Mrs Whitehouse sees red(s) over Jesus sex film

LABOUR Home Secretary Merlyn Rees is in grave danger of corruption.

He has been sent a translation of the script of Jens Thorsen's Jesus film by the campaigning lady of morality, Mary Whitehouse.

So 'grossly blasphemous and pornographic' is the script that each morning before the heady work of translation began, Mrs Whitehouse, her secretary and the translator, referred to in a Press statement as a 'Dane', had to arm themselves spiritually against the onslaughts of the devil.

'The three of us prayed together,' she confided, blushing slightly under her heavy make-up to the film cameras, and then lowering her voice, 'if not we would have been liable to corruption.'

Mrs Whitehouse, is up in arms because 'Thorsen is an

anarchist and his film is intended as a weapon in the destructuring (sic) of Western Society.'

'If this film were even made on the soil of this country, it defiles us,' said the anti-porn campaigner.

In her letter to Rees she writes: 'Jesus and his disciples obtain funds for their revolutionary purposes by arming themselves with

machine guns and raiding banks. They are joined by the Salvation Army and by a nun carrying a gun.'

Worse — 'the police are identified with Pilate and Herod and shown, on the one hand to be lazy, and on the other to sadistically enjoy shooting and killing, even "kind old ladies".'

Mrs Whitehouse would not be drawn in revealing the more earthy side of Jesus Christ's sexual acts.

'Messiah'

But she did inform the Home Secretary that the Son of God is portrayed not leading his followers to the Kingdom of Heaven, but to 'a brothel where Jesus is physically seduced, as whores hail him as "The Messiah".'

Speaking from Sweden yesterday Thorsen described Mrs Whitehouse as 'an hysterical nun'.

He accused her of being 'politically motivated'.

'Mrs Whitehouse is hitting at people's freedom and at their civil liberties', he said.

'It may be attacks on writers and actors now, but the next step will be to attack people in ordinary walks of life.'

ENOCH Powell, the ultra-right Tory MP, faced chants of 'Prosecute Powell' when he made his anti-immigrant speech in London last night.

On the eve of the annual Tory conference, he told Croydon Monday Club that one million

immigrants should be paid £1,000 each to get out of Britain.

In a speech which will encourage every racist and fascist in the land, Powell spoke of 'the catastrophe of widespread violence, entrenched in a divided community.'

Powell claims to be warning against race violence. In fact he is stirring it up.

Powell's message is that violence and

crime has nothing to do with standards of housing, jobs, education or facilities but is a product of 'other impulses of human behaviour'.

He is therefore excusing and justifying in advance whatever violence and crimes the fascists and racists in this country choose to launch against immigrants and their families.

Tom Litterick, Labour MP, wrote to the Attorney General Sam Silkin yesterday urging him to arrest Powell under the anti-terror laws.

'The speech looks like a direct incitement to racial hatred.'

'Enoch Powell is an example of an obsessive self-fulfilling prophet who makes the bloodiest prophecies and then acts himself to make them happen.'

'This speech could be seen as an incitement to hatred, and incitement to racial terrorism.'

'I think it worth considering for the public good that Enoch Powell ought to be arrested under this Act.'

Attacks

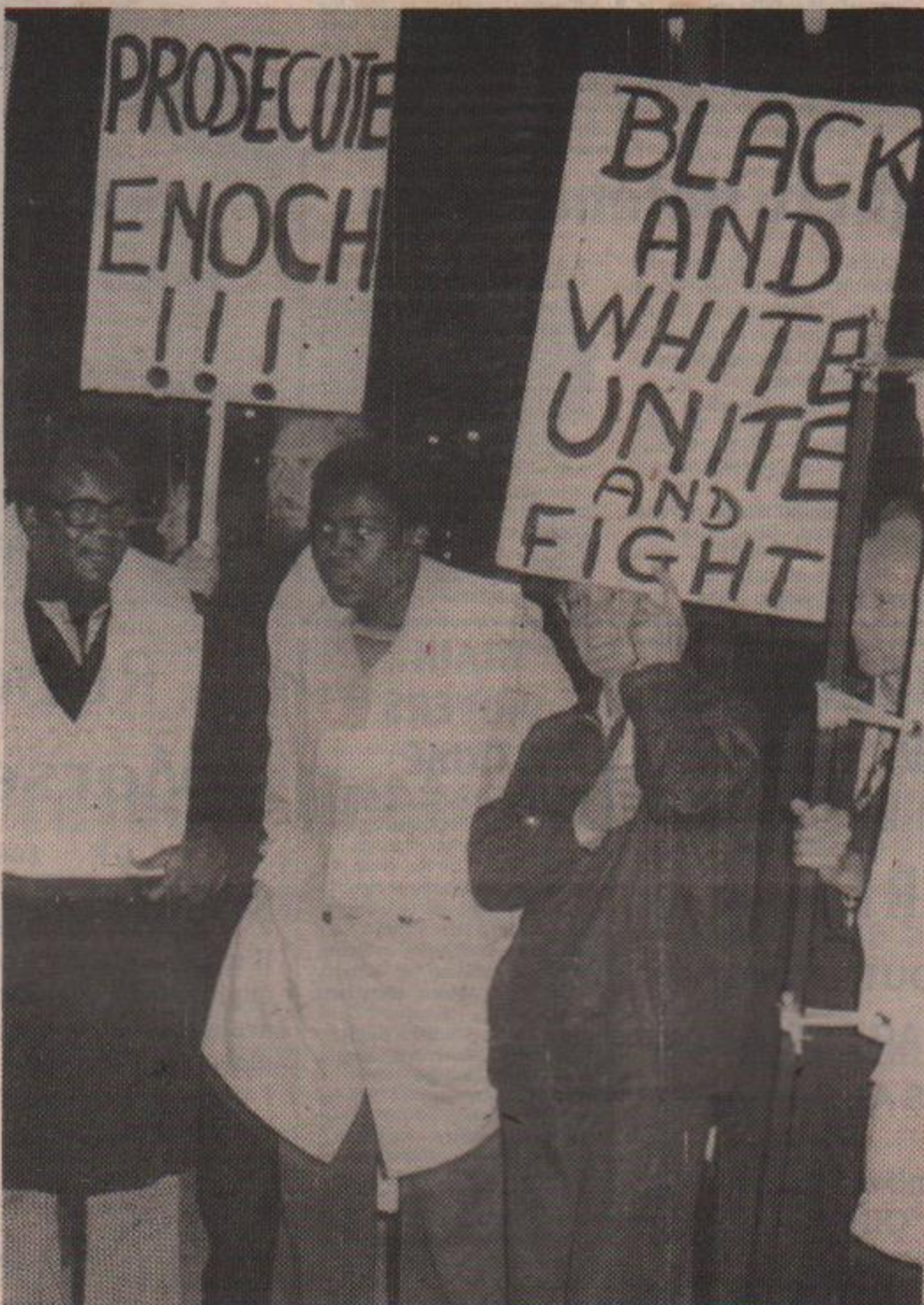
Tom Rees, Runnymede Trust director, said yesterday: 'Mr Powell must know that every speech of his that predicts racial violence is followed by attacks on coloured people by white thugs.'

'He must know that nearly half the coloured population of this country is born here, and has no other homeland to which to go.'

'To fantasise about repatriation can do nothing but inflame hostility on the one hand and arouse fear and insecurity on the other.'

Mark Bonham Carter, Chairman of the Community Relations Commission said: 'To propose the repatriation of more than one half of the black population of this country — one million individual human beings — is to advocate a policy that is morally repugnant, inhumane and, in addition, economically disastrous.'

'Moreover it would not work and it is for this reason that it is a cruel and punishing deception.'

Noises off

Nothing excites the Tory Press more than a red-baiting scare against the Redgrave family, Vanessa and Corin.

Latest into the field is Mr Ian Markham-Smith, a hitherto unnoted figure on the 'Sunday Telegraph'.

He has discovered that 'Miss Redgrave is running a Trotskyite campaign to change Equity voting rules.'

For this imaginative tour de force Markham-Smith deserves a place on the stage himself.

It is the ultra-rightist forces on the Equity council led by general secretary Peter Plouviez and Marius Goring who are changing the rules.

They want to turn Equity into a management association which forbids political discussion among the rank and file and carries out the wishes of the greedy philistines who own and control the theatre and cinema.

Markham-Smith has manufactured 'incidents' alleged to have taken place backstage at various West End theatres.

His witnesses include Miss Sheila Hancock whose statements don't appear to

conform to his story of 'backstage political arguments just before curtain-up'.

At the very least, Miss Hancock has a responsibility to say what really happened.

She has also to consider the political implications of talking to the capitalist Press under conditions in which it is absolutely certain to be used to blackguard Vanessa Redgrave, the Workers Revolutionary Party and those who are fighting to defend Equity as a trade union.

No one has yet found Vanessa or Corin Redgrave launching personal vendettas against leading actors and actresses in spite of well-defined political differences.

Why then should Miss Hancock and some others lend themselves, unwittingly or otherwise, to the squalid witchhunts of the Tories?

Although it has proved somewhat expensive in the past, the Fleet Street Press can be expected to continue slandering the Redgraves.

It will not, however, deflect the 'Defend Equity! Defend the Union!' campaign from forthrightly fighting to unmask the fifth column in Equity who want to straitjacket the membership into mute acceptance of chronic unemployment, shocking conditions and pitiful rates of pay.

COMPENSATION FOR SACKED SIEGE VICTIM

MRS SHEILA Matthews, held hostage in last December's Balcombe Street gun siege, yesterday won compensation from a firm that fired her.

McCulloch and Wallis Ltd, wholesale drapers, agreed to pay her between £1,000 and £2,000.

'I settled out of court because I could no longer afford to fight the case,' Mrs Matthews said afterwards. 'I was using my own life savings.'

She had a £53 a week job with McCulloch. Now she has a £35 a week job with a millinery firm.

After the siege, it was suggested to Mrs Matthews at the firm's Christmas Party that she should get a 'quieter' job somewhere else. The firm told an industrial tribunal there were 'defects' in her work.

Mrs Matthews said yesterday: 'I was well on top of the job when I went back to work after the siege. I was here to clear my name. That is what has been done. If anyone knows what it is like to be held at gun point for all those days and then for it to be suggested that I took a quieter job, they will understand.'



Actors fight to defend union

MANCHESTER — More than 150 actors, actresses and stage managers from all parts of the country have voted overwhelmingly to support the 'Defend Equity! Defend the Union!' campaign against the right-wing Equity leadership.

They also voted to

support the appeal for funds to fight the recent High Court ruling giving the Equity council the go-ahead to change rules by referendum.

The open meeting was held at the Library Theatre, Manchester, last Sunday despite the council's attempt to ban it.

The union leadership had instructed the northern organiser Richard Colby to circulate all deputies in the north saying that the

meeting had been 'cancelled'.

The resolution appealed to all members in the union to defeat the council's forthcoming referendum and to demand the resignation of the council.

Two International Marxist Group supporters tried to move an amendment opposing the campaign to force the council to resign. They wanted to say that the membership should simply 'fight' the council. The amendment was defeated.

TRAIN DRIVERS STRIKE

TRAIN drivers took unofficial strike action yesterday, causing delays and cancellations of services into London from the Tunbridge Wells area of Kent.

British Rail said ten drivers were involved. They are protesting about loss of overtime earnings because of Sunday service cuts which start next week.

Drivers on Southern Region's south-west division are planning a 24-hour stoppage tomorrow over 'economy cuts in Sunday services. Trains into Waterloo from Hampshire, Berkshire, Surrey and Dorset are threatened by the men's action.'

The strike will be in defiance of their union, ASLEF. General secretary Ray Buckton has appealed for the strike threat to be lifted.

Rubery Owen plan Merseyside sackings

MOST OF 200 sackings planned by a subsidiary of the Rubery Owen engineering group are expected to take place at its main factory in Warrington, Lancs.

This was confirmed yesterday by a spokesman at the group's headquarters in Darlaston, Staffs.

He said no details had been fixed yet but the remainder of

the 200 job cuts would be likely to take place at other factories in Kirkby trading estate, Liverpool, and at Press, Shropshire.

The subsidiary is Rubery Owen Conveyancer, which manufactures industrial trucks. It employs 1,600 workers altogether.

Continuing slump in demand for the firm's products is the

reason given by chairman Andrew Wheeler for the redundancies.

News of the cuts follows last Thursday's announcement that two of the biggest industrial and fork lift truck firms in Britain are to merge.

Lansing Bagnall and Henley Forklift claim that together they will form the biggest group of its kind in Europe.

KELLY RESIGNATION

TONY Kelly has resigned as secretary of Newham North-East Labour Party for 'private and personal reasons.'

Kelly, who was prominent in

the successful moves to oust Cabinet minister Reg Prentice as Labour candidate for the constituency, is thought to have moved out of the borough.

Ford lay off more men

PRODUCTION of Ford's new-style Cortina was brought to complete standstill in Britain's biggest car plant yesterday.

The company spread mass lay-offs to the day shift at the Dagenham, Essex, plant.

Night-shift production of the new model, unveiled a week ago, has already been at a halt there for nearly a week.

More than 5,000 workers are now idle at Dagenham.

The 2,500 day shift lay-offs were imposed by management after ten plasma-welders went on strike in the body plant.

Body plant

One thousand workers in the body plant were subsequently sent home and a further 1,500 in the paint, trim and assembly plant were told that should not turn up for work until further notice.

A Ford spokesman said yesterday afternoon the plasma-welders were demanding their jobs be assigned to the higher 'D' grade instead of the present 'C' grade.

Plasma-welding involves the joining and sealing of panels and is a newly-introduced technique at Dagenham, said the company spokesman.

On the night shift, 1,000 workers in the body plant are on strike and 1,500 in the assembly plant have been laid off.

The strike followed an angry outburst by workers who have had their wage packets repeatedly cut by lay-offs.

Retaliate

The lay-offs have intensified as Ford management retaliate against groups of workers resisting speed-up and manning cuts.

This speed-up is being forced through in preparation for full production of the new Cortina and new Fiesta mini car at maximum profit.

The All Trades Unions Alliance (car workers' section) is holding a public meeting for Ford workers today at 5p.m. in Fred's Cafe, Princess Parade, New Road.

RESERVES FALL YET AGAIN

SEVERAL hundred million dollars drained out of British capitalism's dwindling monetary reserves last month.

The Treasury has again concealed the full extent of the decline but at least \$300m in gold and foreign currency has been lost.

Officially, the reserves rose by \$129m in September. But this apparent gain was only achieved by borrowings from abroad of \$336m during the month by state-owned industries.

On these transactions alone, at least \$207m was lost through British capitalism's trade and payments debts for the month.

Loans

And British capitalism has still to stagger through three more sets of trade figures before new loans from the International Monetary Fund might become available late December.

Further big trade deficits could drain all overseas confidence and send the pound crashing.

City sources are saying the remaining reserves of \$5,000m can be used to repay the \$5,300m standby credits in December.

But this would leave the cupboard totally bare for a short while.

Tory leader of the House of Lords Peter Thorneycroft said yesterday that an immediate 10 per cent all round cut in public spending was unavoidable.

He said of the government: 'They must have a package now. They know it. I know it. And I suspect the IMF knows it.'

Nkomo rejects Pretoria proposals

GROWING militancy among Africans in Rhodesia yesterday forced nationalist leader Joshua Nkomo to reject the Pretoria agreement for majority rule in two years' time.

With British Minister of State at the Foreign Office, Ted Rowlands, in Rhodesia for talks with Smith and American envoy William Schaefe, Nkomo declared that there was no longer any such thing as the Pretoria agreement.

'It is for us, the people, to say when majority rule will come', Nkomo declared. 'Dr Kissinger and Mr Vorster cannot decide for us what shape our government must be.'

'They cannot say majority rule will come in two years,' he added. 'It is up to us to say when majority rule will come.'

Behind Nkomo's stand — and similar statements by another 'moderate' black nationalist leader, Bishop Muzorewa — is

the rejection of the Smith-Kissinger-Vorster deal by the black masses.

In a radio broadcast last weekend, the Zimbabwe People's Army (ZIPA) said: 'Concerning the immediate future, our plans are to make the necessary preparations to intensify the armed struggle and to realise our objective — that is, smashing the Smith regime.'

'What we are after now is to intensify the armed struggle so as to create the necessary conditions for Ian Smith and the imperialist powers that back him to unconditionally surrender power to the Zimbabwe people.'

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Police kicked handcuffed man — DURHAM INQUEST TOLD

A MAN who died in hospital had been kicked by a policeman as he lay handcuffed in a club car park, a witness told an inquest yesterday.

Norman Duffy, 28, told the North Durham coroner's court he saw Liddle Towers, a 39-year-old electrician and boxing coach, leave the Key Club at Birtley in the early hours of Friday, January 16.

He appeared to be drunk, and as he left the club he spoke to a policeman in the foyer.

'I saw the policeman laugh and say something back, but I could not hear what it was,' said Duffy.

A few moments later he heard a crash against the front doors of the club. When they were opened he saw Towers lying on his back with two police officers holding his arms.

'I saw another man standing by this man's feet. I think it was a police sergeant,' said Duffy.

A short time later he heard a scuffle outside, went out to where the crowd had formed, and saw Towers lying on his back, handcuffed.

Two policemen were standing by his side and a third was near his head, holding the handcuffs.

'I saw a policeman kick him in the side,' said Duffy. 'I heard the sound of blows.'

'Shortly afterwards I looked again and I saw the policeman with his back to me kick the man in his right side.'

Duffy said the three policemen picked up Towers by his arms and legs and carried him from the car park.

They took him to the pavement, dropped his legs, lifted him by his arms and walked him towards a car.

Earlier, the 11-man inquest jury had been told by the coroner, Lance Heron, that Towers died at Dryburn Hospital, Durham, on February 9.

A doorman at the club, David Smith, said he saw Towers having an argument with three

or four policemen outside. Later he saw Towers on the ground with policemen round him.

'I saw one of the police officers kick Mr Towers twice,' said Smith.

'The kicks were delivered with 'reasonable force' around the shoulders.

A man leaving the club called the police 'a set of cowboys' and a policeman hit him in the chest.

After the eviction council workmen boarded up the houses.



Allaun hits at Tory policy

FRANK Allaun, Labour MP for Salford, has accused the Tories of 'municipal asset-stripping'.

Allaun, a member of the Labour Party National Executive and chairman of its housing committee, said the new Tory document 'The Right Approach' would drive a wedge between owner-occupiers and council tenants.

Writing to his constituents, Allaun said: 'Both sections of the community need and receive substantial

subsidies, but the Conservative leaders want to slash council house subsidies and thereby increase rents for six million families.'

Allaun went on: 'It is clear from the new Conservative document that when its authors talk of cutting public expenditure, they intend an even more drastic reduction in council house building than that proposed by the government — a proposal rejected last week by the Labour Party conference.'

'This would be bound to swell the 260,000 unemployed in the building trade.'

He warns that the Conservative Party's aim is to sell off council houses adding: 'This municipal asset-stripping would set back the hopes of those on the housing waiting lists, since it would reduce the pool of council houses available for re-letting when their present occupants remove or die.'

FAMILIES EVICTED BY POLICE

TWO families were evicted from their homes in south London early yesterday morning by nearly 150 police.

Bus and van loads of police waited in side streets as bailiffs, council officials and 50 policemen forced their way into two houses in Battersea occupied by squatters.

Mothers and children still in their night-clothes were ejected with their possessions.

A court order was granted to Labour-controlled Wandsworth council on September 6.

On that occasion, representatives of the squatters, who identified themselves as members of the Rastafarian religious sect, were forcibly ejected from the hearing by police.

The house at 91 Broomwood Rd was purchased by Wandsworth Council earlier this year, and had been standing empty for some time.

A nearby GLC-owned house occupied by a family of eight, including three children, was repossessed at the same time.

Out of the 7,300 families on Wandsworth's housing waiting list, only 997 were assisted by the council last year.

While the evictions were being carried out, police patrolled the surrounding streets in force.

One young mother, seated on a pile of possessions in front of the house, explained that they had received a court order to leave two weeks ago but hadn't left because they 'had nowhere to live, nowhere to go, and no way to do anything about it.'

Carburettor walk out

ABOUT 650 workers walked out of the SU Carburettor plant in Birmingham yesterday following management's refusal

to pay them for the one-and-a-half days they were laid off last week.

SU is a key component subsidiary of British Leyland.

The lay-offs were caused by a strike by electricians acting in sympathy with their counterparts in dispute at Leyland's Castle Bromwich body plant.

Yesterday's walk-out at SU began when 160 production workers downed tools. Then the rest of the workforce joined the stoppage.

The workers on strike are due to resume work today but are threatening further action to back their demands.

More go broke

MORE bankruptcies are likely among small firms as a result of monopolies cutting down on credit time available to customers.

From November 1, all customers of the Alcan aluminium monopoly must pay their bills within 30 days of the invoice date.

This follows decisions already taken by ICI, Shell and BP to reduce credit time.

Alcan says the slide in sterling, together with pressure from its own suppliers for earlier payment, has made the present two-month time limit a luxury.

POOR JOB PROSPECTS

JOBS prospects in local government and public building are poor because of the spending cuts, says a report from the privately-owned employment agency, Manpower.

Only 1.8 per cent of local government departments expect to take on staff — the lowest recorded in the 10 years' publication of the Manpower survey.

Nearly one in four departments (23.2 per cent) plans to reduce its staff through natural wastage. In public building 15.8 per cent of employers forecast staff cuts, while 11.9 per cent expect increases.

The Manpower report is based on returns from senior executives in 2,867 companies covering over 1,000,000 staff in 30 employment groupings.

Pinta price rises ahead

ANOTHER increase in milk prices will be needed soon because of the effects of the drought, a milk marketing official warned yesterday.

Ian McAlpine, the Scottish Milk Marketing Board's general manager, said the drought meant yields were below expected levels and revenue down, there was less home-grown feed, and bought feed had had to be used in record quantities.

Concentrate prices were rising to record levels, with the effect of sterling's falling value still to come.

'All these factors show that dairy farmers' incomes will be substantially cut back in the current year and require to be boosted by improved milk prices as soon as possible.'

RIGHT-WING STUDENTS SET UP RIVAL ASSOCIATION

THREE ex-students have founded a new association in opposition to the 700,000-strong National Union of Students.

All three are well-known in the student movement for their right-wing politics and hostility towards the NUS.

Several large commercial companies are giving strong financial backing to the new 'British Student Association'. Details of the association will be officially announced later today.

The Association's general secretary and full-time organiser is Leo Brown.

Active

He was very active in student politics in the late 1960s and unsuccessfully tried three times to be elected national treasurer of the NUS.

The two other founders of the association, Tony Brown and Paul Booth, are directors of the association.

Tony Brown organised the bogus 'Campaign for Free Speech' following the NUS ban on fascist and racist speakers at universities and colleges.

The new association intends to undercut many of NUS Travel Ltd's cheap flights and fares.

Travel brochures are being distributed at universities and colleges this week.

An insurance scheme through one of the country's biggest insurance companies will be provided to members.

It will also offer a scheme similar to the NUS service, for discounts at shops, department stores and garages throughout the country.

The NUS recently launched a new discount card allowing students to buy goods from about 11,000 sources more cheaply.

Discount

The card costs £20. The BSA's discount service will come free with membership.

In a statement to the Press, Tony Brown said, 'We are not trying to create a monopoly but an alternative service which is competitive and not tainted with

expenses claims. He is a ratepayers' member for Ossett on the Wakefield District Council. The sums involved totalled £541.

political considerations'.

The organisation had been set up as a result of 'disillusionment on the part of students with their union's past and present extreme left-wing, Marxist policies', he continued.

NUS national treasurer, Chris Morgan, issued a statement yesterday on the new association.

He said: 'The NUS is now larger and stronger than ever

before. Membership is in fact increasing at the moment, and we are now able to provide more and more services to our members.

'The controversial step which we took to improve the situation in NUS Travel will result in students throughout Britain continuing to receive a reliable service.

'Already there has been an

enormous response to our new discount scheme. I seriously doubt whether any other organisation could arrange such a scheme on a similar scale.

'At first sight, the driving force behind the setting up of the British Student Association seems to be the inability of its general secretary, Mr Leo Brown, to get elected onto the National Executive Committee of the NUS.'

Strikers slam GLC neglect

WINDOW frames of council flats and houses are being allowed to rot, said 400 Greater London Council painters who took strike action yesterday.

The painters, employed in the GLC's south-eastern district, are demanding a stop to the run-down of the council's direct labour system.

'Blocks of flats in particular are deteriorating because painting, plumbing, carpentry and other work is being cut back', said one of the painters picketing GLC maintenance depots yesterday.

'Gangs of maintenance men are being deliberately depleted. Men who leave are not replaced. Then the gang is told it is ineffective and is split up.

Fallen

'The labour force on the painting side has fallen by about one-third in the past 12 months', the picket added.

Shop stewards for the painters said that outside surfaces used to get painted by the GLC once every four or five years. Woodwork would deteriorate in this space of time.

But now many blocks of flats are getting attention once every eight or nine years because job cuts have put work so far behind.

The effect on woodwork and other outside surfaces is drastic.

Window frames in many blocks of flats have been left for up to eight or nine years without the council putting on one coat of paint, said pickets.

One gang of 14 painters based at Bermondsey is in the process of being broken up now.

The strikers also condemn the use of contractors instead of direct labour. The contractors, said shop stewards, are paid up to £1 an hour extra for using work cradles on the outside of multi-storey flats.

The direct labour painters get only 3p an hour each for the skill and danger involved in using the same cradles.

'We plan further action to stop the attacks on the GLC's direct labour scheme', said a shop steward.

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CIA men named in Jamaica

KINGSTON — Nine CIA agents are operating in Jamaica under cover of the US Embassy, according to Philip Agee, former CIA agent and author of the best-selling book, 'Inside the Company'.

At a Press conference here in Kingston, Agee identified the embassy attaché as the CIA station chief and the embassy's second secretary and consul as the deputy chief of the station.

He also named as CIA agents the embassy attaché's wife, the consular officer, the third secretary, the vice-consul, assistant attaché, two

telecommunications officers, and a secretary.

Agee gave their names, addresses and telephone numbers, and added that a drug enforcement officer was also likely to be an agent.

'It should be noted,' Agee said, 'that the CIA office in Kingston has increased its complement of operations officers from three in 1971 to five now — a very significant build-up for the CIA in any country.'

Socialist leader goes on trial in India

NEW DELHI — Socialist Party leader George Fernandes, facing trial on charges of criminal conspiracy against the Indian government, appeared in court in handcuffs and chains yesterday and said his country was a victim of infamous dictatorship.

Fernandes, 46, who was arrested in Calcutta nearly four months ago, is the first major opposition figure to be brought before the courts since a state of internal emergency was imposed by Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's government last year.

Appearing in court with 21 co-accused hand-cuffed on both wrists and chained to escorting police, he described the chains as symbolic of what had happened to India since the emergency.

The 22 are charged with conspiring to overthrow the Indian government by means of criminal force.

Fernandes said since his arrest on June 18 he had been held in solitary confinement for two months and been unable to communicate with anyone outside the jail for the past three and a half months.

He said brutal and obscene methods had been used by police in questioning him, although he had not been physically assaulted.

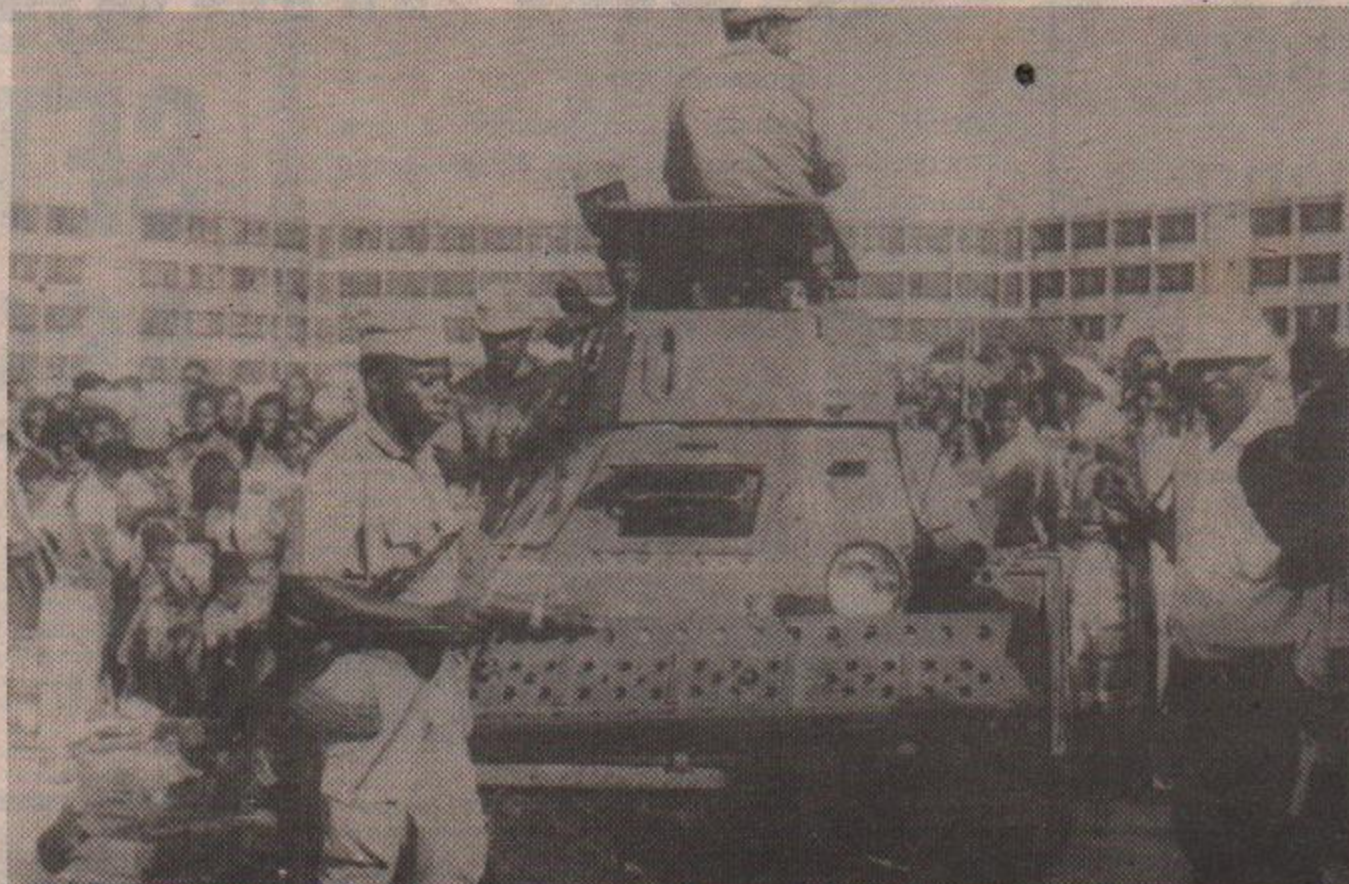
Fernandes told the court that the defendants had not yet decided whether they would

participate in the trial, but had no hope that they would get justice from Indian courts.

He told journalists earlier that the accusations against the 22 were 'trumped-up charges for the most part' But he added: 'We are prepared to take on this case as we have taken on the government.'

● Michael Foot, Leader of the House of Commons, and one-time editor of 'Tribune', is spending ten days in India. He arrived at the weekend, and paid a visit to Kashmir, returning then to Delhi.

According to All-India Radio, reporting a meeting between Foot and Indian Minister of Labour Ragnath Reddy, the British Labourite 'evinced keen interest in the state of industrial relations'.

Soweto students tell of youth revolt

SOWETO student leaders told a Press conference in London yesterday the Labour government was supporting the repression of the black African people through its continued supply of arms to the South African white regime.

Tsietsi Mashinini, president of the Soweto Student Representative Council, said that the nationwide harassment of students was being stepped up by the Security Police. Many more than the known six hundred were in detention.

Mashinini and his colleagues, Barney Makhathle and Selby Semela, escaped from South Africa on August 23 after several months of clandestine activity.

Prominent

All three were prominent leaders in the student protests against the use of Afrikaans in schools which resulted in the massacre of Soweto students by the South African police on June 16.

They escaped to Botswana, where the South African secret police, BOSS, attempted to kidnap them. They are now seeking permission to study in England.

Mashinini, aged 19, said that the South African regime existed now only because of the support of western imperialism.

The Vorster government protects the interests of imperialism and the imperialist countries, in turn, supply arms to repress the African revolution.

He pointed out that any government which sells arms to the white regime supports apartheid.

As the Press conference was being held, a letter was delivered to prime minister Callaghan by the Anti Apartheid Movement pointing out numerous breaches of the arms embargo and calling for a mandatory, effective, arms embargo on South Africa.

British equipment recently captured by the Mozambique government include Ferret armoured cars and 'Transcriber' radio equipment

used in the massacre of Zimbabwean refugees at the Nhazonia refugee camp.

This equipment was supplied to the Rhodesian forces by the South African government, along with American-made Harvard bombers.

Mashinini said that the African people were realising who their real enemies were — that their struggle was not just against the racist regime in South Africa but against the entire imperialist system which was the root of apartheid.

His relatives in South Africa have suffered considerable

harassment by police and he told reporters, 'Anything could happen to them. I expect something will.'

The student leaders called on British workers to halt armament production by British companies for South Africa.

When asked about known BOSS activities in Britain, Mashinini called for BOSS to be totally barred from this country.

The three students will be meeting with immigration officials today when their present visa runs out. They hope to be able to remain in England to complete their studies.

PRENTICE DEAL WITH IRAN

THE LABOUR government has just signed a new deal with Iran — negotiated by the Secretary of State for Overseas Development, Reg Prentice.

This is for a 'vocational training' centre in the Tabriz area of Iran. The British

Technical Education and Training Organisation for Overseas Countries (TETOC), a section of Prentice's ministry, will plan and run the courses, and recruit and train Iranian staff in Britain and in Iran.

On the Iranian side, the project will be administered

by the Iranian Imperial Organisation for Social Services (IOSS).

IOSS is under the patronage of the Shah's sister, Princess Ashraf who once had a journalist who had criticised her burned alive in her presence.

JOSEPH HANSEN AND 'ETIENNE'

NEWS LINE today continues publication of the series 'The Indictment Stands' produced by the International Committee of the Fourth International. It reproduces the International Committee's charges against Joseph Hansen and George Novack of the revisionist Socialist Workers Party (USA) as accomplices of the GPU.

In reply to the International Committee's charges Hansen and Novack have orchestrated an astonishing slander campaign directed at the International Committee. But beneath it all, they have avoided answering the charges and vehemently oppose the International Committee's call for a commission of inquiry.

None of this will stop the International Committee from campaigning to unmask the accomplices of the GPU.

CHARGE FIVE:

'Joseph Hansen has suppressed the fact that in 1941 it was the Socialist Workers Party who helped bring Stalin's No. 1 anti-Trotskyist agent, Mark Zborowski, into the United States from France.'

In line with their policy of shielding the GPU agent Sylvia Franklin, Hansen and Novack have shielded Zborowski as well.

They did not report Zborowski's testimony at the US Senate Committee hearings in 1956, nor his arrest and trial for perjury in 1958, nor his retrial and jailing in 1962.

In the one and only article he ever wrote on Zborowski ('Militant', April 6, 1956), Hansen gave a plagiarised account of an article from the 'New Leader' written by none other than David Dallin, the State Department hack whose wife, Lola Estrine, had worked with Novack to bring Zborowski to New York in the first place.

None of this appeared in the 'Militant' article. We can confidently state that all the Zborowski testimony remained a closed chapter until the International Committee dug it up and published it in August and September of 1975.

Let us make clear just who Hansen and Novack have been protecting.

Mark Zborowski, having infiltrated the Trotskyist movement in France and adopted the pseudonym 'Etienne', was responsible for the theft of Trotsky's Russian archives in Paris in November 1936; the murder of Trotsky's secretary Erwin Wolf in 1937; the murder of Trotsky's son Leon Sedov in February 1938; and the murder of still another secretary Rudolf Klement in July 1938.

When the GPU agent Ignace Reiss broke with Stalinism in 1937 and declared his allegiance to the Fourth International, it was Zborowski who betrayed him to the GPU and thus set up his killing in September of that year.

The exposure of this murderous agent by the International Committee struck raw nerves in both Hansen and Novack.

The former said that the Zborowski case was 'a dry well'; the latter said that we were raising 'a hue and cry' about nothing ('Intercontinental Press', November 24 and December 8, 1975).

In his latest 'reply', Hansen deliberately avoids answering any of the questions raised by the International Committee about Zborowski.

We find Hansen and Novack holding firm to their long-standing policy of protecting agents of the GPU, especially those who become double-agents like Zborowski, Sylvia Franklin (Callen) and Floyd Cleveland Miller.

The International Committee now presents new evidence which provides startling proof that Hansen has sought for decades to deliberately divert and strangle all attempts to investigate the role of Zborowski within the Trotskyist movement.

We are able to document the fact that more than 16 years ago it was Hansen who came to Zborowski's rescue when the leadership of the British section of the International Committee first proposed a thorough examination of this agent's activities.

In doing so, we are able utterly to dispose of the abominable and sinister lie circulated by Hansen via 'Intercontinental Press' that Comrade G. Healy of the Workers Revolutionary Party once knew Zborowski.

A whole page in Hansen's statement published on August 9 is devoted to a section sub-titled, 'Why is Healy silent about his connections with Zborowski?'

Only the most cynical prevaricator could even have posed this question. Comrade Healy has never had any connection with Zborowski whatsoever. He has never even set eyes upon him.

No one knows this better than Hansen and Novack. But considerations of truth do not enter into their thinking at all.

What concerns them above all is stopping — regardless of the means employed — the exposure of the GPU.

In March 1960, Comrade Healy obtained a review copy of 'Mind of an Assassin' by Isaac Don Levine, a new book which threw fresh light on the identity of Trotsky's killer and the GPU network which carried out his murder.

A top GPU agent

Among the revelations — none of them new to Hansen or Novack — was that Mark Zborowski, using the name 'Etienne', was a top GPU agent responsible for the murders of leaders of the Fourth International in Europe during the 1930s.

Upon reading this book, Comrade Healy wrote at once to Hansen in New York seeking more information.

The Socialist Workers Party was still in political solidarity

with the International Committee. Its complete break with Trotskyism occurred three years later in 1963.

Comrade Healy wanted to know whether Zborowski-Etienne was the same 'Etienne' whom he had met after World War Two. The latter was a French Trotskyist who had spent some time in London.

When Comrade Healy wrote his letter of March 14, 1960, he did not know something which Hansen and Novack did: that Zborowski-Etienne had been brought into the United States in 1941 through the combined efforts of Lola (Estrine) Dallin and Novack.

Zborowski thus spent the war in relative safety, free to spy on the SWP and the Fourth International while haggling with his GPU controller about the \$150 a month he received for the assignment.

The 'Etienne' whom Comrade Healy recalled had spent the war years in Europe.

Comrade Healy's letter was a scrupulously principled response to his reading of Levine's book.

Not knowing the whereabouts and movements of Zborowski during the 1940s, he volunteered to the SWP information concerning the Frenchman 'Etienne' whom he had met.

The letter had another purpose: Comrade Healy immediately told Hansen that the penetration of a GPU agent into the leadership of the Fourth International had enormous political and historical implications for the Trotskyist movement.

Hansen attempts to distort this letter entirely by quoting only one paragraph out of context, and then claiming that it proves that 'not only was he [Cde Healy] in close association with GPU agent Zborowski, he remained silent about it all these years.'

Hansen continues:

'Healy acted precisely as if he were trying to cover up his relations with Zborowski.' The best way to clean away this filth is by quoting Comrade Healy's

letter of March 14, 1960 to Hansen in its entirety:

'Dear Joe:

'I have just finished reading Isaac Don Levine's book which will be published here on March 14. It seems to me that this book will be somewhat of a sensation in our circles. There is so much that has to be explained and it requires very full treatment by us.

'First of all, Etienne was in Europe after the war and attended the second congress.

'I personally met him on a number of occasions and in fact he stayed overnight at my place once.

'If Etienne was an agent of Stalin, then a whole number of things follow from this, the

chief of which would be who replaced him in the ranks of the Fourth International.

'Etienne was in West Berlin when Comrades Hippe and Haas were kidnapped by the GPU. What was his role during the war under the German occupation?

'Did he have something to do with the betrayal of Marcel Hic, Lesoil and Videlin?

'The only address which was not raided by the Gestapo was Pablo's on the Avenue Victor Hugo. This was occupied off and on by him from 1943.

'In 1950 when the Korean war broke out Pablo suddenly had to quit this place because it was alleged of GPU pressure.

'The astounding revelation at that time was that the tenancy of the flat was under the name of Mme Saboureau who it transpired was a member of the French CP all the time.

'There seems to have been a reshuffle of things at that time which demand considerable explanation.

'The French in particular have maintained certain opinions about this whole situation. What I have told you is, of course, the facts as given at the time by Pablo.

'The man certainly has enough money to allow him to travel and to send his agents from one end of the world to the other.

'From Tunis to Cuba there is hardly a journey that our sections can make possible any old day in the week.

'The astounding thing about Etienne is the flexible way he was able to treat political questions and at the same time maintain his political position as an agent.

'I say this, of course, assuming that there may be some truth in Levine's allegations. We are duty bound to check on this allegation immediately because all sorts of possibilities emerge.

'Among these is Levine's accusation that it was Etienne who was responsible for at least the murder of Sedov and Klement.

'It would also seem that



there have been, in France at least, a succession of agents of Stalinism inside the movement.

'I think, Joe, we need a full discussion on the whole matter and I will be glad of your observations. Is Levine right on the question of Etienne?

'If he is, then it is necessary for us in the not-too-distant future to have a very real examination of the whole international ramifications of the Trotskyist movement.

'I say this without any panic whatsoever, but there

are things which take place which cannot be explained. We are usually too busy to deal with them.

'Levine has posed the questions. The book will have to be reviewed in this country in about ten days and if you can drop me an interim line between now and then I would appreciate it.'

It is clear from Comrade Healy's letter that the 'Etienne' to whom he was referring was not Zborowski, although he did not know that at the time.

But the essential political conclusions he drew from

Levine's book were absolutely on the mark:

'We are duty bound to check on this allegation immediately because all sorts of possibilities emerge... it is necessary for us in the not-too-distant future to have a very real examination of the whole international ramifications of the Trotskyist movement... there are things that take place which cannot be explained...'

Here was the long-overdue moment — 20 years after Trotsky's assassination — for

Hansen to begin to set the record straight.

His first responsibility would have been to advise Comrade Healy and the British section of the International Committee that the 'Etienne' encountered in London was not Zborowski.

But Hansen did nothing of the sort. The March 14 letter of Comrade Healy set off the alarm bells in Hansen's office at SWP headquarters.

He was not going to reveal that Zborowski had been brought into the United States by Novack and had worked with the Fourth International under the

wing of the SWP in New York City.

Hansen did not want to release information that might throw light on the GPU agents who had set down roots deep within the SWP.

Hansen's central preoccupation was to divert Comrade Healy from pressing ahead with his proposal for an investigation into Zborowski.

He feared that the unmasking of one agent would lead to the exposure of others.

We now publish in its entirety the March 19, 1960 reply of Hansen to Comrade Healy's letter.

This reply is further irrefutable proof that he, along with George Novack is an accomplice of the GPU who has spared no amount of effort to protect its agents.

March 19, 1960

'Dear Gerry,

First on Etienne. There is no doubt about his role. He admitted as much in court here. His defense was that he gave up being a GPU agent and had broken with the Kremlin on coming to the US.

I have a few clippings about the case which I can

check if you need further information. Levine based his report in the book on what was printed about the case.

He did not get to the hearings themselves and inquired of us whether we had anyone at the trial as an observer. (We didn't because of our personnel problem.)

In our review of Levine's book, we decided not to give much space to the Etienne case. First of all, no credit is due Levine at all on this; he is simply reporting what he read in the public press.

Secondly, Levine has a definite political objective in view that is completely reactionary: He is intent on picturing communism as an international conspiracy of which Trotskyism is only one variant.

Still further he wants to picture the Trotskyist movement as crawling with spies. To further this aim he includes material that is false.

I mentioned one item of this type in the review I did — Budenz' report of Muste's visit to Trotsky.

I used that one because it

is so flimsy that a reader can easily see it once the true setting is indicated. I considered including another one, the report about Cannon's personal secretary being a GPU agent.

But this would necessitate an article on our investigation years ago of the slander and the review would have been thrown out of balance.

In addition the size of the protestation would have just the opposite effect to what we intended — you know the aphorism about protesting too much. It was simpler and more effective to characterise the book in a few sentences and illustrate it with the most obvious example.

Of course your political needs may be different from ours and may require a different handling. One of our primary concerns was not to give the slightest encouragement to the view Levine seeks to implant — that our organisations are loaded with spies.

Such a view is deadly poisonous and can do incomparably greater harm than the occasional stool pigeon that turns up in any organisation.

Trotsky was very emphatic about this and this was not just a personal quirk of his, as Levine tries to make out. It was based on a century of experience in this question, including the rich experience of the Bolsheviks.

Now as to your suspicions about who might have replaced Etienne. Some of us wondered about this around 1953 and some have continued to wonder.

However, we could not think of a worse political mistake than to base a policy on suspicions. So long as no evidence exists and an alternative explanation fits the known facts, our feeling is that we must actively oppose the suspicions.

In the long run political policy is sure to prove decisive whether the suspicions prove to have been correct, or, on the other hand, turn out to be the not unusual accompaniment of a faction struggle of this character.

I think we should keep trying to put together all the odd facts, but in the process we should not permit this department of our activity to affect policy until (if that's the way it turns out) something substantial can be reported.

It should be added, in case you don't know, that Levine has a very bad political reputation. He seems to have been tied in with the Knowland bunch and is currently active in the broadcasts beamed to the Soviet Union. His closest ties appear to be among the Social Democrats.

We took the same attitude toward him that we do toward anyone doing research in the activities of the GPU, particularly as they related to the murder of Trotsky.

We permitted him to go through back files of the Militant and our other publications which are matters of public record. We also answered questions from him on matters of fact.

I saw him several times and discussed some of his theories of the assassination. He wanted me to read his

manuscript but I did not care to assume the responsibility that would have gone with such a gesture.

'He was well aware of our attitude regarding such items as the Budenz reports but he put them in anyway.'

'As you can see, it is a case of a reactionary author with a reactionary aim seeking to turn the truth to his advantage by skillfully adding his own ingredients.'

'In case you don't happen to have my review handy I am enclosing a copy.'

'When your review is printed, would you mind sending me two copies? I'll mail them to Levine.'

This letter brings into focus the insidious and treacherous role of Hansen in shielding the Stalinist agents.

● He never informed Comrade Healy that Zborowski was not the 'Etienne' he had met.

● Hansen said nothing about Zborowski's entrance into the United States and his association with the Fourth International and the SWP in New York City.

Hansen merely reports but does not challenge Zborowski's defense that 'he gave up being a GPU agent and had broken with the Kremlin on coming to the US.'

Hansen, of course, knew that Zborowski had attended meetings of the Fourth International and that he remained in the pay of the GPU. Jean Van Heijenoort testified at Zborowski's trial about his association with the agent in New York.

● Hansen made the astounding claim that the SWP did not cover the Zborowski trial with an observer at the courthouse 'because of our personnel problem.'

Fifteen minutes away from the office of the SWP the man who organized the murder of Leon Sedov is on trial — and Hansen writes about 'personnel problems.'

The problem was not the number of people on the SWP staff. The problem was who was making the decisions.

Trial was not covered

Zborowski's trial was not covered because a political decision was made by Hansen not to involve the SWP in any large-scale exposure of the GPU. The decision was made to cover up as much as possible the trial revelations.

● Hansen devoted the letter to a denunciation of Levine, as if the issue of GPU penetration within the Trotskyist movement devolved upon the politics of an author who unearthed important details.

The issue of Levine was a diversion used by Hansen to give the impression that the content of his book when it deals with GPU agents is unreliable.

In essence, Hansen was employing the time-honored argument of all Kremlin hacks: to expose the crimes of Stalinism plays into the hands of imperialism. This attack was directed against Trotsky himself.

Hansen asserted that Levine 'wanted me to read his manuscript but I did not care to assume the responsibility that would have gone with such a gesture.'

But in 1975, writing his first 'reply' to 'Security and the Fourth International' (November 24, 'Intercontinental Press'), Hansen wrote:

'Nor would I quarrel with the paragraphs cited from Levine's book. In preparing his manuscript, Levine consulted me concerning the

details of the assassination of Trotsky, and I think the information contained in the paragraphs approved by Healy's 'investigators' reflect what I told Levine.'

● Hansen attempted to discredit Levine's assertion that Cannon's personal secretary was a GPU agent. He offered a tortured argument for his decision not to publicly refute Levine's statement on Sylvia Franklin:

'In addition the size of the

protestation would have just the opposite effect to what we intended — you know the aphorism about protesting too much...

But just eight months later, the 'opposite' to what Hansen 'intended' happened: Sylvia Franklin was named as a co-conspirator along with Lavrenti Beria in the Soblen espionage case.

What was the purpose of Hansen's silence at that point? If she was falsely accused, why did Hansen throw this

'exemplary' comrade — as Hansen now calls her — to the wolves? More likely, Hansen felt it best not to 'protest too much' in the midst of front-page revelations about the GPU.

● Hansen did not fail to use his favourite argument against the exposure of agents and the maintenance of security vigilance:

'One of our primary concerns was not to give the slightest encouragement to the view Levine seeks to

implant — that our organisation is loaded with spies. Such a view is deadly poisonous and can do incomparably greater harm than the occasional stool pigeon that turns up in any organisation.'

Just as Hansen was writing those lines, the FBI was already implanting the first several hundred of what would eventually total more than 1,000 stool pigeons.

Hansen's letter reveals how skillfully he had worked for decades to divert historians, writers and above all the Trotskyist movement from exposing the whole truth behind the assassination of Trotsky and the GPU conspiracy against the Trotskyist movement.

Two irreconcilable methods

Contained in Comrade G Healy's letter of March 14 and Hansen's reply of March 19 are two irreconcilably opposed methods and purposes.

Comrade Healy, speaking for the British section of the International Committee, is anxious for as much information as possible in order to initiate a full-scale investigation of Zborowski.

But in New York, Hansen is resorting to evasions and downright lies to get the British comrades off the track of the GPU.

But the leadership did not leave it there. Comrade Healy went to the American Library in London and found the testimony which Zborowski gave to the US Senate judiciary committee in 1956.

Thus quite independent of Hansen and Novack, the British comrades of the Socialist Labour League (forerunner of the Workers Revolutionary Party) determined that the French 'Etienne' was not Zborowski.

At the same time they sent off a further letter to Hansen asking for a photograph of Zborowski. The correspondence does not show whether Hansen ever did.

But what was most important in the March 28 letter was its first paragraph:

'Many thanks for your letter on the Levine book. We handled this as carefully as we could in The Newsletter, bearing in mind the points which you made. Needless to say we are in agreement with your general remarks and the need for caution in approaching a serious matter like this. The whole thing, however, has to be the subject of a most thoroughgoing investigation.'

Hansen and Novack didn't want an investigation then, they don't want one now. They covered for Zborowski in 1960. They do exactly the same today. What Comrade Healy began in 1960 is being carried forward by the International Committee today. Hansen and Novack cannot stop it.

The International Committee has brought forward every available piece of information on the killer Zborowski. We have assembled evidence which proves that Hansen and Novack have shielded him.

It is ready to be placed before the International Commission of Inquiry, and we have no doubt that it will fully substantiate Charge Five.

GARY TYLER DENOUNCES US STATE FRAME UP

TWO YEARS ago, on October 7, 1974, 16-year-old Gary Tyler left home as usual and took the bus for Destreham High School.

He can hardly have dreamt as he set off that morning that by the end of the day he would be on his way to Death Row in the state penitentiary.

There was a race riot that day, and seeing the white crowd waiting outside the school, Gary and his friends decided they'd best get on the school bus for safety.

'When we saw the gun in the crowd we all got down in our seats,' he said.

Searching

The police came — not to protect the black youth on the school bus, but to get one or more of them for the alleged shooting of a white youth in the crowd.

They made us get off the bus and they started searching us. My cousin Ike, they put him on the side.

When I asked them why they were busting a man because he had a bullet with a hole in it in his pocket, they pointed the gun at me.

I then said you're not doing us right. You should be trying to protect us. The deputy said, you're a smart one.

Gary was taken down the police station and fingerprinted.

Well, right after that one deputy started writing me up and asking questions. He asked me how old am I. I told him I'm 16 years old, so he got mad and balled up the paper and threw it away. He had gotten mad because I didn't tell him how old I was when he started questioning me.

Right

Well, as the time was passing that's when things started getting hot. As I was sitting in a seat, one of the detectives who knows me came in through the door and saw me.

He walked over where I was sitting and asked me why I didn't go home when he put me out of his car? So I responded by telling him I would be home if they hadn't stopped the bus.

So he took and hit me side my



face. And he asked me again — why didn't I go home? I just sat saying nothing, so he took and hit me again.

So I told him, look man, you don't have the right to be hitting on me like this. So he responded telling me to call him 'Mister' because 'man' is an un-respectable word for him.

Then he asked me again why didn't I go home. I ignored his question and he got real mad. He told the two officers to take the two black dudes out of here. He asked one of the deputies to

He started yelling at me, demanding to know the perpetrator that inflicted great bodily harm on his cousin. When I didn't respond to his demanding question, he screamed calling me a stubborn nigger! And he asked me why couldn't I co-operate?

Hitting

So I responded, telling him he couldn't make me know anything that I don't have knowledge of. He started hitting me, saying I know the person that killed his cousin because I was on the bus. When I didn't say anything, he looked at me and said, 'Nigger, you too damn stubborn nigga.'

What has it been like the last two years in jail, especially in the state penitentiary, Angola?

The two years that I've done were quite hard because this was something I wasn't prepared for but I knew, young

give him something to beat me with so this negro fool, smiling all in his master's face, gave him a black flapjack.

Screamed

And this white detective started beating me with it (I know he loved what he was doing — beating a black man).

as I was, I had to adjust to the system that surrounded me.

If I was to survive I had to get my mind off a lot of things so by doing this I started reading to keep my mind occupied. I used to think about the outside world a lot, but as time was passing I trained myself to cope with the situation I was forced in.

When my people were coming to visit me, they never said anything to worry me, but when

I got convicted of first degree murder, I just told my people not to worry because everything just began.

I started getting mail every day because people were becoming aware of my case. I had gotten to know other brothers that were confined around me so two brothers talked to me and told me to get in some books. They gave me some to read. I started getting deep down into reading, making myself more aware of the struggle that my black people are in.

Do you think the attack by this government is just an attack on you as an individual?

Well, before I was arrested, I used to read in newspapers and see with my own eyes how youth were mistreated, so I don't think I was attacked by being an individual. I was attacked for being black and a youth. We young people are the imperialist government's enemy number one. We are a threat to this capitalist country.

Mobilising

The only means to free me and all political prisoners is by the overthrow of the government and forming or mobilising a government of the people that will be in the interest of the working class and poor people. Yes, I agree we need to struggle for political power by every means necessary.

Gary is still in jail. The decision of the Supreme Court this summer to uphold the death penalty in some states and not in others, has removed him from death row — for the time being. The State of Louisiana is still arguing its case.

London teachers' demonstration

'This government divides the workers'

Peter Curtis is a teacher in Stoke Newington, North London.

Since the Party Conference in 1975 decided to campaign to bring down the Labour government, every economic and political development has verified the Party's decision.

I'm thinking about the developments since the

Labour Party conference in particular.

Thousands of workers must see the role of this government in grovelling before the international bankers and that it is prepared to go almost to any lengths to defend the right of the capitalist class to continue their system of exploitation.

What the Party said about the Labour government being a Trojan horse for the Tories — the introduction of the 4½ per cent wage cutting, and creating the conditions where the trade union movement is brought before the courts.

It is destroying the rights of the working class which have been won in struggle over two centuries.

The continuation of the Labour government in office does not unite the working class in any way, but in fact serves to divide them.

Their policies have created divisions in the working class between black and white, between employed and unemployed, and between youth and older workers.

And now, with the recent appointment of Stanley Orme as Minister of Social Services, the Labour government will seek to legislate against those sections of the working class who have been hardest hit by the slump.

Policy

They are also seeking to introduce a new policy on immigration which will only serve to intensify racial divisions in the working class and provide a basis for the growth of fascist movements in the backward sections of the working class and disenchanted middle class.

Most of the teachers at the school where I work are beginning to realise what the economic policies of this Labour government mean.

And they are prepared for a bitter battle to defend what they see as a proper standard of education. But they are confused about the forms the attacks take.

With regard to the William Tyndale teachers in London — many teachers see that as just a battle between a group of individuals and the employers, and see it as about a disagreement on methods of teaching.

But in fact, it is setting a precedent for the education authorities to establish a method of teaching, the number of teachers employed and the number of schools in the future.

All this is bound up with the government's expenditure cutbacks.

These issues have not been made clear because of the abject betrayal of the teachers' union, the NUT, and the dominant political tendency within their union branch, the Communist Party. They've left the teachers on their own.

On practically every issue the CP are provided with an excellent cover by the International Socialists and the International Marxist Group, who have diverted teachers from the main struggle which is to attack the union bureaucracy and its position of compromise with the employers.

Instead they have led very

militant sections of the teachers' union in exhausting adventures from which they have learned nothing.

The only way that the right to education for the working class is going to be defended is through the mobilisation of the teachers and the other strong sections of the trade union movement for a socialist policy for education.

Education as a right was won by the whole of the working class and cannot be defended just by the school teachers on their own.

The last round of cuts is becoming very apparent in the reduction of teaching staff and facilities; school teachers are being cut in number, there are no supply teachers and so on. They have also cut the curriculum.

In every area there is going to be a very big and angry explosion among teachers up and down the country.

Dole

This will be caused by the lack of resources to carry out their jobs, and by the frustration among the pupils themselves, and the pupils' militancy as they realise they are only being educated for the dole.

Nothing that teachers are fighting for can be achieved under this Labour government. From the limitation on class size, to how the hell they are going to get out of the place alive each night.

Teachers are finding it more and more difficult to control kids in the classroom. They can offer no salvation to the kids.

One member of staff at my school was beaten up so badly that he was in hospital for six weeks. Teachers are concerned about their enormous tiredness and exhaustion, especially the younger ones.

This is in the large comprehensives like where I work in an area where there is enormous unemployment

among youth and great deprivation of the social services, housing and youth facilities.

Youth are in danger, and the staff compromised, by the police coming into the school. It makes them appear the willing tool of the state.

For example, teachers are encouraged to place upon children's files any information that they learn about the child's behaviour and attitude towards authority.

We are told that these files are confidential, and yet if any inquiries are made by outside authorities, they are shown them.

At the beginning of September 1975, we were asked to fill in a form which would give in-depth information on the first year children.

We were asked to classify children according to whether they exhibited certain characteristics, like jealousy, exhibitionism, disruptiveness, inability to concentrate, 'bizarre habits', and a footnote said that we were not to think too hard on it.

You were supposed to just skim through it and put down the names of any kid that came to mind.

The only way that these conditions can be reversed is by the reversal of the enormous cuts in spending, which would mean that there can be some basis for teaching, and also for jobs.

This can only be done through a complete socialist planned economy. In no way can the capitalist system solve these problems.

That means taking up the struggle in the trade union movement and the labour movement as a whole for an understanding of the nature of this crisis, the bankruptcy of the traditional leadership and the necessity to build a revolutionary alternative to lead the working class to power.

The campaign to bring down the Labour government is the form the struggle must take.

DIVINA SHOWS OFF THE LOLA

TWO-SEATER sports car racing is back — 1977 style. The new formula in motor racing was unveiled yesterday with Divina Galica in the driver's seat, and by next year the kind of car shown here will be tearing around Britain's leading circuits at speeds of up to 140 mph.

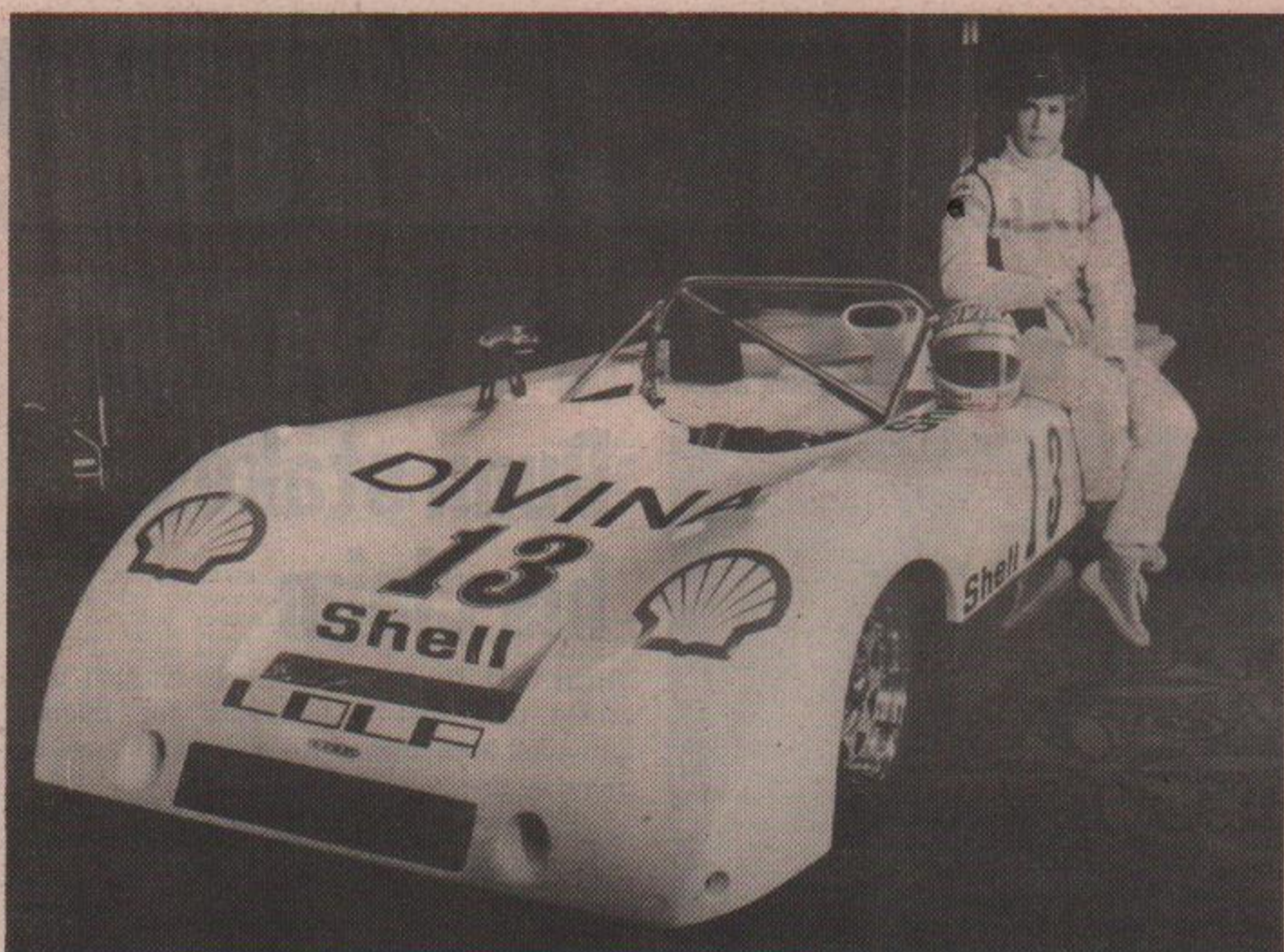
The new formula is called Sports 2,000, and the first car of its kind, the Lola T490, has already been bought and will be raced in a new championship by

Divina Galica, the fastest woman racing driver in Britain.

Powered by the familiar Ford Cortina-Escort 2000 cc unit, producing around 120 bhp, the Lola T490 has a top speed on fast circuits. Divina has already tested her model, and her verdict is simple: 'Very stable — a nippy little car.'

Such famous names as Jim Clark, Graham Hill and Colin Chapman made their names in sports car racing, but the formula died out when costs became too high.

The circuits hope that Sports 2000 will bring the spectators back to one of the most exciting forms of motor racing.



'Player courts' plan getting underway

TWO CLUBS plan to put players in a position where they have to judge their fellow professionals' conduct on the field.

Norwich City of the First Division and Chesterfield of Division Three may start the trend this week.

John Bond, Norwich boss, is planning to introduce a 'players' court' to sit in judgement on

team mates sent off or booked for dissent.

Bond, like most managers, has imposed fines on such players but he believes a 'court' of three responsible players is a fairer way of handling the problem.

Chesterfield are considering players' committees to deal with discipline, as well as with players' grievances. The club will decide later in the week whether to introduce the system.

The first player who would

come before the committee would be Harry Charlton, the midfielder player who threw his shirt to the ground after being substituted in a recent match.

Conduct on the field, however, is, in the final analysis, the responsibility of the manager. He is in charge of picking the team and it plays to his orders.

Courts where professional players who earn their living through the game judge each other could create real divisions among playing staff.
