'Callan' sentence confirmed

LUANDA — President Agostinho Neto yesterday confirmed death sentences passed on four white mercenaries who were tried for their role in Angola's civil war. The president was quoted as saying: 'The practice of mercenarism must be finished on the planet.'

Death penalties were imposed on June 28 on the four men — Cyprus-born mercenary chief Costas Georgiou, also known as 'Colonel Callan,' fellow Britons Andrew McKenzie and John Barker, and American Daniel Gearhart. The date for their execution was not immediately announced.

The pound slips again

BY THE end of yesterday, the pound had lost another ten points against the dollar and was being quoted at \$1.7805. This represents a fall of 85 points on the day and means almost 2½ cents has been wiped off sterling's value in the latest two-day fall.

The pound's effective devaluation compared with end-1971 levels also widened during the day. Closing calculations put it at 38.9 per cent compared with 38.4 per cent Thursday night and 38.5 per cent at the beginning of the day.

Lonrho may sue inspectors

LONRHO board members may take legal action against the two inspectors who criticised them in a special report to the Department of Trade this week after a three-year investigation.

A Lonrho spokesman confirmed last night that the matter was 'being considered'. But he refused to go into further details, and there was speculation about which board members were considering taking action.

DEADLY GAS GOES MISSING

ONE THOUSAND glass phials of the radioactive gas Tritium went missing in London yesterday.

Police say the box containing the deadly gas was lost in transit from Heathrow airport to the offices of ASA Freight Limited in west London.

Tritium is a form of hydrogen used as a tracer gas in experiments and to produce luminous instrument dials.

The story of the missing gas comes a day after a top scientist warned about the proliferation of radioactive materials.

Sir Brian Flowers, chairman of the Royal Commission on Environmental Pollution, said that anyone with the necessary audacity could acquire plutonium, the material for making nuclear bombs.

Fears

It was 'only a matter of when and how often' it occurs, he said.

He also expressed fears about the unsafe introduction of fast-breeder reactors for nuclear energy.

'As a nation we have not

studied the problem, nor have the government and its various agencies encouraged us to do so.'

The world 'should not commit itself to a reliance on nuclear power until that course is seen to be inescapable, and then only if it has been adequately prepared for.'

It is 'a billion pound step down a technological path which may later prove

unacceptable or even catastrophic'.

'Too little effort has been devoted to dealing with the consequences of nuclear power.'

Starve

Building the fast breeder may starve the development of alternative energy resources, he added.

RIGHTISTS MENACE ZAATAR CAMP

LIBYAN leader Colonel Gaddafi has sent an urgent call to the Soviet Union for some action over continued Syrian aggression in Lebanon.

Right-wing Falangist forces are massing for what looks like a large-scale attack on the encircled Palestine refugee camp at Tel al-Zaatar.

The camp's inner defence perimeter which has been under sustained right-wing attack for two weeks was still intact last

night. Professor Aftim Acra of the American University of Beirut called on international agencies to rush supplies of drugs, vaccines, water disinfectants and pest killers to the war-torn country.

He said Beirut's drinking water was unfit to drink and rats, cockroaches and flies were multiplying.

Typhoid had already been reported.

Banning the National Front

YORKSHIRE miners' president Arthur Scargill has successfully moved a resolution at the National Union of Mineworkers' conference calling for a ban on the extreme right-wing National Front.

On Thursday delegates at the Isle of Man conference voted unanimously for the ban.

But who is to impose the ban? The resolution 'calls on the government to outlaw this evil organisation'.

This is politically naive. The bourgeois state is not going to outlaw the National Front or any other extreme right-wing party. In moments of extreme political and economic crisis — as now — the capitalist class relies upon all the forces of state repression against the working class as well as the parties of violent reaction. Groups like the National Front are encouraged to spawn their racist ideologies for the express purpose of splitting the working class.

But racism is only the reactionary cover to prepare the way for police-military dictatorship when the attacks will turn on trade unionists.

This is the lesson of Hitler's Germany when anti-Semitism was used as the prelude to the complete destruction of the trade unions and the imprisonment and murder of workers.

WHAT WE THINK

A Labour government that uses legal juggling to release self-proclaimed racist Robert Relf, but keeps Shrewsbury picket Des Warren locked up, shows vividly where it stands on the question of the basic democratic rights of the working class.

The first part of Scargill's resolution is more correct. It says: 'This conference urges the whole trade union movement to oppose at every step any effort by the National Front to infiltrate democratic bodies...'.

This 'infiltration' is carried out by systematic spreading of racialism among backward sections of workers. The Labour government facilitates this.

Every attack on the working class delivered by the Labour government — wage cuts, higher unemployment, higher prices, cuts in housing and education budgets, attacks on the social services — gives fresh openings for the extreme right to spread their poisonous anti-immigrant propaganda.

What is clear as a pikestaff is that the extreme right deliberately diverts attention away from the crisis of capitalism to blame a small section of

black and Asian workers for the drastic fall in living standards that all working class families are suffering.

Now the right wing is taking its racialism a stage further by cowardly violence on innocent men, women and children in immigrant areas.

Scargill is right — the trade union movement does have a responsibility. It is to give a lead in the formation of workers' defence guards. If Jack Jones told his 1.8 million members to join with black and Asian workers to clear the National Front off the streets, Webster and his friends would think twice about swaggering around yelling their racist obscenities.

But reformist trade union leaders who are collaborating with the capitalist state, big business and the banks in wage-cutting and high unemployment have no intention of mobilising the strength of the working class against racism or any other attack on the working class.

Responsibility to deal with the extreme right rests with the working class. This is the force to which Scargill must address his call if there is to be a serious and successful campaign to drive out the extreme right.

Scargill makes some correct points, but they must be thought through.

Anti-racist Bill brings out the backwoodsmen

THE TORY backwoodsmen forced the House of Commons to an all-night sitting before the Race Relations Bill was passed yesterday afternoon after a 21-hour debate.

Ronald Bell, the Powellite MP for Beaconsfield, called the new curbs on incitement to race hatred 'a severe encroachment upon the traditional freedoms of the British people'.

The Bill aims to ban discrimination in employment on grounds of colour, race, nationality or ethnic origin.

Taking his turn in the relay of Tory MPs who worked shifts throughout Thursday night-Friday morning to prevent

the Bill's passage, Bell denounced the proposed Commission for Racial Equality as 'mischief making'.

'Basically it is a mischievous muddled body which will try and create the illusion that by political patronage and jobs for the boys and girls, you can set up something which will change the esteem in which people are held in their own country', he said.

Bell called the Bill 'a sour farce', 'absolute nonsense', and would 'poison' relations between the 'native and immigrant' populations.

Even Tory deputy leader William Whitelaw, officially backing the Bill on behalf of the opposition, could not refrain from sniping attacks.

He was 'disappointed', Whitelaw said, not to have changed the government's mind on the question of private clubs.

Discrimination over membership of associations with more than 25 members will in future be illegal.



ESSEX police chiefs have been asked to ban two marches planned in Grays today by the International Socialism group and the extreme right-wing National Front. On Wednesday the National Front was in Tilbury to unveil its latest recruit, Robert Relf, the outspoken racist. The meeting was supervised by NF national organiser, Martin Webster (above), and a battalion of police.

Slump is illusory - Powell

ENOCH POWELL, the right-wing MP, claimed yesterday that there was no economic crisis.

He told businessmen in Bromley, Kent, the collapse of sterling, the fall in Britain's share of world trade and the slump were 'illusory'.

'Not one of them make us a ha'porth worse off and we shouldn't notice them if we didn't think about them all the time.'

Powell continued by making another attack on black workers. He said they were to blame, along with the Common Market and devolution, for the

'death of the nation'.

He said a multi-racial society was the 'most explicit denial and repudiation possible of the meaning and the validity of the nation itself'.

Powell's speech followed an anti-immigrant outburst he made in the Commons on Thursday.

He called for 'massive repatriation' of blacks. His views were challenged by some Labour MPs.

Renee Short said his views were like the views of Hitler.

MINISTER of State for Energy, Dr Dickson Mabon, was banned from driving for a year

yesterday for a drink-drive offence at Glasgow Sheriff Court.

THIN IDENTITY MEANS FREEDOM

JUDGES should call a halt to any criminal trial in which the evidence of identification is weak and unsupported by other firm evidence, the court of appeal ruled in London yesterday.

The Lord Chief Justice, Lord Widgery, sitting with four other appeal judges, was giving the court's reasons for its decisions earlier this week in appeals by four men convicted primarily on identification evidence.

Lord Widgery, issuing guidelines to judges on how they should direct juries on the identity issue, said the important aspect of identification was its quality.

If it was good, then the case could safely be left to the jury, provided the judge had warned them of the need for caution.

If the evidence was weak and unsupported by other evidence, the judge should stop the case, said Lord Widgery.

Evidence of visual identification had resulted in miscarriages of justice in recent years, he said.

Though small, the number of such cases had made it necessary for the appeal court to take steps to reduce that number.

which the defence alleges to be mistaken, the judge should warn the jury of the special need for caution before convicting.

AUTHORITY CUTS SLASH SCOTS JOBS

GLASGOW — The Labour government's demands for further local authority spending cuts in Scotland mean huge redundancies. This was made clear yesterday when Scottish Secretary Bruce Millan met the leaders of the convention of Scottish local authorities (COSLA).

Millan demanded that a further £47m be cut from the Scottish local authorities' budgets between now and the end of March 1977.

This is the equivalent of an annual cutback of £94m and is over and above record cuts already agreed and being put into effect.

The giant Strathclyde regional

council — which covers almost half the population of Scotland — has been told to slash its spending by a further £14m.

This would amount to completely closing the roads department or cutting social work expenditure by half.

Over 11,000 jobs are thought to be at stake.

The Glasgow and Edinburgh district councils alone have estimated that over 1,200 jobs will go in their areas if the cuts are made.

Sir George Sharp, president of COSLA and convenor of the Fife region said the government's demands would leave the councils in the position of a doctor who has to 'patch up a broken leg with sticking plaster.'

'The situation is desperate,' he said.

Lothian regional council, convenor Peter Wilson said:

'We are not going to stand for this kind of diktat. We have had enough and we won't take any more.'

Drastic cuts at hospital

A DRASTIC shut-down of hospital services is proposed in a major area of Middlesex.

The proposals include:

- Closure of Hounslow hospital to all in-patients.
- Closure of Hounslow accident unit.
- Closure of Hounslow chest clinic.
- Closure of Brentford hospital.
- Closure of dermatology unit at West Middlesex and the transfer of patients to already hard-pressed medical wards.

• Run-down of the South Middlesex hospital by March 1978.

News of the cut-back plans coincides with a demonstration being held in Hounslow today.

Organised by the joint union shop stewards' committee covering hospitals in Hounslow and district, the march is officially backed by the local trades council.

The closure proposals have come from the Hounslow district hospital management committee in response to pressure from the area health authority to prepare economies of £717,000 a year.

Thatcher screams for sackings

TORY leader Margaret Thatcher called for widespread sackings yesterday in launching a 'nine-point' Conservative 'make-or-break' strategy for the economy.

She called for 'a reduction of over-manning in industry'. In other words, the Tories want the slump to rage hard to cure the falling rate of profit.

'If we turn to the motor industry', she said, 'in Britain we need twice as many men as on the continent to assemble the same car using the same capital equipment.'

'There is no way we can compete on this basis.'

Although Thatcher claimed to

be quoting the government's 'think tank' Central Policy Review Staff, the figures about the same capital equipment being available in British factories compared to what foreign competitors invest is a lie.

British industry is backward because its equipment is the most backward by far.

This is because the British ruling class have arrogantly lived off profits instead of re-investing.

School-leavers situation explosive

THE GOVERNMENT was warned yesterday that unless urgent action was taken to deal with unemployed school-leavers the social consequences could prove more explosive than the remedy.

Ray Heppell, president of the National Association of Careers and Guidance Teachers, told the association's conference in Nottingham:

'We are deeply concerned at the tragic waste of potential resulting from the present unemployment situation among school-leavers.'

Career teachers were worried that much of their work was being negated when the expectations of school-leavers were not fulfilled.

Consequences

He went on: 'unless urgent effective action is taken the social consequences of having a pool of young people in society who feel that they have been let down and rejected could well be so great, that they could prove more explosive than the remedy.'

Against a background of 122,905 school-leavers currently listed as unemployed Heppell said Education Secretary Fred Mulley has invited the NCCGT to send a delegation in the autumn to discuss unemployment.

The association called on the government, the CBI, and the TUC to implement urgent short-term and long-term measures to combat the 'deplorable situation,' the worst since World War II.

Bakers go back

STOCKPORT — Sunblest bakery workers at Bredbury yesterday voted unanimously to return to work.

Management had had to back down in their re-organisation of the shift system which meant the same work for less money — in some cases a loss of £6 a week.

The feeling of the meeting was expressed by an executive member of Bakers' Union.

The lesson learned was, 'when we all stick together and stick it out we come out with a victory.'

'The management will not dare to pull this one again.'

Bill Harrison, Bakers' Union official in Manchester, said:

'This proves the policy of this year's conference decision to support the general secretary and not to agree any more shabby compromises. With this kind of new unity in the Bakers' Union we will see some progress.'

Harrison also said that at the last conference the north-west area had rejected the Labour government's pay policy because it hits particularly hard workers in the baking industry, where there are very long hours and poor conditions.

Normal working will resume tomorrow.

GLASGOW-Out of the tenements into new slums

GLASGOW — 1,200 families in Glasgow's Gorbals district are fighting the district council over the dampness of their flats.

The damp has made their lives a continual battle against destruction of their furnishings and clothes and gives rise to danger of bronchitis and other chest ailments.

Action

The tenants' 'anti-dampness committee' has taken court action to oblige Glasgow District Council to repair the flats and compensate for damages.

The Marshall family live at Pine Place, a low block of flats near the Gorbals shopping centre. When they first moved into their new flat they thought the dampness would 'settle' in time.

But after three and a half years the bedrooms and landing in the flat are permanently damp. It is so bad that their children sleep in the living room.

One child has contracted

bronchitis which Mrs Marshall is certain is due to the damp.

Mr and Mrs Marshall must keep the electric blanket on throughout the day and increase the temperature during the evening to ensure the bed is not too damp.

Like many other tenants the Marshall family have had to throw out ruined carpets. The landing carpet was shampooed in January this year and is still wet.

Clothing cannot be kept in the flat and is kept at Mrs Marshall's mother's house in another part of the Gorbals. The family must leave heaters on continuously to kill the smell from the dampness.

Mrs Marshall said: 'I have stopped paying rent to the District Council. It is going into the bank and it will stay there until the repairs are done when the District Council can have it.'

The District Council took one tenant to court for withholding rent but the court decided the tenants had the right to withhold rent and the District Council an obligation to see that repairs are done.

Another tenant, Mr McWilliams, a railwayman, showed the News Line his flat.

In one of the bedrooms the

wallpaper was hanging off the walls which were covered with dampness and mildew.

'My health has been affected by the dampness', said Mr McWilliams, 'and I am now subject to bronchitis. Water comes through the walls of my children's bedroom and they are also affected in health and sleep in the living room.'

Mr Mc Williams' flat is on a gable end and is affected by seepage of water through three walls.

The walls have become a breeding ground for concrete bugs, says Mr McWilliams and clothing is ruined by mildew.

A report issued by the Glasgow District Council Policy and Resources Committee claims the tenants' 'life-style' contributes to the dampness. It says 'heavy breathing' by children is a contributory factor.

Borrowing

It recommends that the tenants keep the electricity switched on throughout the day with all windows open.

One tenant who did this was presented with an electricity bill of £150 and escaped disconnection only by borrowing the money to pay the bill.

Tenants estimate repairs will cost £300 a flat and with added compensation for damages Glasgow District Council could face a £1½m bill.

But that is not the end of the matter because there are other similar flats in Glasgow and other parts of Scotland.

Many tenants say that only complete demolition and re-housing will solve the problem. They were, they say, better off in the old tenements: 'At least they were dry!'

The tenants are very bitter about the treatment they have been given.

As Mrs Marshall says: 'They have always treated the Gorbals workers as people from the slums'.

The tenants are very conscious of the fact that the Labour government is not on their side either.

'I have always been a Labour voter', said Mrs McVicar, 'but this government has too many Tory policies.'

The Gorbals tenants' fight with the Glasgow District Council can be a beginning in Glasgow of a struggle against all the government's cuts.

The £460m cuts already announced will make this fight very tough and the tenants must bring in strong trade union backing to win.

In the area are railwaymen, Corporation workers, transport workers, clothing and carpet factories who will have to be mobilised.

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HOUSING

SHEFFIELD—The scandal of Royal Exchange Buildings

SHEFFIELD — 'City on the move' the publicity proudly proclaims and photographs show modern blocks of flats and the the city centre — a pedestrian paradise.

What they do not show are the slums in the heart of the city centre.

Off a tiny dark alley, so small that you would never find it unless you knew it was there, are some of the worst housing conditions in the area.

Aptly misnamed Royal Exchange Buildings it is a Victorian tenement block in which 17 families try to live.

The walls sheer up on either side of a narrow courtyard — to a child the sky must seem an unknown quantity.

The block is privately owned and managed by a Sheffield property company.

The owner has never been seen, although many attempts have been made by people to see him.

The block was supposed to have been demolished but there don't seem to be any signs of this.

News Line spoke to some of the residents.

'They told us it would be coming down in 18 months,' said Susan Cheetham, 'we've been here three years now.'

Susan, 23, has two young children.

'When I was expecting my youngest we had terrible

trouble with leaks. The housing didn't want to know.

'This place wants pulling down and we want to be rehoused in a council house. What kind of a place is this for kids'.

Julie Hammond, 21, has one little girl. She too has lived in the block for three years.

'We took the place thinking that it was coming down soon and we would be rehoused.

'Tracey, my little girl had broncho-pneumonia when she was four months old. Doctors admit that the conditions contribute to these diseases.

'He told us to get out of the place but where can we go? We're on the housing list. We just wait.

'They think we're nobody. They just shove us here and hope for the best.'

Peter Greaves, 25, lives with his wife and two little

girls on the top floor of the block. They have two rooms, and an attic where they all sleep.

A month ago Pete, who is an epileptic, was sacked by Sheffield Corporation because he had a fit. He is a turner by trade but cannot find a suitable job.

'This place had been empty 18 months when we took it — it was either that or out on the street.

'We've been here six years now. The worst thing of all is having to sleep in one bedroom.

'Having no hot water makes it almost impossible with tiny babies.

'A girl along the way has something wrong with the lights and she has to use candles.

'The kids have to play in the muck. We have been swept under the carpet, nobody wants to know. I was on the housing list in October 1969.

'They then came and looked at this place and said it was self-contained and after 4 years struck us off the list!

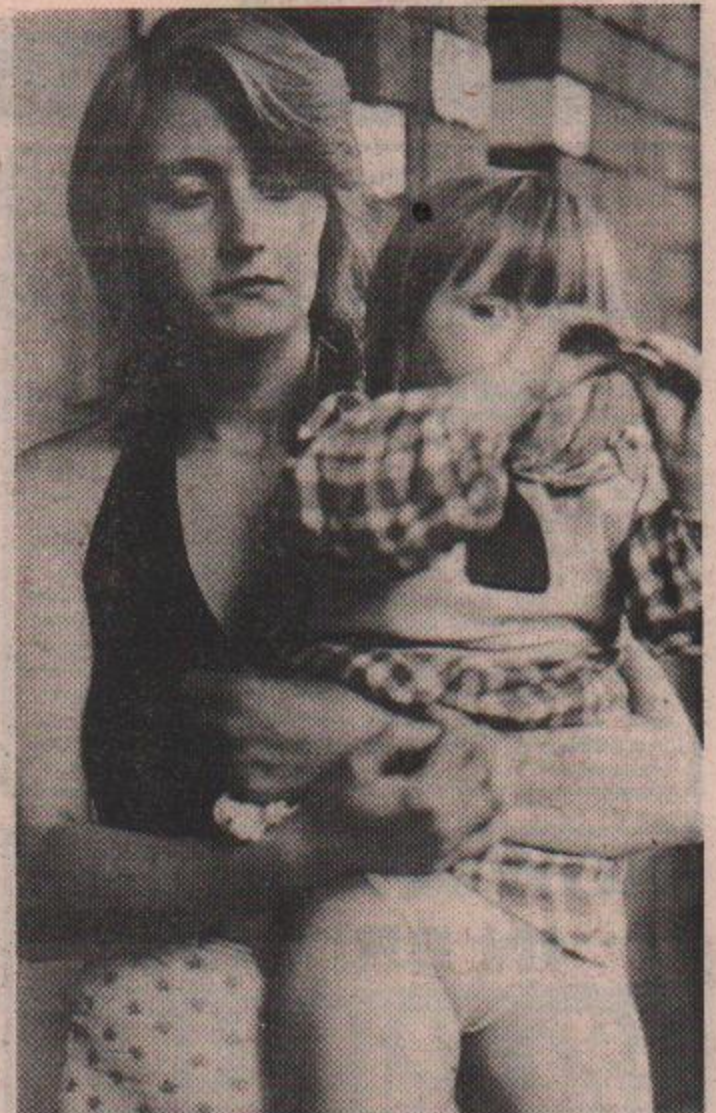
'A chap from the welfare came after we had complained and 'there's plenty worse off than you; for the rents — £3.66 a fortnight — you can't complain'.

'But,' says Pete, 'we're human beings just the same'.

Sheffield city corporation is Labour-controlled, but the only interest shown has been by two recently elected Liberal councillors.

This system of private property which allows these families to live in a place not fit for human habitation must be destroyed.

What kind of Labour council can allow these conditions to exist? The place must be pulled down and the families rehoused immediately.

Children held in Vorster jails

JOHANNESBURG — Vorster's police are still holding numbers of African children in prison cells, three weeks after the Soweto township rebellion.

A senior police officer admitted this yesterday, although he would not comment on reports in the Johannesburg 'Star' that dozens of children, some as young as eight, were being held, and that most had not had a change of clothes since their arrest.

Asked about the children, Brigadier J F Roos, who is heading police investigations into the township riots, said: 'What do you think would happen if we let them run around the streets? We would never find them again.'

Roos refused to say how many children were being held, or to give their ages or the precise charges they are held on. Police Minister James Kruger has said about 1,300 blacks were arrested during the township battles.

Portugal government attacks workers' commissions

ONE OF the last acts of the outgoing Portuguese sixth provisional government is a law to limit the power of the workers' commissions.

These commissions have controlled many enterprises, both Portuguese and foreign, since the overthrow of fascism in 1974.

Now the provisional government, a coalition of the Socialist Party, the Communist Party and the capitalist PPD, says the commissions are 'a challenge to management authority' and have 'wrecked business confidence'.

The new law forbids the workers' commissions from interfering with the rights of management.

The provisional government is due shortly to give way to a minority government of Mario

Soares' Socialist Party, backed by the military in the shape of right-wing President General Eanes.

Supported

Eanes was supported in the Presidential elections by the Socialist Party, the PPD and the even more right-wing CDS.

Thus, the new government will be a continuation in practice of a coalition between the Socialist Party and the capitalist

parties and will seek to uphold the new law.

The Communist Party, which put up only a token opposition to Eanes, can be relied upon not to make a real fight over this latest attack on the working class either.

This move confirms that the new government will only be able to protect capitalism in Portugal by attempting to take back the gains made by the working class since fascism was overthrown.

However, it is one thing to promulgate laws, it is another to put them into practice. This could well require sending the troops and police into the factories to put the workers' commissions out of business.

Bitter

That will be no easy task. The stage is being set for a bitter class confrontation in Portugal.

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More arrests in Lockheed scandal

VICE-PRESIDENT Nadji Watanabe of Japan's domestic Ali-Nippon Airways (ANA) yesterday became the ninth senior Japanese businessman to be arrested in connection with the Lockheed bribery affair.

Police detained Watanabe after the parliamentary committee investigating the scandal laid a complaint of

perjury against him before the supreme prosecutor's office.

The 61-year-old vice-president was suspected of lying when he told the committee he had no knowledge of illegal payments made to ANA by the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation.

Police have already arrested five of his senior colleagues in ANA, including president Ikuji Wakasa, in connection with the affair.

The US aircraft corporation has admitted spending millions of dollars to further its sales in Japan. ANA bought 21 Lockheed

TriStar aircraft.

Two former directors of Japan's giant Marubeni Trading Company, which was the Lockheed agent in Tokyo, are also being held on suspicion of perjury themselves before the parliamentary committee by denying they knew the meaning of receipts they had signed for Lockheed.

The only man charged in the affair so far is Lockheed secret consultant Yoshio Kodama, who has been accused of income tax evasion and violation of the foreign exchange and trade control law.

Soviet ships leave in hurry

NEW YORK — Two Soviet sailing ships which took part in New York's US Bicentennial celebrations have set sail for home without docking after anonymous threats, and the city's failure to give any guarantee of safety.

Captain Ivan Schneider of the 378-foot four-masted bark Kruzenshtern, a training ship, said he had been told to expect

'some kind of provocation' in the port of New York.

He had been prepared to receive Americans if the authorities and police could guarantee the safety of his

students, 'but to our regret the local authorities refused to give such guarantees'.

Captain Schneider said his cadet crew had taken part in the parade through New York with other crews, however, and found a 'very good attitude'. Groups of Zionists had come out in small boats to shout anti-Soviet abuse, but he regarded this as a minor incident.

Danes to get lighter coke

DANISH manufacturers of Coca-Cola have agreed to reduce the amount of dark brown colouring in the world-famous drink, despite the multi-national company's insistence that it is harmless.

New regulations insisted on by the Danish government come into effect at the end of this month. They reduce the level of ammonised caramel colouring in Coke and other cola drinks.

This follows recommendations issued by the World Health Organisation after scientists said the present level might cause cancer.

Representatives of the US-owned firm say research has shown the colouring to be harmless. But manufacturers in Denmark have dropped their opposition to the new regulations.

SPAIN'S right-wing Cabinet, formed three days ago by Prime Minister Adolfo Suarez Gonzalez, is already facing its first challenge from the working class.

And as he presided over the first meeting of the new Cabinet yesterday, King Juan Carlos — Franco's nominee — nervously urged his ministers to 'take the appropriate decisions and work without fear'.

'May this be a strong government in a strong state,' the shaky monarch pronounced.

With more and more postal workers joining the strike, Juan Carlos pleaded for 'increased confidence in the monarchy'.

Turkish workers die in fire

DORTMUND — Five Turkish workers were killed and three other persons seriously injured when a fire ripped through a three-storey apartment building early yesterday morning.

A police spokesman said the cause of the fire was not immediately known.

The fire brigade rescued the rest of the occupants from the building where they had been trapped by flames.

All the men living in the house were foreign workers. Immigrant workers in Germany have been consistently subject to attacks and acts of terrorism by right-wing organisations.

British casualties claimed in Oman war

ADEN — Reports from Oman say there is a new upsurge of fighting by the Popular Front for the Liberation of Oman.

Several British soldiers serving with the reactionary ruler Sultan Qabus, in the Labour government's 'secret war', are among those

killed.

The British commander in Oman ordered a state of emergency at all bases and posts in the Dhofar region following recent attacks.

On June 8, PFLO forces shelled the fortified post at Arzayt, killing one British officer and wounding three of the Sultan's men.

Four days later a landmine planted by PFLO sappers blew up a vehicle on the road to Ma'murah, and according to PFLO reports, killed two British

mercenaries and wounded the rest of the passengers.

A landmine blew up a Bedford military truck near the town of Taqah on June 16.

The PFLO claims four British personnel killed and others wounded and taken to Salalah hospital.

In Salalah the authorities are said to have had trenches dug and set up checkpoints to search

people for arms and explosives.

A British Army spokesman in London told News Line they had received no reports of any British casualties in Oman this year.

Unless we could give the names and units he would be unable to check, he said. He said the war was over now, although there was a 'training unit' in Oman.

Polish farming - 15 years behind rest of Europe

WARSAW — Polish farming is 15 years behind other Eastern European states, and 20 years behind the West, according to the Communist Party daily 'Trybuna Ludu' this week.

'In one decade we must do what took others tens of years.'

The article was one of a series on food production problems in Poland — highlighted and symbolised last month by food price riots led by workers from a tractor factory.

Poland has not carried out large-scale collectivisation as in other workers' states. There are still over three million private farms, many under five acres.

The bureaucracy tried to balance between the peasantry and the working class, but now finds itself caught between the militancy of the industrial workers opposed to price rises, and the conservatism and costs

of the farmers.

'Trybuna Ludu' says farm mechanisation in Poland covers only 40 per cent of the farms.

It is 15 years behind East Germany and Czechoslovakia, 10 years behind Rumania and Bulgaria, and 20 years behind Western European countries.

Poland is reported to have a horse population of three million, consuming fodder which might otherwise go to cattle.

In the past year the country has had to import a record 7m tonnes of grain, mainly for livestock feed, to supply

millions of small farmers with sufficient feed to prevent mass slaughtering of cattle, the Polish Press says.

Despite this, private farmers' herds are decreasing, because state fodder prices are too high.

The burden of importing expensive western grains, costing hundreds of millions of dollars, drains the country's hard currency balance at a time of mounting overseas debt.

'Trybuna Ludu', referring to inefficiency, points out that the fertile south-west of Poland has better soil than average, yet is producing lower yields.

'Daily Mail'

ALLEGATIONS in a 'Daily Mail' article attacking Vanessa Redgrave were 'totally untrue', the newspaper admitted in the High Court yesterday.

The court heard that the 'Mail' had agreed to pay 'substantial damages' in settlement of a libel action brought by Miss Redgrave.

The article was published in November 1974 under the headlines: 'Shut up, Vanessa' and 'What made the director of her latest film blow up'.

Film

It claimed the actress — a Central Committee member of the Workers Revolutionary Party — had disrupted production of a film at Elstree Studios.

The film was 'Winter Rates', in which she co-starred with Cliff Robertson and Susan George.

Mr Peter Bowsher, counsel for Miss Redgrave, told the court yesterday:

'...The defendants entirely accept that these allegations against Miss Redgrave, and in particular in reference to her behaviour as a professional actress, were totally untrue.'

Lumet, with her outspoken political views.

Mr Bowsher continued:

'There was not one word of truth in these allegations which, if given credence, could have prevented Miss Redgrave from ever working again in the cinema.'

Protests

The article had drawn immediate protests from those working on the set of the film.

On the same day that article appeared, the director, two of the producers and various members of the cast and crew wrote separate letters to the editor of the 'Daily Mail' informing him, in

effect, that their allegations were totally unfounded.

Four days later an apology appeared in the newspaper acknowledging there was no truth in the serious charges levelled against her.

Cartoon

'Unfortunately', Mr Bowsher went on, 'the defendants then published a further article and cartoon concerning her

political interests in their issues for the 29th and 30th September 1975 as a result of which further proceedings claiming damages for libel and seeking an injunction were commenced against the defendants.

'I am happy to say that these proceedings have now been resolved.'

As well as damages, the 'Mail' have agreed to pay the costs which Miss Redgrave incurred in bringing the libel proceedings.

Had a court trial resulted from the action, said Mr Bowsher, many witnesses would have been called to counter 'every allegation calculated in any way to reflect upon Miss Redgrave's professional integrity'.

Featured

The court heard that Miss Redgrave has featured in a major role in many films including

'Camelot', 'The Charge of the Light Brigade' and 'Isadora'.

In the theatre, her leading roles as a member of the Royal Shakespeare Company, included those in 'As You Like It' and 'The Taming of the Shrew'.

She is due to start work on a new film, 'Julia'.

Mr Richard Hartley, counsel for the Daily Mail, told Mr Justice Theisger:

'May it please your Lordship, the defendants entirely accept that these allegations against Miss

Redgrave, and particular in reference to her behaviour as a professional actress, were totally untrue.'

A reply to an interview with Sinn Fein

president Rory O'Brady (News Line June 17, 18, 19.)

The way forward for Irish workers

THE PROVISIONAL Sinn Fein has waged a persistent struggle against British imperialism in Ireland.

Unlike the Officials and their Stalinist patrons and, even more, the contemptible creatures of the British ruling class who lead the Irish Social Democratic and Labour Party, the Provisionals

have never abandoned this struggle.

However, courage and determination alone cannot be an adequate substitute for a clear political programme.

It is clear from the interview with Provisional Sinn Fein President Rory O'Brady in News Line (June 17, 18 and 19) and a recent policy article in the Provisionals' newspaper 'An Phoblacht' (June 25) that the organisation does not have such a programme.

O'Brady insisted in his interview that the Provisionals were fighting, not for a united

Ireland, but for 'a new Ireland'. The war aims set out by O'Brady were:

- A declaration of intent by the British to withdraw from Ireland
- A recognition of the right of the Irish people to decide their own future.
- A general amnesty for all political prisoners in Britain and Ireland.

The Sinn Fein President emphasised that he was not demanding an immediate and complete withdrawal of British forces — only a declaration of intent to withdraw, with the timetable remaining negotiable.

The war aims set out in the authoritative article in 'An Phoblacht', the paper of Sinn Fein published in Dublin, were even less demanding. They were:

- Freedom from English rule. Recognition of Irish nationality.
- Republican control of those parts of the north-east where Catholics are in a clear majority.
- Equality of treatment with Protestant communities in the rest of the north-east.

There is no question but that this means the border stays. The 'An Phoblacht' writer 'Freeman' claims the Provisionals would regard an independent Northern Ireland (i.e. under Orange capitalist control) as 'discussible' and acceptable under certain conditions.

reacted to the determined opposition of right wing Loyalist organisations like the UDA and UVF, he replied that he would give them 'immediate access to power in an enlarged nine-county Ulster'.

He said: 'The Republicans, the Nationalist people if you want to call them that, will rule in all Ireland, but in the

against the social revolution that they turn now to a possible 'unilateral declaration of independence'.

There is nothing progressive in such a move. Its aim is to split the Irish working class among themselves and also from their class allies in Britain.

The present direction of the Provisional Sinn Fein

order to get social and cultural emancipation later.

Apart from the mines, he said the Provisionals were 'keeping their options open' concerning nationalisation of the property of 'the neo-colonial capitalists'.

Asked what policy the Provisionals had for unemployment, poverty and inflation, he argued that no-one could get the working class on to the streets because the Common Market was baling out capitalism in Eire.

Clear

While proclaiming the need for 'a national reconstruction' it is clear that O'Brady did not see the working class as an effective force against capitalism at all.

This leads him, even while his organisation is waging a tenacious anti-imperialist war, to scratch around for bits and pieces of 'progressive' organisation here and there, much of it from capitalism, instead of starting from the forces of the class struggle which are actually developing.

'When we talk about our federal structures of government and local participation,' he said, 'there is something like this in Switzerland.'

'When we talk about workers' ownership, there is something like this in Yugoslavia. On the co-operative side we find certain developments in Danish agriculture quite encouraging.'

What are these trivialities compared with the historic developments which have occurred recently in Vietnam.

THE WHOLE question of what Provisional Sinn Fein is fighting for is clearly the subject of great controversy within the movement.

The week after 'An Phoblacht' carried the article referred to here, it published in full a statement from Republican News — the Provisionals' Belfast-based paper — denouncing the article.

'Republican News' said

nine-county Ulster. The Loyalists will rule if that's the way they want it.'

It is difficult to see this as anything other than the continuation of partition in a different guise.

leadership plays into the hands of that tendency.

The solution to the problem of Ireland is not to be found through a federal Ireland, or a 'two Irelands' policy — the reactionary line pushed by the extremely dubious British and Irish Communist Organisation — but through the unity of the working class, north and south, and the unity of the Irish and British working class in revolutionary struggle against imperialism.

O'Brady said that national liberation was necessary first in

He says: 'I would still regard an all-Ireland federation as the ultimate goal to aim at.'

'But it would be quite possible to work towards that goal within the two Irish states, and the achievement of an independent North would be a step in the right direction.'

Rory O'Brady does not go as far as that. He insists 'The border must go'.

Cambodia and Laos?

Yet O'Brady does not even mention these important revolutionary victories — because to achieve them, it was necessary not only to fight a war for national liberation, but to carry through a social revolution.

The Provisional Sinn Fein is walled off from such gains by its own lack of a revolutionary socialist programme.

O'Brady reflects the confusion and political vacillation of the Irish petty-bourgeoisie which cannot play an independent role in the Irish liberation struggle.

O'Brady was also very pessimistic about the British working class.

While stating correctly that: 'Freedom cannot be given to the Irish nation by another nation, we must fight for it', he claimed that it was difficult for the Irish struggle to win support because of 'the tide of propaganda'.

He was justified in arguing that 'guerrillas work with the methods nearest to hand', and the Workers Revolutionary Party defends the right of the Irish people to use whatever method they choose in the fight against imperialism.

But the Provisional Sinn Fein leader had no answer to the

argument that indiscriminate bombings split the working class, create great confusion which is immediately exploited by the right-wing Labour traitors and the Tories to strengthen the repressive apparatus of the state and frame up innocent Irish workers.

And when asked what programme his organisation had to unite the workers and small farmers of Ireland against imperialism and capitalism in Ireland, this man who has devoted his life to the struggle could produce nothing but the vaguest generalities and complaints about the very powerful weapons the modern state uses to brainwash the masses.

Yet these very masses are being forced by the crisis of capitalism more and more each day into inevitable conflicts with the ruling class and its agents. Most significant is O'Brady's silence on the role of the Catholic Church, which, of course, is one of the weapons used by the capitalists to 'brainwash the masses'.

A nationalist movement which refuses to secularise the state and expropriate the property of the Church cannot win the

confidence of the Protestant workers or put an end to the ignorance, superstition and cultural barbarism perpetuated by the Catholic Church in Ireland.

The Catholic bourgeoisie and petty bourgeoisie are organically incapable of carrying out this historic task, because they are tied in innumerable ways to imperialist finance capital.

Historic

Only the working class, whose historic interests are implacably opposed to every form of mystification and theological deception, can unite the Irish nation and clear away this mediaeval institution of the Catholic Church together with its Protestant counterpart in Ulster.

In these conditions, the International Committee of the Fourth International (including its Irish Section, the Workers League, and its British section, the Workers Revolutionary Party) puts forward the following programme:

1. Immediate withdrawal of British troops from the north of Ireland, the disbanding of

the standing army and its replacement by a workers' militia.

2. The immediate release of all political prisoners in the north and south of Ireland and in Britain.

3. Disarming and disbanding of all Unionist anti-working class organisations.

4. Repeal of the Offences Against the State Act in the south of Ireland, all repressive legislation in the north, and Jenkins' Prevention of Terrorism Act in Britain.

5. Industrial class action in Ireland to defend jobs, living standards and democratic rights, and to force the Labour-Fine Gael coalition to resign. For a workers' and poor farmers' government in Ireland which will nationalise the banks, industry and land under workers' control and without compensation.

6. Mobilisation of the independent strength of the working class to force the Labour government in Westminster to resign and to fight a General Election on socialist policies.

7. Withdrawal from the Common Market. A radical redistribution of the land to the landless and small farmers. The expropriation of the large landed estates and their operation under workers' control as state farms. Cheap credit and fertilisers for farmers coupled with an immediate programme of capital investment to improve and modernise Irish agriculture and being the transition to collective farming.

8. The defeat of British imperialism, the green and orange Tories of Ireland, and the building of a secular United Socialist Republic of Ireland.

We urge all supporters of the Provisional Sinn Fein, and all workers and small farmers in Ireland to consider and discuss this programme.

Manning talks in Lancaster dispute

LANCASTER — Shop stewards representing 1,300 workers on strike at Storey's had talks with the management here last night in an attempt to end a dispute on undermanning.

All the workers involved in the strike are members of the Transport and General Workers' Union.

The full-time T&GWU official at the factory, Sam Pearson, said before the meeting that the union would not deviate from the 1968 agreement which regulated overtime and manning in the firm's two local factories.

Both sides claimed that the other has been in breach of the agreement in recent weeks.

The disagreement came to a head on Monday when 120 men

walked out of the transprint division at the White Lund plant after refusing to operate machinery with less than a normal number of men.

The union is claiming that the agreement on manning means that workers cannot be forced to work with less than the full quota of men.

In the past the management has re-deployed staff to cope

with the situation.

Pearson said: 'Compulsory undermanning would put hundreds of workers on the dole'.

The workers fear the eventual closure of the White Cross works and suspect that Storey's are planning to move elsewhere.

Management claimed that the people who worked undermanned got extra pay.

Workers who spoke to News Line said the bonus was a 'mere pittance'.

They added that undermanning not only reduced safety and increased their work load, but would inevitable lead to redundancies.

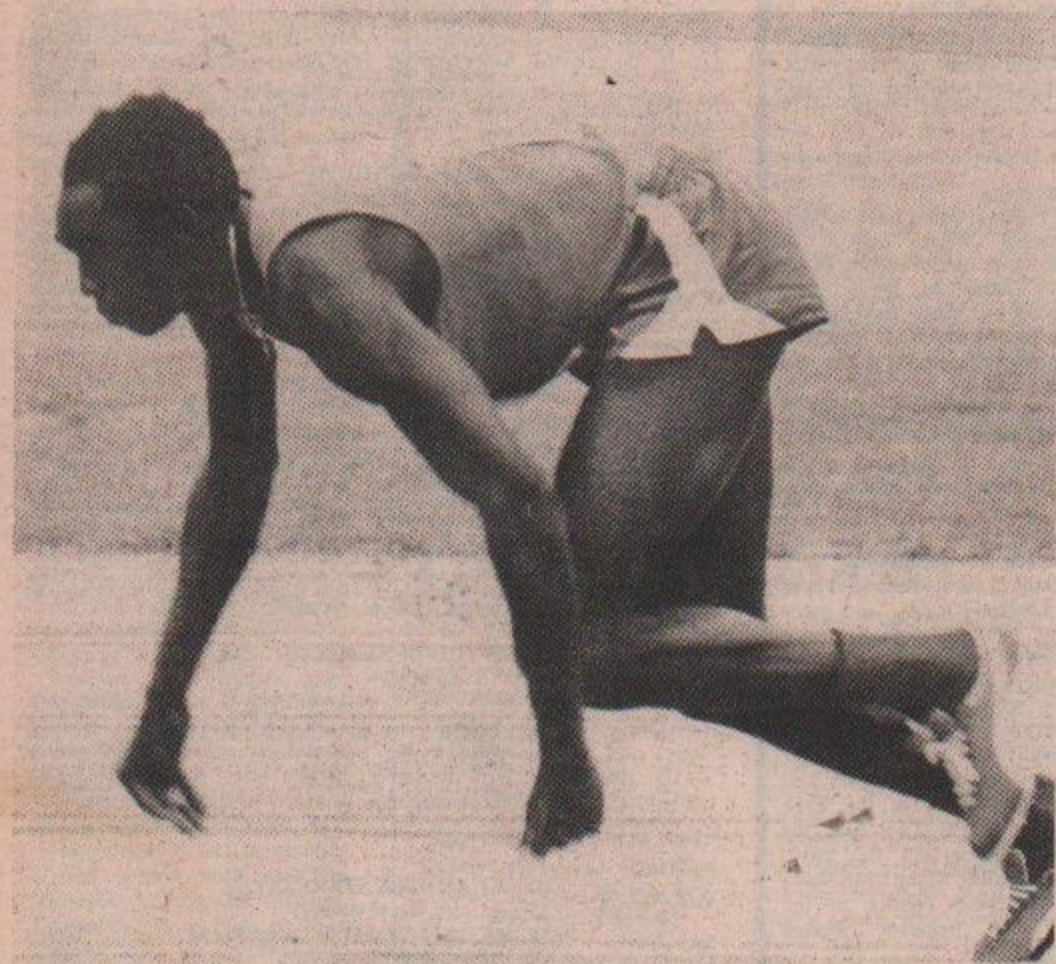

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Sussex abandon unequal struggle

SUSSEX gave up with hardly a struggle after resuming at 153 for five, at Lords, facing the task of scoring a further 71 runs to avert an innings defeat by championship-chasing Middlesex.

Within thirteen overs they were all out for 171, giving Middlesex victory by an innings and 54 runs and 17 valuable points.

Roger Knight, Sussex's mainstay, with an overnight 87, did not last long. He lost Javid Miandad at 167, and at the same time lofted a drive from Phil Edmonds to mid-on. He had batted 204 minutes and hit 13 fours for his 90.

Two more wickets fell at 168 while Edmonds finished off the innings by having Long taken in the slips, giving him three wickets for nine runs in 6.3 overs today. Jones had two for six to return three for 26.

All-rounder Clive Rice ended his search for a big innings this season with 95 not out which steered Nottinghamshire to a three wicket win over Yorkshire at Worksop.

While the other batsmen fell victim to an unpredictable pitch Rice, who hit 11 boundaries had few problems. His fourth wicket partnership of 118 with Basharat Hassan, 65, was the turning point in the match after Nottinghamshire, left 260 to win, were 85 for three at one time.

A fighting innings from Alan Hill steered Derbyshire away from what had seemed probable defeat against Warwickshire at Coventry.

Forced to follow on, Derbyshire were 35 behind at the start of the day, but with help from Eddie Barlow, Hill took them into the lead then proceeded to punish all the Warwickshire bowlers.

He completed his first century of the season with his 17th boundary, taking 260 minutes. Untroubled he moved on to a career best 143 before rain halted play.

Taiwan athletes 'won't get in' - says Canada

TAIWAN'S Olympic team was reported yesterday to be trying to enter Canada by plane or bus from Detroit, but an External Affairs Ministry spokesman in Ottawa said: 'They will not be allowed in'.

About 40 Taiwan athletes and officials are challenging a Canadian government ban on their entry into Canada. The Canadian government has said they will not be allowed in unless they agree to drop the name, the Republic of China, in the Olympics, due to open on July 17.

The Taiwan team flew in the middle of the night from Los Angeles to Detroit, on the Canadian border.

An External Affairs Ministry spokesman said: 'They will be kept out. They do not have visas to enter Canada. They will not be allowed in unless there is an agreement with the

International Olympic Committee, and I have no information on any such agreement.'

Earlier, the Taiwan team had been expected to try to board a flight from Chicago's O'Hare Airport, but the athletes and officials went instead to Detroit.

An Allegheny Airlines spokesman said the team was booked on Allegheny flight 452 due to leave Detroit at 10.45 local time (14.45 GMT) for Montreal.

'They went to the airport this morning and I believe Canadian consular officials are talking to them,' the spokesman said.

But the Allegheny spokesman added: 'We are told they do not have Canadian visas and in that case we cannot legally board them on a flight to Canada.'

While the Taiwan team seemed to be planning a confrontation with Canadian immigration authorities, Olympic officials were meeting here to try to solve the crisis over Taiwan's participation that is threatening the Olympics.

'Penthouse' pet in tour crash

Accident number one involved Ian Marshall and Ian Jones, whose Alfa-Romeo GTV crashed heavily at the end of the stage.

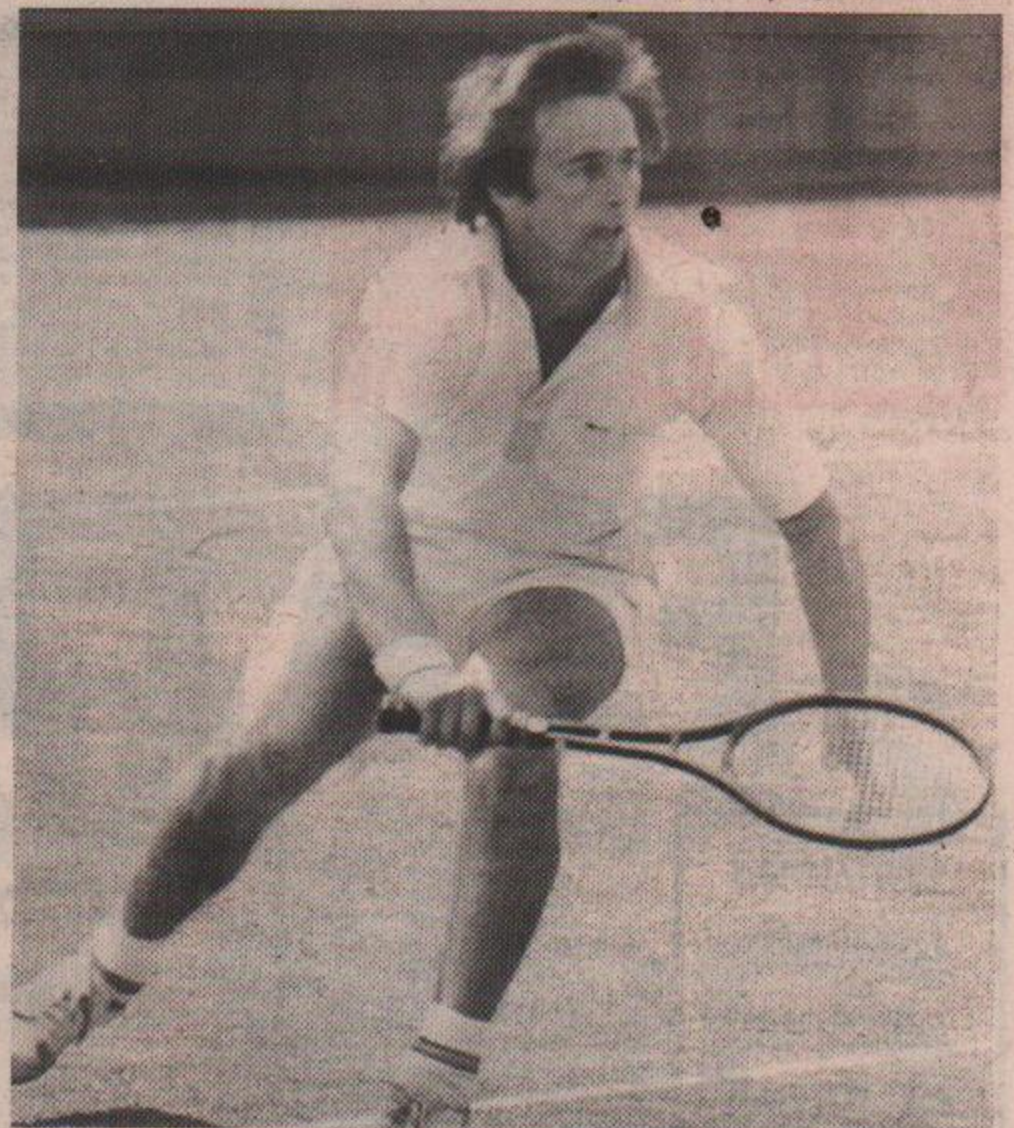
Shortly after the wreckage had been cleared a Fiat 128 coupe 'rolled' several times.

LLOYD BROS SEAL FRENCH TEAM'S FATE

BROTHERS David and John Lloyd saw Britain through to the European Zone final of the Davis Cup yesterday by winning the doubles for an unassailable 3-0 lead in the match against France.

Roger Taylor, who got Britain off to a good start on Thursday when he beat Patrick Proisy in the singles, was rested for the doubles, giving David Lloyd his first Davis Cup match for two years.

But team manager Paul Hutchins' gamble paid off, as the brothers net off as confidently against Proisy and Francois Jauffret as John Lloyd had finished in winning the marathon three-hour singles against Jauffret the day before dropping only twelve points on the way.

David Lloyd, making the most of his recall to the Davis Cup team after two years, set about punishing any loose shots from the Frenchmen. He was particularly strong overhead and served to an immaculate length.

With the 5-0 lead, the Lloyds started making their first mistakes, and John, the younger brother, dropped his serve in the 6th game, allowing Proisy and Jauffret on to the score board for the first time.

They had a point for a break again in the eighth game, but this time John averted the danger with a fine smash. The Lloyds finally took the set 6-2 on their third set point and then went on to win the second 6-4.

It was in the third set that the French pair started to put up a fight.

With the tie-break system not in operation in Davis Cup competition, the war of nerves to hold serve went on until the 20th game, when at last the break came, and the British pair lost their first set, 11-9.

With it they could have lost their nerve, but David, whose game had become a little ragged in the third set, started to play his shots again.

A 6-3 victory in the set was enough to give Britain the match, and make today's two singles matches a formality.
