Warm welcome for Dr K!

FIRE ENGINES raced through the streets of Johannesburg yesterday as demonstrations, marches and fire-attacks marked the arrival of US Secretary of State Henry Kissinger.

A suite of lawyers' offices in the heart of Johannesburg's commercial sector was one of at least six major fires reported in 24 hours.

Twelve people were killed and 40 injured — on police figures — during anti-government demonstrations in the Black and Coloured townships near Cape Town.

Three children were killed and 12 injured when police opened fire on the grounds of two schools in Soweto.

Another African was shot dead by police in a separate incident.

Thousands of African and Coloured demonstrators sang freedom songs and carried placards describing Kissinger as a murderer and condemning his visit.

Kissinger was in South Africa for talks with racist Prime Minister Balthazar Vorster, and possibly with Smith of Rhodesia, in a desperate attempt to stem the African revolution in Rhodesia, Namibia and South Africa itself.

African leaders have denounced the talks as 'lending respectability' to the two racist governments.

SOUTH AFRICA ABLAZE

Even Kenneth Kaunda of Zambia, who has agreed to Kissinger meeting Vorster and said he would let the US envoy 'decide for himself' whether to talk to Smith, was forced to comment Yesterday: 'If he fails, we fight.'

But Vorster has repeatedly proclaimed his determination not to grant genuine independence to Namibia.

He will conduct fake negotiations only with his own black stooges in the area. The South African apartheid

rulers have also said they will never grant freedom, or even the vote, to Blacks and Coloureds.

And Ian Smith, who is due in Pretoria this weekend 'to watch a rugby match', has reiterated that he will not even

accept the British Labour government's proposals of majority rule in Rhodesia in two years' time.

This time Kissinger cannot produce any 'miracles'.

The African revolution is on the march.



LEBANON

SYRIANS IN ISRAELI ARMY TALKS

MILITARY consultations have taken place between senior Syrian and Israeli officers, Israeli Defence Minister Shimon Peres disclosed yesterday.

Peres claimed that the talks concerned the reunion of Druze villages on the Golan Heights.

But they follow reports of meetings between Peres and right-wing Lebanese political leaders as preparations mount for a Syrian-led military offensive against the Palestine Liberation Organisation.

Meanwhile, talks between PLO chief Yassir Arafat, president-elect Elias Sarkis and Syrian deputy Defence Minister

Naji Jamil opened yesterday in Shtoura, Lebanon.

The talks broke up at 5.30p.m. and are to be resumed tomorrow. No announcement on progress was made.

But left-wing Beirut Radio stressed 'the reservations displayed by Syria and the rightists'.

President Franjeh would hardly have mounted an ultra-right take-over of the Lebanese cabinet (a week from when Sarkis is supposed to take office) unless he had Syrian backing. Franjeh yesterday

defended his move — described by the Falangists as 'a wrecking operation' — saying it was aimed at 'unifying the country and preserving legitimacy'.

Fighting between Falangist forces and followers of Franjeh's National Front in north Lebanon, and between Falangists and Camille Chamoun's National Liberal Party in east Beirut was reported.

The main danger remains a sudden military offensive by the Syrians and their ultra-right allies to smash the PLO.

BONN

Lockheed papers go missing

CRUCIAL documents concerning aircraft deals between Lockheed and West Germany are missing from the Bonn Defence Ministry.

Allegations of bribery in the early 1960s when West Germany bought 900 Lockheed F-104 Starfighters have been made. The main target of the accusations is the Bavarian Christian Social Union, part of the Christian Democratic opposition in the Federal parliament. Its leader, Franz Josef Strauss, was Federal Defence Minister at the time of the deal.

A statement from Bonn yesterday said: 'A reconstruction of the proceedings leading up to the choice of the F-104 and its electronic equipment is unusually difficult, because some of the documents, in particular some documents of the then ministerial office, were already untraceable in 1966-1967, and remain untraceable in the present investigations.'

The shoring up of Mr Slater

SCANDAL after scandal from the City of London is revealing that the men who have been doing nothing in their lives except making fortunes have been secretly helped by the Labour government when they ran into difficulties.

Jim Slater, of Slater-Walker Securities was hailed as a financial wizard for making millions out of speculation and asset-stripping during the boom years.

Slater has produced nothing, except profit. Not a brick, nor a shovelful of coal nor anything of any use to anybody was ever produced by Slater's 'genius'.

Miners, seamen, engineers, railway workers every section of the working class which produces all the wealth

What we think

— have been told their wages must be held down, while prices rise and social services are cut. Yet the Labour government, through the state-owned Bank of England, handed over more than £110m to the Slater Walker speculators.

This is the same Labour government which will not even provide invalid cars.

Which Party Conference authorised a Labour government to hand over this kind of money to the labour movement's worst enemies?

Which election manifesto carried such a commitment?

When was it discussed in a Cabinet meeting?

The answer is that the Labour leaders decided to rescue this washed-up 'genius' without consulting anybody, except a few top bankers. Is there any more doubt about where the loyalty of this Labour government lies? It is not a workers' government, but a capitalist government.

Even the Tories were forced to launch inquiries into firms like Lonrho (involving the Queen's cousin, Angus Ogilvy), Vehicle and General Insurance, and London and County Securities.

But the Labour government covers up for them all. Trade Secretary Edmund Dell is said to be 'unlikely' to refer the Slater-Walker report to the Director of Public Prosecutions. And even if he did, the maximum penalty for any breach of the Companies' Act is £100.

Far more than this is being taken from every worker in the land in the form of higher prices, lost jobs, over-crowded schools, slum hospitals, reduced services of every kind.

The Labour government has shown which side it is on. It is for the speculators and against the workers. It is time for the working class to force it to resign.

Always higher than pay

SINCE March this year the annual rate of inflation has fluctuated as follows.

March 21.2 per cent higher than 12 months earlier.

April 18.9 per cent higher than 12 months earlier.

May 15.4 per cent higher than 12 months earlier.

June 13.8 per cent higher than 12 months earlier.

July 12.9 per cent higher than 12 months earlier.

August 13.8 per cent higher than 12 months earlier.

This exposes once again the complete lies of the Labour government which has tried to blame workers' wages for the spiralling cost of living.

Wages have been held down under the TUC pay restraint for more than 12 months.

The current rate of pay increase is limited to only 4½ per cent, the lowest it has been cut to for more than six years.

But despite this, the annual rate of inflation has never gone much below 13 per cent and it is now rising again.

The last month's price increases of 1.4 per cent in fact show that the annual increase in the cost of living is running at something like 17 per cent again, and is heading back towards the 20 per cent rates of inflation seen in 1974 and 1975.

INFLATION TARGET MISSED

Still not down to single figures

THE Labour government has lost the battle against inflation.

Big increases in a whole range of food prices, combined with continuing sterling devaluation, caused the Retail Price Index, released yesterday, to show a rise of 1.4 per cent from

July to August.

The government originally set this month as the target for getting inflation down to single figures. Instead, it stands at 13.8 per cent.

When it became clear the single-figure aim could not be achieved this month, the date was pushed back to the end of

the year.

Then Chancellor Denis Healey said it would be achieved 'some time this winter'. Now it has been postponed again — to some undefined future date.

Every major item in the shopping basket went up, causing a 3.3-per-cent rise in the food price index alone.

Potatoes were dearer. So were eggs. So was bread. And bacon, and fish, and butter, and cheese, and coffee, and canned foods...

Other food price increases — like that on milk — have not yet worked through to the index, so it could be worse still next month.

According to today's 'Grocer' magazine, food prices have gone up 22p in the pound in the last year. There have been 12,313 food price increases in 1976 — and nine reductions.

There have been 339 food price increases in the last week

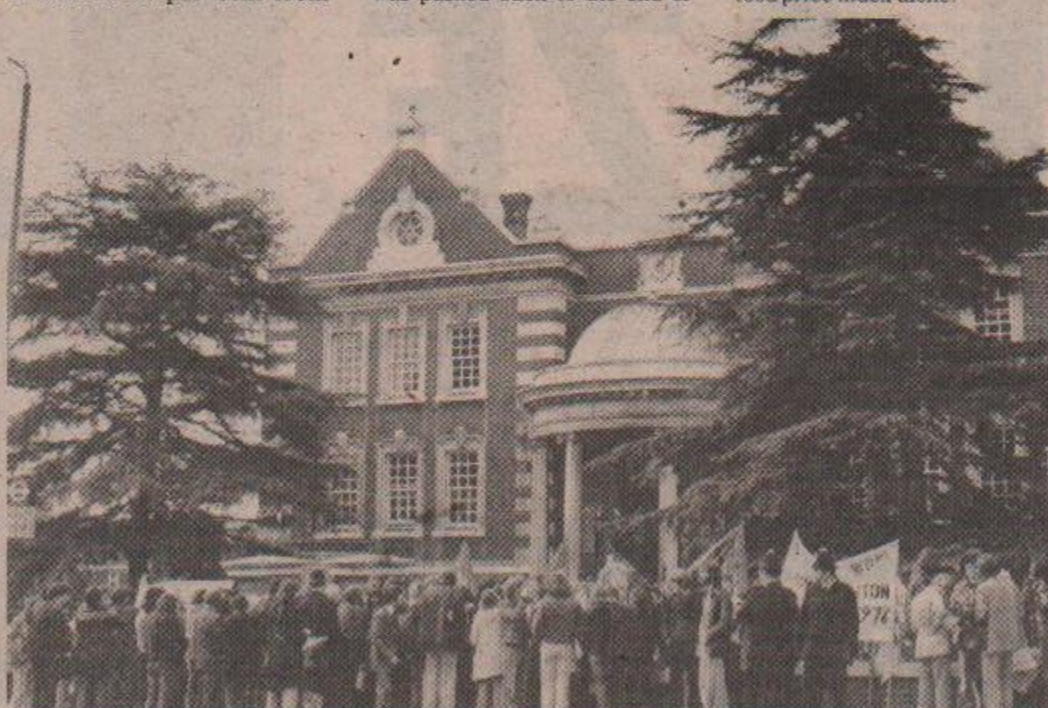
alone.

The government's entire economic policy is a failure.

The wage laws and the social contract have not kept prices down. They haven't saved jobs either.

Nor have they saved the pound.

The government and the TUC both claimed that if the threat of a seamen's strike receded, the pound would strengthen. Tremendous pressure was put on the NUS to postpone its strike and accept a deal.

SEAMEN SAY 'NO RETREAT'

MEETINGS are planned by seamen in several ports over the next few days to exert further pressure on the pay negotiations which resume on Tuesday between the National Union of Seamen and the shipowners.

The NUS has already bust through the 'social contract' by forcing the employers, the TUC and Labour leaders to concede that benefits can be negotiated in addition to the £2.50-£4 pay rise limit.

The shipowners are expected next Tuesday to go 'some way' towards meeting the NUS claim for £6 a week extra.

But they will substitute various 'fringe benefits' for much of the cash being claimed.

The General Council of British Shipping hinted on Thursday night that the cash part of their offer will even fall short of the £4 maximum for many seamen and will be nearer £2.50 for the lowest paid grades.

What cash is offered will also be delayed until next January, instead of being paid from July this year as demanded in the seamen's ballot for industrial action.

And though the shipowners have indicated they will offer concessions on fringe benefits like fall-back pay and smaller items, there are still doubts about whether an acceptable offer will be forthcoming on payment for 'captive time'.

This is the unpaid time seamen spend on board ship while off-duty, and is the fringe benefit on which the NUS is most keen.

With the NUS deadline for calling an all-out strike only a week away, militants in ports like Liverpool and elsewhere are continuing to demand strike action unless their original claim for a straight £6 rise from July 2 this year is met.

MINERS JOIN TILT

MINERS gave the 'social contract' a battering yesterday.

Demands grew in the coalfields for miners to retire five years earlier — with no loss of income.

Industrial action is threatened unless the coal board agrees to cut the retirement age from 65 to 60 by January 1977.

Welsh miners' leader Emlyn Williams said yesterday they would accept the national decision on any strike action.

Mr Williams said they understood it would be the matter of a ballot and it would then be up to the members. Whatever the decision they would abide by it.

Jack Dunn, general secretary of the 3,300-strong Kent area of the National Union of Mineworkers, said Kent was fully backing the demand and that if no progress was made on the issue by the end of the year, they would probably back some form of industrial action.

David Bolton, Scottish area vice-president of the NUM, said he had no doubt that Scottish miners would be prepared to take industrial action if the claim for early retirement was turned down.

'As far as I am concerned, talking personally, if we are determined and there is a refusal, we will need to consider taking some form of action'.

Industrial action could mean an overtime ban, a one-day strike or a total stoppage, he said.

'That will be a decision made by the miners themselves. But our attitude in Scotland is quite clear. We are determined that this claim will be implemented.'

Ailment

'The life expectancy of miners is 67 years. It is the most hazardous industry in Britain. According to reports by some rank-and-file miners, there are few men aged 50 or over who do not have some serious ailment'.

Eric Mountain, NUM secretary at Dearn Valley pit, near Barnsley, Yorks, told News Line: 'There is unanimous support in this pit.'

'Speaking for Dearn Valley, I think a vote would show massive backing for industrial action if the coal board does not concede. It could start off with an overtime ban and lead to an all-out strike if necessary.'

'There are over 400 working miners at this pit and dozens would be involved in a lowering of the retirement age.'

'They would welcome early retirement but we would have to insist they did not lose out financially.'

'It would also mean we could recruit men off the dole to take their place. At the moment we are only allowed to recruit so many and our quota is full.'

Looking

'We have a lad aged 16 starting today. He's a school leaver who has been looking for a job for weeks. There are a lot of others his age who still can't find jobs and would like to come here,' added Mr Mountain.

If the government is forced to concede the five-year age reduction next January, the miners will have followed the seamen in driving another hole in the Labour-TUC wage-cutting policy.

Government ministers and TUC leaders have always insisted in the past that 'fringe benefits' are outlawed at least until next July and that a 4½ per cent supplement on wages is the maximum allowed in settlements.

The momentum which mounted behind the retirement issue was in the wake of Thursday's decision by the NUM national executive to request a meeting with the Prime Minister on the matter.

The executive are bound by a vote at the union's 1976 annual conference which made it official policy to fight for early retirement without loss of earnings.

Apart from retirement at 60 by next January, the official NUM policy is also to fight for the age to be reduced to 55 by 1980. Up to 80,000 miners — 30 per cent of the total — would be involved in such a scheme.

Joe Whelan, Notts coalfield left-winger who sits on the national executive, said if miners felt industrial action was necessary to force the retirement concession from the coal board then they would take that action.

Warnings must also be sounded that sections of the NUM leadership hope to use the retirement issue to hold back rank-and-file demands for a decent rise on basic pay.

Len Clarke, right-wing president of the Notts miners, said yesterday: 'There is no point in miners pushing for a large wage increase as this will only get eaten away by inflation. It is better to have fringe benefits such as early retirement', said Mr Clarke.

Fred Croom, NUM secretary at Calverton

colliery, near Nottingham, said a complete overtime ban would be very effective.

Maintenance work normally done at weekends would be done in the week instead, hitting production, he said.

'A very big majority at Calverton would vote in favour of industrial action on the issue of retirement', said Mr Croom.

He suggested that the earlier retirement scheme could be financed from a pit productivity incentive scheme.

But incentive schemes are opposed by a majority of miners on the grounds that they would split the solidarity of miners in various coalfields.

Arthur Scargill, Yorkshire

miners' president, commented that miners were entitled to a wage increase as well as a reduction in the retirement age.

If retirement at 60 was good enough for Sir Harold Wilson and Coal Board chairman Derek Ezra, it was good enough for the miners, he added.

Nottingham busmen oppose cuts

NOTTINGHAM City transport crews took all buses to their depots for three hours on Thursday lunchtime to a mass meeting.

They are protesting against the decision of the Tory council's city transport committee to sell 18 luxury coaches and close one of the city's bus depots without consulting the union.

The busmen say the luxury coaches — used for the past two years in the Nottingham 'park-and-ride' scheme which was recently scrapped — should be added to the corporation's fleet or used for private hire.

Many of the vehicles in use are already over 11 years old.

Clive Johnson, chairman of the 5/92 T&GWU branch, said after the meeting:

'By negotiating we mean we are prepared to meet with anybody providing the joint decision arising from these meetings are implemented. We

will not be party to talking shops where we are accorded no right to influence the decision.'

'The reason for our meeting was to inform the members and bring to the attention of the public that future services are in danger,' he said.

Mr Johnson explained that there has been no recruitment of staff since the beginning of this year.

At least 20 more drivers could be employed, but this work is covered by overtime pending decisions over service levels after a survey in October.

Solicitor barred from prisoner

SOLICITOR Mr Barrington Black said yesterday he had written to the Home Secretary after being refused permission to visit a prisoner involved in the Hull jail riot.

He said that the prisoner — now in Wakefield's top security jail — was alleging that he had been assaulted.

Black, from Leeds, said it was 'rather incredible' that he should

be refused permission to see the man.

The assault is alleged to have taken place at Hull from where the man was moved after the rioting.

The prisoner involved was William Gould, from Manchester, who had been sentenced to ten years for robbery with violence.

UNION leaders representing 90,000 farm workers yesterday put in a claim for a 'substantial increase in the minimum wage rates' at a meeting of the Agricultural Wages Board.

The general secretary of the National Union of Agricultural and Allied Workers Reg Bottini later declined to give details of the claim.

'We are conscious of the fact that negotiations are constrained by the current wage policy and we are not doing another seamen. What we

expect is the maximum allowed under the current policy,' he said, therefore admitting he is asking for a wage-cut for his 80,000 members.

The employers' reaction will be given at the next board meeting on October 25.

The current weekly rates of agricultural workers are £45.65 for grade one workers and £36.50 for ordinary grade workers.

Drought order for NW

THE SECRETARY of State for the Environment yesterday made an order under the Drought Act, affecting the whole of the north west water authority's area. It empowers the authority to limit and prohibit non-essential uses of water. These uses include the watering, by hosepipe or sprinkler, of parks, ornamental gardens, lawns, recreation grounds, sports grounds, playing fields, golf courses or racecourses, whether publicly or privately owned; the filling of privately-owned swimming pools; the operating of mechanical car washers; and the cleaning of the exterior of buildings.

Finnish government resigns

HELSINKI — Finnish prime minister Martti Meittunen yesterday announced the resignation of his 'popular front' government after a failure to agree on budget measures. It was the second time within months.

Printer gives final evidence

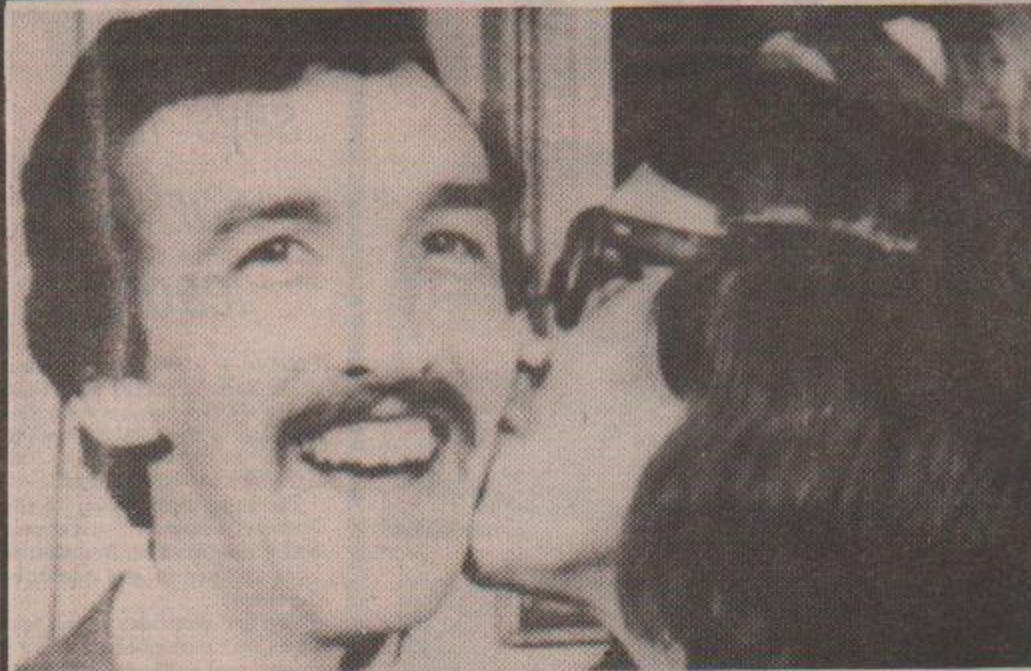
THE RYMAN-MORTAKIS election expenses trial yesterday ended its ninth day at Newcastle Crown Court, and the Blyth, Northumberland, printer, Mr Ron McCall finally ended his evidence after four days in the witness box.

He was recalled to give further evidence and again denied he had been lying, or fabricating evidence, when cross-examined by 46-year-old Labour MP for Blyth, John Ryman, a barrister who is conducting his own defence. Ryman and his 52-year-old former agent Peter Mortakis of Blyth, deny conspiring to make a false election expenses return. They have also denied making false declarations under the 1949 Representation of the People Act and the 1911 Perjury Act.

The decision to put Mrs Garside in charge of special projects came after discussion of the William Tyndale inquiry.

Tories block votes for EEC immigrants

STRASBOURG — British Tories have blocked a move in the European Parliament aimed at giving immigrant workers voting rights in local elections.

A motion was before the 18-nation parliament of the Council of Europe calling on member-states to grant

local government voting rights to aliens after they fulfilled a minimum residence qualification of not more than five years.

Tory MP Percy Grieve, who represents Solihull at Westminster, proposed an amendment deleting the important paragraph from the motion, and asked for a

roll-call vote.

Only his own Tory delegation supported him, and their colleagues from Austria and Luxemburg. French Stalinists abstained.

Grieve then challenged the quorum, and was successful. The debate has been postponed until some time in the future.

RACIALISTS' VOTE ROUT

THE DEFEAT of the racist candidates in the Blackburn local council by-election shows the shallow basis of big votes for the National Front and National Party which won two seats there in May.

But the comments of the Labour candidate after his victory late Thursday night show why the social democrats fail to get out the working class vote in so many elections.

Shop manager Mike Madigan, 34, said: 'This has been a very unpleasant period in the history of this town.'

Humbug

FOUR FOUNDRIES IN BSC CLOSURES PLAN

FOUR FOUNDRIES face closure with the loss of at least 650 jobs, the British Steel Corporation said yesterday.

BSC announced talks will start soon with the trade unions to rationalise its whole iron foundry industry.

Nine foundries employing a total of 2,000 are involved in the rationalisation plans.

BSC says it is facing increasing surpluses of ingot mould foundry capacity due to advancing technology, including the use of continuous casting, which has led to a fall in demand

for ingot moulds and bottom plates in steelmaking.

The economic slump is also to blame, although BSC avoids saying this because 'officially' they pretend the slump is ending.

The strategy to be discussed with the unions involves the gradual cessation of ingot mould production at Teesside Bridge over the next two years, but with the intention of continuing the manufacture of general castings.

It also plans the ending of ingot mould and bottom plate production at Shotton Foundry in 1979 — irrespective of decisions on the future of steelmaking at Shotton — at Landore (Swansea) foundry by 1980 and at Consett (Redcar) foundry by 1984.

It adds, however, that the precise timing of the closure

would depend on the rate of decrease in ingot mould demand, which is related to the decline in production by the ingot route and to technical developments providing longer mould life.

It is intended to retain the BSC foundries at Distington (Cumbria), Stanton (Notts), Renishaw (Yorks), New Stevenston (Yorks) and Dowlais (Merthyr Tydfil).

In formulating these proposals, the corporation says

it has been guided by social considerations as well as commercial and operational pressures.

The number of employees engaged on ingot mould production at the closure foundries is as follows: Consett 85; Landore 460; Shotton 90 and Teesside Bridge 30.

In an attempt to head off resistance to the closures BSC is putting across the idea that alternative jobs can be found.

COT TRAPS

MANY parents are unaware that their babies sleep in death-trap cots, a government minister warned yesterday.

New laws are to be brought in urgently to make cots safe — but safety experts estimate that 100,000 cots are at present in use which could be dangerous.

Dennis Canavan, Labour MP for Stirlingshire West, last month called for an immediate investigation after a spate of carbon copy baby deaths. The accidents happened when babies' clothing got entwined on the drop-rods used to remove one side of cots.

Mr John Fraser, Minister for Prices and Consumer Protection, said yesterday that new safety regulations would be imposed when the British Standards Institution completed a study now taking place.

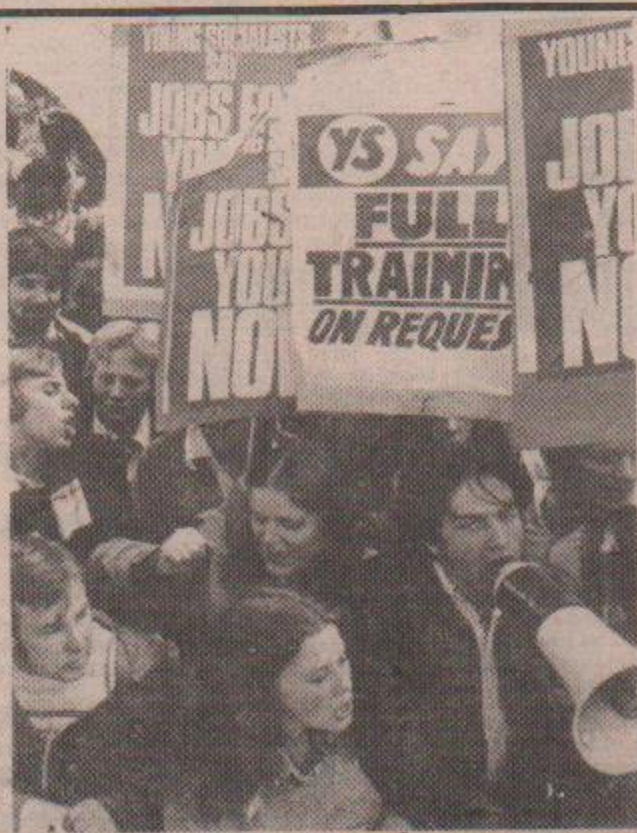
In the meantime, his department is launching a publicity campaign to alert parents to the dangers.

INQUIRY SIT-DOWN PROTEST

A SIT-DOWN demonstration led by anti-motorway campaigner John Tyme again halted the public inquiry yesterday into slip roads for the £11m Archway scheme in north London.

The inquiry had to be abandoned for more than three hours when it opened on Wednesday.

Adjourning the inquiry until next Tuesday, inspector James Vernon said he needed time to assess arguments raised by objectors attacking the legality of the inquiry and his impartiality.

To applause from more than 100 objectors to the scheme, he said:

'Some tricky new points have been raised. This is clearly a very difficult and serious issue.'

Withdraw

Trouble came earlier after Tyme asked Vernon to withdraw because of his 'former association' with the Department of the Environment, which is responsible for the road scheme.

Vernon declined. So Tyme responded by saying he had lost

all faith in the inspector and proposed to demonstrate in the only peaceful way open to him.

He then sat down on the floor of Hornsey Town Hall in front of the inspector's table and was promptly joined by about 40 other objectors.

The inspector adjourned the inquiry until 2 p.m. and swiftly left the room. Police moved in and began removing the demonstrators, who chanted and sang choruses of 'against the will of the people'.

The hall was eventually cleared.

SQUATTERS SET UP EVICTION ALARM SYSTEM

SQUATTERS in Camden have prepared an emergency telephone alarm system to alert supporters all over London as they brace themselves for their third round of evictions in three years.

The warning system will swing into operation if police and bailiffs resort to violent methods like those seen in south London this week.

John Retty, tenant in the building for 11 years, supports the squatters' action.

He was evicted from the property in 1974 after refusing to pay the increased rent demanded by the new owners, Cromdale Holdings London Ltd.

Subsequent squatters were evicted after company officials told the courts that the property was needed for immediate commercial use.

After the 1974 eviction the only action by the company was to rip out a staircase, after which the squatters moved in again.

Harassment

The building, in Camden High Street, was used by the Camden Federation of Tenants and Residents and has been a meeting place for various community organisations.

National Front harassment, including a shotgun blast through the front window, temporarily curtailed these activities.

But the squat is now again the centre for activities in Camden,

especially the campaign against the borough council's housing policies.

The labour-controlled council bowed to public protest over the waste of the property two years ago and issued a Compulsory Purchase Order.

Possession

This was rescinded by a closed meeting of the council's community planning resources committee. Simultaneously possession orders were obtained by Cromdale Holdings Ltd., enabling them to evict the squatters.

Cromdale Holdings Ltd. is owned by Scottish Heritable Trust of Glasgow. The company shares directors with Scottish Sight Improvements, which is in turn owned by Stock Conversion Ltd., one of Britain's biggest property companies.

The unemployed young people at the squat are determined to stick it out this time. They know full well there is nowhere for them to live as London's housing problems worsen.

Big road lobby behind Archway Motorway

TENANTS FIGHT 'HELL OF THE JUGGERNAUTS'

A POWERFUL road lobby is behind a government plan to drive a motorway along a stretch of built-up residential area in north London, opponents of the scheme claim.

The proposal to widen Archway Road, they say, is the result of official transport planning which allows big road-building firms to benefit from construction programmes while British Rail and other forms of transport are starved of investment.

John Tyme, leading anti-motorway campaigner says Archway Road is a 'concentrated, brutalised hell of juggernaut traffic'.

He says: 'Like two mice at a piece of cheese, Department [of the Environment] civil servants and road lobby representatives have systematically over decades dismantled the transport system in this country in that lobby's interest.'

Determined

The DoE intends to build a six-lane motorway next to the existing four lane Archway Road. It claims that the decision to build the motorway was decided at a public inquiry in 1973.

Officials say the new inquiry being held at Hornsey Town Hall will deal only with the secondary question of a slip road onto the motorway. But objectors are determined that the inquiry discusses the scheme as a whole.

Hornsey's new prospective Labour parliamentary candidate, Ted Knight, said:

'In specifying the discussion is

only to be on slip roads and link points, the assumption is made that the new road is a foregone conclusion. Demolition of 120 homes and the displacement of 200 families is taken for granted.'

Local residents have formed an action group under the name of STAMP (Stop The Archway Motorway Plan) to co-ordinate opposition to the plans.

STAMP has received the support of many local associations and has leafleted residents in the area urging them to register their objections.

STAMP's reasons for objecting to the motorway are clearly laid out in the circular sent out to the local people. The main points are:

- Almost all DoE's inquiries with an inspector paid for by the Department have accepted the

official plans.

- It's going to cost the ratepayers tens of millions of pounds. This at a time when all public spending on essential services is being cut.

- This isolated slab of motorway is no use; it's a short cut between two traffic jams. Anyone who lives nearby will suffer dirt, noise and danger from increased traffic. Good homes, shops, open spaces, woods will be destroyed.

Reasons

Many objectors are arguing that the inquiry should not and be immediately adjourned on the following grounds:

- Parliament has not

authorised the enormous expenditure involved. It has been denied information necessary for understanding or controlling the highways programme.

- The objectors at the 1973 inquiry were denied their rights. The inspector ignored all objections to the need for a scheme.

- Objectors at the 1973 inquiry were denied information that should have been available to them.

- The government has admitted that their procedures at road inquiries are in need of review.

- The government has admitted that they do not yet have the objectives of a national transport policy, and the Greater London Council has a policy of traffic restraint.

French

PARIS — Six men arrested in an attempted break-in at the headquarters of the French print workers' union, Syndicat du Livre, claim they were promised their criminal records would be destroyed if the raid was successful.

The six also told an examining magistrate that they had been promised they would be well-paid if the operation was a success.

Paris police claimed when the six were arrested that they were ordinary burglars after union funds.

French printworkers are engaged in bitter struggles over jobs. Six Syndicat du Livre members were injured, two of them seriously, when police attacked pickets on Thursday outside the offices of Emilien Amaury, owner of the 'Parisien Libéré' daily.

Amaury is bringing the paper out elsewhere using non-union labour.

PANIC SWITCH BY
TRUDEAU

OTTAWA — Drastic changes in Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau's federal cabinet reflect the Liberal government's fears of the Federal elections.

The government has been shaken by a series of scandals which resulted in the resignation of senior cabinet ministers.

Jean Marchand and M. Ouellet were charged with contempt of court, bribery and a cover-up.

A number of top civil servants have also been implicated in the scandals.

Three senior Cabinet ministers have resigned in the announced government changes, and two leading ministers have been demoted.

One is Warren Allmand, ex-Solicitor General, whose controversial anti-capital punishment legislation caused nationwide controversy.

Noted cabinet right wingers

have all retained their positions, including James Richardson in Defence and John Munro in Labour.

The cabinet changes come in the wake of public opinion polls indicating a substantial lead for the opposition Progressive Conservative Party over the waning Liberals.

Trade union militancy has been growing over Trudeau's wage control legislation.

The Canadian Labour Congress is being forced by its members to organise a token General Strike for later this year.

Trudeau's anti-inflation board has cut wage settlements, while unemployment, prices and inflation rise unchecked.

Public spending cuts have slashed health, child care and youth employment schemes.

Big business and bankers are irate at the government's policy of token interference in their affairs.

Earlier this year MPs questioned the government about recent Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) raids carried out without the knowledge of the cabinet.

One victim was the 'Toronto Sun' executive editor Peter Worthington, who leaked a letter accusing Trudeau of tying the hands of RCMP investigations into separatist activities in Quebec.

Allegations that the Tories hired a CIA-linked intelligence agency, Intertel Inc., to dig up the dirt on the Liberals are adding to these suspicions.

Similar conspiracies were reported in British Columbia against the NDP 'socialist' government elected during the 1973 election.

Prime Minister Callaghan will be meeting Trudeau shortly to discuss the mutual problems of the Social Democratic Parties they both head.

Teachers' union expels
all West Berlin members

WEST BERLIN — Thirteen thousand German teachers are about to be expelled from their union.

That is one in ten of the membership of the Gewerkschaft Erziehung Und Wissenschaft (GEW) — Education and Science Trade Union — the entire West Berlin membership.

West Berlin teachers have received a letter from union leader Erich Frister:

Re-apply

'As of October 1, 1976, you are no longer a member of the GEW, only of the GEW-Berlin. You do not belong to the national union, or to the DGB (West German Trade Union Federation). If you wish to continue to belong to the GEW and DGB, you will have to re-apply for membership.'

The union leaders decided on this move towards the end of last month, after the West Berlin teachers' federation had failed to comply with orders to dissolve itself and accept 're-organisation', bringing it under full control of the national body.

The national executive wanted to take full control of finances and the right to decide on membership.

Its reorganisation meant

depriving the members of many of their rights.

However, at the decisive meeting, 28 per cent of the delegates would not accept the new rules. This left the national leaders without the three-quarters majority required under the union constitution. The West Berlin federation stayed as it was.

The row between West Berlin teachers and their union bureaucracy has taken a constitutional form, but its content is political.

Education is being hit by the effects of the economic crisis —

cuts and political witch-hunts.

Ministers have been discussing the possibility of pay cuts.

A controversy is raging over the McCarthy-style 'Berufsverbote', laws which are used to bar Marxists and other left-wing militants from public employment.

True to form, the right-wing union leaders are taking decisive action — not to defend their members, but to attack them.

The union chiefs operate their own blacklist. Left-wing militants or members of

revolutionary or communist organisations can be barred from membership under 'incompatibility' regulations.

The West Berlin teachers' federation had incurred the wrath of their union bosses by not applying these rules rigorously enough.

This is a key area of decision-making that the national executive wants to take into its own hands.

Frister's letter stresses that the executive reserves the right to reject applications from anyone falling into the 'incompatibility' category, or if they behaved in a manner considered 'anti-trade-union'.

Zionist threat stops film

PARIS — A film about the Palestinian resistance made by French director Jean-Luc Godard has been withdrawn from a Paris cinema after threats from a Zionist terror-group.

The film 'Ici et Ailleurs' ('Here and There') filmed partly in the Middle East, was taken off after a fake bomb-package was found in a Latin Quarter cinema.

The 'Jewish Defence League' phoned the Press claiming responsibility.

The League is an extreme

right organisation responsible for anti-Arab and anti-communist provocations and violence.

Defiance

Although mainly active in the United States, where it was founded, it has recently spread to Britain and western Europe.

In defiance of the Zionist threats, a cinema owned by a left-wing co-operative has decided to show Godard's film.

POSEIDON LOSES £10.4m

SYDNEY — Poseidon, the mining company whose rocketing shares led the biggest stock exchange boom in Australia's history seven years ago, has reported losses of \$14.4m (£10.4m). The company admits it is in trouble.

Reports in 1969 of vast reserves of nickel at Mount Windarra, 200 miles north of Kalgoorlie, set off a scramble for mining shares. It took Poseidon shares from a few cents to \$280 (£201).

On Wednesday they closed at 92 cents on the Sydney Stock exchange.

Soweto children are our future—union chief

THE PRESS talks a great deal about the children of Soweto. But these are not just children.

These are the people of South Africa. These are the future leaders. They are not prepared to live under apartheid.

This was the message from Zola Zembe of the South African Congress of Trade Unions to a meeting in London on Thursday night to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the 1946 miners' strike.

Over 100,000 workers took part in what is the biggest strike in South African history. Now the African masses are on the march again.

Zembe described the conditions in the African miners' compounds.

'They are prisons,' he

said. 'They are surrounded by walls and barbed wire. They are guarded by special police.'

'No worker can leave them without a special permit — and then under guard.'

'The food should not be given to any human being. The toilets are open ditches dug alongside a wall. Men have to squat like animals.'

In 1946, the miners were driven underground at bayonet point. Nine miners were killed and over 1,000 wounded. Union leaders were arrested, tortured and killed.

'Gold doesn't only build South Africa,' Zembe said. 'It builds Britain and the United States as well. That's why Kissinger is so anxious to fly to South Africa.'

'Vorster can fly to African states and

negotiate with their leaders, but in South Africa the Africans' leaders are in Robbins Island.

'Capitalism seems strong, but it is weak when you know how to fight it — though it's not a paper tiger,' Zembe added.

He said that the dispute over the use of Afrikaans in African schools was explosive because Afrikaans was 'the language of the oppressor, of the police and of the prison warden'.

The SACTU representative condemned the manufacture of helicopters, Saracen cars and Land-Rovers in Britain for use by Vorster's repressive forces.

He called on the British labour movement to stop investment in South Africa and the export of military equipment there.

'This is internationalism and comradeship,' he said. 'An injury to one is an injury to all.'

Speakers from the British trade union movement at the meeting were Lawrence Daly, general secretary of the National Union of Mineworkers, Dave Bowman, President of the National Union of Railwaymen, Kenneth Morgan, general secretary of the National Union of Journalists, and Gordon Craig, representing the Scottish TUC.

Delegations from the Yorkshire, South Wales and Kent miners' union attended the meeting, and messages of support included some from the International Mineworkers' Federation, the Australian Miners' Federation, the British TUC and trade union organisations in France and Italy.

JOHANNESBURG — At least two youths and a young girl were lying in the mortuary at Baragwanath hospital, Soweto, by yesterday afternoon. Another 12 people were wounded.

South African police shot them for demonstrating against the visit of US Secretary of State Kissinger.

Kissinger arrived in Pretoria yesterday for talks with South African racist premier Vorster.

It is probable that Rhodesia's Ian Smith will join them either today or tomorrow.

Vorster's armed police have surrounded the African townships around Pretoria and Johannesburg to prevent people getting out to disturb US talks with the racists.

Police opened fire with shotguns and revolvers early yesterday morning in Soweto, and again later on crowds of school pupils who had gathered in the grounds of two schools, singing freedom songs and bearing placards.

Racist

General Kriel, commander of the riot squads, said the youth had been carrying placards condemning Kissinger's visit and calling him a murderer.

During the night, police had gone into the Black and Coloured (mixed race) townships around Cape Town after the successful two-day strike there and shot numbers of people.

Police reported eight killed and more than 40 injured.

Judging from past record, the true figures will be considerably higher than those given by the police.

Under cover of darkness, when a power-failure blacked out large areas of the western Cape,

barricades were put up in the townships and youth stoned the police.

A 15-year old girl Sandra Adams, was shot dead by police, as she watched from her window, her parents said.

Police reported clearing a pile of stones and rocks from the main railway line out of Cape Town.

Trains were halted later near Guguletu township when a stretch of track was found loosened.

A number of fires were reported during the night, including two at the all-white University of Witwatersrand, near Johannesburg.

At Port Elizabeth, another 150 people have

been arrested. Police say the situation there is tense but under control.

Premier Smith said yesterday that he hoped to meet Kissinger over the weekend.

The ruling Rhodesian Front party had earlier voted him a mandate to negotiate with the US Secretary.

The same congress re-elected extreme right winger Des Frost, who opposes any deviations from Rhodesia's racist laws, as its chairman.

The white racists have thus effectively made it clear that they intend to give nothing, and have little fear that Kissinger expects them to.

The CIA man's little Green Book

WASHINGTON — A top-level investigation is going on in the United States into how one of President Ford's Intelligence aides came to lose his little green notebook.

It disappeared shortly after Leo Cherne, chairman of the president's Intelligence Advisory Board, returned with his aide, Commander Lionel Olmer, from a trip to Europe in March 1975.

According to the 'Washington Post', the

contents included discussions concerning the CIA and briefings to CIA agents.

About four months after its disappearance, the 'Post' says, Cherne was called by a man called Casey who said he had received the notebook from friends of Patty Hearst, then on the run.

Casey set certain conditions for the

notebook's return, which Cherne says he refused to consider. But the notebook was returned a month later.

The US Justice Department is investigating how the book was lost, how Casey got hold of it and the circumstances in which it was returned.

Cherne described the affair as a '14-month ordeal'.

The last living mem

Mrs Maria Joffe was one of the last of the Left Opposition in the Soviet Union to see Trotsky.

She was there when the Stalinist secret police burst into his home and dragged him away to exile.

The Opposition went underground. They were hunted down. Almost all perished in the camps during the 1930s.

If the Arctic cold, the hunger and crippling labour did not kill these outstanding revolutionists, the Stalinist bureaucracy sent them to their graves with a bullet in the back of the neck.

But Maria Joffe, wife of a Bolshevik and Soviet diplomat who opposed Stalin, survived 30 years in a Stalinist camp.

She can now tell the story of the destruction of the Russian Trotskyists.

'I believe I am the only one left alive from those days,' she told News Line in her new home on a peaceful stretch of the Mediterranean coast eight miles north of Tel Aviv.

Her face and sturdy body show little visible marks of her terrible privations. Her spirit also remains unbroken. The only time her voice wavered was when she spoke of her son Vladimir, who, like the rest of the children of the Russian Trotskyists, was murdered by Stalin's men.

Mrs Joffe was allowed to leave the Soviet Union and arrived in Israel in January 1975. Before that she lived on a pension in Leningrad after being

released — but never rehabilitated in the so-called Khrushchev thaw.

She says she is happy now. Perhaps her Jewish origins and the fact that she was born in New York, helped to secure her passage to Israel. She feels it is a 'miracle' that she remained alive throughout the mass murders of the Stalin period.

Mrs Joffe's own political career was linked closely with that of her husband Adolf Abramovich Joffe, friend of Trotsky, member and later chairman, of the Military Revolutionary Committee that organised the October revolution and a leading Soviet diplomat in the early years of the workers' state.

Joffe sided with Trotsky and the Left Opposition against the rise of

Stalinism. In November 1927 he made his last protest and took his life after Trotsky was expelled from the Soviet Communist Party. His funeral, attended by 10,000 oppositionists, marked the last large public demonstration by the opposition against Stalin.

In his graveside oration Trotsky said: 'Comrades, let me say this — and it is a consideration I believe corresponds in full to Adolf Abramovich's last thoughts and last testament — such an action, withdrawing from life by one's own decision, has a contagious power. Let no one presume to follow the example of this old fighter in his death. No. Follow him in his life.'

TROTSKY SAID 'FIGHT ON'

I WAS born in New York but I never knew English because I came to Russia as a little baby.

My mother died without me knowing her.

I started as a Zionist but then Trotsky came along and explained that the Jews could join in as part of the revolution and their freedom, so in 1917 as a student I joined the Bolsheviks.

In 1918 I married Mr Joffe and had my son in 1919.

As a student I was able to speak and make an impression on the other students, so for this reason I think the Bolsheviks made me a journalist, and this was my work right up until my arrest in 1929.

You know in his book 'My Life' Lev Davidovich [Trotsky] was named after his birth Lev Davidovich Bronstein, says he saw me before he was exiled by Stalin. This is quite true.

Crowds

You must understand the atmosphere when Trotsky was being sent away. In the square before the railway station there were great crowds to see Lev Davidovich off.

The workers of the big Putilov factory had come out and they had a huge picture of Trotsky and were standing a guard of honour by it.

The authorities were very worried about these demonstrations for Trotsky and one of Stalin's men came along and said that it was no use waiting because Trotsky was not coming and had been taken away by another route. So eventually everyone went home.

When I came home there was a call on the telephone. It was Lev Davidovich. I said 'Where are you?' He said 'Here in Leningrad — it was a trick to stop the demonstrators seeing me.' He asked me to come to him.

'So I went to see him. I was talking with him for ten minutes when the Cheka came to the door. They banged on the outside and called to Trotsky to come with them.'

Trotsky said: 'I am not going anywhere with you.'

One of them said, 'Look, you

taught us to be disciplined, now you are being disciplined.'

Trotsky said: 'Yes, I taught discipline, but not the blind discipline that you follow.'

They started hammering at the door. Trotsky was very calm, he was dressing, talking to me, giving instruction on how the opposition should conduct itself when he was gone, what work we should do, the pamphlets and leaflets we should write, meetings we should hold and so on.

He was very calm. He even told a joke. He said 'Did you hear about Zinoviev. Someone said to

him, Zinoviev your collar is dirty, change it around to the clean side. Zinoviev replied that his collar did not have three sides, only two, and they were both dirty.'

Trotsky was anxious for me to get away with the instructions. So he said that I should stand by the door, and when they burst in, I should slip away. They broke in and, like Trotsky said, I slipped away.

That was the last personal contact we had with him.

His son Sergei was in the room all this time and had seen that Trotsky was talking to me. This

is why, later, he entrusted me to get his last message to his father.

At the time I was an editor in the State Publishing House in Moscow. This organisation was responsible for publishing everything — all the political and artistic works and therefore there were many important people employed there.

When Trotsky was thrown out, I decided to make a speech. They all came together and listened while I supported Trotsky and condemned his expulsion.

There was a complete silence. At the end there was no applause — nothing. So I knew

that soon after this I too would be arrested. It came two days later.

I was arrested in 1929, one year and three months after Mr Joffe committed suicide after Trotsky was thrown out of the Communist Party.

I was arrested at home. But I was not in the house when they came. They found there the son of Trotsky, Sergei. He was reading and they came in and waited for my return.

My own arrest had a peculiarity. In the days of the Bolshevik Party, Joffe had a right-hand man who was very close to him called Menzhinsky.

He went over to Stalin and was one of the men who killed and shot.

When I was arrested I was sent to a light camp. And I know this was the work of this man — not that I had any direct contact with him. After he went with Stalin we cut off all contact.

After the exile of Trotsky, the Left Opposition went underground and continued to be active — writing pamphlets, distributing them where we could and holding secret meetings.

One by one, the groups were arrested and smashed. Not just the Trotskyists were arrested. All their families were taken, all their friends and the families of their friends. They were all shot. There were no survivors.

Destruction

I want to tell you about Babi Yar — the first Babi Yar. No one in the world knows about this. It was the destruction of the Trotskyist movement.

The Trotskyists were assembled at a camp 60 kilometres inside the Arctic circle called Vorkuta. They fought to organise in these camps. They had a hand-written newspaper called 'Pravda' — Truth, but its full title was 'Truth From Behind Bars'. They even had satirical papers with humour in them.

These people who led the resistance were treated terribly. In 1936, 300 of them decided to go on hunger strike for a series of demands. They wanted to be re-united with their families who had been separated from them and put in other camps.

They wanted the right to books and papers.

They wanted to be free to follow their professions and be separated from the criminals,

they said — 'What's the point of it — we are all doomed anyway and no one will know.' Even these people were shot.

With me they wanted just one sentence. 'Just give us three words', they said, 'and you will be free to go anywhere except Moscow and Leningrad'.

They said my son Vladimir would be able to go to a good school. All they wanted me to do was to denounce Trotsky and the Left Opposition.

They told this to my sister and she brought my son to see me in the prison. He was 13. My sister sent him outside the cell. But when I heard, I called him back.

I said 'Come here — this is what they want me to do. What should I do?' He said: 'Mother, do you still disagree 100 per cent with Stalin?' I said, 'Yes, I do.' He said: 'Then you cannot do it — what about the memory of my father?'

So I did not sign.

I never saw my son. He was at school in Moscow and was a very brilliant student. He went to Tomsk university and passed exams with distinction.

But they threw him out when he was 17. He was arrested and disappeared. I don't know what happened to him — but seven years later I learned he was no more.

Sergei, Trotsky's son, met his end in 1937. He was shot. But before his end he got a message

to me. I got it in a very remarkable way.

There was a doctor who knew of Sergei's execution. So he gave the message to a criminal prisoner and in return for a bottle of spirits this man promised to deliver it to me. He arrived at the prison, and five days later I came there so I got Sergei's last message.

It was that I should get in touch with Lev Davidovich and tell him not to worry because his son

Sergei did not break — that he died like the son of Trotsky.

This was remarkable because Sergei was not a political boy. Even as a youth he did not join the Komsomol and concentrated on his studies.

But the persecution of his father had an influence on him. When he came to know he would be shot, he decided he was a Trotskyist and would die like a Trotskyist.

How did I get out? To this day I do not know. It is a miracle.

I have no explanation. I was sure, completely sure, that I would be shot. I had got it in my head that I would be shot.

Reprieved

So when I came out it was like a new life.

Four times I was taken to be shot. Each time I was reprieved. There was one man called Kashetkin. He was from Moscow, in charge of all the killings. I came before him more than 20 times.

Once he took out his gun and put it to my breast. But someone came to the door and interrupted and I was saved. This man must have been responsible for the deaths of hundreds of thousands of people.

They all died.

I believe that I am the only one from this time left alive.

Our perspectives are a powerful weapon in the working class

Terry Hardy, from New Cross in south-east London, describes the Workers Revolutionary Party's Perspectives as 'a powerful weapon in the working class.' He explains:

⚡ The Perspectives are about revolution in Britain. The working class have got to take the power.

The discussion on the perspectives is part of the preparations of the Workers Revolutionary Party for the coming struggles — struggles with the working class against the Labour government. Struggles to take the working class to power.

That can't be left to

spontaneity. We have to struggle to raise the consciousness in the working class.

Since I joined the Party, we have built the education centre, which has now been open for a year. And we also have the daily News Line. All these changes are preparations to train a cadre for leadership. That is the crucial question now.

Developments

We're fashioning a weapon — the Workers Revolutionary Party.

The Perspectives document itself is a weapon in the working class. It relates what is happening in Britain to the developments elsewhere.

It tackles questions which confuse workers, like Stalinism and false 'Trotskyists' and false fighters for the working class in the revisionist groups like the International Socialists.

Some workers are confused by the Labour government, saying that there is going to be an economic recovery — but that is utter rubbish from start to finish.

The Labour government has reneged on its manifesto, and revealed it to be the false document that it was. It has nothing to do with reality and neither does talk of economic recovery.

The Labour government is conscious of what it is doing.

It's just an attempt to cover its own role, which is dictated by the international bankers. This government is about saving capitalism, which Callaghan and company think they can do by smashing the working class and

taking away all the things that the working class has fought for and won.

They think that by doing that they can resolve the contradictions in capitalism.

But it is clear every day that what is happening is the opposite of economic recovery. You only have to look at the 'Financial Times' share index to see the state of British and international capitalism.

And the recent suspension of a Bank of England official, and the revelations about the Slater-Walker group, show that all the things that looked stable in capitalism before are now falling apart.

These things and the recently-published price index as well — they all show that the opposite of what the Labour government is claiming is happening.

The unemployment is going up all the time, and there are still 250,000 school-leavers on the dole. It's just crazy to say that these show there is economic recovery.

In fact they show the deepening of the crisis of capitalism.

I'm a student at the National Film School. The film industry is one in which there has been a rapid decline over a number of years. It has reached a point now at which the British film industry is virtually non-existent.

Those films that are being made are escapist and very bad quality anyway.

The National Film School is like the Rolls Royce of educational institutions. It costs a great deal of money to put a student through there.

Education

But all the students are finding that there is less and less education available to them. The school has not been expanded at all, although when it was first opened five years ago, expansion was planned.

The money buys less all the time, because costs of everything have gone up, and the budget has not been expanded.

And for the students that come out of the school there is no future of employment.

This is the future that faces all young people and the trade union leaders are helping the Labour government to carry out these Tory policies.

There was a time when it may have appeared that the trade union leaders were a force for the working class.

But as the crisis has deepened, their role as the agent of capitalism in the working class has been clearly revealed.

Betrayal

Naked betrayal is the only way to describe what the trade union leaders are doing, and the more they do it the more they isolate themselves from the working class. Their allegiance is not with the working class, but with the ruling class.

That is reflected in the way that for virtually the whole of the TUC in Brighton, they locked themselves in a hotel room with the leaders of the seamen's union to prevent action by a section of the working class.

320 delegates to the conference signed a petition supporting the seamen. That gives the lie to solidarity of the trade union movement behind the Labour government, the social contract and the trade union bureaucrats.

The Perspectives takes the analysis and programme of the revolutionary party right into the working class.

We are fighting precisely against the betrayals of such reformist and Stalinists as in the trade union bureaucracy.

We are fighting this completely reactionary Labour government and the various revisionist groups that call themselves socialists and Marxists, but give the lie to that by their practice.

The Workers Revolutionary Party is the only force that is going to lead the working class and the Perspectives sets out clearly how that is going to be done.

We are the only Party that calls for the Labour government to be brought down and that is not just some abstract demand.

There is no other way of dealing with the Labour government and the policy has already won enormous support.

ISRAEL'S SLUMS

The house that Kawaz—and thousands of others—built

Two hundred thousand Israeli workers live in slums. Kawaz Yehzekel is one. He built his tiny home himself.

It houses his wife and six children. Mother and father sleep on the floor every night so the children can at least have a bed.

'My sons will go to the army,' says Kawaz with a bitter smile, 'for this they have rights. But on everything else there are no rights.'

Despite such bad conditions, the Yehzekel family struggle to give their children the best possible chance in life.

Kawaz says his sons have good brains. But education is a problem because after primary school it is not free. After years of living in their tiny house, the family are threatened with eviction. The local council say they want the land.

Fine — says Kawaz — give me a new house. The answer is no.

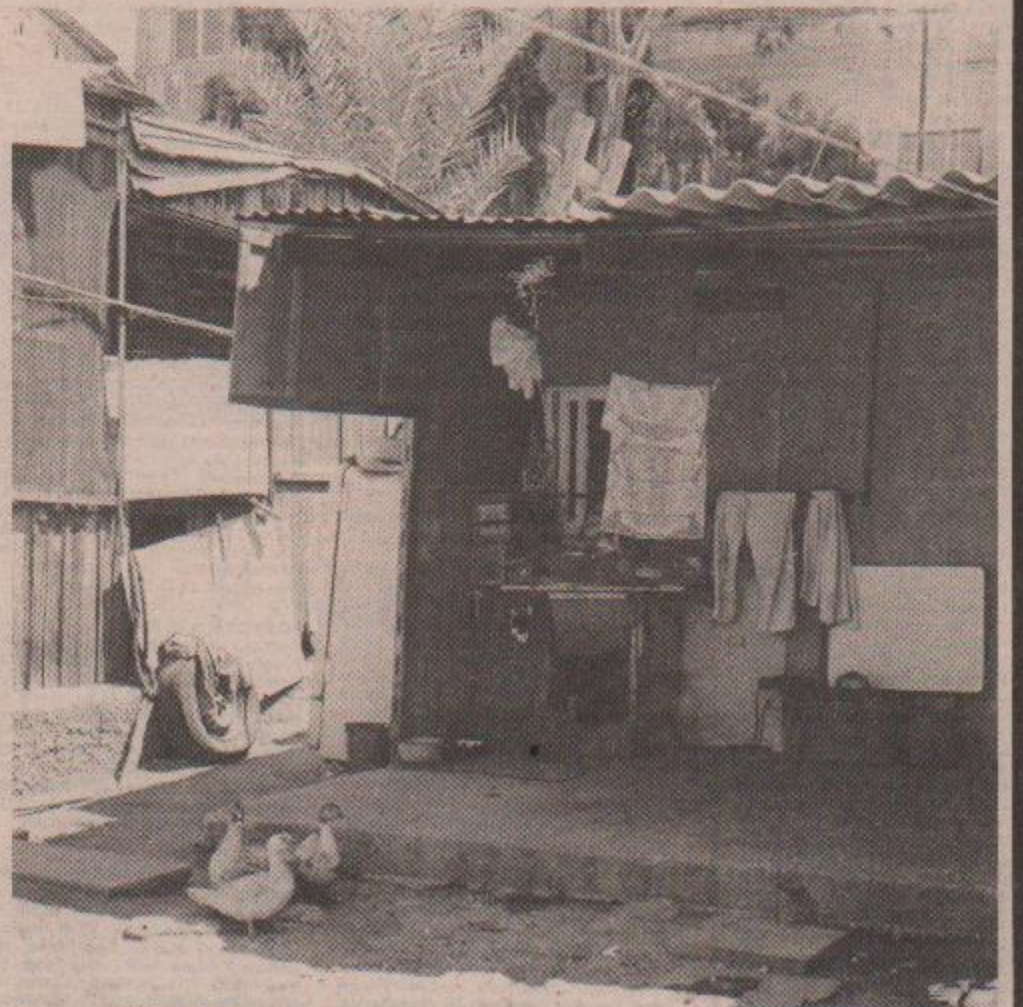
The most they have been

offered is a loan. But not enough to get a decent home. What they really want is to get an apartment which has a monthly rent.

The Yehzekel family are not an exception. Sixteen thousand families live in bad slum conditions in Jerusalem and 80,000 in Tel Aviv. Much of the south of Tel Aviv, Israel's biggest city, is one huge area of bad and decaying housing.

The economic crisis and government policy have have resulted in a slow down in housing. The poorest Israelis, Orientals who come from Arab countries, stand by and get more angry as the government denies them homes 'because of the economic difficulties', but find the money to house immigrants, attracted by Zionist propaganda, in smart apartments.

Many say with Kawaz: 'We are determined that our sons and daughters should not have to live in such houses when they have a family.'

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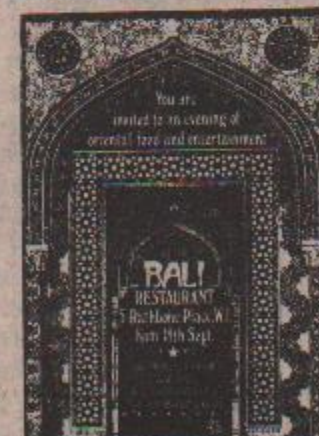

On the occasions when Rangers did try to build moves from the middle of the field, it was apparent that they did not have players capable of anticipating the play and creating openings.

The only exception to this pedestrian approach was the play of Tommy McLean, one of the few forwards today resembling in style the great Scottish wingers of old.

Time and again he beat the full-back only to see the chances created by his dangerous crosses squandered by his less-talented colleagues.

Hibs, at home to Sochaux, did little better. Despite much effort they managed to score only one goal, and that came significantly enough, from full-back Brownlie.

As with Rangers, the Hibs attack was out of touch.

The Hibs mid-field and attack were incapable of varying their tactics and with the French back four outstanding, the home side finished the game looking decidedly fraught.

Celtic, facing the solid rather than exciting Polish side, Wisla Krakow, also failed to impress. Despite an early goal through MacDonald, Celtic could not find a way through the very average Polish defence for most of the game.

Saving

Dalglish was off form and this affected the whole attack. Their other forwards, such as Glavin and Doyle seemed out of their depth and Lennox is clearly past his best.

One of the saving features of the game, however, was the mid-field play of Burns. This is a young player of real and dynamic talent, capable of cracking defences with his strong, forward thrusts and accurate passing.

Hearts, away to Lokomotiv Leipzig, were lucky to get away with a two-goal defeat. But for some fine goalkeeping by Cruikshank and a penalty miss by Leipzig late in the game, the score could have been much higher.

● Celtic yesterday signed striker Joe Craig from Partick Thistle for £60,000. Craig made his debut against Hearts.

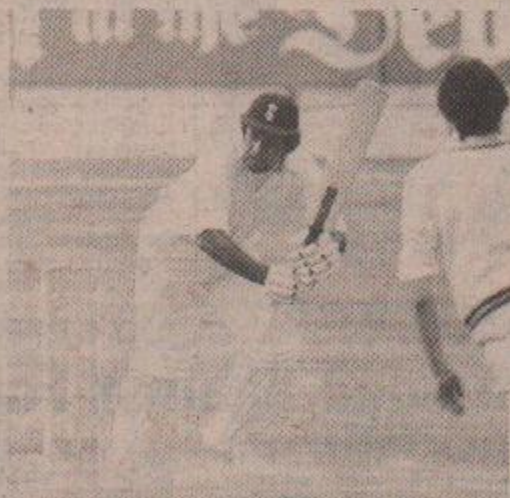
Younis apologises

YOUNIS AHMED has sent an apology to the Pakistan Cricket Board for playing in South Africa and has asked to be considered for the forthcoming Test series against New Zealand.

Younis, who has played for Surrey for the past 11 years, was banned for life by the Pakistan Board in 1973 for touring South Africa with D H Robins' team that year.

He now hopes that the Board will lift the ban in time for him to take part in selection trials starting in Lahore next week for the Pakistan team to play three Tests against New Zealand in October and November. Pakistan will also be playing in Australia and the West Indies at the end of this year.

The Pakistan government will have the final say on whether Younis can represent the country again. Younis disregarded government policy barring sporting contacts with South Africa.

He saved two penalties there in one match two seasons ago, and will hope for an equally superb performance in his 450 the League game for Spurs.

Shadows

And he must know that despite Burkinshaw's decision for this game, the first team keeper's jersey is no longer his exclusive property.

As the Northern Ireland international commented yesterday: 'Barry has done brilliantly and I'm sure he could play in any First Division side.'

But for now Daines returns to the shadows after his longest senior run since he joined the club as an apprentice eight years ago.

Tottenham, otherwise unchanged, will need Jennings' brilliance. They have not won at Anfield since 1912 and the possible inclusion of Jimmy Case for the injured John Toshack will not weaken the League leaders.

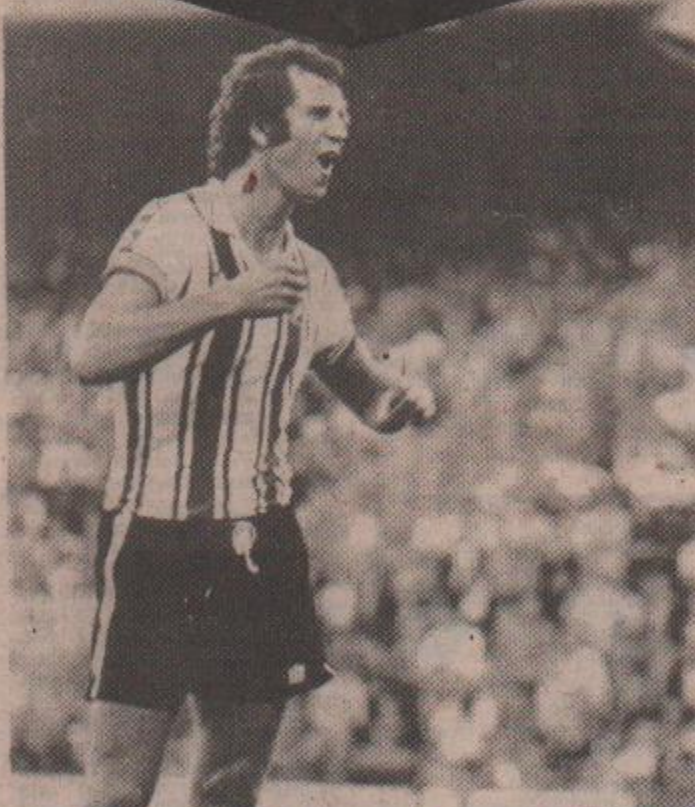
Willie Young, the Tottenham centre half, has written to the Scottish Football Association asking for his international 'life-ban' to be lifted.
