Dear editor.

Many contributors to the Militant put forward the slogan "a united socialist Ireland" as the only answer to the present turmoil in N. Ireland. However, as internationalists and realists we should recognise that Britain and the two Irish states form a single economic and geographic unit and because of this, to call for a socialist Ireland and leave it at that is as absurd as to call for a socialist Wales.

I would go further and say that those who call for an Irish workers'

The **residui passia" - resources llocated by Parliament but clogged up in the outdated bureaucratic bottleneck, have accumulated to £6 billion. Stagnation, bankruptcies, unemployment and the chronic outflow of capital are unchecked. On top of all this, the "hot autumn" that opened up an epoch of strikes, demonstrations and uprisings in 1969, is due to be reopened this year, when 5 million workers in 57 different industries submit their claims for a new three-year contract.

TRIKE-BREAKING CONSPIRACY

The politicians now have the task of forming Italy's 33rd post-war government somehow, out of the nine factions of the Christian Democrats, the five factions of the Socialists and the five other parties now represented in the Chamber of Deputies. They could return to the impotent and sterile formula of the last nine years-a precarious alliance with the Socialists. But the Socialists are now demanding "a more advanced political equilibrium"-ie. an accommodation with the CP.

Sooner or later, the capitalists will be forced to accept the pleas of the CP and involve them in the government. A "Popular Front" will be a strikebreaking conspiracy, which will disorien tate the workers and drive the middle class to the right. But it will provoke a crisis within the ranks of the Communist and Socialist Parties, which will be regenerated with working class militants demanding a break from the stranglehold of the Parties' liberal "allies" in the government.

The Italian workers from Turin to Sicily have risen to their feet and rocked the rotting capitalist state to its foundations. But before they overthrow it and replace it with a workers' democracy, they will have to sweep their leaders aside and rally around a full-blooded Marxist programme.

But, in our opinion, whatever beneficial effects may spring from these actions have been more than fully eroded by the present campaign of individual terror. It is utter nonsense to argue that a policy of retaliatory shootings will have any different effect on Protestant workers, than the Provos' campaign of indiscriminate bombing.

Cathal Goulding, when he stated that this campaign would end with the defeat of both wings of the IRA, was absolutely correct. Despite the heroism of the rank and file fighters, this type of campaign will only strengthen the hand of imperialism.

Undoubtedly, it is correct to say hat in words the stand of the Officials has been non-sectarian. Few people would deny that they have advanced class demands and have appealed to he Protestants. But the utterly confused manner in which their programme has been formulated, can only serve to irive the Protestants away.

Instead of consistently raising the lass issues, by using the excuse that "Democracy is a prelude to socialism" (Sept. UI), they have relegated the class struggle to second place. Despite the best intentions, this limiting of he campaign to a fight for democracy, will be taken by the Protestant worker, to whom it offers nothing, as a threat o his supposed 'privileged' position.

The comrade asks, how can the TUs ive a lead in the present situation? n the case of DATA, their action was correct simply because the original lecision to give a donation was taken without the consent of their NI members. But the real question which arises from this is, why are the unions in so weak a position? As the Militant has consistently pointed out, it is due to the failure of the leaders to take up the burning political issues and give a class lead. Many opportunities have already been missed and the Labour movement has been weakened drastically. But this is no excuse for inactivity and abdication now. Even at this late hour, if they were to champion the defence of all areas and to campaign on the economic questions of unemployment, housing, wages etc., the influence of the Labour movement would snowball. In part, the Officials, by advocating a TU defence force, have recognised that only the Labour movement can provide an alternative. If they were to consistently fight for this idea, and for a full class programme, within the Labour movement, they could play an enormous part in the development of a class movement. A reply of this length can only touch upon the important points raised in the comrade's letter. For this reason, we welcome further debate on this and other aspects of our position on Ireland. It is only through the fullest possible discussion of all the basic ideas that a Marxist tendency can develop in Ireland.

That this is a vicious and antiworking class piece of legislation, is proved by the fact that subsidies to home-buyers will be continued. There will be no means test or rebates for house-buyers, but a straight subsidy, which, on average, is already far higher than that received by council tenants. Surtax payers on a £40,000 mortgage over a 25 year period, paying £3,200 interest and £278 in the last year, will get an income tax rebate of £2,414 (or roughly £46-40 a week) on the first year.

PROFIT-MAKING ACTIVITY

Subsidies are continued for housebuyers not because the Tories are sentimental about those sections of the working class, and middle class particularly, who have been forced to buy a house to get a place to live, but to drive even more people in sheer desperation to get into debt and to scrimp and deprive themselves, in order to have the illusion of owning a house; this is for the benefit of the landlords, firms. Even before this savage attack on council tenants, the price of houses has increased 52 % in two Why? Because of the removal of years in Britain.

Rents will be doubled by 1976. Even in the year ahead, in spite of the government's pretended limit on price increases of 5%, rent the first time since council housing compensation on the basis of need, bringing the Tories to their knees. was introduced, it will become in many parts of the country, a "profit making activity" and the profits will be taxed by the Chancellor at the rate of 50%! In addition to the £100 per head which will be taken from the pockets of most working class families as a result of this Bill, there will be an increase in rates, not only for council tenants, but for all tenants. Nor will private tenants benefit. Their rents will shoot up sky high, when what was once the cheapest sector, council housing, becomes will shoot to astronomical levels. It is now virtually impossible for skilled workers to afford the price of housing. As a consequence of this Bill, it will become impossible. As Housing Minister Amery explained when justifying the Bill in Parliament, without such an Act, "by the middle of the decade, the (subsidies) ... will have risen from £350,000,000 to £600m." What are these Housing subsidies? go to the grasping money-lenders, mainly the banks as the interest is guaranteed; 10p goes to the landowners and approx 4p for the builders' attack on the whole of the working profits. Of every 100p paid by the tenant, 6p is the real cost of housing. If money is required for upkeep and rebuilding, it could be increased to say 10p in every 100p paid by the tenants now. The bankers and money-lenders make over £1,000m in interest every year on council housing.

This is what stands in the way of cheap housing and low rents. It is the forces behind capitalismthe insatiable demand for Rent, Interest and Profit. Such is the nature of the ETU Executive Committee that if allowed to, they will on the one hand declare how democratic the union is, due to themselves. On the other hand, they will throw resolutions carried by a democratic vote, into the proverbial dustbin, because those resolutions happen to offend the Executive Committee's own particular policies, which entail agreements like selling the tea breaks and other hard-won conditions, for measly pay rises.

The workers in the Electrical Contracting industry should not allow this to happen; they should elect shop stewards on every site. They should work in their branches, moving resolutions supporting the conference decisions and debating their implications. They should, through their shop stewards, charge their Area Industrial Committees to bring pressure to bear on their Area and National officials for the early implementation of the Conference decisions. All this should be done in conjunction with raising the issues of a need for real democracy within the ETU and the need for the next National Conference of the contracting industry to have on the agenda resolutions calling for the nationalis son of the industry under democratic workers control, as the only alternative towards ending the the problems facing the workers in that industry.
