdicts of

guilty against eight defendants.

The "conspiracy" charge was given such a vague and broad definition by the federal attorneys and the judge that no laborer who would seek to better his conditions by organized protest either against the government or a private employer could escape its scope.

#### AFL Appeal

In view of the extreme importance of this case for organized labor, the AFL WPA Defense Committee immediately announced it would appeal the case to the Circuit Court of Appeals. If a reversal is not obtained there, the case will be carried to the United States Supreme Court. The De-

Incomplete reports from the various schools of the nation indicate that this Armistice Day saw numerous student anti-war demonstrations carried on in the main under the leadership or with the acitve participation of the Young Peoples Socialist League (4th International).

On the whole, however, it cannot be denied that the number, size, impressiveness and militancy of the student demonstrations declined this year, as a result, no doubt, of the growth of war hys-

Especially striking was the signal failure of most of the demonstrations held under the auspices of the American Student Union. This Stalinist-controlled group has been hit most hard by the recent change of "line" of the Stalinist movement. It has not succeeded in "adapting" itself to the Stalin-Hitler pact and the new Stalinist line and it is probably slated for dissolution.

## M-DAY SHOWS A FEAR OF PEOPLE BY BOSS CLASS

The war that has been planned for so long has already come to Europe. Soon, America too will be drawn in. We of the YPSL have said for a long time that this war is a rich man's war, that the Sixty Families, who profit from the war, will try today as in 1917 to drag the American people into a war in which they haven't any stake at all. If we look at the plans which are being made for M-Day we will see that this is proved to the hilt.

They say it will be a peoples' war. But they lie and they know that they lie: for if it will be a people's war, why are Roosevelt and the Sixty Families afraid to let the people vote on the war? 

## M-Day Means Regimentation Of People in Every Way

The Industrial Mobilization Plan is a measure for keeping the "home front", the people, in check when the Sixty Families herd America into the war. Ever since 1920, the Assistant Secretary of War has been busy making plans for M-Day, the first day of the war, when labor, the youth, the unemployed as well as women and children will be mobilized in the fight for Wall Street's

The general outline of the Plan is as follows: All men, 18 and over will be required to register for the draft. No exemptions will be allowed. From these, a certain number who are between the ages of 18 and 45 will be sent into the army. The rest will be kept behind to man the factories

But those who have stayed behind will not have escaped the draft: their service will only have been deferred. In this way, the government keeps the right to switch men back and forth between the front and home, with very disastrous consequences for labor. This is the main feature of the Plan: to drive the whole nation into the war machine, with the life of every man, whether he's in the army or not, at the disposal of the government.

The I.M.P. represents the lessons which the American bosses learned from the last war. The war offers them the opportunity to make tremendous profits. The Plan safeguards that opportunity in two ways: first by making absolutely sure that the bosses will get those profits. (No one connected with the Plan takes seriously any talk about "taking the profit out of war." Said Colonel C. T. Harris, testifying for the War Department: "I do not know how to take the profits" out.") The second way is to hamstring every effort labor makes to get higher wages.



HISTORY OF NEGRO REVOLT by C.L.R. James-No. 18, Fact Monographs-35c.

Stepin Fetchit-the lazy, stupid hanger-on who knows how to dance and stutters so "amusingly"-and Aunt Jemina-who is "useful" as a cooking machine, if not as a human being-are these caricatures which American capitaiism tries to construct in the mind of America truly representative of the Negro people?

To merely ask the question is to answer it:

You need but read this little book to see that they are not typical; that, on the contrary, they are lying misrepresentations.

In this book you will find the outline of the real story of the Negroes-the story of the most oppressed group in modern history and the story of the struggle of that group to achieve national liberation.

#### TOUSSAINT LOUVERTURE

The author, who is a leading Negro revolutionist, begins his book with a brief description of the first Negro revolt of modern times, that of the San Domingans under the leadership of Toussaint Louverture.

What is important is to note the irrefutable answer given in these few pages to the reactionary prejudices concerning the "inherent inferiority" of the Negro. The black leaders who people these pages, though only yesterday downtrodden and ignorant slaves, show themselves to be at least the equal of their white opponents. The fascinating figure of Toussaint, a coachman and slave until the age of 46, and ten years later master of Haiti, is presented in its full significance as example of the ingenuity and genuis which an uprising of the oppressed always generates.

James continues with brief sketches of the role of the Negro in America previous to the Civil War, establishes the true importance of the Negro as a factor swinging the tide of victory to the North, and then describes the way in which the Negro has again been gradually driven into virtual slavery in the South. It is not a pretty picture; but it is true.

The revolts of the Negroes in Africa-most often heroic and hopelessly desperate uprising of slaves who could no longer tolerate their plight -is briefly described. A wealth of almost unknown material is presented here. Numerous pictures of unknown Negro leaders who almost always met death in their attempts to smash the regimes of European imperialism are given.

#### NEGRO AND WORKER

James then turns his attention to the Garvey movement which at one time had assumed mass proportions in America, but which was fated to failure. For no Negro movement for national liberation, James tells us, can succeed in this era of declining world imperialism if it is not the ally of the workers in their struggle against capi-

What is really needed is not only the outline for a history of Negro revolts, but the history itself. What James has done for the San Domingo rebellion in his book "The Black Jacobins" he must do for the rest of the links in the chain of Negro revolts. For there is no man more capable of that job than James.
