

SEAMEN STILL IN DEADLOCK

BRIGHTON — Talks between the National Union of Seamen's leaders and the TUC continued beyond midnight as the first national strike for ten years loomed.

An NUS member told me: 'They are trying to brainwash us'.

The lobby of the Metropole Hotel was crowded with Press, television and radio journalists as the private talks entered their 11th hour.

Unless a formula can be found today, the seamen will start their strike at midnight.

Gordon Norris, NUS executive member, admitted yesterday that a strike might well topple the Labour government.

Last night Prime Minister Callaghan took advantage of the strike threat to shove up the Minimum Lending Rate by a drastic 1½ per cent to 13 per cent.

He also made a surprise reshuffle of

the Cabinet to bring leading right wingers William Rodgers and Roy Hattersley into the inner sanctum.

At one stage of last night's Brighton talks, National Union of Seamen general secretary Jim Slater threatened to resign from the TUC General Council if the browbeating did not stop.

He had at his elbow telegrams from seamen in many parts of the country telling the union to 'stand firm'.

Earlier the NUS executive was still adamant that unless its £6 a week wage claim was paid from last July, UK shipping would be brought to a standstill.

Shortly before 11 p.m. last night both sides in the argument sent out for fish and chips — 32 bags in all.

There was later confirmation that both parties were going line by line through the 'social contract'.

Reporters were kept well away from the suite where the talks were being held. Attempts to contact NUS members on the telephone achieved little.

'None of us can speak now. They're listening in to the telephones. It looks like we'll be here all night and there's even talk of the government intervening in the morning,' said one executive member.

Midair crash mystery

AIR TRAFFIC controllers at Zagreb airport, Yugoslavia, were detained last night after the worst mid-air crash in history.

Two people survived the collision at 30,000 feet between a British Airways Trident and a Yugoslav DC 9 in near-perfect weather conditions but died later.

The British consul in Zagreb, Mr David Montgomery, who went to the scene of the crash, told Reuters Press Agency by telephone last night that two people aboard the British plane were still alive when the aircraft crash-landed.

'There was a small girl between six and ten, I saw her. It's very difficult to tell, but I would say she was a Turkish girl,' Mr Montgomery said.

Senior police officials told me that she was still alive about an hour after the crash. There was another woman still in her seat belt who survived for about half an hour. I think these were the only people living after the crash.

Mr Montgomery said the plane 'although concertinaed, was substantially intact and landed on its belly. This suggested to me that the pilot had performed a miracle.

'It's impossible to tell how many people were still inside but it may be 50 per cent, 25 per cent scattered near the wreckage and the remainder about 200 yards away'.

Mark Young, British Airline Pilots' Association general secretary, said the collision was 'one chance in ten million'.

The two aircraft were under the control of Zagreb air traffic control tower at the time of the crash. The collision point is known as 'a junction' for flights between West Germany and Austria and Yugoslavia.

The British Airways Trident — call sign 'Zulu Tango' — was travelling from Heathrow to Istanbul carrying 34 passengers and nine crew.

The DC 9 was carrying 108 passengers and five crew on a return trip from the Split sea resort on the Adriatic to Cologne.

Eye-witness Captain Kroese, flying a Lufthansa Boeing 737, said there was an explosion on impact. The British plane lost a starboard wing. Shortly before the collision the Inex-Adria DC9 reported 'technical difficulties' and was being diverted to Zagreb.

• A Team of investigators from the Department of Trade and from British Airways left London last night to help the crash investigation.

REES AT HOME OFFICE

PRIME MINISTER James Callaghan announced nine new cabinet appointments last night, strengthening his right-wing grip on the Labour government.

Callaghan's closest ally, Merlyn Rees, takes Roy Jenkins' job as Home Secretary. Roy Mason takes Rees' job as Northern Ireland Secretary. Fred Mulley replaces Mason as Minister of Defence. Shirley Williams takes Mulley's job at the Department of Education and Science.

William Rodgers, a virulent right winger, comes into the cabinet for the first time as Transport Minister. Roy Hattersley, another rabid right-winger, gets his first cabinet job as Prices Secretary.

Also into the cabinet for the first time is ex-Tribunite Stanley Orme, who loyally assisted the repression of northern Ireland as a junior minister and is now rewarded with the Ministry of Social Security.

Fred Peart becomes Lord Peart, leader of the House of Lords, and Lord Privy Seal, all in one go. John Silkin gets his job as Minister of Agriculture. Gerald Fowler has resigned as Minister of State for Education.

ICI: Oiling the wheels

IMPERIAL Chemical Industries (ICI) the chemicals and textiles giant, has admitted given backhanders worth £1.35m. An ICI spokesman said: 'Bribes is not a word we would use. They are payments made to secure the co-operation of certain governmental officials and departments'.

ICI is a publicly listed company. Recently it launched the biggest money-raising operation ever recorded on the stock exchange. As a top member of the CBI it is imposing the 4½-per-cent wage controls and calling on its work force to 'sacrifice' for the good of the nation.

In various ICI plants sections of the work force are being cutback and productivity stepped up. It makes for a curious company policy: bribes abroad and the sack at home.

Its refusal to disclose the names of the officials who received bribes and the countries they come from is preposterous. After the British Petroleum and Lockheed bribes scandals, there is an overwhelming case for a full public inquiry.

What is public already is sufficient to demand that ICI be nationalised without compensation and placed under workers' control.

Jobs lobby: A postscript

THE YOUNG SOCIALISTS 'Jobs for Youth Now' campaign brought 1,000 young workers, students and unemployed youth to Brighton on Thursday to lobby the annual TUC. They spoke to many delegates about their demands: full jobs training on request, trade union rates of pay, a guarantee of employment on completion.

A delegate from the Society of Civil and Public Servants yesterday spoke from the rostrum about the 'serious and honest demonstrators' on the YS lobby. The lobby, the march through Brighton and the public meeting all failed to raise a single mention in the capitalist Press or television.

It is known as a Press black-out.

Wilson's forest

THE ZIONIST Federation is to dedicate a new forest at Cana, near Nazareth, to Sir Harold Wilson, it was announced yesterday. The Jewish National Fund, which carries out these afforestation schemes, is an instrument for Zionist colonisation in Palestine. It plays a major role in the Zionist land-grab in the occupied West Bank and in the Galilee area around Nazereth.

Under its rules, once land is acquired

by the JNF, Arabs are not allowed to be tenants on it, to work on it, or to reside on it. It is therefore a racist policy as well.

The Sir Harold Wilson Forest will be near the King George V and Sir Winston Churchill forests. The former Labour leader thus takes his appropriate place in the pantheon of imperialist idols and backers of Zionism.

CURRENCY CONSPIRACY AGAINST THE SEAMEN

THE government delivered another blow at the seamen yesterday by raising interest rates 1.5 per cent to 13 per cent.

This equals the highest bank rate ever imposed in the City of London and follows Thursday's deliberate decision by the Bank of England to let the pound fall.

After withdrawing support, sterling dropped nearly 4 cents against the dollar. The decline in the pound was immediately blamed on the seamen's strike.

To stop this currency collapse getting out of hand, interest rates were raised yesterday to try to keep foreign funds in London.

The fall in the pound and the increase in the minimum lending rate are both deliberately calculated to push up the cost of living.

Burdens

This way, the Labour government hopes to put more burdens on the working class to counter any success the seamen's strike might have in breaching the TUC's pay restraint, and at the same time get one section of the working class blaming another.

The interest rate rise will also supplement the public

spending cuts and help the Labour government drive down living standards through mass unemployment.

It is the third increase in the bank rate in six months. It will choke off still more of the thin trickle of capital investment still taking place.

The Stock Exchange index fell rapidly yesterday as a result of these latest deflationary measures.

The last time there was a 13-per-cent bank rate in Britain was at the height of the political crisis between the Heath government and the working class led by the miners at the end of 1973, which ended with the bringing down of the Tories.

RENT OFFICE REVOLT IN WALLSEND

ANGRY council tenants occupied a rent office in Wallsend's Battle Hill estate yesterday in protest against a 62p increase in weekly rents covering a wide area of Tyneside.

The occupiers came from Longbenton, North Shields and Wallsend. They represent the North Tyneside action committee which will discuss further activities next Tuesday.

The local housing director wanted police to evict the occupiers yesterday, but the action committee had a lawyer on hand to insist that talks were held with the council housing committee leader.

Some of the occupiers spoke to News Line.

Thames water curbs

SOME 12 million people supplied by the Thames Water Authority could soon face tough new curbs on water usage.

Environment secretary Peter Shore has given the Authority leave to apply for emergency restrictions under section 1 of the Drought Act 1976, chief executive Alex Morrison said.

The Authority's policy and resources committee decided yesterday to press for the new powers as soon as possible. But first they will hear some 100

objections to the restrictions.

These objections will be heard within the next week and the Authority will begin statutory procedures to gain the new powers.

These will include bans on all hoses and sprinklers, the filling of privately-owned swimming pools, mechanical car washers, the cleaning of the exteriors of buildings and the operation of fountains.

The washing of road vehicles for any reason other than safety or hygiene will also be outlawed.

Sick

Ann Syverson said: 'The houses that we live in in Meadowell are not worth 60p, let alone the 60p increase they are trying to put on now. I am also sick of being on the dole.'

Alexis Madison said: 'This proves that we can do it. The working class are getting choc-a-block. We occupied to draw attention and win more support. We want the trade unions to back us.'

TORTURE CASES TO STRASBOURG

BELFAST — Six men beaten and tortured during questioning by the RUC are to take their cases to the European Commission on Human Rights in Strasbourg.

Three of the men were tortured last June and the others received similar treatment in January and February 1975.

Guilty

Their cases are being pressed by the Northern Ireland Civil Rights Association a week after the British government was found guilty of torture and inhuman treatment in a Strasbourg report.

NICRA's aim is to nail Merlyn Rees' lie that torture against prisoners ceased five years ago. Three men, Peter Hands,

Recent cases nail Rees' lie

Frankie McAlorum and Jim Scullion, from the Beechmount area, Belfast, say the torture incidents took place early in June this year.

Hands said he was picked up by soldiers at his home on June 7 and released after nine hours questioning, during which time he had been slapped about the face, handcuffed in a chair and punched, and shown photographs of dead people.

Three days later, he says he

was again picked up by the police at his home. After questioning, he was put in a cell for two hours.

His statement continued: 'When they took me upstairs again, they hooded me and put wire around my fingers, one saying 'plug it in' as if they were going to electrocute me. They kicked me onto my back and then I was lifted up and the wires were taken off my fingers.'

Hands' statement alleged that the questioning continued for a further five days, during which time guns were put at his head and blanks fired.

He related one further incident which took place in the police station whilst he was hooded.

Hanging

'They put a rope around my neck, made me stand on a chair, then kicked it away. I was left hanging from the roof.'

'I felt myself going faint then I fell down. They said later the "rope" had broken.'

His statement ended: 'Before my release, the police doctor at Springfield Road said I was talking like a man who had been severely tortured and my eyes looked as if I had been hooded.'

'He said that already there had been four cases like this and not to be afraid to talk. He told me to take out writ against the police.'

Apartheid row at GEC meeting

SIR Arnold Weinstock's General Electric Company was accused yesterday of trying to export military equipment to apartheid South Africa.

The accusation caused a rumpus at the company's annual general meeting in London.

The charge was made by the Rev. David Haslam, an executive member of Christian Concern for Southern Africa.

He said a £10m telecommunications order for 'tropospheric scatter' equipment would be used by the South African military.

Haslam asked GEC's chairman, Lord Nelson, to stop the deal in view of the government's ban on military exports to South Africa.

Lord Nelson denied that the

equipment was to be used by the military. He then refused to let Haslam speak.

After the meeting, Haslam claimed the equipment is similar to the NATO ace high tropospheric scatter system which is linked to the United States ballistic missile early-warning system.

He said: 'An extension of it could be used, as it was in Vietnam, to detect guerrilla forces by the introduction of "battlefield sensors".'

Lord Nelson refused to let Bishop Richard Wood speak at the meeting.

Afterwards the bishop, who was deported from Namibia

last year, said it was ridiculous to suggest the equipment was intended for civil purposes. The South African Post Office already had the country fully covered by a microwave tower relay system.

Mr Haslam finished by saying: 'This is just a dodge to avoid the rules.'

Life in letter bomb case

SEAN O'DOHERTY was jailed for life at the Old Bailey yesterday for masterminding a letter and parcel bomb campaign in Britain.

Thomas Cooper, the 17-year-old youth from Londonderry who posted one of the parcel bombs for him, was jailed for three years.

At the end of a five-day trial, the jury of nine men and three

women found O'Doherty guilty on all 31 charges of sending letter and parcel bombs, causing explosions and making and planting time bombs.

After the jury retired, Mr Justice Theisiger suggested that a universal system of finger-printing might have advantages.

He said: 'It does seem to me to be worthy of consideration by parliament whether, in these days, it would not be wise in

view of the fact the real preventative action with regard to all crimes is the certainty of conviction, that our birth certificates or marriage certificates should have one's fingerprints recorded by the Registrar General.'

He added: 'It could not do any harm to anybody and it might, assuming that O'Doherty is possibly guilty, have enabled the police to pick him up from the Registrar General certificates at an earlier stage.'

Cigar smuggling

BRITISH racing driver Tony Dean was the brains behind one of two teams smuggling American cigars into the UK, a court heard yesterday. The head of the other team was an American racing driver, Robert Ryan Brown, of Long Island, New York, said Mr Arthur Hutchinson, prosecuting, at Leeds Crown Court. Dean, 44, garage proprietor of Leeds, pleaded guilty to knowingly dealing with 50,000 cigars on which duty had not been paid.

Russia with gloves

A PAIR of wicket-keeping gloves and two pairs of batting gloves will be in the diplomatic bag of Mr Edward Bishop, Minister of State for Agriculture, when he flies to Moscow today for a six-day visit to promote UK farm exports. They are going at the urgent request of the MCC — the British Embassy's Moscow Cricket Club.

Signalmen stop

TRAINS BETWEEN Paddington and Bristol, South Wales and the west country will be delayed — and some cancelled — on Sunday because of unofficial action by signalmen, British Rail said yesterday.

Divorce rate up

MORE SCOTTISH women are divorcing their husbands, according to figures published yesterday. Divorce actions by women last year rose by 999 to 6,585, an 18 per cent increase on the previous year. The number of women seeking divorce has risen steadily since 1969 when 3,000 cases were recorded.

More flight delays

SPANISH air traffic controllers are expected to impose their work-to-rule this weekend, causing disruption to flights to and from Britain. Manchester airport will be hit by a 'chain reaction of delays' for the fourth weekend in succession. Today hold-ups of up to eight hours can be expected, said an airport spokesman.

3 typhoid cases

THREE people, two women and a man, from the Huddersfield area are in hospital with typhoid. The women stayed in the same Spanish hotel during their holiday. The man, an Iranian student, recently travelled across Europe to Huddersfield by car. Dr Audrey Wilkinson, specialist in community medicine, said yesterday that there was no cause for alarm.

Crown Agents' loss

THE CROWN AGENTS, which act as buyers in Britain for many foreign countries, made a loss of £45m last year, it was announced yesterday. This was an improvement on 1974 when this semi-official organisation lost £128,700,000.

No wombles here

WELLINGTON, New Zealand — The latest word to be added to the list of New Zealand's unparliamentary language is 'womble'. Rebuking a Labour member who used the word to describe two parliamentary under-secretaries, Speaker J R Harrison said: 'No honourable member is a womble.'

CAR-ROUND-UP

ELECTRICIANS at Leyland's car body factory in Castle Bromwich, Birmingham, who have been in dispute over the threat of redundancies due to automation, will return to work Monday. It means that the last 5,000 of the nearly 30,000 car workers locked out by Leyland to avoid paying lay-off money will return to work.

Leyland has temporarily dropped its strike-causing provocations following the end of the stoppage at Lucas, which cut off the supply of component parts to Leyland's Longbridge factory.

After the first strike at Chrysler's Ryton assembly plant in Coventry for more than 12 months, shop stewards recommended 25 toolmakers to return to work following another company provoked dispute over job insecurity.

At Ford's Halewood plant, Liverpool, solderers are still complaining over the dangerously high lead level in their working area. More than 4,000 assembly workers have been sent home from the night shift three times this week after 15 solderers walked out.

STOP SHIP-YARD SACKINGS

A RESOLUTION opposing shipyards closures and redundancies was passed unanimously by Congress yesterday.

'We will not under any consideration, stand the position where closures and redundancies are the price to pay for

public ownership,' said John Hepplewhite, a Newcastle upon Tyne delegate from the Boilermakers and Shipwrights Union.

He went on: 'We appreciate as a union that some reorganisation of the industry is inevitable. But, he added, the boilermakers' union wanted it placed on record that Congress opposed closures and redundancies in shipbuilding.

He called for a card vote in order to strengthen the TUC's commitment to protect shipyard jobs. But TUC president Cyril Plant rejected this call even though on Thursday evening Plant had allowed a card vote on the devolution debate.

Len Edmondson (AUEW) seconded the resolution and warned that any closure of yards would multiply redundancies in supply industries.

Less help for blind from Labour

BLIND delegate Tom Parker condemned the Labour government for giving less help to blind people than when the Tories were in office.

Parker, who is secretary of the National League of the Blind and Disabled, said the 'special needs' allowance which was introduced in 1948 had only been increased by 2.5p since then by Labour governments.

All rises had come from the Tories.

The allowance remained £1.25 compared to the 75p when it was brought-in in 1948.

Parker said his society, which is affiliated to the TUC, was still waiting for a reply to an appeal it made last March for a substantial increase in the allowance.

Stud farm fraud: Two charged

TWO MEN and a property company have been accused of conspiracy to defraud following police investigations into the sale of Tedfold Stud farm, Billingshurst, Sussex.

They will appear at Horsham Court on October 12.

A Sussex police spokesman said yesterday that summonses alleging two offences of conspiracy to defraud have been served on Derek Frank Ritchie, John Malcolm Guthrie and Broadland Properties Ltd.

Ritchie, who was a partner in the estate agents' firm Weller Eggar at the time, acted for the sale and re-sale of the 350-acre farm in 1972. He has since left Weller Eggar.

Guthrie is chairman and managing director of Broadland. The Farm was reported to have been bought by Broadland then resold shortly afterwards at a gross profit of £171,000.

Phone row sacking

THE Basingstoke branch of the boilermakers' union is to be asked to take up the case of a welder Pat Francis, sacked by the Lancing Bagnall fork-lift truck manufacturers.

Workers at Bagnall's claim Francis was sacked in breach of all procedures at the factory after a row with a foreman over a phone call Francis made to his wife.

The union has so far refused to take any action to annul the sacking and reinstate Francis to his job.

Visits off at Long Kesh

BELFAST — visits have been suspended for Ulster Defence Association special category prisoners in Long Kesh because of disturbances on Thursday night.



Bill Sirs with Jobs for Youth Now lobbyists

WORKERS yesterday demanded an effective voice at all levels in the steel industry.

Bill Sirs, general secretary of the Iron and Steel Trades Confederation, called for modernisation and expansion of the industry above that projected by the British Steel Corporation.

A resolution accepted by the TUC backed his call and

added that there should be total worker participation at all levels.

Sirs told delegates: 'We are asking for investment which will allow us to match our world competitors.

'We have all the physical assets required by modern industry, and if we exploited them we could be the major supplier of steel products in western Europe.'

THE SCANDAL OF EEC FOOD PRICES

COMMON MARKET food prices are 'an absolute scandal', said Harry Wood, general secretary of the Society of Metal Mechanics.

He gave details of 'mountains' of beef, butter and skimmed milk that have been kept out of the shops to maximise profits.

'Old aged pensioners cannot afford one chop a week — but the beef mountain is growing all the time,' he said.

Les Dixon (AUEW) said: 'Prices in the Common Market are all higher than they are elsewhere in world markets.

'We must condemn the practice of "denaturing" food and crops. This is the practice of deliberately making them unfit for human consumption in order to keep prices high in a world in

which people are starving to death.'

A resolution was unanimously passed deploring the Common Market prices policy and demanding action to stop the destruction of food and the dumping of milk.

McGarvey is new chairman

BOILERMAKERS' leader Dan McGarvey was chosen as the new chairman of the TUC General Council. McGarvey, elected by a General Council meeting after the Annual Conference ended at Brighton, was a member of the Labour Party's National Executive Committee from 1958 to 1965, and has been a member of the General Council for over ten years.

Seamen's petition signed

A TOTAL of 324 delegates and official visitors to the Congress signed a petition expressing support for the seamen yesterday.

The petition was circulated by delegates from the Civil and Public Services Association. Peter Colman, a member of the CPSA executive, said 'it was about time the ordinary delegates had an opportunity to say how he felt about this dispute'.

CPSA general secretary Ken Thomas signed the petition as

did Labour MP Joan Maynard, AUEW executive member Reg Birch, seamen's leader Jim Slater and Shrewsbury picket Des Warren.

Among those who refused to put their names to the petition were union leaders Lawrence Daly of the miners, Hugh Scanlon, engineers, and public employees union leader Alan Fisher.

THE three rail unions used the TUC platform to launch a campaign aimed at preserving the present rail system and putting pressure on the government for a publicly owned integrated transport system. Sidney Weighell, General Secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, told delegates that the campaign would be carried into every city, town and village.

Call for prison inquiry

HOME SECRETARY Roy Jenkins has been asked to initiate an inquiry into prison grievances.

The appeal comes from Radical Alternatives to Prison (RAP) and follows the occupation of Hull prison last week by prisoners.

Gail Coles, writing for RAP, calls for a 'fully independent public inquiry into the grievances of the prisoners at Hull'.

At such an inquiry the 'prisoners, their families and friends as well as individuals and groups involved in prison reform must be allowed to testify', she said.

The letter sent to Jenkins says that roof-top demonstrations are the only way prisoners can draw attention to their grievances.

RAP has known about the tension at Hull

maximum security prison for some time. They supported a call for a public inquiry into the prison in November 1975.

RAP calls for 'adequate grievance machinery and unhindered communication with outside individuals and groups through uncensored correspondence and unrestricted visits and prison staff being freed from the restrictions of the Official Secrets Act, which keeps them from participating in public discussions of penal affairs'.

BROKERS BAILED

Several fraud counts

SEVEN stockbrokers and their managing clerk appeared at the Guildhall, London yesterday charged with conspiracy to defraud their clients.

They belonged to the firm Chapman and Rowe which was 'hammered' on the London Stock Exchange in 1974 leaving a deficit of £2m.

They were remanded until November 10 on bail totalling £10,500 each.

They were ordered by magistrate Leslie

Robinson to surrender their passports.

The charges alleged they defrauded clients by using stocks and shares belonging to such clients as security for loans granted to the said firm of Chapman and Rowe and certain of its partners by banks and other financial institutions without having the authority of the said clients to use the said stocks and shares for the said purpose.

It was also alleged by

one, 'by the misuse of monies received by the said firm, by the misdescription in books and other records of the said firm, of the uses to which such monies were put, and by divers other fraudulent tricks and devices'.

Standing in the dock were Victor Thomas Andrews of Great Thrift, Petts Wood, Kent, Michael Childs Waller of Seaview Road, East Preston, Sussex, John Maxwell

Gordon of Slade Bottom Farm, St Mary Bourne, near Andover, Hants, and Ralph Clarke of Sterling Street, South Kensington, London — all of them partners in the City of London firm.

Standing in front of the small dock were managing clerk John Michael Goodsell of Marlpit road, Sharpthorne, Sussex, and partners Alan Harman of Putney Heath Lane, Putney, London, George Edward Miller of Osborne House, Wimbledon Park Road, Wimbledon, London and Herbert Neville Woolmer, of Heath Lodge, Preyheath Road, Worplesdon, Surrey.

Five on 'Tartan Army' charges

EDINBURGH — Five men appeared in court here yesterday accused of plotting to further the cause of the 'Border Clan' or the 'Tartan Army'.

They also faced charges of blowing up pipelines, electricity pylons and a BBC transmitter.

All five reserved their plea at Edinburgh Sheriff Court and will stand trial at the High Court in the city on September 21.

Counsel for the five said they would be challenging the relevancy and the

competence of the charges. The five are Gerard McGuigan, Donald Currie, Euan MacPherson, Hamish Henderson and Robert Anderson.

All are accused of conspiring with five other men and four women between January 1972 and May 1976 to 'further the purposes of an association of persons known variously as "The 100 organisation", "The APG", "The Border Clan", "The Tartan Army", or some other association to the prosecutor unknown'.

The five are alleged to

have plotted to use criminal means in pursuance of the conspiracy and to use explosives to cause damage to property including electricity lines and pylons, oil pipelines, land lines and installations and premises used for broadcasting.

At yesterday's hearing Mr Bernard Heslin, for McGuigan, said:

'The defence has had exactly eight days to look at the indictment, take statements from 200 witnesses and examine 400 productions.'

SCHOOLS WITCH-HUNT FAILS

BY OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT

A VICIOUS witch-hunt by the racist National Party and the reactionary 'Crawley Advertiser' against teachers at the Thomas Bennett school has collapsed.

Sussex Director of Education Roy Potter last week dismissed allegations of 'Marxist indoctrination' at the school.

'I consider it highly irresponsible that this publicity should have been given to such unsubstantiated allegations,' he said.

Hearsay

This followed sensational headlines in the 'Crawley Advertiser' saying: 'Is your child being taught of revolution? Another William Tyndale? "Brainwashed by the Reds".'

To support this 'Advertiser exclusive', all the paper could

rake together were bits of second-hand hearsay evidence from a Tory backwoodsman Councillor Bill Siddall and the local National Party activist Anthony Brewer.

Without producing a single hard fact, Siddall told the paper he had 'repeatedly heard complaints about political indoctrination from parents.'

Again without producing any facts, Brewer was reported by the paper as saying:

'Politics has no place in comprehensive schools. Many parents were reluctant to complain to the headmaster

for fear that their children may be victimised.'

The 'Crawley Advertiser' then proceeded to embroider on this hearsay drivel and declare:

'After a two-year wrangle between parents and officials, the county council have agreed to try and find out just what Red extremists may be up to.'

Among the claims that will be probed will be:

- The Workers Revolutionary Party is actively recruiting schoolchildren during school hours.

been persuaded to take part in political demonstrations which were organised by the WRP and which on one occasion at least took place in school time.

Leaving nothing to chance, the 'Crawley Advertiser' made certain its readers would mistake fantasy for fact by running an editorial in the next issue.

'Perhaps parents will be grinning on the other side of their faces when they know the results of a special education department investigation into "political indoctrination" at one of our schools', it said, as though the investigation had already taken place and the slanders confirmed.

They in fact were NOT confirmed. Director of Education Roy Potter announced that he 'completely rejected the allegations'.

Having seen Brewer, Potter said: 'Mr Brewer gave me no specific evidence of indoctrination or anything else.'

Potter added: 'Politics have a proper place in the school curriculum. The cardinal

principle is that it is presented objectively.'

The headmaster and staff at Thomas Bennett are well aware of this.

Then he concluded: 'I consider it highly irresponsible that this publicity should have been given to such unsubstantiated allegations.'

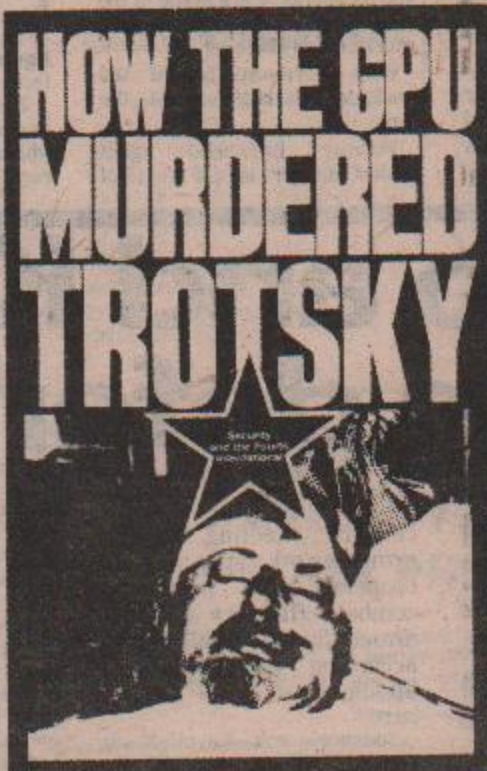
But the 'Crawley Advertiser' put all this at the bottom of its next story giving no indication that the slanders had been refuted.

Deceit

The first paragraph of the report merely said deceitfully: 'County education chiefs took swift action this week over claims of "political brainwashing", at a Crawley school.'

The 'claims' in fact were slanders largely stoked up by the 'Crawley Advertiser' itself which the paper had not the guts to repudiate after they had been denied by the County Education Director.

CRUMB-SIZED REFORMS CAN'T HALT REVOLT

CAPE TOWN — After three days of clashes in which more than 20 people have been killed by the police, youth again took to the streets yesterday in the Cape province of South Africa to battle the racist regime.

Trouble was reported in five Coloured (mixed race) areas around Cape Town and in the black African townships of Guguletu and Nyanga.

In Wellington, 30 miles to the east, a school was burnt down, and police used tear gas and opened fire to break up a crowd of over 1,000.

Further east, at Oudtshoorn, police fired tear gas to break up a demonstration of students denouncing the apartheid system in Bridgton Coloured township.

Nurses

In Cape Town itself, over 300 Coloured nurses demonstrated in the grounds of a nursing home against police brutality and demanding equal pay.

'Why should we go to work when we are paid half the salaries of our white

colleagues', a nurse asked reporters.

While Police Minister James Kruger said yesterday that he had discussed with Cape Town police officers new measures to deal with demonstrations, the government announced a package of minor concessions in the hope of gaining Coloured and Asian middle-class elements to its side.

These included permission for Coloured and Asian businesses to be set up outside the segregated Coloured areas; abolition of segregation in public buildings; and permission for Coloureds to sit on the executives of trade unions.

These trifling measures are

unlikely to satisfy even the most 'respectable' Uncle Toms, who would like to collaborate with the regime if they could.

Vorster made it clear a few days ago that he would not

consider one-man-one-vote in South Africa.

Coloureds form a majority in Cape Province and Black Africans an overwhelming majority in South Africa as a

whole.

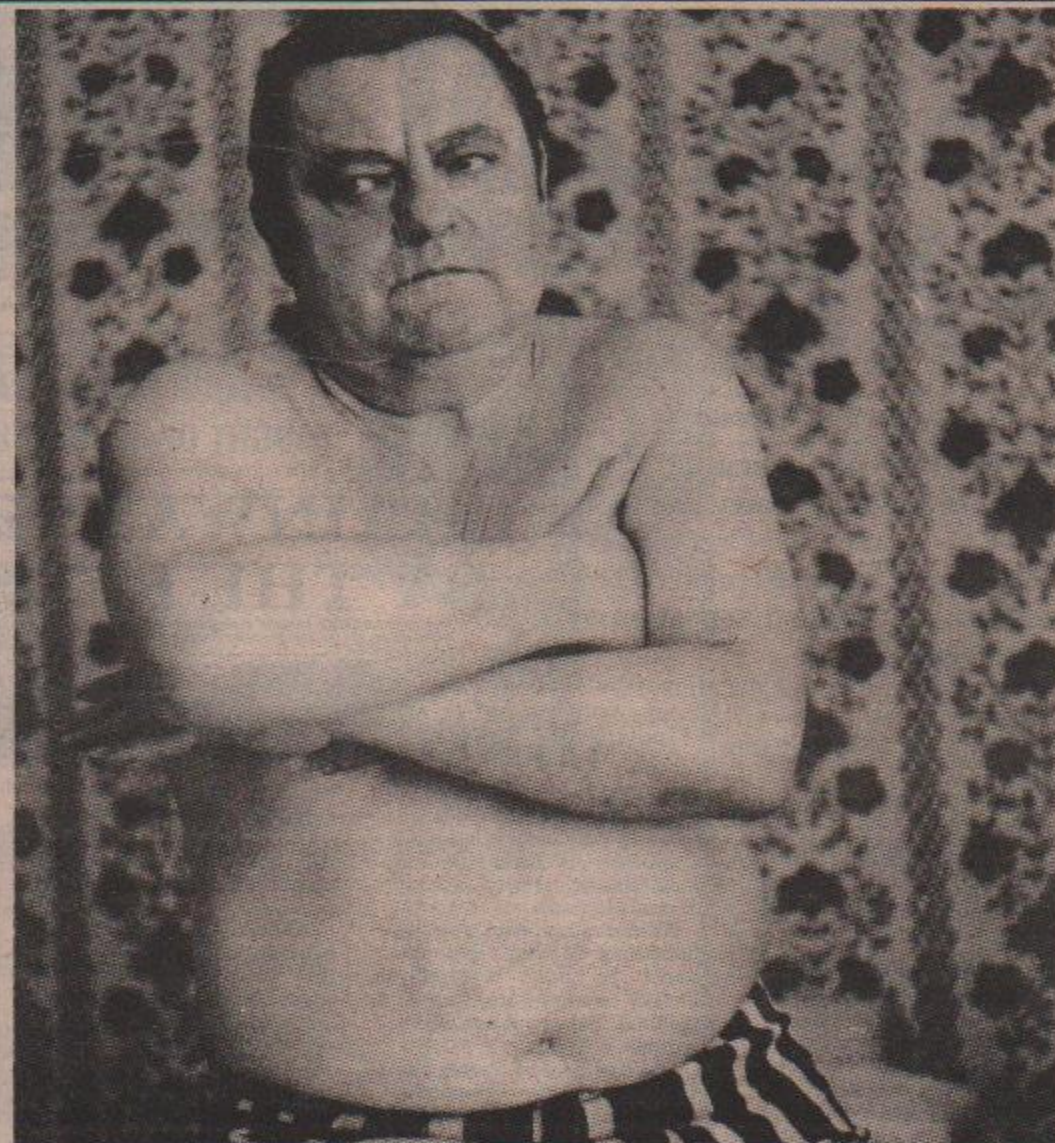
The courageous struggle which the Coloured and Black youth have begun will not be stopped now either by Vorster's paltry crumbs tossed as

PLANE BRIBES IN REVERSE

BONN — Questions are to be asked in the West German Bundestag about unexplained payments to the Lockheed aircraft company which have been brought to light in a newspaper article.

The 'Frankfurter Rundschau' had disclosed that mysterious payments totalling 10.3 million marks

(£2.35m) were made to Lockheed by the West German Defence Ministry.

The payments, in commissions and contributions to the US aircraft corporation and its agents, were made in the 1960s, when Franz-Josef Strauss was Defence Minister.

West Germany bought 900 Lockheed Starfighters at the time.

Former Lockheed agent Ernest Hauser, an old friend of

Strauss, said last month that Lockheed channelled large sums of money to Strauss and his party, the Christian Social Union.

A spokesman for the government Auditor's Office in Frankfurt yesterday said the 'Frankfurter Rundschau' figures were correct and came from a 1969 Auditor's Report.

The spokesman could not explain why the Defence Ministry should have made payments to Lockheed over and

above the agreed price for its aircraft.

With General Elections due on October 3, and Strauss tipped for Finance Minister if the right-wing parties win, the Lockheed affair must inevitably become an election issue now.

With no alternative explanation offered, it looks as though Lockheeds not only made illicit payments to arch-right winger Strauss, but were able to do so with the West German taxpayers' money!

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Cairo and Khartoum sign defence pact

CAIRO — Egypt and Sudan have agreed to form a joint military chief's committee and provide each other with base facilities.

The two regimes have just concluded a joint defence

council meeting which announced plans to cooperate in promoting combat efficiency of their armed forces in all fields, according to the official Middle East News Agency here.

Sudanese and Egyptian air forces and navies will be provided with base facilities in each other's country. The

governments will aim at unifying their military training systems and standardising armaments.

A joint armed forces chief-of-staff committee is to be set up. A committee will see that the Defence Council meets regularly, in consultation with the chiefs of staff, and that its decisions are implemented.

The foreign ministers and war ministers of each country took part in the Defence Council,

which was set up under the military pact concluded in mid-July.

The emergence of this reactionary alliance will be viewed with some anxiety in Tripoli.

It has already been admitted that Sadat, Numiery and King Khalid of Saudi Arabia have 'put out a contract' to assassinate President Gaddafi or overthrow his government.

Suarez steps back from Catalan clash

AS POLICE clashed with strikers in the north-west of Spain yesterday, the government announced a face-saving compromise formula to avoid an even bigger clash in Barcelona.

Thousands of workers in industrial areas around San Sebastian have been on strike for two days over the shooting by police of a young draughtsman, Jesus Maria Zabala.

He was shot in the border town of Fuenterrabia on Wednesday night, when riot police attacked a Basque nationalist demonstration.

In the port of La Coruna yesterday, police made batons charges to break up columns of striking building workers who were marching through the city centre.

A major clash between workers and police was looming today in Barcelona, where Catalan nationalists and working-class parties had said they would defy a ban on their planned rally.

But after talks with the organisers, the Civil Governor announced yesterday that the rally could go ahead without interference, only outside the city.

The rally is for democratic rights and the restoration of Catalan autonomy, abolished by Franco after the 1936-1939 Civil War.

Civil Governor Sanchez Teran, announced a rally could take place in San Baudillo de Llobregat, a few miles south of the city.

The rally organisers say they will accept the site. It has historical significance, as the burial place of an 18th century Catalan national hero.

Fearing big autumn wages struggles on the horizon, and moving to draw reformist and Stalinist leaders into closer collaboration, the Suarez government evidently decided it could not afford a violent clash with workers in an important centre like Barcelona.

The government has managed to divert the demonstration, save faces on both sides and step back from a violent confrontation.

ASSAD PREPARES

BY CHARLES PARKINS

BEIRUT — All the signs in the Lebanon are pointing to a final military confrontation between the Zionist-backed right wing and their Syrian allies on one side and the Lebanese leftists and Palestinians on the other.

The rightists are determined to have the leftist and Palestinian resistance crushed by September 23 when the new regime of President-elect Elias Sarkis takes over.

All talk of political settlement seems to have gone by the board as the rightists and the Assad regime step up their collaboration.

Camille Chamoun, leader of the extreme right-wing National Liberal Party, was the latest visitor to Damascus this week from the right-wing camp.

The man who brought US marines into the civil war in 1958 said after his talks with the Syrian government:

'Lebanon is determined to liberate every inch of its territory in order to restore territorial unity despite all that has happened.'

'The next few days will see fruitful co-operation between the two countries in various fields.'

The rightist leader also expressed the hope that 'The Syrian initiative in Lebanon will succeed in putting an end as soon as possible to the Lebanese catastrophe'.

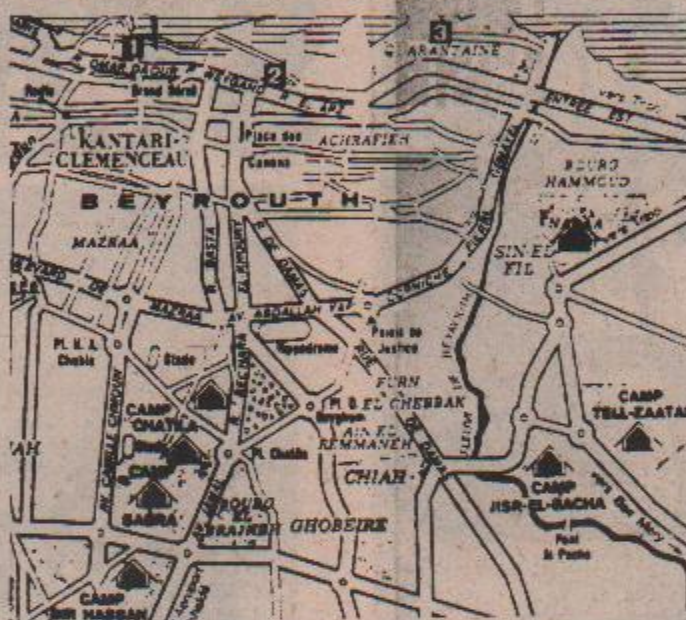
Lip-service

Despite the lip-service which is being paid to efforts to solve the crisis by peaceful political means, there is no evidence of any such intention on the part of the Syrians or rightists.

Both Chamoun's and Pierre Gemayel's trips to Damascus have brought forth semi-official statements that neither they nor the Syrians take the current

The Arab League initiative —

spearheaded in Lebanon by Dr Hassan Sabri al-Kholi — now seems to have faded almost

FINAL ASSAULT

completely out of the picture.

Kholi himself is expected to return to Lebanon today after a prolonged absence.

But it is difficult to see what he can do in current circumstances beyond asking his forces to keep the runways of Beirut airport clear of the weeds now growing there.

Reformed

The Egyptians have recently refrained from pursuing their previously vehement propaganda campaign against the Syrian role in Lebanon.

Egypt's weight at the Arab League is known, and it seems clear that Cairo and the Arab bourgeoisie as a whole have decided to leave Syria to get on with the job.

Approval for the Syrian-rightist lunge has also come from the Soviet bureaucracy. This is the interpretation that the Palestinian leaders are putting on this week's 'Pravda' article condemning 'leftist extremists'.

'Pravda's article talks of 'reasonable compromise'.

While acknowledging the demand by the Palestine Liberation Organisation and Lebanese left for Syrian withdrawal, it makes no condemnation of the Syrian role.

In the interests of its counter-revolutionary co-existence policy, the Kremlin is indicating that it is going to let the right and Syrians go ahead to crush the Palestinian and Lebanese masses.

Some observers believe that 'zero hour' may be as soon as early next week to ensure that the operation is completed before the 23rd.

In this respect, the reported Syrian decision to suspend the issue of entry and exit permits between Lebanon and Syria until Sunday may be of importance.

Resistance

It would be no easy task even for a large Syrian force to take all of the main remaining centres of leftist and Palestinian resistance, and particularly west Beirut.

The thrust is therefore expected to concentrate on certain strategic objectives which would weaken the leftist-Palestinian strongholds.

One target would almost certainly be the port of Tripoli in north Lebanon, already under an increasingly tight siege by the Syrians to the north and rightists to the south and east.

Unless the Syrians and Rightists can take Tripoli by the winter, they will be denied a weather-proof road linking Syria to the Christian heartland, since the existing links all cross mountains which lie deep in snow in the winter months.

Meanwhile Syrian forces still at Jizzin, east of Sidon, would be expected to advance on the port town again.

Even if they failed to take it, they would again put the vital food and fuel links which feed west Beirut under their control, subjecting the Muslim-leftist quarters of Beirut to another and worse period of starvation, thirst and immobilization.

New danger fear over saccharin

WASHINGTON — Saccharin may be dangerous to health, according to a report by a government watchdog agency released here.

The General Accounting Office (GAO) report said the Food and Drug Administration had been studying saccharin since 1972 to determine if it could cause cancer. The studies were ordered after tests on some animals indicated there was a possible danger.

The FDA study will not be finished until at least 1978. The use of saccharin is allowed under an interim FDA regulation.

The extended use of a food additive, such as saccharin, whose safety has not been conclusively established, could expose the public to unnecessary risk, the GAO says.

Saccharin is used mainly in diet soft drinks, dietetic foods and as a substitute for sugar in drinks and in foods.

VENEZUELA GETS A \$1B LOAN

CARACAS — Venezuela, the world's third biggest oil exporting country, has borrowed one billion dollars from foreign banks. Finance Minister Hector Hurtado said the loan, for short-term refinancing of Venezuela's foreign debt, is with a consortium headed by two leading American commercial banks, Morgan Guaranty Trust and Citybank.

The seven-year loan carries interest at around 7.5 per cent, although this could vary according to market conditions, Hurtado added.

Soweto Pressmen held

JOHANNESBURG — Three more black South African journalists were detained by security police in Soweto yesterday bringing the total to ten.

They were Willie Nkosi, 28, a photographer, Jan Tugwana, 22, a reporter, both of the Rand 'Daily Mail', and Dyna Bdkivym, a reporter of the black newspaper, 'The World'.

According to the 'Mail', security police said Nkosi and Tugwana were being held for preventive detention under the Internal Security Act.

Nearly 300 people are known to have been detained in the last month.

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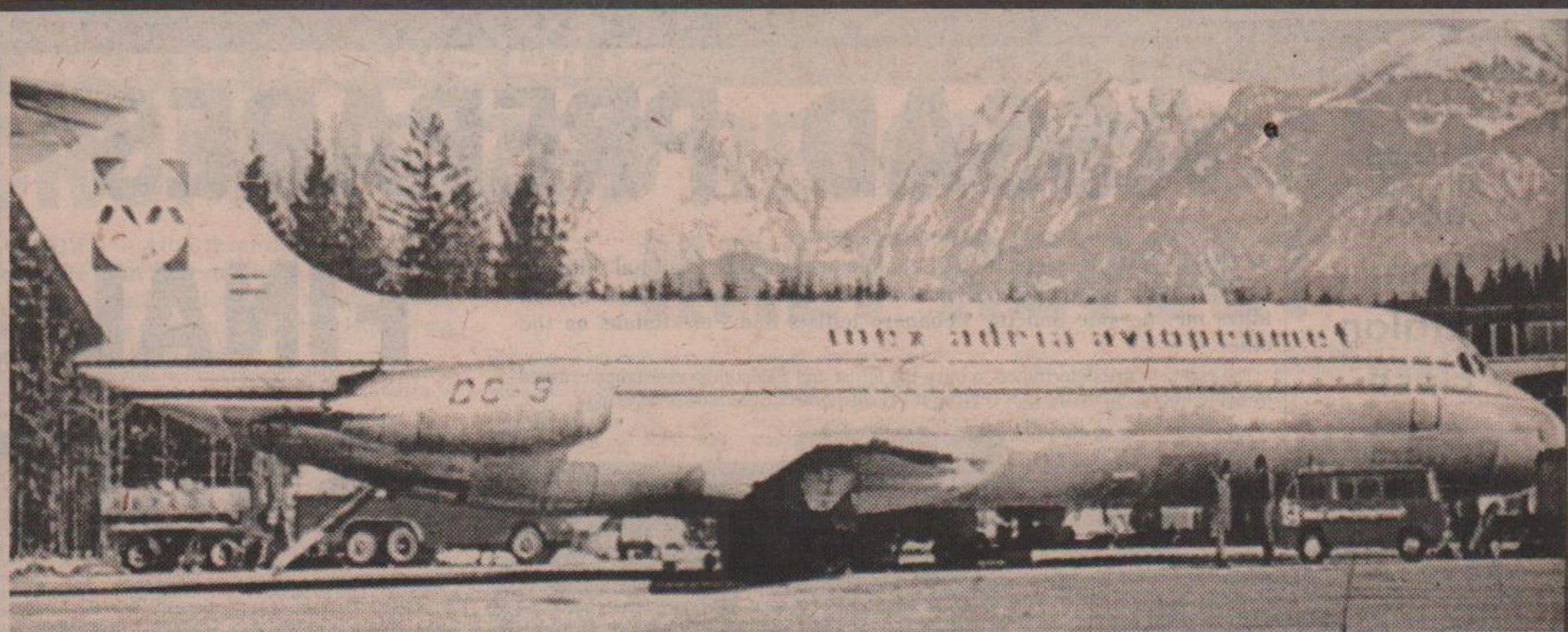

Seamen aboard disaster plane

ALL 176 people aboard a Yugoslav DC-9 airliner and a British Trident jet were killed yesterday when the two planes collided high over northern Yugoslavia. It was the worst toll ever in a mid-air crash.

The planes collided at an altitude of 10,000 metres (30,000 feet) and fell to earth near Vrbovec, about 40 kilometres (25 miles) northeast of Zagreb.

The Yugoslav airline Inex-Adria said its DC-9 was carrying 100 passengers and a crew of five on a flight from the Adriatic resort of Split to Cologne. It said all but one of the passengers, a Yugoslav, were West German.

The British Trident 38 is a short to medium range, rear-engined airliner made by Hawker Siddeley.

The McDonnell Douglas DC9 is a twin-jet, short-haul airliner produced by Douglas aircraft, of California. It is powered by two rear-mounted Pratt and Whitney JT8D Turbofan engines.

The captain of the Trident was named as Capt Dennis Tann, 44, who joined BEA in 1957.

Two passengers aboard the aircraft were seamen flying to join the BP tanker British Loyalty.

They were deck cadet Martin Heffer, 19, of Truro, Cornwall, and Seaman Robert Siner, of Bootle,

Lancashire, married with two children.

The National Union of Students had four passengers booked on the Trident, said NUS spokesman Danny Mullen. Three were from Yorkshire and the fourth from Kensington, London.

He was awaiting confirmation that all four actually travelled on the plane.

At Heathrow — where several stewardesses broke down in tears after hearing of the crash — check-in staff said three passengers had failed to turn up for the flight. A ground steward refused to name them.

Perspectives discussion

Here, two young mothers who attended one of those meetings explain just some of the real harsh problems outlined in the document; problems caused and made worse by the Labour government's anti-working class policies.

TWO homeless working-class women with young children are being hounded from pillar to post by one local authority after another in London.

They can find nowhere to live, they haven't even been able to get a clothing grant for their children and they can't get a job because their youngsters have no decent shoes to go to school in.

Mrs Roseann Grimshaw, 27, told News Line that when they went to Barnet council offices, 'they told us that as far as they were concerned, we could sleep in an all-night laundrette with our children or walk the streets'.

Mrs Ina McDonald, 36, with her two sons, came to London from Glasgow together with Mrs

Grimshaw and her child about six weeks ago.

They both spoke to News Line after attending a discussion meeting on the Workers Revolutionary Party's conference perspectives document and both joined the party.

'I've been Labour all my life,' said Ina McDonald, 'but now I'm wondering why.'

The two women hoped to stay with Mrs McDonald's brother in Croydon, but when they went

there he had moved. At his new place, the landlord allowed them to stay overnight, but there was no room for two women and three children to stay longer.

Crowded

Next day they went to Croydon council who sent them to the battered wives hostel in Chiswick. That was crowded, they say, so they stayed with a friend they knew who was able

to lend them a room for a few nights while the regular occupant was away.

Next they tried Brent Borough Council offices and were kept hanging around all day. Finally the police were called to evict them from the premises — together with their children.

Only then were they told that they were at the wrong place anyway and ought to have applied to the Barnet authority.

All Barnet was prepared to do was give them a travel warrant back to Scotland. 'You're Glasgow's responsibility, not ours', they were told.

'We don't want to go back to Glasgow,' Roseann Grimshaw says. 'We want to make a life for ourselves here'.

'We're very bitter about all this,' she told us. 'All we want is

somewhere to live, anywhere at all.'

These two women want to work. They've both been bus conductresses in Glasgow. Roseann has done factory work and shopwork and been a bar-maid. Ina has done shop work as well.

Job

'If we could just get fixed up with a place to live we could get a job,' says Ina.

The two have been forced to move into a squat in Cricklewood with their children. There are no beds — they are sleeping on mattresses. They have electricity for lighting, but no gas for cooking. They use a

little Belling stove and it takes half an hour to make a pot of tea.

Roseann says: 'I get £14.95 for myself and child each week.'

We've trailed everywhere, dragging the children with us. In two days it cost us £2 in bus fares back and forth to the Social Security. Then they took 30p a week off me because I'm squatting.

'We went to Hounslow Council, and they didn't want to know. They just refused point blank to help us. Now we've been sent a form to fill in for a clothing grant. They're just passing the buck between each other.'

'We don't want any charity. We just want a place to live, to get our children into school, and to get work so we can build our lives.'

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Can you give a brief history of the union?

It was founded in 1954 by a student from Sudan and one from Iraq. The one from Iraq became the Foreign Minister of Iraq in 1963 and was also in the United Nations for a while.

It was founded to represent all Arab students in Britain, and in Ireland as well. The main aim was always to counter imperialist and Zionist propaganda and to educate students in the progressive and revolutionary ideologies of the Arab world.

The union has also been involved in syndicalist issues like the defence of all students' rights.

How is the union financed?

Basically from contributions of members, some help, unconditional help, from progressive Arab organisations, and from the Arab League office in London.

How are the executive members of your union elected?

We hold an annual conference in London attended by no less than 1,500 Arab students and delegates from our branches. Every Arab student is entitled to attend this conference and vote.

Also the conference is attended by most Arab ambassadors in Britain and delegates from organisations in the Arab world.

At the end of the meeting we elect the seven-man executive and thereafter these executive members elect those to serve in the various posts — president, secretary, treasurer, one in charge of Arab relations, plus two in charge of culture and information.

There are 52 Arab societies in universities and colleges all over Britain.

What happens when the policy of the union conflicts with the policy of an Arab country where you have members?

This happened between 1969 and 1971. The work of the union was suspended for two years. The leadership of the union supported the Egyptian government and the abortive Rogers Plan. Most of the union was against it and there was sharp struggle which ended in deadlock for two years.

We have always stood on our policies in spite of the policies of any Arab government.

Have conflicts arisen in the union over the Lebanon civil war and the role of the Syrian government?

In the Syrian situation there wasn't any kind of objection from our members in the stand we took. This means that most of the Arab students in the UK are very conscious of the situation in the Lebanon and have followed the policies that we have adopted.

The pro-Assad students have said nothing at all while most Syrian students have been very active in the campaigning against what Syria is doing.

Recently it was revealed that a SAVAK police agent had infiltrated the Iranian students in London. Do you face the same hazards?

Yes, there is always this possibility and we are aware of



Arab students' demonstration in support of the Lebanese revolution

The voice of Arab students in Britain

The general Union of Arab Students in Great Britain is launching a campaign to arouse support for the Lebanese leftist and Palestinian forces in the Lebanon civil war. In this interview three executive members of the union talk to News Line about the union and its activities. They are Husam Al Rawi, president, Jala Backdash, vice president, and A.Z.H. Al Hashimi, executive member in charge of international affairs.

it. Students are subjected to harassment and pressure from their governments. We have examples of this.

We know that there are people, for example, giving information to the Syrian Embassy. But we have found that students are not intimidated. They didn't worry. They go ahead and do what they believe in. The union always has their solidarity in spite of the pressures.

What is the latest case of victimisation by an Arab government?

Following the coup attempt in the Sudan, the embassy in London wrote to 14 students telling them that their grants were terminated and asking them to return to their country.

Six of them are on the executive of the Sudanese

Students' Union in Britain. They have been told that since their grants have been cancelled their Students' Union is already dissolved.

Before they received these letters, a circular by the Sudanese Socialist Union was sent around accusing them of being spies and traitors and all kinds of things. They were being judged and convicted in spite of the fact that none of them had anything to do with the coup attempt. If they went back they know what their fate will be, especially after the execution of 90 people in Khartoum.

The Sudanese government is using the coup as an excuse to get rid of all opposition. Anyone who is progressive, anyone who has been opposed to the policies of the government is now threatened.

What will you do for these students?

Already we have sent letters of protest to the Sudanese government and the cultural department of the embassy in London. We are demanding that the rights of the students be restored at once. Meanwhile we are making arrangements so that they are financially cared for. We will raise the matter with the National Union of Students (NUS) as well.

What is your attitude to the British capitalist Press coverage of issues in the Arab world?

We are very dissatisfied. The news coverage always portrays the Palestinians as a bunch of terrorists and bloodthirsty criminals. The issues of the Arab revolution and the Palestinian revolution are never really covered in a way to give justice to our cause and we certainly don't get equal space as the Zionists.

The exception is your paper, News Line.

There are some issues that don't get reported at all. What about the struggle in Oman? We don't hear anything about it in the British Press although there are British soldiers there. There is a complete black-out on news of Oman which leaves a lot of British people not knowing what is going on there.

Have you had any further examples of recent British Press bias?

Well, it's going on all the time. There was the case of Mrs Bloch who was killed in Uganda. It was all over the newspapers, the television and the radio. But on

the other side of the coin, the British papers don't worry when the Israelis shoot up the refugee camps killing innocent civilians.

And in the Entebbe raid the Israeli government acted as terrorists: they invaded a sovereign state breaking all the rules of United Nations charter and the Press turned it into a Heroic act.

What support do you get

from the left in Britain?

In general we get the support of the British left. Some sections are very committed like your party [the Workers Revolutionary Party] and the Young Socialists. It is seen in your resolutions and the solidarity you have given.

But it is not very satisfactory from other quarters where they believe in protecting the official line.

What is your view of the Labour government?

From my own experience I have not seen any difference between the Labour government and the Conservative government stand. They follow the same policies in the Arab world and on the Palestinian question.

Recently they invited Golda Meir to a Labour Party convention in London but they won't invite delegates from the Arab Labour Parties. Recently we asked some Labour MPs to support a humanitarian appeal for medicines for the Lebanese progressive forces and they refused. They couldn't give a damn.

What assistance are you planning for the Lebanese and Palestinian victims of the war?

We are launching a campaign for the Lebanon sponsored by us. We have formed the Lebanese Medical Aid Committee. Its aim is to collect donations and essential medicines and we are appealing to all humanitarian and friendly organisations to give their help and medical aid to the injured and wounded.

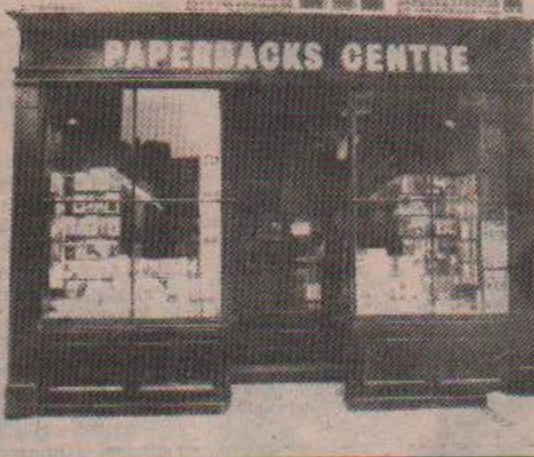

THE bicentenary of Britain's oldest classic, the St Leger, will be marked by an even greater festival atmosphere than usual at Doncaster today.

French trainers should be in on the celebrations, too, by confirming their superiority with this year's three-year-olds.

Five French horses have come over for the Leger, and the one most likely to win the season's last classic is Angel Penna's Crow.

Little had been heard of Crow in England until he ran such a fine race against Wollow in York's big prestige event, the Benson and Hedges Gold Cup, last month.

Experience

Then, over 10½ furlongs, a distance palpably too short for him to show his top form, Crow still came within a length of Henry Cecil's star colt, who had to race all the way to the line.

In Yves Saint-Martin, Crow has a jockey second to none in France, and with plenty of experience of our tracks.

The Bill Pyers-Campero combination also makes considerable appeal, while Secret Man, beaten only once in five races this year, when he was runner up in the Grand Prix de Paris, has been backed in inspired circles during the last couple of months.

Of the nine trained in this country, Marquis de Sade is certainly the best on his day. Ryan Price was cautious yesterday after the coughing

earlier this week that made his horse a doubtful runner. The Findon trainer said: 'He's well. I have always said that he

will beat all the English horses. Whether he beats the French, I don't know.' Price saddled Bruni for a

runaway victory 12 months ago, but although he is now fit to run, there must still be a question mark against Marquis de Sade.
