COMMUNITY COUNCILS

THE Workers Revolutionary Party today calls upon all those fighting the Tory government, its cuts and closures to take a bold initiative.

This call is made to Labour Party-controlled borough councils, trade union organisations and all those committees and action groups who are up against the Thatcher onslaught.

It is especially made to areas like Consett, Shotton, Corby, Port Talbot and Dundee, which are literally being sentenced to death.

We say close ranks and build Community Councils to form a common front against the Tories.

Represent

The Councils would represent all the people affected by the Tory slump policies, irrespective of their race, religion or past affiliations.

The Community Councils must incorporate existing local community bodies which have sprung up almost overnight in some areas—for example, community groups against police violence, against racism, against hospital and school closures, against cutbacks in local facilities, such as playgrounds and libraries, against cuts in medical facilities and university education, and also tenants and ratepayers' organisations.

This call is made in the knowledge that the Thatcher government is creating impossible conditions for

millions of working people to live.

- Unemployment is 1.9 million and rising. Factories are closing at the rate of five a week; redundancies last month reached 40,000.

- Inflation is 22 per cent and being fuelled every day by increases in the cost of living.

- Rail fares up 25 per cent in November, telephones up 22½ per cent, electricity another 10 per cent and yesterday milk went up to 17p a pint.

- At the same time Thatcher wants to impose a pay ceiling in single figures—9 per cent and no more.

Education

- Hospitals and schools are closing, therefore ending the right to a decent health service and education.

- Public transport is being run into the ground and priced out of reach for working-class families and the unemployed.

At the same time, the Tories are handing out extra millions to the armed forces, the police and so-called 'civil defence'.

One of Whitelaw's final acts before the end of this parliamentary session was to give £45m for unspecified 'civil defence' projects.

It is not to build nuclear air raid shelters, but to boost the government's strike-breaking forces and its apparatus for civilian repression.

All these sinister developments prove beyond a shadow of doubt that this Tory government is driving deliberately towards a violent class confrontation. It is out to provoke a state of national emergency which will be used as a pretext to attack living standards on a sweeping and brutal scale and do away with basic democratic rights.

Labour Party-held borough councils are in a special dilemma.

With the best intentions, some of them have tried to defend the post-war reforms in local government services and facilities. Placed in the straitjacket of the Tories' cash limits, they have increased rates and council rents to try and make ends meet.

But they can't. Thatcher won't allow it. She is determined that her paupers' policy is carried out to the letter.

policy is carried out to the letter.

In the next four months, the borough councils face a worsening dilemma when public service workers put in their new pay claims.

There is no way that these can be met and the current depleted services retained. The Tories know this very well. They intend to stand back and gain advantage out of the warfare between Labour-controlled councils and the unions.

Initiate

We must not allow the unions and the Labour movement to fight each other for the benefit of the Tories. Borough councils must initiate the campaign to build Community Councils in which the trade unions and all those involved in the anti-Tory struggle will be united.

The purpose of the Councils will be to alert and mobilise the masses to the dangers of Thatcher's militarist-monetarist dictatorship, especially the activities of the police and the

PINTA UP 'MOLE' CLAMP

THE TORIES allowed another 1/2p to be slapped on to the price of milk yesterday. But even a 17p pinta did not satisfy farmers and big business who had clamoured for a 1/2p rise.

Agriculture Minister Peter Walker, who announced the increase, blamed rises in the costs of wages, pro-

duction and processing and distribution.

In March this year the price of a pint was forced up by 1/2p and yesterday Walker hinted of a further rise later this year.

Limiting the price to a 1/2p rise was described as a 'victory for common sense' by the Consumers Association.

THE British Steel Corporation, currently trying to get the name of the 'mole' who leaked secret BSC documents to Granada Television, is now being threatened on another front — the 'Sunday Times'.

Yesterday BSC was granted a temporary injunction against Times Newspapers in the High Court to stop publication in

this weekend's 'Sunday Times' of information from confidential BSC documents.

It is effective until next Tuesday when Times Newspapers will have an opportunity of stating its case more fully.

'Sunday Times' deputy editor Frank Giles said he hoped the injunction would be set aside on Tuesday.

HOTEL FIRE ACT OF REVENGE?

A RIGHT-WING loyalist terror group may have started a fire which gutted a hotel and killed seven people in County Donegal yesterday.

After the blaze had wiped out a family of four as it swept through the building,

a senior police officer admitted: 'The chances of an incendiary attack have not been ruled out.'

'The ferocity of the fire and the speed with which it gained a hold indicated some kind of incendiaries could have been used.'

The fire at the 40-room Central Hotel in the holiday resort of Bundoran, broke out just after midnight when about 100 people were in the hotel — most of them downstairs enjoying a disco.

Bundoran is only a few miles from Mullaghmore, the County Sligo village where Lord Mountbatten and three members of his boating party were blown up by a bomb, allegedly planted by the Provisional IRA last year.

The suspected arson attack, some security observers believe, could be a revenge strike by a loyalist group timed to coincide with the first anniversary of Mountbatten's assassination.

The four dead members of one family were husband James Brennan, an accountant from Naas, County Kildare, his wife Anne and young children Deirdre and James.

A brother and sister, James J. and Adrienne Kinsella, 12, from Dublin, also died. Their sister, Jennifer, was seriously injured when she leapt from an upstairs window.

The search was continuing last night for three missing people. Police said they were presuming all had been killed.

armed forces.

They would also take the responsibility for all aspects of the social and economic crisis facing workers and sections of the middle class as the world slump and Tory policies attempt to throw industry on to the scrap heap and the social services into wrack and ruin.

The Community Councils would take immediate steps to house the homeless by requisitioning all empty property and putting it to proper use.

The poor and unemployed simply cannot afford to pay the soaring increases for rents, rates, electricity, gas and telephones.

Decision

It has been statistically proved that when unemployed workers pay off these weekly items they have nothing left to live on.

The Community Councils would tackle these hardship cases by suspending rate and rent payments to those in real poverty and instituting a graduated system of rates based on income.

When the multi-nationals, the banks and

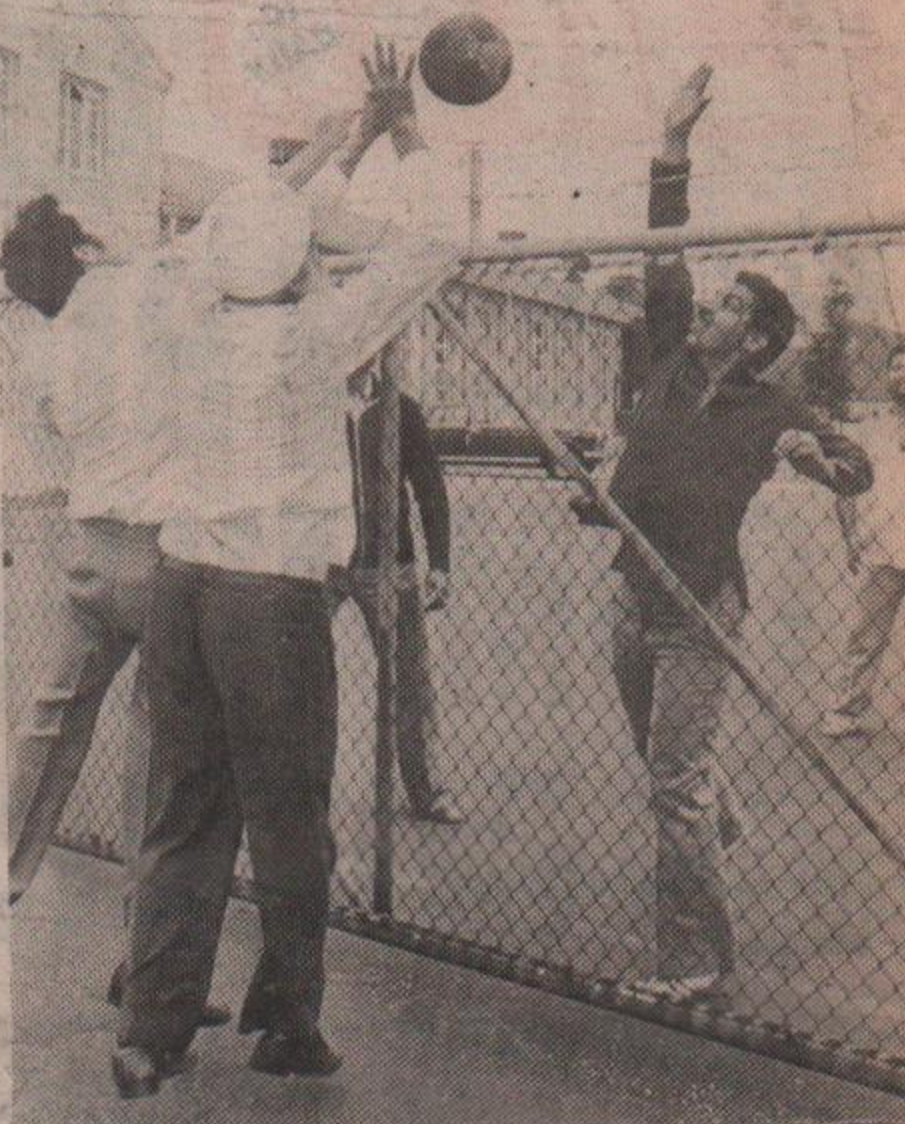
the business tycoons are engaging in tax evasion amounting to billions of pounds each year, why should the old, aged, the unemployed and the disabled be penalised and terrorised?

So many young families now face the repossession of their homes because they cannot pay the exorbitant mortgages. They entered the agreements when they had jobs; now they have been thrown on to the dole.

The Community Councils would negotiate a moratorium on these repayments to stop families being thrown on to the streets.

In short, the Community Councils would form the local and regional defence of living standards and basic rights of whole areas of the country bringing together trade unionists, industrial, commercial and service workers, the self-employed and small shopkeepers. They would become the central organisations

Quaker Oats strikers to escalate action

FIVE HUNDRED strikers at the Quaker Oats plant in Southall are to escalate their fight to defend jobs, wages and conditions.

They defiantly ignored a management threat that a pay offer, which has already been rejected by the workforce, would be cut to eight per cent if they failed to return to work yesterday.

Pickets, who have stopped all essential supplies said that they would not return until eight women who, they claim, were unfairly sacked, are all reinstated.

The women were dismissed

sed by management two weeks ago for allegedly 'sleeping' during working hours.

The strikers are also insisting before they return, that threats to make 53 workers redundant, are lifted.

T&GWU convenor H Mahmood told News Line that his members were determined to stay out until the management's attempt to 'dictate to the unions' had been beaten back.

The 19-per-cent pay offer was thrown out because it was subject to the breaking of almost all existing working agreements in the factory.

The workforce regarded the percentage figure as merely a carrot to lure them into accepting complete mobility of labour, and they firmly rejected it.

But after six hours of talks at the arbitration service ACAS on Wednesday, the management was still refusing to consider the reinstatement of the women, renegotiate the pay claim or withdraw redundancy notices.

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Closer to video age

THE video age will come a step closer next year when Britain's first public access video library opens in January.

For the price of a cinema ticket any member of the public will be able to choose one of what will eventually be 1,000 films — either feature films transferred to tape or television programmes.

The emphasis will be on the work of independent film makers rather than big commercial films.

This library will be just part of a major new development in film presentation by the Institute of Contemporary Arts in London.

They are planning to convert their existing cinema into two smaller spaces which will be able to show everything from 35mm. features in full stereo to 8mm. and video films. There will be a cinema specialising in showing new British, European and American feature films for extended runs and a smaller area called a cinemathèque which will be able to show 16mm. and 8mm. films, video work and mixed media events.

The ICA hope that through these new facilities they will be able to make the work of young film makers known to a wider public.

WE'LL STARVE UNTIL DEATH

SAY JAILED IRANIANS

THREE of the Iranians on hunger strike at London's Brixton jail have been moved to the prison hospital.

Fifty-two of the 53 in jail have been refusing food and liquid since being remanded in custody on Tuesday on charges arising out of the demonstration outside the American embassy in London.

Their solicitor warned yesterday that the hunger strikers were 'ready to die'. Malcolm Hurwitt, who represents the 68 students arrested during the embassy protest, said that he last saw them on Wednesday.

Martyrs

'They told me they were ready to become martyrs and I presumed they were ready to die for their cause,' he went on.

He said that 'martyrdom was a general opinion expressed' when he spoke to 19 of the 53 remanded in Brixton 'and my impression was that all the demonstrators at that time held this view.'

Seyfollah Ehdai, Iranian consul-general said on ITNs 'One O'Clock News' the Iranian's behaviour in custody was 'the only way they have found to indicate their anger about the action of the police.'

There was an orchestrated campaign against Iranian students in Britain, he said.

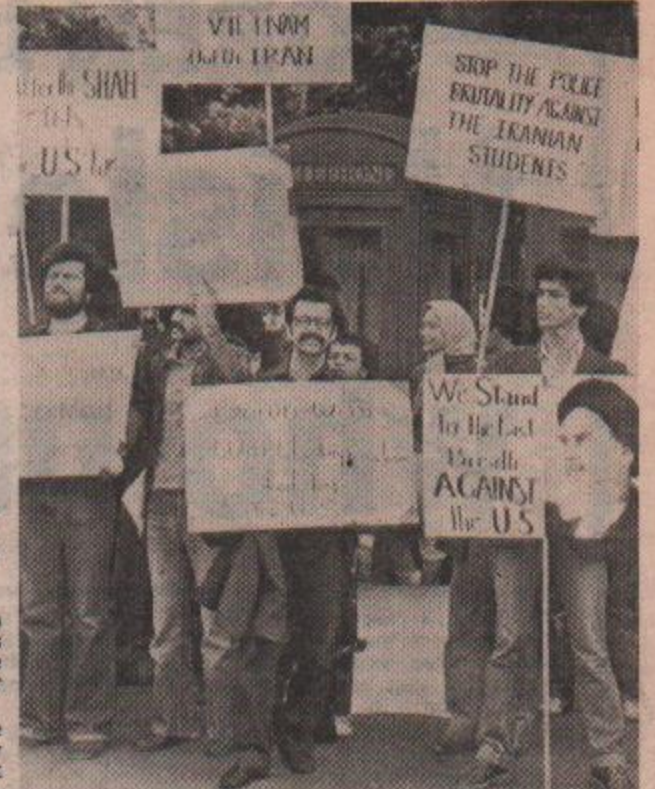
'Some media are trying to make public opinion against Moslem students.'

The police and SAS had been thanked many times for their action at the Iranian Embassy siege, Ehdai added. But he took

a different view of the police role at the disturbance outside the US Embassy on Monday.

'We condemn the action of the police which was very aggressive and we condemn the misbehaviour of the police.'

He said he had asked the Iranians in custody to obey the law, 'because the court is different from the police. We can sue the police for its aggressive action,' he said.

THE BBC's 'Match of the Day' will keep its title this soccer season, but will be screened on Sunday tea-times, presenter Jimmy Hill revealed yesterday.

It will show highlights of three matches instead of the usual two on a Saturday night.

The BBC is putting the finishing touches to the programme which returns next weekend (August 17), and switches to Sunday under the season-by-season alternating deal with ITV and the Football League.

Soccer switch to Sunday

'We shall be talking to the fans and managers and telling viewers something about the clubs that are staging the matches we feature.'

Jimmy Hill will be in the studio presenting the show with Bob Wilson backing him up.

The commentary team is the same — John Motson, Barrie Davies and David Coleman.

The switch to Sunday has more than doubled the cost of the programme, with a third match to cover and extra expense for a wider-ranging programme. Each edition will cost £55,000, compared with £25,000 on a Saturday.

The ITV regions will have their own football programmes on Saturday night and will be able to choose three matches from the six that ITV cameras will cover each Saturday.

Action

Jimmy Hill said: 'The programme will still have all the football action, but will be more reflective in its approach as we will have more time.'

'It will be more of a magazine programme and will be aimed at all the family as they have tea. The programme will go out late afternoon, probably at about 4.30.'

As part of its new look, the programme will be putting the spotlight on clubs featured in matches.

Higher rebates promised

HIGHER RENT and rate rebates expected to help 2.6 million people, especially those on low incomes, were announced yesterday.

John Stanley, Minister for Housing and Construction, said that if parliament agrees, the whole range of allowances would be increased from November.

It will mean, for instance, that a man earning £70 a week with a wife and two children to support and paying £11.70 a week rate and rents will qualify for rebates of £7.35 against £4.25 at present.

Rebates will still be based on the needs allowance — a notional figure

for each family size which takes into account their basic needs — but some changes are proposed.

The allowance for a dependent child, for example, will be restored to the same proportion of the needs allowance as it was eight years ago — up 25 per cent from £7.70 to £9.60.

Courage to quit London

ALMOST 700 jobs will be lost over the next 18 months as Courage closes its London brewery and bottling plant as part of a major cost-cutting exercise.

Courage chairman Geoffrey Kent said yesterday that shutting the brewery next March, and the bottling plant by early 1982, was the only way to ensure a healthy future.

The London production sites, both at Southwark, will be sold. Customers at the brewery's 1,450 public houses in the area will not notice the difference, say the brewers.

Women in Africa protest

THE Anti-Apartheid Movement picketed the South African Embassy yesterday to mark what they call South African Women's Day.

On August 9, 1956, 20,000 women took to the dirt-roads of their shanty towns to protest against the extension of the socially inhibiting 'pass laws'.

These laws are the regulation for black people in South Africa where families are purposely kept apart to ease the mobility of labour for the diamond and gold mining industrialists, amongst others.

Protesters handed out leaflets which said: 'Women find employment in the lowest paid and most insecure jobs — the average wage of black women is eight per cent of white males. Despite the risk of removal, women organise and are militant trade unionists.'

'Already this year, thousands of women in the textile and other manufacturing industries have taken strike action.'

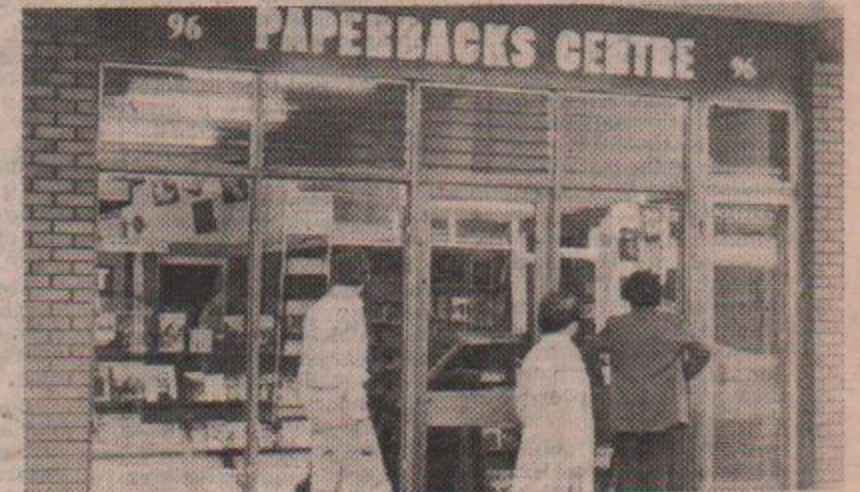


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OPEN LETTER TO MEMBERS OF THE Heisler: The FBI agent who unmasked himself

ON JUNE 9, 1980, Ed Heisler, a member of the National Committee of the revisionist Socialist Workers Party of the United States, wrote to the party headquarters in New York confessing that he was an agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

Heisler, who is listed as eighth in the SWP's leadership, belonged to the party for 20 years, having joined in Milwaukee in 1960.

It is two months since Heisler confessed to earning \$400 a month (plus bonuses) from the FBI, and still the SWP leaders have made no public comment.

An internal document has been issued in the 'Party Organizer', the SWP's bulletin for members, written by Larry Seigle, one of the Carleton College brigade who have been 'plugged into' the SWP and dominate its top leadership.

This week in Oberlin, Ohio, the SWP opened its annual 'educational conference'. Few of the arriving delegates and

guests had read Seigle's report on the Heisler affair, because the monthly bulletin for July had not been properly circulated.

But the Workers League, the Trotskyist party in political solidarity with the International Committee of the Fourth International, widely distributed a statement to conference delegates exposing Seigle's cover-up of the FBI man's activities. (The Workers Revolutionary Party is the British section of the ICFI.)

The Workers League statement provoked anxiety and panic among SWP leaders who have been trying to play down Heisler's spy role and keep the membership in the dark as much as possible.

News Line today reprints the Workers League statement as a further contribution in the ICFI's five-year investigation into 'Security and the Fourth International'. It forms part of a series of articles that we will be publishing in commemorating the 40th anniversary of the assassination of the founder of the Fourth International, Leon Trotsky.



LARRY SEIGLE's report on self-confessed FBI agent Ed Heisler, published in the July 1980 edition of your 'Party Organizer', is an insult to the intelligence of every politically serious member of the Socialist Workers Party.

The SWP has not yet said a word publicly about Heisler's resignation and his admission of being an agent. Nothing has been published in 'The Militant'.

But he was a member of the SWP for 20 years and during most of the last decade was among its most prominent public spokesmen. He was the SWP's chief representative in the trade unions. He received special publicity in 'The Militant' as a 'dissident' fighter for union democracy in the United Transportation Union. He was nominated in 1974 to run as the SWP's senatorial candidate in Illinois.

Two years later, Heisler was named chairman of the Camejo-Reid presidential campaign. He was initially the chief spokesman for the SWP's legal suit against government spying on the SWP, and Heisler was selected in 1975 to testify on behalf of the SWP against the nomination of George Bush as CIA director.

Heisler was elected three times to the national committee of the SWP — most recently at the last SWP convention held in August 1979 at Oberlin.

In the 1980 edition of the 'International Handbook of Communist Affairs' published by the government 'think tank' at the Hoover Institute of Stanford University, Heisler is listed as the eighth ranking leader of the SWP.

After failing to publish a single statement on Heisler for seven weeks after his resignation, the SWP has now released an edited text of a report given by Seigle in New York in late June.

The fraudulent nature of

Seigle's report is clearly established in its very title, 'An Agent Exposed'.

As everyone in the SWP knows, Heisler was not exposed at all. FBI agent Heisler exposed himself! He ended his 20-year career as a spy in the SWP with a letter dated June 9 to the New York headquarters in which he graciously enclosed copies of his correspondence with the FBI.

The fact is that neither Seigle nor any other leader in the SWP has ever exposed a single agent. The only way an agent can be 'exposed' in the SWP is by voluntarily admitting to being one.

How are SWP members supposed to react to the news that Heisler is an FBI agent?

According to Seigle, 'you are entitled to 30 seconds to register your surprise'. But, looking on the bright side, once you 'start thinking through what this means', the most cheerful conclusions will be unavoidable.

Betrayed

After all, as Seigle points out: 'What has happened is not that we have just been betrayed, but that we have just succeeded in putting an end to long years of betrayal. That is something to be glad about.' (Party Organizer, Vol. 4, No. 2, July 1980, p. 3.)

As this great success has been achieved entirely through the efforts of Heisler himself — first by spying on the SWP and then by voluntarily resigning — it would appear that he is owed a debt of gratitude. A motion of appreciation from this Educational Conference apparently would be in order.

Heisler's self-exposure has contributed powerfully to the learning process. Having been told by the agent that he successfully penetrated its top leadership, the SWP 'can understand more deeply some of the strengths of our movement'.

As Seigle suggestively explains: 'When we understand what it is about our party that prevented Heisler from doing so many of the things the FBI wanted him to do, then I think comrades

will feel even prouder of the party than we already are, and more confident in ourselves.' (Party Organizer, p. 3.)

First, Seigle declares that Heisler's voluntary resignation is a great victory for the SWP. Then, he assures everyone that what Heisler didn't do is far more important than what he actually did for the FBI.

But how is it that Seigle happens to know what it is that the FBI wanted Heisler to do? He reports that Heisler 'received great praise from the FBI' and 'that they would give him bonuses when he turned in exceptionally good work. He was praised by his control agents for his "rise" in the "organisation"'. His salary was adjusted upward.' (Party Organizer, p. 4.)

Why Seigle places the word 'rise' between quotation marks is not explained. Is he suggesting that Heisler was not really rising from position to position?

Nor does Seigle explain why the FBI paid Heisler \$400 per month if he was not carrying out the job it expected of him. Calculated over a period of 20 years, this is the equivalent of a sum in the area of \$100,000 tax free.

The purpose of these contradictory statements is simply to evade the questions that are uppermost on the minds of all politically serious members of the SWP: Who recruited Heisler? Who nominated him to key positions? Who were his closest associates? Who were his possible contacts? Who has replaced him in leading positions?

Rather than answer these questions, Seigle offers the membership a real sob story.

The Heisler affair has caught the FBI and the government attorneys in yet another damaging lie in our case,' he states.

'About four years ago, we had selected from the leadership of the party a list of 35 comrades and demanded from the government the complete files on all of them. The government was ordered to produce them, and ostensibly complied with the court order.

'Heisler was one of the 35. Of course, the government didn't give us the files on Heisler as an informer. They didn't tell us he was a fink. They didn't tell the judge. They just lied. An outright lie and cover-up.' (Party Organizer, p. 5.)

Why does Seigle act so surprised? Does he expect a capitalist government to behave any differently?

Selected

Seigle doesn't mention the fact that it was Heisler who was originally selected to handle the SWP government case, before he himself took over the assignment. Rather, he gets himself worked up over the double-dealing of the capitalist state.

He announces — profound discovery — that 'the government has not reformed its ways'. Perhaps Seigle thought it had.

But what is even worse, he tells us, 'the ruling class will use any method, anything they can get away with to accomplish their goals'.

And that's not all. 'They are not bound by any standard of conduct, any court rulings, laws or constitutional protections, any concern for the advancement of humanity. Their methods, like the end they serve, are repulsive.' (Party Organizer, p. 5-6.)

Seigle sounds surprised. He becomes even more indignant over Heisler himself.

Ploughs on

'What was Heisler as an individual?' he asks rhetorically. Why anyone would really be interested is not explained, but Seigle ploughs on.

'He was a person who betrayed every comrade, everyone who collaborated with him, tried to befriend him, tried to help him to be a better comrade. He could betray without batting an eye. Without a tinge of guilt or remorse.' (Party Organizer, p. 6.)

But Heisler did not want any 'comrades' in the SWP.

His real 'comrades' were his fellow FBI men from Carleton College working inside the SWP as spies.

Would it matter if Heisler had betrayed with a tinge of guilt and remorse? What point is Seigle trying to make?

Descending ever deeper into pathos, Seigle desponds: 'When you see someone like that, you are looking at an empty person.' But at \$400 per month, this emptiness did not apply to his bank book.

Amidst all this sugar-coated liberal rubbish, Seigle arrives at the guts of his argument. 'What are the lessons of this experience for the party?

'First, there aren't any fundamentally new lessons. We have been through this many times before... And, frankly, the Heisler affair is not a very big episode in the history of our party, or the history of informers and agent-provocateurs.' (Party Organizer, p. 5.)

Why doesn't Seigle explain what was bigger than Heisler?

Is he referring to the case of Mark Zborowski, the GPU agent inside the Fourth International who played a major role in organising the assassinations of Erwin Wolf, Rudolf Klement, Ignace Reiss, Leon Sedov and Leon Trotsky?

Or is he referring to the case of Sylvia Franklin, another GPU agent who penetrated the national office of the SWP in 1938 and worked as James P. Cannon's personal secretary until 1947?

Unlike Heisler, neither Zborowski nor Franklin chose to inform the Trotskyist movement that they were working as agents. Moreover, they were the beneficiaries of a decades-long cover-up organised by the biggest agent of all — Joseph Hansen, who served both the GPU and the FBI in the course of a 45-year career as an agent of counter-revolution.

Seigle, as a student of Hansen and a connoisseur of agents, doesn't rate Heisler very highly. He voluntarily cut short a promising career

in the leadership of the SWP by confessing.

'While there are no new lessons', he continues, 'we can take this opportunity to re-examine the experiences of our movement in dealing with government persecution and informer-provocateurs.' (Party Organizer, p. 5.)

This would be very useful, but first Seigle would have to name the agents they have caught. But there aren't any to name. The one extraordinary feature of the experiences of the SWP in dealing with informers is that they are never caught. Unless they expose themselves like Heisler, they are assured of a long and dignified career inside the SWP, especially if they denounce so-called Healyism loud enough to hear.

This is because the SWP firmly adheres to the policy set by Hansen and maintained by his Carleton protégés: No one is ever to be investigated or accused of being an agent. This is the single unchallengeable rule within the SWP. Seigle makes it clear, Heisler notwithstanding, that this policy cannot be changed:

Penetration

'The second alternative method is to start a hunt for informers in the party. To think you can 'find' the informers, to think that by stepping up your security or your vigilance you can protect yourself from penetration by cop agents.

'This turns the party inward and undermines everything the party is based on: the mutual trust and confidence we have in each other that is based on our common programme and loyalty to our party.' (Party Organizer, p. 9.)

In short, according to Seigle, Barnes, Hansen, et al, you can do absolutely nothing to stop the infiltration of police agents.

Though Seigle shortly before reminded us that there are to be found on this planet 'empty' people like Heisler who lack 'fundamental human qualities', who 'betray everyone without batting an

eye' and 'without a tinge of guilt or remorse', the party must be based on 'mutual trust and confidence'.

After all, Seigle claims, a hunt for informers 'is the cops' own favourite proposal. They love to start internal witch-hunts, to start agent-baiting, informer scares. Let's start a hunt. Let's track them down. Let's question everyone.' (Party Organizer, p9.)

Who is Seigle trying to frighten? Why should any serious member of the SWP refuse to be questioned in a matter of mutual interest in the common fight against the capitalist enemy? Surely, only the real agents and the foot-loose liberal petty bourgeois would object.

Does anyone in the SWP remember Heisler demanding a hunt for informers? In all the years he spent in the leadership of the SWP, did he ever expose a single agent? Did he ever demand an investigation into a member he considered suspect?

Of course not. The real line of police agents is the one advanced by Seigle himself: You can't expose agents, and if you attempt to do so you are guilty of 'agent-baiting'. As Seigle declares:

'This is the pattern of the Healyite campaign against our party and against the Fourth International too. Under the transparent guise of concern over "security" and the need to find agents, the Healyites are carrying out a disruption campaign against us.'

The US Healyites, the Workers League, have been reduced to nothing more than an instrument in this disruption campaign. The major activity of the entire Healyite organisation is their massively financed international campaign to disrupt the party and the Fourth International through their slander and agent-baiting campaign.' (Party Organizer, p9.)

to protect itself useless as well?

If that is his opinion, then it would logically follow that the use of agents is of no importance and that it does not matter how many of them infiltrate the revolutionary movement.

Furthermore, if that is his position, then he would have to maintain that there is no reason for the state itself to exist.

The historical premise of the state is the fundamental requirement of a ruling class for a special instrument of coercion to secure its interests.

An important part of that instrument is its highly elaborate intelligence network, consisting of strategically placed informers within the organisation of the revolutionary movement.

This is nothing more than the shabbiest liberal reformist type of argument.

But Seigle does not deny this. He states in his report that 'some basic facts about the ruling class and its government' are that 'informers and provocateurs are a key weapon of the secret police, and they are used extensively against us as they are used against every component of the labour movement, the Black movement, and every other progressive force in society'. (Party Organizer, p5.)

The political content of Seigle's argument is unmistakable: the necessity of the capitalist state to employ informers as part of its security apparatus is acknowledged, but the right and necessity of the revolutionary organisation of the working class to strengthen its security is denounced as disruption.

On the matter of Heisler himself, Seigle is caught in some very serious contradictions. He states that there is no way that Heisler could have been accused of being an agent.

But on the other hand, Seigle informs the SWP ranks that 'we have learned a lot about Heisler in the last few days from comrades and from friends not in the party.'

'And there will be more. It is important that we get together the whole story, or as complete a version of it as possible. What we know so far points to a major disruption around the drug question.' (Party Organizer, p6)

Previously, Seigle stated that 'there are no new lessons' to be learnt from the Heisler case. Now he states that 'we have learned a lot' about Heisler, and it involved his participation in and encouragement of a drug scene in the SWP.

'Heisler', according to Seigle, 'systematically talked to comrades trying to convince them that our security policy isn't really what we say it is. He argued that some leaders of the party smoke marijuana, and that others know they do and wink at it.' (Party Organizer p6)

Seigle admits that 'we don't yet know all of the provocative and disruptive activities Heisler was carrying out. But we do know that he waged a major campaign until the day we expelled him, to undermine our security policy. He worked at this energetically, persistently, with vim and vigour.' (Party Organizer p6)

Let us remind Seigle that Heisler's campaign stopped before the SWP expelled him, because he admitted to

being an agent and resigned first.

Before expelling him, the SWP leadership, always giving agents the benefit of every doubt, waited to ascertain that his letter of resignation was not an 'elaborate' forgery. Then it expelled Heisler.

But until Heisler resigned, we now learn, 'he worked overtime to undermine the policy, to cast doubt on it, and to poison basic confidence in the party and its leadership'. (Party Organizer p6)

All this is revealed after Heisler resigned. But let us assume that a member of the SWP would have approached Seigle or another member of the Carleton fraternity and conveyed these reports to them.

What would have happened if this member had reported comments made by Heisler while drunk or pointed out that he was pursuing a pro-drug campaign 'with vim and vigour'.

Denounced

The member would have been denounced for 'agent-baiting' or even, still worse, of being a 'Healyite'.

However, Seigle himself cannot avoid violating the SWP's cardinal rule. A major conclusion, he declares, of the Heisler case is — 'the next time someone in this party invites you to go smoke dope, you have to assume he or she is a cop'.

Come, come, Mr Seigle, would this not be agent-baiting? Would it not be more proper to hang no smoking signs in all your offices and draw them to the attention of anyone considering lighting up?

He also seems to be violating his deeply-held convictions against 'agent-baiting' when he warns against the 'what's-the-harm-if-you-and-I-go-up-on-top-of-a-mountain-where-there-won't-be-a-cop-around-for-fifty-miles-and-light-up argument'. (Party Organizer p7)

'Well, you might make a miscalculation,' Seigle warns. 'The cop just might be issuing the invitation — and there's no way of knowing!' (Party Organizer p7)

So, in the SWP, based on mutual trust, you have no way of knowing whether the person standing next to you works for the Bureau of Narcotics... or, for that matter, the FBI.

Reassures

But just in case anyone in the SWP is starting to get worried, Seigle reassures them that Heisler 'was hemmed in'. (Party Organizer, p7)

'Forget the FBI for a moment, and consider what this episode reveals about the power of this party. The party is so strong that even an enemy right in the midst of the party, in the national office, on the national committee, couldn't affect the political course of the party.' (Party Organizer, p7)

Seigle attempts to dress up this declaration of complete political prostration before the capitalist state with yet another fatuous reference to the case of Roman Malinovsky, the spy who infiltrated the Bolshevik Party.

A complete distortion of the history of the Malinovsky case is dredged up again and

again to justify the established infiltration of more than 1,000 informers in the SWP over 20 years.

Seigle would be well advised to steer clear of history. It isn't one of his strong points. But it's high time that we dispose of these miserable attempts by the police-agents of today to distort the history of Bolshevism for the purpose of perpetuating their control of revisionist organisations.

A fine example of Lenin's attitude toward the struggle against police agents is to be found in his famous 'Letter to a Comrade on our Organisation Tasks'. He wrote:

'We must get the workers to understand that while the killing of spies, agents provocateurs, and traitors may sometimes, of course, be absolutely unavoidable, it is highly undesirable and mistaken to make a system of it, and that we must strive to create an organisation which will be able to render spies innocuous by exposing them and tracking them down.'

'It is impossible to do away with all spies, but to create an organisation which will ferret them out and educate the working-class masses is both possible and necessary.' (Collected Works, Volume 6, p245)

Significantly, there is one aspect of the Malinovsky case which is relevant to the Heisler case which Seigle chooses not to dwell on.

He mentions that through Malinovsky, 'names were turned over to the cops. Untold numbers of Bolsheviks were victimised. Many were killed as a result of his treachery.' (Party Organizer, p8)

But Seigle would have us assume that Heisler didn't go that far, that he was 'hemmed in'.

By whom? Far from being 'hemmed in', Heisler was systematically promoted into one leading position after another by agents occupying still more powerful offices in the SWP. There is not a politically honest member of the SWP who can avoid this conclusion.

What Seigle never does explain is why Heisler was nominated for one leading position after another. He does not mention one outstanding quality exhibited by Heisler:

Why, for instance, was he chosen to testify before the US Congress on behalf of the SWP against the nomination of George Bush as director of the CIA in 1975?

Even more damning is Seigle's failure to explain why Heisler was kept on the national committee at the last SWP convention at Oberlin in 1979. He even openly contradicts himself in describing Heisler's recent activities in the SWP.

At the start of his report, Seigle states: 'In Los Angeles, for the past year and a half, under the guise of one medical problem after another, he has been almost totally inactive, although he has been working at a plant organised by the steelworkers' union, where we have a fraction.' (Party Organizer, p3)

But toward the end of his report, Seigle gives another account: 'The first thing is that Heisler was politically a dead man as far as this party goes.'

As an agent-provocateur Heisler was used up. He wasn't a factor in the party, he carried no weight. Under

the guise of difficulties finding work and medical problems, he hadn't been active for most of the last two and a half years.' (Party Organizer, p9)

Why does one and a half years become two and a half years? And why was this 'dead man' re-elected to the national committee? Why didn't he come under political criticism at the last convention?

The answer is that the agents who placed him in the leadership of the SWP are still protecting him and, more important, the existing network of which he was a part.

At the centre of this network are the police agents recruited off the campus of Carleton College, one of whom is Larry Seigle. The others are Jack Barnes, Mary-Alice Waters, John Benson, Betsy Stone, Caroline Lund, Doug Jenness, Cindy Jaquith, Barbara Mattson, Paul Eidsvik, the late Dan Styron, and Peggy Brundy.

Only recently did we learn that Brundy attended Carleton. However, it explains why Brundy was selected to replace Mattson when the latter left the national committee, for reason left unexplained, last year.

To divert attention away from Heisler, the SWP members are planning to resuscitate their utterly fraudulent 'anti-FBI' suit that has been utilised for more than seven years as an elaborate cover for the agents inside the SWP.

The distinguishing feature of this suit is that it has not led to the exposure of a single FBI agent.

Diversion

In fact, the resignation of Heisler as a self-confessed FBI agent proves that this legal diversion has been supervised from its inception by the government. As Seigle's predecessor in the role of public spokesman on the lawsuit, Heisler proved that it exists principally to provide the agents with a diversion.

Now, they plan to make some use of the self-exposure of Heisler to get a bit more money from the government in a financial settlement of this bogus case.

Every charge made by the International Committee since it began its investigation into Security and the Fourth International has been proved.

The International Committee of the Fourth International and the Workers League will relentlessly pursue this investigation and publish its findings in every part of the world until the agents in the leadership of the SWP are driven out.

We call on all SWP members to face up to their revolutionary responsibilities by beginning a fight to organise all the principled comrades in your movement against the police agents in the leadership. Now is the time to take a stand for the working class and Trotskyism. The Workers League promises you every possible assistance in this struggle.

World Headlines...

Troops for Vanuatu

PORT MORESBY — Nearly 40 Papua New Guinea troops flew to Vanuatu and their commander said he expected casualties when they went into action to end a secessionist rebellion in the newly-independent South Pacific nation. The 37 soldiers were the first to leave Port Moresby since parliament decided to give military backing to the Vanuatu government, which is facing a rebellion on the island of Espiritu Santo. At the airport, defence force commander Ted Diro said: 'We plan for the worst.'

Gandhi film protest

NEW DELHI — Leading Indian film personalities have attacked a government decision to finance British actor Sir Richard Attenborough's proposed film on Mahatma Gandhi. A group of 23 actors, producers and scriptwriters said in a statement that the decision was 'totally unjustified'. The statement, issued by the Forum for Better Cinema, said such institutional finance was not available to Indian film makers.

Fascist declares alibi

NICE — A lawyer said that an Italian fascist, arrested in France after last Saturday's bomb explosion in Bologna which killed 79 people, could prove he was in Nice on the day of the blast. Dufaur de Cypres told reporters that the detained man, Marco Affatigato, could produce several independent witnesses to testify that he visited a money changer's office here on Saturday. Affatigato, 24, is fighting an attempt to extradite him to Italy.

Police defuse bomb

TORREMOLINOS — Police yesterday defused a 15-pound bomb in this Spanish resort, packed with tourists. Police sources said the bomb was found during the night near an exhibition hall following an anonymous phone call. No one claimed responsibility for planting the explosive. Basque separatists last month set off six bombs in Mediterranean resorts to seek the release of 19 colleagues.

Professor arresed

LIMA — Police have arrested a university professor and three of his pupils in connection with the murder of three West German students on the foothills of an Andean mountain a week ago. The four men were in possession of some money and clothes belonging to the Germans. The three were tied up, shot and then beheaded. A fourth German was shot in the head but survived the attack.

New Japan airport

TOKYO — The Japanese Transport Ministry said it planned to spend £13.4 billion over the next five years to help build an international airport on reclaimed land in Osaka Bay and improve existing airports. The plan, subject to Finance Ministry approval, includes \$4.4 billion for initial work on the new Osaka airport, which is expected to start in 1982 and be completed around the end of the decade.

Bank rates rising

NEW YORK — Chase Manhattan Bank has raised its prime rate, the interest charged to corporate customers, to 11 per cent from 10 1/2 per cent. Most major banks are charging 11 per cent. Chemical Bank, one of the few to have gone as low as 10 1/4, earlier this week also brought its prime rate back to 11 per cent.

ISRAEL'S SPY CHIEF ROW

TEL AVIV — The head of Israel's secret services yesterday dismissed allegations that he was resigning over government attempts to block investigation of the attack on Palestinian leaders in the occupied West Bank.

The 'Washington Star' said the secret service head, whose name is never published, had asked to be relieved of his post after Prime Minister Beigin blocked the investigation of car bombings that crippled two Palestinian mayors two months ago.

The US newspaper said investigators had established that among the attackers were leaders of the ultra-Zionist Gush Emunim (Faith Bloc) movement which has led the campaign for mass settlements in the West Bank.

'The report in the American newspaper is baseless,' the faceless secret services chief was quoted as saying. He said he had put in a request to be relieved before the attacks took place. He will step down by the end of this year when he will have

completed six years in office, he said.

The Mayor of Nablus, Bassam Al-Shaka, lost both legs in the attack while Ramallah Mayor Karim Khalef lost a foot when bombs exploded as they entered their cars.

The culprits have not been caught.

Beigin assigned the task to the secret services which are responsible for security in Israel and Arab territories under Israeli occupation.

The secret service, like the Mossad intelligence service which operates abroad, comes under the direct authority of the Prime Minister.

Charged

The Palestinian mayors have charged that the authorities were not doing enough to uncover their attackers. The mayors said they had not been questioned by the investigators once since the incident.

Arab countries have given a cool reception to Luxembourg Foreign Minister Gaston Thorn who is on a fact-finding mission in his capacity as president of the European parliament.

The official Syrian Press described his tour as 'an attempt to salvage the Camp David conspiracy'.

Syrian radio gave no details of the talks between Thorn and the Syrian leaders, but observers noted a distinct lack of enthusiasm on the part of the Syrians.

Although Syria's economic ties with Western Europe, in particular the Federal Republic of Germany, are close, Syria is suspicious of Europe's attempts to show that it can play a political role in the Middle East independent of the United States.

Journalist charged by Bolivian junta

LA PAZ — The Bolivian junta will put on trial an American woman journalist for allegedly 'libelling and defaming' the country's leaders.

Mary Helen Spooner, 29, a US citizen, was arrested at her hotel here during the night. A part-time correspondent for a number of radio stations and news publications in North America and Britain, she arrived in Bolivia recently from her base in Santiago, Chile, to

cover the aftermath of the July 17 military coup.

The Interior Minister, Colonel Luis Arze Gomez, told reporters that Miss Spooner had sent a story to London in 'flagrant violation of national and international laws' concerning the Press.

It said that President Luis Garcia Meza and other members of the armed forces were involved in drug trafficking and accused Colonel Arze Gomez of 'personal misconduct' during clashes between Bolivian miners and the army in 1967.

'There are foreign news correspondents who are abusing the facilities they have in Bolivia. They are transmitting tendentious news based on false information without any sources,' the colonel said.

Colonel Arze Gomez had earlier ordered the arrest of Reuters staff correspondent Rene Villegas and his part-time assistant Gerardo Irujo in the belief that one of them had written the offending article.

Yesterday he absolved them of responsibility and said that they could continue working.

But he warned them and other journalists working in Bolivia 'not to commit this kind of offence'.

Some ten Bolivian journalists who worked for international news agencies before the coup have since either been arrested or expelled from the country or have gone into hiding.

Last Saturday, Harold Olmos, head of the Associated Press office in La Paz, was escorted to the airport and ordered to leave his country. His passport was endorsed 'expelled'.

A number of foreign journalists who travelled to Bolivia to cover the coup have also been told to get out of the country.

Others have been picked up by police or military authorities and released after questioning.

Libya accuses Sadat

NEW YORK — The Sadat regime is a Trojan Horse masking a plan for United States aggression against the Libyan Jamahiriya.

This is the main accusation in a Libyan statement issued as a UN Security Council document.

The Foreign Ministry



SADAT

statement said the stockpiling of US arms and the massing of American aircraft in Egypt were a step towards aggression against Libya.

It asked the council to act to end 'this aggression before it is too late'.

The statement said that the Egyptian regime, as a Trojan Horse, was massing brigades along the Libyan border, 'planned for and supported, financed, and encouraged by the United States of America'.

US aircraft have recently been conducting joint exercises with the Egyptian Air Force and since the Iran and Afghan crises, Egypt has provided some military facilities for US forces.

Polish strikes hit textiles

WARSAW — Poland's unprecedented strike wave is entering its sixth week and has now spread to the key textile industry.

In the major textile producing city of Lodz 10,000 workers are on strike in one of the city's biggest cotton plants.

Weavers in a textile plant in Kalisz, western Poland, also struck on Monday to demand higher pay but returned to work when management promised to consider their grievances.

According to the Self-Defence Committee (KOR), 20,000 workers at a big helicopter factory in south-eastern Poland staged their second strike in a month on Thursday to press wage demands.

The strike, at Swidnik, came after management failed to fulfil promises of 15-per-cent wage rises and refused to pay for days lost during an earlier strike in July.

The new dispute was resolved the same day after management agreed unconditionally to the full wage settlement and also paid for the striking days.

There have also been strikes in the crucial Baltic shipyards and ports.

Over the weekend workers in Gdansk and Gdynia struck for higher pay and garbage piled up in Warsaw yesterday as a strike by the city's 1,000 dustmen entered its fourth day.

The dustmen are demanding new union elections, pledges that they will face no reprisals for their strike, strike pay, increased wages, danger money and extra supplies of meat.

The Self-Defence Committee also reports that railwaymen who led a strike that almost paralysed the city of Lublin last month have started electing union representatives under new rules that could set a precedent for other unions.

Under the usual rules, more than three quarters of the candidates for union office are nominated by outgoing officers.

The Lublin workers are nominating a higher proportion of their own candidates this time. The results of the election will not be known for some days.

The widespread nature of the strikes has thrown the Stalinist bureaucracy into crisis and Prime Minister Edward Gierk has been summoned to Moscow.

On Monday the Communist Party newspaper 'Trybuna Ludu' made a rare confession of official failing and bureaucratic inefficiency.

A whole range of problems was listed in the paper, ranging from rising prices to the unfair distribution of wealth. The paper criticised excessive and inefficient bureaucracy, bribery and inadequate stocks in the shops.

In an interview this week Jacek Kuron, the co-founder of the KOR, said: 'The government authorities are terribly weak now.'

VILLAGERS FACE DEATH SENTENCE

ADANA, Turkey — A military court yesterday condemned to death 22 residents of a small town in southern Turkey for their part in the riots there in December, 1978.

Thousands of Turkish elite Blue Beret army commandos, in camouflage uniforms and heavily armed, patrolled the streets of Kahramanmaraş as a total of 800 defendants were sentenced.

The tribunal handed down 14 other death sentences but commuted them to life imprisonment or 20-year terms.

Another 350 residents of the town were given jail sentences averaging six years, while 400 others were acquitted.

One hundred and eleven people died in three days in the riots which broke out when a local cinema was bombed while showing a left-wing film.

Military law was immediately declared in major cities and provinces and is

still in force in half the country.

At one stage of the rioting, fascist mobs were reported to have seized two districts of Kahramanmaraş.

The indictment accuses a small group of right-wing extremists of the initial cinema bombing, in a deliberate attempt to provoke Sunni Moslems against Alevi Moslems.

It alleges that rightists exhorted citizens to 'Kill the Communists.' Such slogans were shouted from the mosques by right-wing Moslem

priests, according to the indictment.

Many of the defendants, who are mostly right-wing Sunnis, are illiterate. Six fascist youth, all of whom faced the death penalty, frequently disrupted the court.

Since the riots about 3,500 people have died in Turkey in political violence, most of them at the hands of fascist gangs such as the Grey Wolves.

The Turkish economy is in complete crisis, with massive inflation, unemployment and a crushing foreign debt.

'Jerusalem Day' in Tehran

TEHRAN — Over a million Iranians, many of them black-veiled women, gathered in central Tehran yesterday in a massive demonstration of support for the Palestinian cause.

With shouts of 'Allah-O-Akbar' ('God is great'), they approved a resolution attacking Israel for making Jerusalem its capital and calling on the national parliament to study ways to help the Palestinians.

The day was observed as 'Jerusalem Day' throughout Iran in response to a call from Ayatollah Khomeini.

Thousands of troops in uniform joined the main prayers at Tehran university and heard a string of speakers vilify Israel as an enemy of all Moslems.

Budget

Jalaleddin Farsi, one of the candidates to become Iran's new Prime Minister, said the government of President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr should budget money to help the Palestinian movement.

The resolution approved

by the meeting said Iran should also aid Islamic movements in the Philippines, Afghanistan and Eritrea, and American blacks.

Sri Lanka — sacked workers on the rampage

COLOMBO — Thousands of Sri Lankan workers, sacked for taking part in the general strike which began on July 18, yesterday swept through the centre of Colombo wrecking cars, buses, shops and offices.

Injured

Police said the crowd was led by some opposition politicians and claimed that Mahendra Wijeratne, a government MP, was beaten and severely injured as he arrived at Parliament.

They said that cars and buses in the city centre were stoned and the passengers pulled out and beaten.

Police said later the situation in the city centre was under control but there were sporadic outbursts of violence in other areas.

The general strike led to

the sacking of 40,000 state employees and several thousand workers in the private sector.

The government declared a state of emergency before the strike and banned stoppages in essential industries. It also called up demobilised troops and imposed Press censorship which remains in operation.

A Cabinet meeting on Wednesday decided that all workers who stayed away without valid reason on July 18 had lost their jobs.

Detained

● The leader of the reformist Lanka Sama Samaja Party, ex-Cabinet Minister Colvin de Silva, has been detained following yesterday's riot in Colombo. About 100 people were injured as armoured trucks and troops were sent into the city centre and police made baton charges.

Ford to lay off 6,000

BONN — The announcement that the Ford car company is to lay off 6,000 workers in West Germany is a new sign of the deepening crisis in the West German car industry.

Ford Werke AG said the lay-offs were at its two plants in the Cologne area were essential because sales of its family cars fell by up to 50 per cent in the first six months of this year.

The announcement followed similar moves by Adam Opel AG, owned by the US General Motors Corporation, which began a volun-

tary redundancy scheme for 5,900 workers in June.

The lay-offs will affect one worker in five at Ford's Cologne-Niehl and Dueren plants, where short-time working was previously in force on all production lines.

A Ford spokesman said that even these massive redundancies might not be enough to prevent further short-time working.

The job cuts are a serious blow to the populous industrial state of North Rhine-Westphalia, which already has a 4.9 per cent jobless rate

— well above the national average of 3.7 per cent.

There was more bad news for West German industry yesterday with the latest government figures showing industrial orders fell 2.5 per cent in June, the last month for which statistics are available.

The Economics Ministry said the June figures were part of a more general downturn in industrial activity and reflected a sharp fall in domestic demand. Orders from abroad fell less sharply, it said.

Underground a new sewerage system is to be undertaken. Over the wide river Tigris, new bridges are planned. Old roads are being renewed with modern traffic systems and elsewhere new ones are being laid.

There are high-rise flats, spacious suburban homes, hotels, highways on stilts, government offices and buildings to administer expanding state-controlled enterprises.

Outside Baghdad are factory developments and industrial complexes.

The task of reconstructing Baghdad and bringing Iraq into an age of high technology and developed industry is immense. It is a task which the Iraqi government, the Revolution Command Council and the people are facing with growing confidence.

They know that their task is essential if the oil wealth of the nation — the Arab nation — is not to be squandered or plundered for the gain of individuals.

Using their oil revenues, the Iraqis have embarked on a huge undertaking — their 'great march forward'. The pace is set by the determined leadership of the Arab Ba'ath Socialist Party.

Workers skilled in modern techniques of construction are in short supply. Much of what is lacking is imported. What is unknown has to be learned.

The process of reconstruction is a struggle. There are many problems and progress is not as rapid as the Party and government hoped for in some instances.

Building is under way at all levels. In one area Japanese engineers use the most modern techniques on major projects. In another area this is complemented by the efforts of 40,000 city youth who are helping to construct homes in the countryside for farm workers.

Some 4,000 of them each week, for a ten-week period, volunteer to attend special youth camps where they

take on this task as part of a training programme.

Mention new buildings in Baghdad and people are quick to point the stranger to three examples in particular — the conference centre for the gathering of heads of non-aligned nations in 1982, and two nearby hotels, the Sheraton-Ishtar and the Meriden-Palestine.

Surprisingly, people are less likely to refer you to the new National Theatre building, the headquarters of the federation of trade unions or the Opera House, all of which are under construction, providing solid proof of the struggle for a new life in Iraq.

The new construction, either to meet long-standing needs, or to cater for future requirements of an advanced society, is one part of Iraq's rapid development.

To boost living standards the government announced on the eve of the July 17 Revolution celebrations that there would be immediate and substantial wage in-

The celebrations last month which marked the 12th anniversary of the Iraqi July 17 Revolution provided a valuable opportunity to assess the achievements of the Iraqi people under the leadership of the Arab Ba'ath Socialist Party. Alan Bott, recently returned from Baghdad, has filed six reports covering

creases for all workers, soldiers and state employees.

Deputy Prime Minister Taha Yassin Ramadhan, who announced the rises on TV and radio, said they would add nearly £1 billion to the current year's budget and give average wage rates for most workers five times higher than they were before the 1968 revolution — and prices are strictly controlled.

The increases announced also affect pensions, overtime rates and welfare benefits. The government also increased the limit on interest-free home loans.

These and other decisions by the Arab Ba'ath Socialist

Party and the Revolution Command Council came only a few days after the passing of a new welfare law which aims to ensure security for every citizen.

It seeks to ensure that the young are educated and trained, that workers have jobs and homes and the old have the dignity of an adequate pension.

Health facilities are provided to the extent that the state will send sick people to any part of the world where they can receive treatment not yet available in Iraq — completely free of charge.

The welfare of physically and mentally handicapped people is legislated for and the provision of special centres for them ensured.

the social and economic development, cultural life, — from art to archeology — the new role of youth and the political struggle of the Arab Ba'ath Socialist Party and Iraqi President Saddam Hussein to use the natural wealth of the country to improve all aspects of life of the Iraqi people

Moves towards building a welfare state will help promote the independent role of women in Iraqi society.

The political report to the Eighth Congress of the ABSP stressed that the problem of cultural, social and economic backwardness of Arab women was 'one of the hazardous impediments' of the Arab renaissance.

The General Federation of Iraqi Women is active in the struggle against this problem and special facilities for the organisation were among a list of new building projects announced during the Revolution celebrations.

It would take a special article to describe the range

of development in education, but a measure of the achievements of the Revolution is the fact that the number of students at university level in Iraq increased by 122 per cent between 1968-1979. Numbers at technical institutions increased by more than 300 per cent.

All basic and higher education is completely free and there are many opportunities available.

Another important area of development for Iraq is agriculture. Minister of Agriculture and Agrarian Reform, Amer Mehdi Saleh explained:

'The Revolution has actively implemented agrarian reform measures which have covered hundreds of

thousands of families in the agricultural sector.

'Co-operatives have provided extensive services to peasant families, besides the indirect benefits realised through agricultural credit extension by specialised banks and institutions all over the country.'

Mechanisation, irrigation, use of fertilisers and desalination of salty soil have been important projects for the government.

Saleh went on: 'The post-revolution period has also witnessed the completion of a large number of infrastructures in the agricultural sector: roads have been built, electricity and water supplied, silos constructed, schools, hospitals and co-operatives provided and social security funds opened.'

'Our planning in this important sector proceeds from our particular experience in socialist reconstruction, which confirms the elimination of all forms of ex-

ploitation, thus discrediting anything which would impede socialist reconstruction.'

President Saddam Hussein was ready to admit recently that the best hopes of the leadership for industrial expansion had not been realised because of a number of difficulties. Nevertheless, he stressed, the results of the last national plan period were good.

He is making good use of trade agreements with the Soviet Union to basically equip some engineering factories and train essential craftsmen and women.

In one machine shop I visited, there were rows and rows of lathes, drills and grinders, heavy stamping and other equipment entirely from the Soviet Union or Eastern European countries. There was just one Japanese machine on trial.

Many of the skilled workers originate from other Arab states and some are from Europe. It is the young workers of the new Iraq who are training to join them.

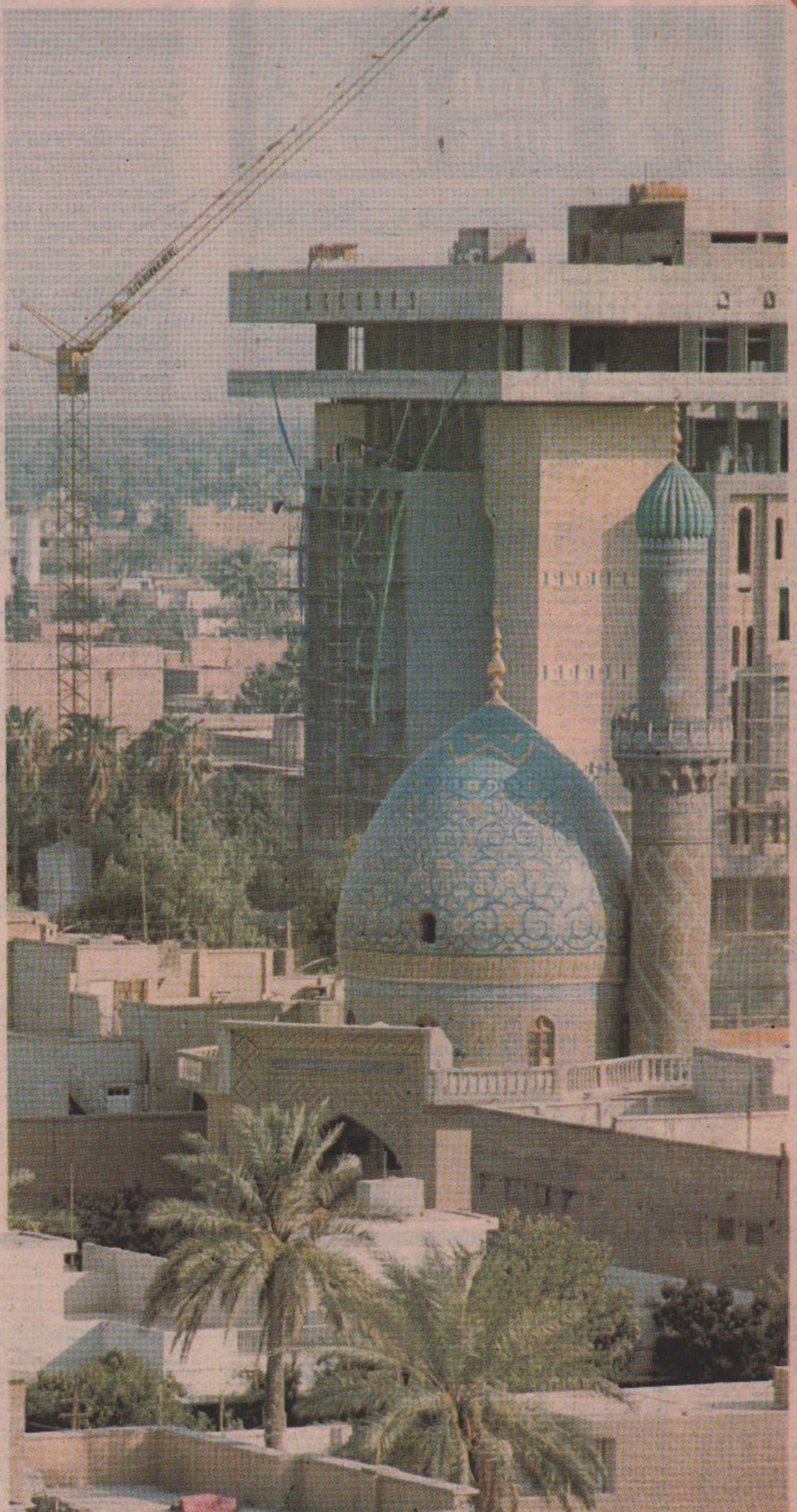
The skilled industrial workforce in Britain for instance has developed through generations of workers, because Britain was the first capitalist country in the world and therefore created the first working class through the Industrial Revolution. Such a workforce cannot be created immediately in Iraq and in the last ten years — in which oil money has been turned to social reconstruction — this process has only just begun. It has nevertheless begun with revolutionary confidence.

The numbers employed in industry in Iraq have more than doubled since the 1968 Revolution and because of the surge in construction work the numbers employed in this sector have shot up to almost double the 1968 figure.

In a Baghdad hotel bar, three British engineers were killing time while off duty from contract work. They cynically joked of Iraq's development, that there was little point in importing colour TV sets for people who don't have electricity supplies.

Their very presence in Iraq gave the lie to their distorted characterisation of development in this country and it was not long before the conversation turned to the fact that their companies back in Britain were all on the slippery slope of slump and threatening major closures.

What would they do if their firms went bust? 'Well', they agreed, 'there's plenty of work out here for engineers.'

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Steelmen's diaries

DAY 216

NEWS LINE continues the diaries of steelworkers from all parts of Britain, who gave their views day by day right through their recent 13-week strike. As the struggle continues against the Tory attack on their jobs and living standards, they trace its progress through their own experience.

SCOTLAND

TRADE UNIONS were never meant for this. The steel corporation is moving around the country, closing down plant after plant, and there's no united opposition to it.

It's become a competition. Steel plants in South Wales are doing all they can to see that they retain work, and Scotland and other parts of the country are doing the same. One setting out to prove they're more deserving than the other.

The Tolpuddle Martyre would turn in their graves if they saw what's going on. Consett is next for the chop. But the only channel of

communication we've got for knowing what's going on here is News Line. That's the only way we find out the things going on in Consett and so on.

When you hear that Pat Shevlin, the ISTC convenor of Clydesdale works has been sacked on the spot, and his appeals rejected, it makes you ask whether all the strike leaders are going to get the same treatment.

It's a mistake to think, as some do, that the more cuts down south there are, the safer Scotland is. As one of the Clydesdale shop stewards said, if they can throw out Shevlin, they can throw anyone out.

WALES

BWELL, we are going on short-time working in Llanwern. We don't know any details as yet, but there are going to be a series of meetings throughout the works next week.

Management are saying that the order book is collapsing, but they are so devious I would not be surprised if this wasn't just an excuse after the slim-line. As far as I'm concerned I am going to resist it. After the painful experience of the slim-line, there is no way they are going to get away with what I believe is a deliberate move by BSC.

There are a whole number of plants in the region now on short-time, including Whiteheads, Ebbw Vale, Trostre and Velindre. And it hasn't come out-of-the-blue for me at Llanwern. But how severe it is going to be and how long it is going to last I just don't know. We don't know what type of scheme the BSC intend to operate at the plant. The most common one being used up and down the

country seems to be the one where you work four days on full pay and then get 75 per cent for the fifth day.

It's getting worse, the slump is visibly hitting the centre of Newport. Shops are holding their January sales now because there is no business. People are not buying things because they just don't have any money.

It's all right for the Tories to go on about holding down wages and telling the unemployed to move to find work. People like Joseph and Prior have got two houses — they are used to good living.

It's about time the TUC walked forward instead of backwards, they should give up this milk and water approach to the government. It's time we started walking towards the Tories. For starters the TUC could at least call a lobby of parliament.

ENGLAND

I'VE JUST heard about this injunction that BSC has got against the 'Sunday Times' and it's really got me hot under the collar. It's terrible — they're just slapping injunctions on everything now. It's a public owned corporation and the public has the right to know.

It's a very serious thing and they'll suppress every bit of freedom of speech if they can. The question comes up: if they are going to these lengths to stop the 'moles' then what have they got to hide? There's a planned campaign to hide the truth and it makes you wonder what's going on when it's so easy to get an injunction.

The Granada programme created a lot of sympathy for the strike and apparently the

second programme, which was not shown because of another injunction, was even more dynamic.

Things are in a bit of a limbo here at present because it's the first week after the break and we're just waiting to see what is going to happen on short-time working. They've applied for the 75 per cent and they say that it will be either 75 per cent or the 80 per cent, but talk's cheap.

September 14 is the date that's been picked for short-time working for some reason, and although things are very quiet around this area with holidays it's all starting to boil up and I think we'll see some developments when the month is out.

But both Shield sides have different goals

LIVERPOOL and England defender Phil Neal wants today's Charity Shield match at Wembley between West Ham United and Liverpool to be the greatest ever curtain-raiser to a new season.

'We have got to prove to the fans that England's bad showing in this year's European Championship was not an indictment of the game as a whole in this country,' Neal told News Line.

'A game of goals, thrills and attractive football will go some way to eradicating the bad memory of Italy in June. I know that we at Liverpool will be out to put a real show on, just like last season against Arsenal.'

'I'm sure that West Ham United will do the same thing. They are a team that play football first, and look for results after. They, at any time for me, are a great advertisement for the game.'

Neal sees today's game as a way to let the rest of the First Division know that Liverpool will be going into the eighties just as strong as they came out of the seventies. He feels that today's Liverpool are as strong as ever.

'We are as good a team now as we have always been. Liverpool are in no mood to give anybody a chance to win anything this year. That FA Cup semi-final defeat by Arsenal last season left a very sour taste in our mouths.'

'We want to do the double this season. It's the only thing left for Liverpool to do. No, not the double, the treble. We want the European Cup back, retain our League Championship and win the Cup. We haven't won the last one for a couple of seasons.'

But West Ham are quite confident that they can put a

dampener on Liverpool's hopes — just like they did to Arsenal at the same venue last May.

Then it seemed that the famous Gunners just had to turn up at Wembley to take the FA Cup back to North London. But West Ham came to Wembley better prepared and outwitted Arsenal in every department.

Tactics

Now it would seem that the Hammers are employing the same tactics again. The players have prepared for the match, they know what they have to do today and they intend to make the League champions fight every step of the way.

Paul Allen, still a week short of his 18th birthday and with an FA Cup winners medal on his mum's sideboard, is looking forward to another 'day out' at Wembley.

'The boss won't pick the team until near the match

because we have a few injuries, but I'm looking forward to another great day out at Wembley,' he said yesterday.

'If I do play it will be great to come up against such professionals as Ray Kennedy, Terry McDermott, Kenny Dalglish and Graeme Souness. I can learn a lot from them just by playing against them.'

But Allen was quick to point out that it was promotion to the First Division that the Hammers were after this season. Nothing short of that would satisfy the players or their manager John Lyall.

Allen said: 'We've had a very good preparation for the new season. We're still a little rusty after the long lay-off, but mentally we couldn't be in a better state. Saturday's game will wind up our preparations for the long League programme.'

'This year we don't intend to slip up. It's happened for the last two seasons when we ran out of steam over the last few hurdles. This time we

are out to make sure that doesn't happen.'

Like Allen, his midfield team mate Alan Devonshire also had his best year last season. He matured into one of the best midfielders in the country and gained his first England senior cap against Northern Ireland in the Home Championship.

He's been worried by a recurring hip injury recently, but he said that he would love to play at Wembley on Saturday if he was picked.

'It's a great place to play. Wembley brings the best out of you as a player if you can

get over the initial nerves quickly.'

'But like winning the FA Cup last May, a victory over Liverpool on Saturday won't really count for anything if we don't get promotion this season.'

'People who say that a win over Liverpool will make the rest of the Second Division sit up and worry about us this season is a load of rubbish.'

'If that was the case why didn't Sunderland surrender their promotion place to us after we had beaten Arsenal

at Wembley in the Cup Final?'

'We will obviously be going out to win this Saturday, but winning promotion next April, or even earlier, would be a lot, lot sweeter in the long run.'

SHATTERED

ANY lingering hopes England had of levelling the series disappeared yesterday afternoon when they once more failed to cope with the West Indies pace bowling.

They were shot out for 143 — their lowest total of the series — on a pitch made lively by the 42 hours of continuous rain that only stopped in Leeds just before dawn.

Only Ian Botham and David Bairstow offered any real resistance to a West Indies side short of Andy Roberts but still fielding four pacemen despite their injury scares.

England have generally been outplayed throughout the series, and only uncertain weather has kept them alive this summer.

Viv Richards, leading the West Indies in a Test for the first, but not the last, time in the absence of the injured Clive Lloyd, won the toss.

And he had no hesitation in putting England in, confident that on a pitch that was bound to offer something to his bowlers, the home side would soon be in trouble.

He was proved right too quickly for the Headingley crowd, who had waited patiently for play to start at 2.45p.m. and no doubt anticipated a fine innings from Geoff Boycott.

But the local idol, probably playing his last Test on his home ground, had problems from the start with the bounce and pace of Michael Holding.

The fastest of the West Indians made the ball zip past Boycott's nose more than once before he pitched one up and a frustrated Boycott mis-timed his shot to give Alvin Kallicharran a

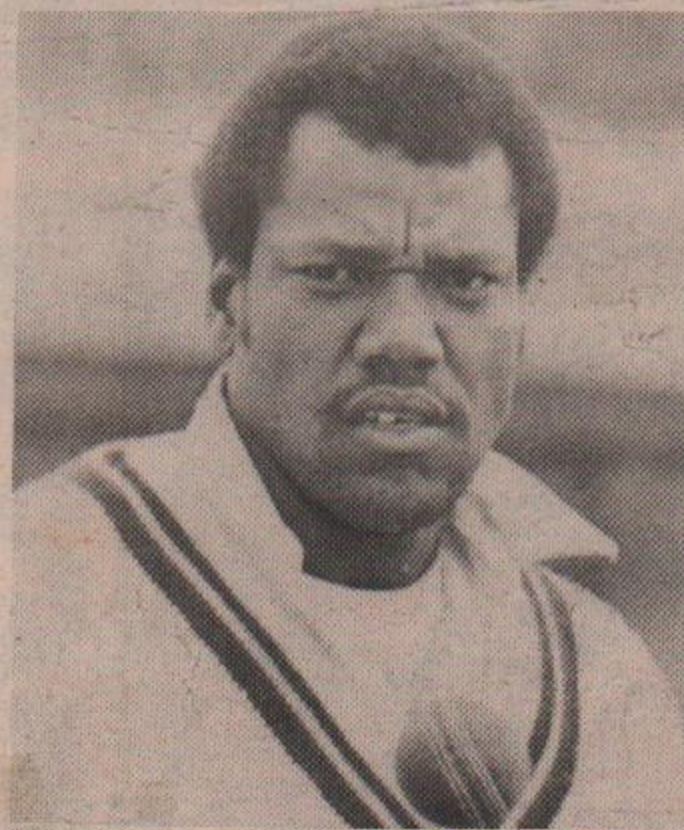

The other two, Billy McNeill of Celtic and John Greig of Rangers, are determined that the Old Firm are not finished yet.

Ferguson's view is that his job at Pittodrie, where the championship flag flies for the first time in a quarter of a century, has only just begun.

Determined

He is ambitious, one of the new breed determined to break the Old Firm's stranglehold on Scottish football.

And he knows that one championship is not enough.

Dons begin their title defence at St Mirren, where manager Jim Clunie is also determined to build on Aberdeen's success and take the glory out of Glasgow.

But the old, old story of Scottish football could be what wrecks the dreams of both Clunie and Ferguson.

For Aberdeen go into the new season without last season's top scorer, Steve Archibald, while Saints are more or less resigned to losing Scottish international left-back Iain Munro.

Scotland's provincial club's have a lot more money — and ambition to go with it — than they used to have. But where's the talent to spend it on?

Admittedly, there are men like Gordon Strachan around. And last season's Footballer of the Year, now a Scotland regular, mercifully decided there was no place like home even though the bright southern lights were glittering.

So did Celtic's Davie Provan and Tommy Burns, the midfield man Arsenal saw as the replacement for Liam Brady.

New cap

Rangers' Ally Dawson, John MacDonald and Bobby Russell, St Mirren's new cap Peter Weir and Aberdeen's Alex McLeish also have fine futures.

But where are the budding stars? Well, there are not that many, but most of them are looking for a chance to break into the first team — at Ibrox and Parkhead.

That's why, although any neutral would have to hope that Aberdeen, St Mirren, Dundee United or someone will continue to give the Old Firm a hard time, this particular footballing pessimist is expecting to see the flag back in Glasgow next May.

Which end of the city will it be flying in? Ask me that one in nine months' time!

Intikhab boosts Surrey's hopes

FORMER Pakistan captain and test spinner Intikhab Alam bowled Surrey to a very important victory at The Oval yesterday.
