PM blames immigrants for unemployment

THATCHER'S RACIST PLOY

PRIME Minister Thatcher has begun to play the anti-immigrant card in an attempt to quell increasing unrest within the Tory Party.

Addressing Scottish Tories in Perth yesterday she implied that immigrants were responsible for unemployment, and that Labour stood for more immigration.

She said: 'Labour say they will scrap our immigration laws. Hardly a way to reduce unemployment!'

It was a sinister echo of her remarks during the 1979 general election when she claimed Britain was in danger of being 'swamped' by people of alien culture.

Labour's home affairs spokesman Alf Dubs last night accused Thatcher of trying to build up hysteria because she is losing public support. He said her remarks were 'absolute codswallop'.

The Scottish Tories are up in arms about big rate rises. The government has had to promise £40 million in emergency aid for business ratepayers, on top of £50 million already promised for householders.

Problems

At the same time, she is facing increasing problems within the parliamentary Tory Party. Three-quarters of her backbench MPs are said to consider the government's policy presentation is 'appallingly inept'.

These problems reflect the mounting economic crisis which is most clearly shown by the inexorable growth of mass unemployment.

Thatcher has repeatedly made it clear that her government will not change course. Behind the scenes she is under increasing pressure to play the racist card.

Dubs said: 'I reject entirely the government's view that immigration is responsible for unemployment.'

'Unemployment is to do with this government's economic policies. The whole country suffers from them, black and white.'

Dubs said Labour is com-

mitted to changing the immigration laws to enable families to come together, particularly husbands, wives, children and elderly dependents who are separated by the current immigration Act.

The Labour Party's official policy is to maintain the reactionary restrictions on immigration.

Dubs said: 'It is not a commitment to open the doors to unrestricted immigration. She is talking absolute codswallop.'

Thatcher's remarks were immediately condemned by representatives of immigrant groups. Hardev Dhesi, senior vice-president of the Indian Workers' Association, said:

'Immigration laws have been passed and applied vigorously by both parties and yet unemployment has continued to increase. Unemployment has nothing to do with immigrants. It is the economic system that is responsible.'

Dhesi added: 'This is the new racism. They pose as not being racists but in real fact this comes to racism. They are trying to isolate and blame one section for all the ills. They are seeking scapegoats.'

Arif Ali, editor-in-chief of the 'Caribbean Times', commented: 'I sincerely hope that Mrs Thatcher is not going to repeat her 1979 swamping statement or take the black community in this country and make them scapegoats, because that is exactly what happened in Germany in the 1930s.'

Labour MP Eric Heffer said: 'This helps the most reactionary forces in Britain who wrongly argue that unemployment is due to the blacks and immigrants who should not be here. It has to be fought all the way.'

SACK THREAT STILL HANGS OVER GCHQ

UNION leaders representing nine GCHQ civil servants threatened with the sack said yesterday that the government had not lifted its plans to dismiss the nine members.

After a meeting on Thursday night with Cabinet Secretary Sir Robert Armstrong, the unions said the

government had not changed its position.

All civil service unions have promised industrial action if a single member of any union is dismissed from the eavesdropping base. The TUC has pledged a national Day of Action if the government goes ahead with its threat.

In the meantime, the unions have submitted an appeal against the ban on trade unions at GCHQ with the European Commission on Human Rights. The unions say that the ban is an unjustifiable restriction on the right of their members to join a trade union of their choice.

In Geneva, the International Labour Organisation has urged the British government to withdraw the ban on trade unions at GCHQ, although the statement indicates that the ILO would sanction a no-strike agreement favoured by the TUC right-wing and the Labour Party.

In a new report, the ILO

committee supervising violations of international labour law urges the British government to 'reach an agreement which would ensure not only the government's wish as regards continuity of operations at GCHQ but also its full application of the freedom of association conventions which it has ratified'.

Liverpool twins with Nicaraguan town

A DELEGATION of Nicaraguans from the sea port of Corinto were at Liverpool town hall yesterday afternoon for a reception to mark the twinning of the two towns.

The leader of the city council John Hamilton presented them with a formal document to officially mark the occasion.

Present were city councillors, Liverpool MPs and representatives of the Liverpool-Corinto Direct Links Campaign.

Last night the Nicaraguans performed songs at the David Gareth Jones Memorial Theatre at the Merseyside Trade Union Resource Centre.

SELL-OFF SCANDAL Fraud probe in BT shares

MULTIPLE applications for British Telecom shares are being investigated by Scotland Yard's fraud squad.

The move follows concern in the Department of Trade and Industry that some people tried to break the share issue rules to cash in on BT's privatisation.

It is understood the inquiry will centre on ap-

plications made by about ten groups. The BT prospectus for the state sell-off last year stipulated one application per person.

Kleinwort Benson, the merchant bank handling the share issue, and the accounting firm Peat Marwick Mitchell, suspected fraud. False names were used on some application forms.

RUSH FOR AEROSPACE

BRITISH AEROSPACE shares powered up 10p to 418p yesterday side by side with a last-minute scramble for a slice of the £550 million stake being sold by the government.

Within an hour of the offer closing at just after 10a.m., the merchant bankers handling the largest stock market offering since British Telecom were reporting a sell-out.

With only a quarter of the 147 million shares from the sale of the government 48½ per cent stake and the £50 million worth new shares from

the company available to the public, early indications were that the offer could be several times over-subscribed. Details of the allocation of shares are to be announced on Monday.

The remaining 76 per cent of shares have already been sold to institutions, or offered to British Aerospace staff and existing shareholders.

The overall sale will net the government about £363 million while the company itself will make £178 million.

Rolls chief invites quick privatisation

ROLLS-ROYCE, the state-owned Aero-engine manufacturer, should be privatised as soon as possible, according to its chairman, Sir Francis Tombs.

The government wants to sell off Rolls-Royce before the next election and Tombs said that aim was part of his appointment as chairman three months ago.

The past 14 years of state control had limited the company's freedom and delayed important decisions, he claimed in Rolls-Royce's staff newspaper, published yesterday.

Rolls-Royce returned to the black last year with a pre-tax profit of £26 million against the previous year's £114 million loss.

Eritreans evicted

THE ETHIOPIAN government has evicted 6,000 Eritreans from a camp in the east of the country, the Minister for Overseas Development, Timothy Raison, was told yesterday.

In an urgent message to Raison, the Eritrean Relief Committee urged the government to reconsider its refusal to provide aid relief to the stricken people who are also fighting a national liberation war against Addis Ababa.

The ERC said the incident at Wad el-Hilew camp was a 'tragic example of the need for Western aid to be channelled directly to the Eritrean people'.

Eritreans were suffering under a blockade on food relief to liberated regions of Eritrea, the ERC said.

It accused major relief agencies of complying with Addis Ababa's use of 'food aid as a political weapon'.

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Chinese back rights of PLO

PEKING — Chinese Premier Zhao Ziyang last night attacked the Israeli regime and its supporters for acting as obstacles to a Middle East peace settlement.

Zhao made the attack during a banquet in honour of visiting Palestine Liberation Organisation chairman Yassir Arafat. He said during his speech at the welcoming banquet that Israel and its supporters had consistently refused to recognise the rights of the Palestinian people.

'The Israeli authorities and their supporters still refuse to recognise the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people, refuse to recognise the PLO and refuse to hand back the Arab lands they are occupying,' Zhao said.

'Their mistaken stand is the greatest obstacle to a peaceful settlement of the Middle East problem. Only when they change this position can the Middle East move towards peace.'

Zhao had endorsed a Jordanian-Palestinian delegation's proposal to convene an international conference on the Middle East at a meeting with Arafat and Jordan's Deputy Prime Minister, Abdul-Wahab al-Majali.

The speech and comments at the morning meeting, reported by the official New China News Agency, were the strongest attacks by the Peking bureaucracy on the Zionist regime.

It constituted the strongest implied criticism of the Israeli regime's chief sponsor, the United States, with whom Peking enjoys new-found diplomatic warmth. Zhao did not name the US.

In his reply, Arafat warned that the 'US ought to realise the era is irrevocably past of not recognising the inherent rights of the Palestinian people, especially their right of self-determination'.

Zhao had told the joint delegation that Peking backed what NCNA described as a fair and reasonable Middle East settlement.

He praised the 'action programme', saying it would give a fresh impetus towards a solution of the Middle East 'dispute'.

Arafat arrived in Peking on Thursday and was warmly embraced by Foreign Minister Wu Xueqian. Yesterday, he greeted Zhao

in similar fashion in the Great Hall of the People.

The visit is aimed at lobbying the five permanent members of the United Nations Security Council in support of an international conference on Palestine.

The other four are the US, the Soviet Union, Britain and France.

US Secretary of State George Shultz was in Tel Aviv yesterday on a brief mission to assess the Middle East peace process.

HOURS THREAT TO SHOP JOBS

UP TO 200,000 jobs could be destroyed and wage rates would be driven down if trading hours are extended, the shopworkers' union warned yesterday.

In a statement condemning the abolition of the Shops Act, the Union of Shop, Distributive and Allied Workers (USDAW) said the family life of staff — mainly married women and working mothers — would be ruined if they were forced to work most Sundays.

Tens of thousands of full-time jobs were likely to disappear if fewer weekday shop workers were needed as a result of trade being transferred to Sunday, and casual labour was taken on instead on Sundays.

Retail costs would rise with only the same amount of business being done over seven days as was now being done on six, with attempts being made to cut shopworkers' wages.

'If the government also abolishes Wages Councils, employers will no longer have to pay double time for Sunday work so there will be little financial benefit for anyone working Sundays in a shop,' said the USDAW statement.

The 400,000-strong union believed there was no natural majority in the Commons for abolishing as opposed to reforming the Shops Act.

USDAW said it would intensify its campaign over the next few months to retain regulation of shopping hours by law.

General secretary Bill Whatley said: 'We believe there are many people in and out of the retail trade who don't want Sunday to become just another busy shopping day.'

'Prices would go up in the shops unless the full burden falls on shopworkers in the form of wage cuts.'

'Pensioners and young mothers will also lose out as corner shops close down as a result of big stores opening on Sundays and taking their trade.'

Bus engineers' strike threat

LONDON'S 2,500 bus maintenance staff will strike from May 22 if management attempt to impose a new job recording system and speed-up.

A conference of delegates from every garage in London yesterday ratified a branch-by-branch vote which rejected the new recording scheme with a clear majority.

Delegates at yesterday's conference argued that the management's proposals would not lead to higher engineering standards as they had claimed, but only lead to extra work, job and manpower cuts and speed-up.

Earlier in the week, the new London Transport management informed un-

ion representatives for the T&G WU maintenance workers that they intend to impose the job recording schemes on May 22.

But the delegate conference yesterday agreed that if any member were disciplined for refusing job recording, all LT bus garage maintenance staff would walk out.

The maintenance staff are expected to appeal to the conductors and drivers to give support.

Many of the workers are expecting a bitter struggle ahead.

Euro-Stalinists accused of delegate vote-rigging

WITH a week to go before the showdown between the two wings of British Stalinism, the 'hardliners' have accused the 'Euros' of vote rigging.

Members of the Communist Party, those who still take the 'Morning Star' that is, picked up the paper yesterday to read: 'Shock report exposes CP vote rigging'.

It felt to expelled London member Monty Goldman to expose 'the full extent of the gerrymandering undertaken by the executive committee' in a bid to manipulate next weekend's special congress.

Both sides have plenty of members with experience of this kind of affair, so Goldman presumably knows what he is talking about when he accuses the Euro-led executive of 'dishonest (!) vote-rigging'.

What is at stake is the representation at the emergency congress, called to endorse the anti-Soviet 'Marxism Today' line and prepare for expulsions of the Moscow 'hardliners' grouped around the 'Morning Star'.

It is clear that the executive committee majority expects to win hands down. A press statement from the Communist Party this

week stated that it expected an 'overwhelming vote of confidence' in the present policies and leadership.

Since January leading members of the CP have been expelled, with the most prominent being 'Morning Star' editor Tony Chater who organised the hijacking of the paper from party control.

A large slice of the London leadership is either expelled or suspended following a refusal to accept a ruling by the executive to postpone an area conference last November.

Goldman claimed that 'gerrymandering' in London had denied the anti-executive faction their fair share of delegates for the special congress.

In the areas controlled by 'hardliners' it appears, according to Goldman, that one delegate was obtained for every 100 members, while in other areas sympathetic to the executive you could get a delegate for just 50 members.

He confirmed that from London there will be 21 delegates supporting the executive and 18 against.

The votes cast for delegates were in the opposite proportion, said Goldman. Some 1,100 members attended the branch meetings electing delegates. Votes cast for executive candidates were 471 and against 629.

He told a meeting of the minority faction in Brentwood, Essex: 'It means that the congress is being packed by executive delegates elected by the gerrymandering of the selection process.'

Goldman added: 'It is going to be a congress without any real authority.' This confirms that the 'hardliners' will not accept its outcome and are bound to split from the CP.

That will leave the party in the hands of members like Graham Woodward of Taunton.

This week's 'Focus', the weekly paper of the executive, carried a letter from Mr Woodward on the draft resolution for the congress in which he referred to the USSR as a 'revisionist Soviet imperialist government'.

No, not one of Reagan's speeches but a supporter of the Euro-Stalinist led British Communist Party.

NUM MOVE TO SUE UPSETS BANKERS

MOVES by the miners' union to sue the owners of the Luxembourg bank Nobis Finanz for paying the British High Court-appointed Receiver Michael Arnold £4.9 million are causing consternation in banking circles.

Despite press speculation to the contrary, the union believes it has a good legal case under Luxembourg law for arguing that Nobis Finanz and its parent company IKB acted improperly.

The anxieties of the European banking fraternity are underlined by the fact that Nobis Finanz never paid over the £4.9 million to the Receiver from the NUM account.

Rather, the money was paid — on heavily insured terms — from the accounts of IKB in case of legal action by the union.

The Luxembourg parliament has also been drawn into the issue, since a considerable part of the country's finance activity depends upon the protection it can afford clients from legal actions overseas.

The Luxembourg courts are likely to be extremely cautious about setting a

precedent allowing foreign governments to seize client's funds for apparently 'political' purposes. Such a ruling could lead to a wave of withdrawals from Luxembourg banks.

The British High Court sequestration of the NUM funds was a precedent for Luxembourg law, and was

never fully settled in the courts. The payment of monies to the Receiver from a separate IKB account was adopted as a way of side-stepping the problem.

It also seems certain that the British government have been involved in discussions with the Luxembourg government over the issue.

One of the conditions for the release of NUM monies from the original sequestration order is that they sign an agreement absolving Nobis Finanz and IKB from any liability over the handling of NUM funds.

Not only have the NUM refused to sign such an agreement, but they have also prepared legal action against the banks.

AS BALLOTING by NACODS pit deputies over the introduction of an overtime ban began yesterday, the union gave up its fight over Bedwas colliery in South Wales.

The overtime ban is being recommended by the union's leadership in protest at the NCB's refusal to put a number of closure proposals through the colliery review procedure.

Among those closures which have bypassed the procedure are Bedwas, Frances and Polkemmet pits in Scotland and more recently the Bates and Horden pits in the North East.

Talks

The NCB claimed yesterday that it had conducted extensive talks with NACODS about the closures.

But the union's general secretary Peter McNestry said he would 'refute completely' that such discussions had taken place.

Charge dropped

ONE of the three accused miners before Cardiff Crown Court was yesterday cleared of a murder charge.

The judge, Mr Justice Mann, ruled that Anthony Williams, 26, had no case to answer.

Williams still faces charges of conspiring to damage the taxi of David Wilkie, and endangering the lives of Wilkie, who died, and his passenger

David Williams, a blackleg miner.

The two other young miners, Dean Hancock, 21, and Russell Shankland, 21, both deny murder charges.

After hearing defence submissions yesterday, the judge ruled on Williams, and added that the jury will not be asked to give verdicts on conspiracy charges against the two younger men who still face the murder charges.

Jury visits Orgreave

THE JURY at the trial of 15 miners charged with riot yesterday visited the scene of clashes between pickets and riot police outside the Orgreave coking plant near Sheffield.

The trial of the miners from Yorkshire, South Wales, Scotland, Nottinghamshire and North Derbyshire began on Thursday and is expected to last a month.

Yesterday afternoon South Yorkshire's assistant chief constable Tony Clement began giving evidence for the prosecution on events at Orgreave on June 18 last year.

Under cross examination he claimed: 'It was my intention to police the area with as few officers as possible.'

Clement will continue to give evidence on Monday

and is expected to be in the witness box until Wednesday.

The defendants include: William Greenway, 51, from Gwent in South Wales; David Moor, 28, from Wath in Yorkshire; Bernard Jackson, 43, from Wombwell, Yorkshire; George Foulds, 32, from Ayr in Scotland; Brian Mooreland, 29, from Murton in Durham.

Vauxhall deadlock

AFTER ten days of strike action by 160 electricians at Vauxhall's Ellesmere Port plant, there is still no sign of movement on either side.

Over 2,500 production workers have been laid off without pay, while electricians at the Luton and Dunstable sister plants are balloting on whether to support the action.

The strike has so far cut production of the new Astra car and van by about 400 vehicles a day. The dispute concerns the operation of new robots at the Ellesmere Port plant.

Plans

The electricians claim the management deceived them over plans for the new machines. Although it was understood by the electricians that they would be trained to work the new robots, the management sent a junior management grade for training.

The result is that the skilled electricians are now under the authority of semi-skilled lower management.

Awami League London protest

PROTESTORS against the martial law regime of General Ershad in Bangladesh began a vigil outside the country's High Commission in London yesterday.

Their continued vigil will last until Sunday when a major rally will be staged against the recent rigged referendum of Ershad which was boycotted by an estimated 80 per cent of the population.

Staffs hospital blamed

NEW evidence that a hospital in Stafford is the source of the killer Legionnaires' disease outbreak was disclosed yesterday.

One woman has died from suspected Legionnaires' disease and two other people have been treated for the disease in Stoke-on-Trent — 15 miles north of Stafford where the original outbreak occurred.

The North Staffordshire Health Authority said there was evidence of a link between all three patients and Stafford District General Hospital where it is believed the present outbreak — which has killed 33 people — began.

Health authority manager Stuart Fletcher said: 'There is evidence of association between the three

patients and the Stafford hospital. They had all been treated there or accompanied other people there.'

Fletcher said the woman died at Bucknall hospital in Stoke two weeks ago — just hours after being admitted with Legionnaires' disease.

Fletcher said the two other patients had been confirmed to have had the disease.

Deferred NGA

THE High Court hearing at which the NGA print union faces sequestration of its funds was yesterday deferred. The contempt proceedings brought by the Wolverhampton Express and Star and its sister company Precision Colour Printing are now expected to open in Birmingham on May 22.

Bail for journalist

COLOMBO — An Indian journalist was released on bail by a Colombo magistrate yesterday following his arrest on a charge of failing to co-operate with authorities investigating one of his reports. Magistrate I. Iman said he would release Anand on bail but asked him to return to court on May 24. The journalist was said to have distorted a speech made by President Jayewardene at a banquet for Prime Minister Thatcher last month.

Hayden in Nepal

KATHMANDU — Australian Foreign Minister Bill Hayden arrived in Nepal yesterday as part of a South Asian tour aimed at building stronger ties with the region. Hayden, who met Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi on Thursday, will spend two days in Nepal and meet King Birendra.

Police notice defied

SEOUL — Riot police confronting student protesters outside Seoul's Sejong University yesterday hoisted a notice saying: 'Stop throwing stones and we will not fire tear gas.' The students, demonstrating for the resignation of President Chun Doo Hwan's government, raised their own notice saying: 'Let the cause of protests be known.'

Korean hunger-striker

KAWASAKI, Japan — A Korean resident arrested for defying a fingerprinting law went on hunger strike yesterday demanding to be released from jail. Lee Sangho, a 28-year-old teacher, told his lawyer he would neither eat nor speak until he was released, according to officials of a Korean residents' organisation.

Anti 'Yankee' protest

TEGUCIGALPA — About 300 people, saying Honduran security forces abducted their relatives, yesterday marched through the streets of Tegucigalpa demanding the withdrawal of US troops. 'If the Yankees do not leave Honduras they will die,' the demonstrators, mainly women, shouted.

Mobutu to visit Israel

JERUSALEM — President Mobutu Sese Seko of Zaire, one of Israel's few friends in Africa, arrives tomorrow for a six-day visit. Seko is expected to ask for aid in exchange for helping Israel establishing closer links with other African states. Zaire was one of 27 African countries who broke ties with Israel in 1973. Israeli leaders have held secret talks with officials of other African states, but so far only Liberia has followed Mobutu's decision to re-establish ties.

SENATE FREEZES U.S. ARMS BUDGET

WASHINGTON — The Republican-controlled Senate yesterday approved President Reagan's federal budget after freezing military spending increases to the annual inflation level.

Reagan's own senators delivered the White House another setback by suspending a proposal to abolish Social Security cost-of-living benefit increases next year.

After more than two weeks of debate, the budget scraped through the senate after a 17-hour session and a 49 to 49 vote, which needed Vice-President George Bush to break the tie.

An hour later, it was given final approval on a voice vote after Democrats gave up fighting a showpiece fight to retain full social security and health care benefits.

The Democrats had added a demand for a minimum corporation tax in a blatant and pathetic attempt to upstage the Republican senators who

had demanded that Reagan impose a minimum tax on defence contractors to plug a multi-million swindle.

The budget plan goes to the House of Representatives Budget Committee next week.

The House is controlled by the Democrats but is expected to propose few changes.

But the Senate altera-

tions, especially the freeze on military spending to not exceed the rate of inflation is a major blow for Reagan who has emerged badly from the Bonn economic summit and his Western European tour.

The budget, a revision of earlier plans, calls for cutting \$56 billion from an estimated \$227-billion deficit next year and hold-

ing the deficit under \$100 billion by 1986.

In East Berlin yesterday, Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega said at the end of his East European tour that new US trade sanctions would seriously affect his country's beleaguered economy.

Ortega said he had secured pledges from the Warsaw Pact countries for emergency economic aid and that no political condition had been attached to it.

President Reagan decreed a trade embargo on the Sandinist government shortly before he left for the Bonn economic summit and a visit to the Bitburg war cemetery.

Ortega said: 'The embargo will have a very serious effect on our economy, especially if you consider how dependent we are on spare parts and machinery from North America.'

'In all the (Warsaw Pact) countries I have visited there was a great readiness to help Nicaragua meet these problems... but we are not expecting abundance and a solution to all our problems from this.'

Tanaka illness causes storm

TOKYO — The illness of former Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka, known as the 'Shadow Shogun' because of his powerbroking influence, has caused a furore in Japan.

Senior Japanese politicians in the ruling Liberal Democratic Party are seriously worrying about the power vacuum.

Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone is a Tanaka protégé and won the party leadership only as a result of his tutelage, politicians freely admit.

In Tokyo's streets, rumours are rife that the 'Shadow Shogun' may have died and that the LDP is keeping his death a secret.

Censorship on Tanaka's whereabouts after a six-day visit home from hospital earlier this month has helped fuel the rumours.

Scandals

Tanaka, 67, has been the centre of political storms and scandals, the most sensational of which was his conviction in 1983 on charges of receiving \$2 million in bribes from Lockheed Aircraft Corporation.

His illness places Nakasone in serious threat across to politicians in Tokyo.

Finance Minister Noboru Takeshita, a Tanaka faction member, formed a rival LDP group before his mentor's illness.

But it was not clear if Takeshita plans launching a new challenge for LDP leadership — the prime ministership goes with the post — immediately.

Tokyo's stock exchanges have reacted feverishly to Tanaka's illness, some stocks diving sharply in value in the past week.

GATT to discuss US ban

GENEVA — The world trade body GATT is calling a meeting later this month to discuss economic sanctions imposed against Nicaragua by the United States.

The council meeting of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) will be held at Nicaragua's request on May 29.

The US last week placed a total embargo on trade with the Sandinist government and suspended landing rights in the US for Nicaraguan planes and ships.

The US Trade representative in Geneva, Peter Murphy, criticised Nicaragua for approaching GATT on an issue which he said was purely political and a national security matter for the US.

'GATT is an economic forum and we are trying to minimise the political rhetoric in it,' he told a news conference.

The Nicaraguan mission in Geneva said it would protest against the US move on grounds that it was contrary to the fundamental principles of GATT.

Its 90 members are pledged to trade with each other on an equal basis without discrimination, except in certain special circumstances.

Chaos as Nigeria expels migrants

LAGOS — Thousands of West African immigrants in Nigeria were desperately trying to beat yesterday's deadline ordering 700,000 immigrants to get their papers in order or be expelled.

Most of the immigrants are from neighbouring states, including about 300,000 from Ghana, which has asked Nigeria to extend the deadline to the end of May.

Five Ghanaian immigrants died instantly and

73 were injured when a lorry taking them home from Nigeria plunged into a ravine at Anecho in southern Togo.

The lorry overloaded with around 100 Ghanaians and scores of suitcases skidded off a bend as it approached a bridge.

Many of the immigrant workers gathered yesterday at the sprawling Lagos slum of Ijora, where thousands of Ghanaians live, to board trucks, buses and taxis to

take them home. Many vehicles were also loaded at four other points in Lagos.

A spokesman for the expelled people, Kwesi Poku, said fares had shot up by 20 naira (\$22) but that deportees were willing to pay up because of uncertainty over Nigeria's reaction if they failed to leave.

At Lagos docks, the cargo vessels were due to sail to the Ghanaian port of Tema.

Ghanaian Thomas Enimah said he was stranded with his wife and two children at the wharf where they arrived last Tuesday.

They had run out of money except for the 20 naira which they are allowed to take home, he added. Fares are much higher.

Two years ago, Nigeria expelled two million immigrants at short notice, earning international condemnation.

SOUTH AFRICAN WORKERS CALL FOR MASS STOPPAGE

Punjab killing sparks clashes

JOHANNESBURG — Black South African trades unions and anti-apartheid groups yesterday called for a general strike next Tuesday.

Trade union officials said up to half-a-million black workers were expected to heed the call to remember their leaders murdered this week and to protest against the presence of police in the townships.

The call was issued in protest over the murder of Chemical Workers Union leader Andries Raditsela and student leader Siphso Motsi this week.

Raditsela, also a member of the executive council of South African Trade Unions, was taken into police custody last Saturday and brutally beaten up before being thrown out on to the street.

He was found on the floor of a local government office last Monday and admitted to Baragwanath Neurological Hospital, where he died from brain damage.

His death was officially reported on Wednesday.

Motsi, also taken into custody last Saturday, died on Sunday but it was not until Thursday that police admitted to his murder.

Lawyers for Motsi's family said he, too, had died of brain injury.

Pretoria police alleged Motsi had mysteriously developed 'convulsions' while under interrogation.

Raditsela's death, officially admitted a day before Motsi's, has sparked a storm among black workers.

Tensions, already high from a year and a half of uninterrupted revolts against the hated apartheid regime, have reached breaking point.

The official admission of the second death was the result of outrage generated by the brutal murder of Raditsela by his police captors.

The resistance of the millions of miners, students and industrial

workers in the 'labour pools' of the 2-million-strong Soweto, and dozens of townships across the country, has thrown the racist white minority rulers into insoluble crisis and open political splits.

This week the government announced the abandonment of plans to banish at least 700,000 blacks to the desolate plains that pass for Bantustans, or 'homelands' in official parlance.

President Pieter Botha's move follows the abject failure of the combined police and military forces to evict the 65,000 shanty town dwellers at the now-famous Crossroads settlement outside Cape Town.

Bullets

Evicted dwellers defied the bullets and the tear-gas and repeatedly returned, forcing the troops to abandon the year-long barbarity.

At least 3 million workers have been banished to inhospitable regions of the country since 1960, under one of the most hated aspects of apartheid rule — the pass laws.

Botha's announcement was welcomed by the reformist, multi-racial United Democratic Front and the petty bourgeois black nationalists.

But the 70 per cent black majority's resistance to the treachery of the reformist UDF and the Stalinist African National Congress has been overwhelming.

Australians extend strike action

BRISBANE — Australian trade unions decided yesterday to extend a ban on all freight movements into Queensland by road, rail, sea and air for another week. The blockade of the north-eastern state — to protest against new anti-union measures introduced by National (Tory) Party Premier Sir Joh Bjelke-Petersen — began last Wednesday.

It was to have lasted 48 hours but the Australian Council of Trade Unions said it would continue until May 17. Thousands of travellers were hit yesterday by a 24-hour stoppage of airline flights and ACTU industrial officer Ian Court said there would be another stoppage on Tuesday.

Court said the extended blockade would keep pressure on the Queensland government to reinstate more than 1,000 power workers sacked in

February. The dismissals have been followed by police harassment of pickets, random arrests and an assortment of charges that violate basic civil and democratic rights.

A scandal has erupted, meanwhile, involving Bjelke-Petersen's political confidant and chairman of the Totaliser Agency Board (the Australian betting chain), Sir Edward Lyons. He is accused of betting more than \$700,000 during the year, often without deposits to cover the bets, and state Racing Minister Russell Hinze has demanded his removal.

French Pacific A-test

PARIS — French military commanders yesterday exploded a 150 kiloton nuclear weapon in the Pacific on the eve of the arrival of Defence Minister Charles Hernu in the troubled colony of New Caledonia.

In Paris, the French Defence Ministry refused to confirm the explosion, which was the biggest since France began atomic explosions on the Mururoa Atoll.

The blast was greeted in Australia and New Zealand with official government protests. Both countries fear that the explosions are releasing large quantities of radioactive material into the Pacific Ocean.

France ignored the findings of a survey on the atoll, which showed that a large underwater

'leak' of radioactivity was coming from a three-foot wide gash in the coral which had been split open by the explosions.

Hernu said on his arrival in Noumea: 'We are not here to make war on anybody but we are present and our position is a regional one. It is not only the security of New Caledonia which is at stake but also Guinea and Polynesia.'

Intentions

In a speech making clear French intentions to maintain a large military foothold in the area, Hernu added: 'If France is the world's third naval power it is largely due to the Pacific and everything represented by the Western Pacific.'

When French President Mitterrand visited New Caledonia in January, he ordered a big expansion of the small naval base in Noumea. The French are proposing independence for New Caledonia, but in words only. In any agreement with the strife-torn country, France intends to maintain full military control.

Hernu's arrival in the country comes during some of the fiercest street clashes since the local Kanak population stepped up demands for independence at the end of last year.

A Kanak youth was shot dead and 95 people were injured during street fighting on Wednesday. Since the fighting, Kanak members of the territorial assembly have resigned.

Hernu is expected to tell the government it will strengthen its troops from 3,000 to 4,500, as well as altering naval and airport bases to accommodate larger vessels and planes.

● The French government were yesterday forced to issue a statement denying that they used human guinea pigs during atomic tests in 1960.

Posts

The denial came after a TV documentary shown on Algerian television last week claimed that 150 fighters from the Algerian National Liberation Front were tied to posts in the line of the blast to test the effects of radiation on humans.

NEWHAM MARCH AGAINST RACIST ATTACKS

A NATIONAL demonstration against racist attacks and police inaction has been called in Newham, east London, today by the Newham Seven Defence Campaign.

On a similar march against racist attacks three weeks ago 35 people were arrested. Two have been charged with assaulting police and further charges are expected to be laid.

A spokesman for the Newham Seven Defence Campaign, Carol Burgher, told News Line about the aims of today's march.

'Basically, we feel that when black people defend themselves against racist attacks they, in turn, become criminals and the police refuse to prosecute the real criminals.'

'We are demanding justice when we defend ourselves.'

'We say that the only way we can protest is by

demonstrating. But we feel the police are trying to intimidate us into keeping quiet about what is going on because they are the ones in the firing line at the moment when it comes to racial attacks.'

'We have a right to march in the streets of Newham or any part of Britain and we will do so.'

Anger

Burgher expressed anger at the announcement of new public order laws to be introduced by Tory Home Secretary Leon Brittan in parliament next week.

'The kind of sentences they will now try to implement for demonstra-

tions and "rioting" are ridiculous,' she said.

On Monday seven Asian and two white youth go on trial at the Old Bailey for affray charges following clashes on April 7 last year.

The clashes took place outside the Duke of Edinburgh pub in East Ham. The seven Asians were arrested within a few weeks and charged.

They are Zafar Khan, 18; Parvaiz Khan, 17; Amjad Ali, 21; Khan Bahadur, 22; Jyoti Rajpattan, 17; Athur Chowdhury, 19; and Habib Mohammed, 18.

The two white youths were charged at the beginning of this year.

The same day as the clashes at the pub a series of racist attacks on Asian people took

place in the Upton Park and Forest Gate areas.

In one incident a partially disabled 16-year-old Asian youth was dragged into a car, taken to Wanstead Flats park and assaulted with a hammer.

A family shopping on Green Street, an apprentice on his way home and an Asian woman were also attacked by racists.

Campaign

Today's demonstration is also in support of the campaign for Eustace Price, a 16-year-old West Indian teenager who was stabbed to death in a fight between Asian, black and white youth in Plaistow last November.

Gerald Pryce, Eustace's brother, is among five black youth charged with affray arising out of the incident. Five white youth have also been charged, four with affray and one with murder.

Brookhouse men support levy for sacked miners

MINERS at Brookhouse pit near Sheffield are supporting a levy for sacked men and the families of those in jail even though none at the colliery has so far been victimised.

NUM branch secretary Peter Rose believes the national march from Edinburgh to London will help 'to keep the fight for those in jail and the men who have been sacked in the forefront.

Centre

'It's important because these men can easily be forgotten and they mustn't be. That's why we are running a levy at this pit,' he told News Line yesterday.

'I can tell you that if there was one man sacked or in jail from Brookhouse he would be the centre of attention as far as our branch is concerned.'

A large proportion of the 670 Brookhouse men — 173 in all — were arrested during the strike and about 70 of them still face court cases.

Rose said that he ex-

pected the forthcoming election of branch officials to reflect the intense struggle which his members were engaged in for a year.

He said: 'I wouldn't be surprised if there were changes on our branch committee. I don't mean that moderates are about to take over. I think that men who were dedicated, hard and fast in support

there in the pit. Even though a third of the men here scabbed they will still oppose pit closures.

'When the strike started at South Kirkby over the lads sacked there some men here were asking: "Well when are we going to come out?"'

'One thing is clear though. The men have not got their heart in the industry any more. When you are in this industry you live and breathe mining.

'But in the pubs round here people don't talk about the job in the way that they used to.'

Signal

Rose stressed though that this did not signal a victory for the government and the defeat of the NUM.

'They used every part of the state to break the NUM — and they failed. If everybody had gone back in disagreement with the union then that would have been a defeat, but that hasn't happened.

'The best thing from the NUM's point of view would be if we were to strike again this winter and get full support. That would put the NUM back as a union, as a fighting force.'

'I believe that we were guided into the strike by the NCB and the government and that we had no option but to fight.

'Given the fact that we were right up against the whole state system I think that we gave them a hell of a run for their money.

'The first priority since the return to work has been to seek reinstatement at work for the many hundreds of men sacked and victimised by the National Coal Board during the strike.

'Until these men have their jobs

back, their welfare and that of their families is the responsibility of the National Union of Mineworkers and the wider labour movement.

'To this end, the Trustees of the Miners' Solidarity Fund have confirmed their willingness to continue in office in order to assist with hardship, victimisation and welfare benefits to members and their families in line with the constitution of the Trust.

'The National Executive Committee of this Union has therefore determined that, to ensure a uniformity in the treatment of all cases, all future contributions intended for hardship and solidarity shall be directed to the Miners' Solidarity Fund and NUM Areas have been notified accordingly.'

Urgent appeal: Miners need cash to continue their fight

THE whole trade union movement has an urgent and immediate responsibility to step up financial support for the National Union of Mineworkers, even though the strike is over.

In refusing to sign an agreement with the Coal Board accepting the loss of jobs, and refusing to purge its contempt in front of Thatcher's Bonapartist courts, the NUM are abiding by TUC policy. But for carrying out TUC policy — despite the refusal of the TUC leaders to take a similar principled stand — the NUM have incurred the hatred of every department of state, the judiciary and the banks.

The conspiracy between the judiciary and the banks extends across national boundaries. The High Court in Britain have told the union that it will not release the union's funds from sequestration until the union trustees sign a declaration absolving the foreign banks from any future court action abroad.

Legal sources in Europe believe the NUM would have a good chance of bringing a successful legal action against foreign banks

Labour's move to Bonapartist government

THE Labour leadership's compliant acceptance of Thatcher's Bonapartist rule has never been in doubt. It was expressed most clearly during the miners' strike when Neil Kinnock backed the state forces against the NUM.

Behind the mild criticisms of Thatcher for breaking the 'post-war consensus' is an acceptance of the new bourgeois consensus — the smashing of the trade unions by the capitalist state.

John Prescott, Labour's employment spokesman, has confirmed to industrial correspondents of the Tory press that his party, in the dubious eventuality of forming a government, would not repeal Tory anti-union laws.

The 'Financial Times' reported: 'Behind his statements is a feeling among senior party members that parts of the legislation are of greater value than Labour publicly admits.'

Prescott, remembered by miners for his treacherous role in ending the second dock strike which broke out on the question of the blacking of coal, told the reporters: 'We cannot advocate that you get rid of the government's legislation and assume that we will go back to the old legislation. That's clearly not adequate and I don't feel that the trade unions will feel that either.'

The Tories have passed three sets of anti-union laws, in 1980, 1982 and 1984. It is legislation which eliminates all the fundamental rights won in two centuries of struggle.

Every legitimate activity of a trade union — from the calling of a strike, the organising of a picket line to sympathy blacking action — is outlawed.

Yesterday the National Graphical Association was in danger of having its funds seized for a second time by the courts for pursuing industrial action on behalf of its members.

Of this legislation, Prescott said: 'What's not realistic is just to say you are going to get rid of it. It's quite realistic if you are clear about what you are going to put in its place.'

Prescott even rejected the legal position which prevailed before Thatcher took office in 1979 which was based on Labour's 1974 repeal of Edward Heath's Industrial Relations Act. 'Nobody accepts that 1979 will be sufficient to deal with trade union law,' said Prescott.

This is music to Thatcher's ears. The Bonapartist regime has to all intents and purposes incorporated the leadership of Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition.

The Tories know that every time they crack the whip, Kinnock and company will jump through the hoop like the trained lapdogs of the capitalist state that they are. This is the best thing that could happen so far as the working class is concerned. The right-wing reactionary leaders of the Labour Party are exposed before every trade unionist.

When Durham miners' leaders say they do not want Kinnock to attend the area gala, it reveals that the workers' movement is beginning to tackle the historic problem of its bureaucratic leadership.

The world economic and political crisis which produced Bonapartism has driven the Labour leaders into the arms of a regime which rests openly on the naked use of state forces against the undefeated working class.

At the same time, it has created the best possible conditions for the building of the Workers Revolutionary Party and the ousting of the right-wing reformists from positions of leadership in the workers' movement.

False claims about rules

LEADERS of the NUM have responded angrily to the press attack on proposed rule changes for the union.

In the latest edition of 'The Miner', general secretary Peter Heathfield says that enemies of the union are spreading false accusations about the rule changes, which have already been unanimously approved by the national executive committee.

Among 'extraordinary lies' circulated by the Tory press, says Heathfield, are that the new rules will lead to a dictatorship of the president.

But, he says, the new rules do not give the president additional powers, they remove his casting vote.

Heathfield also makes a strong defence of a rule change to allow a category of associate membership of the union. He says the category would carry no voting or other powers at all.

'We were thinking especially of Women Against Pit Closures, who came to our assistance with such sacrifice and courage during the recent dispute.'

says Heathfield. 'Their membership will be an honour to them and a way of saying "thank you" from us.'

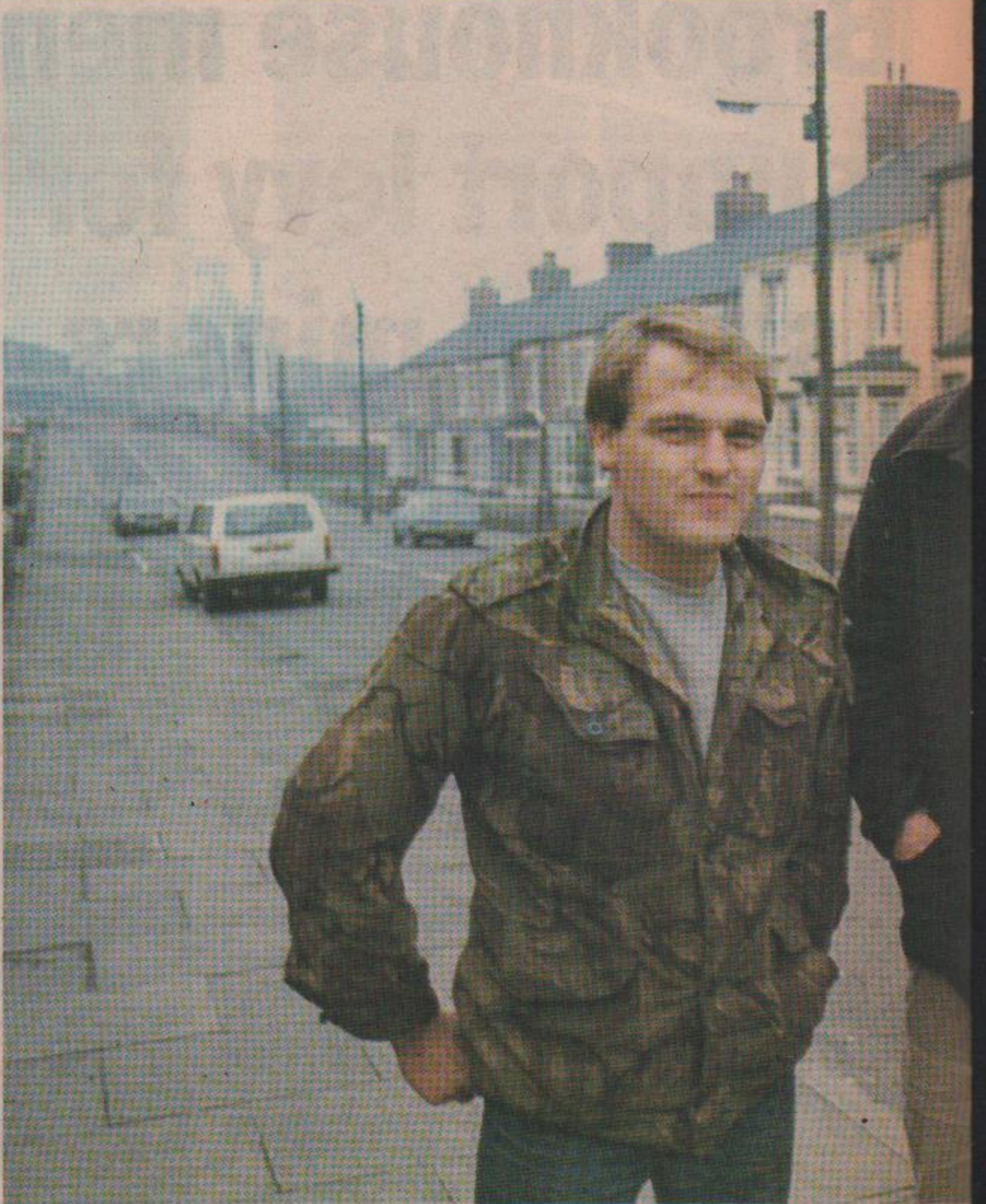
In answer to allegations that the authority of area executives would be diminished, Heathfield says: 'The new rules do not affect the powers of the areas in any way whatever.'

'The Area Executives will have exactly the same control over their members, exactly the same rights to hold ballots and exactly the same control over their Pension Funds as they have under existing rules.'

Heathfield says the proposed new rules are vital to the future of the union. 'Many of them simply bring the old rules up to date. Others are made necessary by the new trade union laws and legal actions.'

'All are designed to strengthen democracy in what we proudly claim is one of the most democratic trade unions in the world,' Heathfield concludes.

SACKED HORDEN GREET

SACKED miners from Horden colliery will be among the first to greet the National March for the Release of Jailed Men and the reinstatement of those sacked when it arrives in the Durham village.

Earlier this week the Coal Board announced plans to shut Horden and axe more than 1,000 jobs in an area which has depended historically on mining.

Fight

One of the victimised Horden men, Joe Hepworth hopes that a fight is waged to prevent the closure.

Welcoming the march organised by the Young Socialists, he told News Line: 'We've got to keep fighting, we've got to protect the pits and communities.'

'What is happening in this area is that the NCB is shutting pits and then transferring men to other collieries.'

'This is making some pits overmanned and cannot make them economic.'

Ian Stephenson, whose brother Stuart was among the first miners jailed during the strike, hopes that the march will unite the unemployed with those in work.

Fife Federation of Trades Councils, a very active body uniting trade union struggles throughout its region, are to give every support.

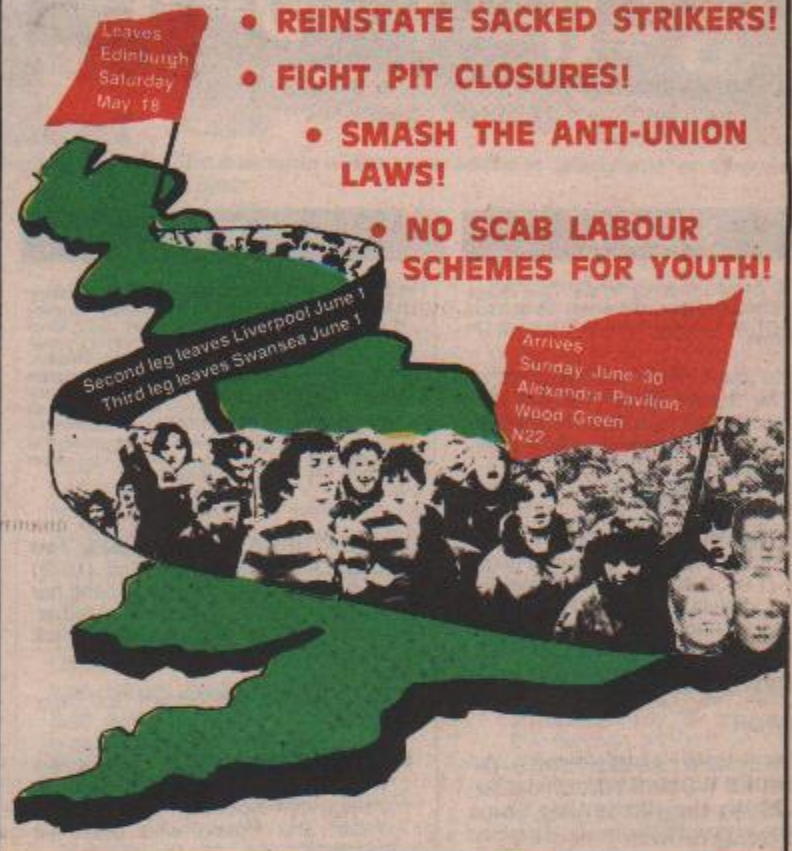

How Roosevelt plotted to enter the war

THIS week's 40th anniversary of the ending of World War II in Europe has seen the capitalist media parade the hoary lie that Britain and the United States together crushed the Nazi terror in a war they never wanted.

The reformists and Stalinists, who fully backed the imperialist World War II in reactionary defence of the capitalist state, have assisted in no small way by peddling the phoney line that the West was dragged into the war by Hitler, Mussolini and the Japanese Mikado.

The truth is that imperialism wanted that war and President Roosevelt duped the American people into it, taking elaborate steps to sidestep constitutional constraints.

Although official American policy was non-intervention in the impending war, Roosevelt was conspiring for World War II as early as the autumn of 1937, and tried might and main to whip up a suitable degree of hysteria in the United States.

But his 1937 speech failed to stir the American masses, Congress, reflecting this resistance in the electorate, refused to vote the huge sums needed to finance the colossal military budget such a scheme would have required.

The president's pacifist humbug in public and imperialist war hatred in the Oval Office, however, reflected the essence of US imperialism's drive to capture and monopolise markets.

World War I had resolved nothing for imperialism in its death agony. The Bolshevik October Revolution of 1917 had shattered a dozen pipe dreams, from London to Paris and New York.

Germany was bankrupt, robbed blind by the 'Big Three' at Versailles.

World imperialism was still licking its wounds after 14 armies failed to crush the Bolshevik workers' state.

The Red Army under the command of Trotsky, Lenin's co-leader and architect of Red Army, broke the back of imperialist aggression, albeit at giant cost in lives and resources.

The Great Depression

that followed the Wall Street crash of 1929 wreaked untold suffering and misery on the world working class and hit with its most vicious force in the metropolitan capitalist centres.

New York's Central Park became notorious as a giant shanty town with the barbarity of evictions and death by disease.

Roosevelt's New Deal was, in fact, a retreat by US capitalism driven up against the brick wall of a saturated domestic market and outdated production methods.

Yet it was the largest single capitalist domestic market. For it to expand, and production with it, US imperialism needed first to defeat the American working class and seize new foreign markets to fund internal development.

Cunning

Roosevelt's constitutional cunning at home and diplomatic double-dealing overseas was driven by this objective need, which could be satisfied only by war — and it meant fleeing the allies.

Expanding war production meant finding a suitable pretext. But one of the first warnings of the then general counsel for the Treasury, Herman Oliphant, made to Roosevelt was that production was at an alarmingly parlous state.

Thomas Reynolds, 'Chicago Sun Times' writer wrote after examining classified documents: 'That was in the spring and summer of 1938 —

even before the late Neville Chamberlain, then British Prime Minister, had made his deal for 'peace in our time' with Hitler at Munich.'

Oliphant was encouraged to put a staff to work on those long-range problems by Roosevelt and the then Secretary of the Treasury, Henry Morgenthau, Jr.

Reynolds said: 'A key man on this staff was a young lawyer, Oscar Cox, who later was to draft the Lend-Lease Act.'

'In the fall of 1938, Oliphant came up with the data to show that if war did break out, this country would have to assume that sooner or later it would be involved.'

'On this data, Oliphant concluded that the only possible insurance policy would be to step up air-plane production to 50,000 annually.'

More importantly, this was how Lend-Lease was born. Roosevelt had been Assistant Secretary of the Navy during World War I and was familiar with the problems his predecessor Wilson encountered in acting as a belligerent while technically remaining 'neutral'.

Lend-Lease was a legal and financial device to bypass Congress, constitutional embargoes against involvement in a 'foreign' war and, fundamentally, to drag the American working class into war by the hair.

When Morgenthau, Oliphant and Cox put the prepared plan to the president, however, he could only endorse the plan.

But he had to advise them to shelve it for the time being because a bel-

ligerent Congress was trimming every minor defence appropriation.

Roosevelt had to wait two years for the right timing. In May 1940, Hitler's Wehrmacht ran rampage through France in May.

France capitulated and there was panic in the American ruling class, and wild fears of a Nazi invasion of Britain.

In an editorial in December 1941, 'Fourth International', the American Trotskyist publication, said: 'Roosevelt extracted the ready-made project for 50,000 planes a year from his portfolio and rushed it through Congress.'

'This and similar measures were pictured at that time by the capitalist press as masterful and ingenious improvisations and sold to the American people on that basis.'

In reality, however, the military, industrial and financial aspects of US intervention in the European war had been carefully worked out far in advance of the date when they were announced to the world.'

So the US purchased its way into Anglo-French air missions and selling aircraft hand over fist.

Aircraft parts were standardised and mass production on an unprecedented scale began. Ammunition and small arms all fell into this category of feverish mass production.

Fodder

Perhaps only the Nazis excelled the breakneck production in the early days of the war as they literally fed human fodder into their giant underground works.

But the hitch came when bankrupt Britain ran out of sterling and dollars with which to pay for the American-made weapons.

'Fourth International' said: '... Cox dug up an old 1892 statute which permitted the Secretary of War to lease certain properties for five years.'

'Although that made certain limited types of war material available to Britain, (the US's) neutral status still blocked the way to large-scale aid.'

'The State Department ruled that the United States could not provide arms to Britain because (it) was still neutral and to do so would violate international law.'

'But the same State De-

partment obligingly pointed out that it was perfectly legal for private firms to sell arms to another country.

'So the supplies of weapons in the government arsenals were turned over to the munitions corporations who shipped them at a handsome profit to England.'

'This scheme served additional purposes. Since many of the guns on hand were growing aged, the War Department was pleased to have the material replaced with the new ammunition and weapons.'

'The supplies of weapons in the warehouses were, therefore, traded in to private companies such as United States Steel Export and others, which undertook to replace them for the War Department with new weapons.'

In fact, the original Lend-Lease Act was drafted in twenty minutes and rushed by messenger from department to department for approval within a day.

According to Reynolds: 'Then it was rushed to the White House. President Roosevelt studied it for ten minutes, then leaned back in his chair and slapped his desk: "Boy, that's it!" Mr Roosevelt said.'

Roosevelt then took personal charge of selling it to the American public, on the pretext that it was a 'lend-lease' programme that would not involve the US directly in war.

In fact, it meant total commitment to the imperialist slaughter of the working class.

Unlike Silver Dollar, he has already had two runs this season. After finishing a good third to Les Arcs at Newmarket, he returned

there later last month to hand out an impressive four-length beating to Flying Saucer over ten furlongs.

He seems to be progressing along the right lines, and can go on to better things.

Carillon (2.45) is the junior in the field for THIRSK'S Hunt Cup, but Geoff Hunter's colt has shown up well

in top company, and will take some catching off his light weight.

At Ascot earlier in the month, Carillon was a factor until two furlongs from home in the White Rose Stakes, won by Vertige.

He finished almost nine lengths behind the winner, in sixth, but it was the final quarter mile which found him out. He will be better suited to this mile.

'It will be unbearable,' McCarthy said yesterday.

City face Charlton this afternoon while Portsmouth travel to Huddersfield for their final match of the season.

Both clubs are locked on 71 points while City have the slightly better goal difference.

'We have put a lot of pressure on ourselves following last Monday's defeat at Notts County. We just cannot afford to slip up now. It would be like the end of the world for us.'

The nightmare of two seasons ago when City lost at home to Luton — two teams fighting to stave off relegation — at Maine Road will haunt

the fans this afternoon.

City have been very erratic over the past two months — and Charlton are just the kind of team to put one over on them today and ruin the celebrations at Maine Road.

'The lads are all keyed up for this one. We are short of several key players through injury and suspension, but the lads who have come in know exactly what has to be done,' said McCarthy.

'The fans will play a big part in the outcome. If they get behind us then Charlton could be rattled

before a ball is even kicked.

'It's not going to be easy but Charlton are not a bad side and they have a hit a good streak recently, they drew at Oxford a few days ago so they must be fancying their chances on Saturday.'

McCarthy, however, believes that City's task this afternoon is slightly easier than that of Portsmouth.

'They are at Huddersfield and that's a difficult ground to come away from with three points. I'd rather be at home to Charlton than preparing

to face Huddersfield at their place — I'm sure Portsmouth must feel the same way.'

City will be hoping that history doesn't repeat itself either this afternoon.

On May 7, 1977, City and Portsmouth were locked on 52 points apiece going into the last League fixtures of the season with both clubs chasing the remaining promotion place from the Second Division.

City were playing the already-relegated Bradford City at Maine Road while Portsmouth were entertaining sixth-placed Preston at Fratton Park.

Maine Road began to celebrate at 4.40pm after putting eight past the hapless Bradford City without reply.

But Portsmouth, who had kicked off 15 minutes later, scored a late goal to win 5-1 — thus ensuring promotion on the slimness of margins, 0.00501 of a goal!

'Thank God it's not down to goal averages these days,' quipped McCarthy when he heard this story.

'But we have to win tomorrow to make sure of that final promotion spot.

We have a five-goal cushion on goal difference at the moment and I cannot see Portsmouth beating Huddersfield by five clear goals.

'But if they win and we were only to draw then it wouldn't make any difference, they would be up anyway.'

'It's going to be a nail-biting 90 minutes. But if the players do their job then the champagne will certainly be flowing at Maine Road around 4.40pm on Saturday afternoon.'

AUSSIES THRASH SOMERSET

JEFF THOMSON fired the Australian cricket tourists to a 233-run victory in their opening first-class match against Somerset in Taunton yesterday with a six wicket haul.

But had they not dropped six catches, the Australian's margin of victory would have been far greater.

And captain Allan Border fears a repeat of the past

winter, when the Australians dropped 53 catches in Test matches and one-day internationals against West Indies.

Said Border: 'We must do something about it. The dropped catches are really concerning us now.'

Improve

'It is not good enough and we have got to improve. We cannot afford to do it in Test matches, because you can't possibly win them if

you start dropping everything.'

The Australians declared their second innings earlier yesterday at 316 for six asking Somerset to score 359 to win in five and a half hours.

With Brian Rose unable to take part since his arm was broken in the first innings, the task was daunting but there was just a chance Somerset might escape while the fielders — the luckless Dirk Welham dropped three — were suf-

fering from butterfingers.

In the event, however, Somerset were dismissed for 125 despite stern resistance by Vic Marks 48, and Peter Roebuck, who was dropped three times before he had made 11.

He went on to make 33 not out, becoming the first Somerset player to carry his bat against the touring side since Frank Lee achieved the feat against the Australians in 1934.

Jeff Thomson had to bear more than his fair share of

the bowling by the absence of influenza victim Geoff Lawson.

But he responded with six wickets for 44 runs from 14 overs, helped by four catches from substitute wicket-keeper Ray Phillips.

Partner

The 34-year-old ex-fast bowling partner of Dennis Lillee said afterwards: 'I would rate that as my best bowling performance ever in England.'

'I can't remember bowling better on other trips. It's not just a question of

the figures it was the way I bowled as well.

'I was able to put the ball where I wanted — and that doesn't happen very often.'

Thomson's figures might have been less special had not his young partner, 20-year-old Craig McDermott, suffered most from the dropped catches.

He again showed a great deal of pace and promise without any support from his fielders, which left Border fuming: 'I know it was a bit cold, which makes the hands go hard and makes it difficult for the ball to stay in them, but that is no excuse.'

Favourites stay but Noah out

FAVOURITES John McEnroe and Ivan Lendl toyed with their third-round opponents but former French Open champion Yannick Noah was beaten by American veteran Terry Moor in the \$615,000 Tournament of Champions.

Noah, whose only victory since the 1983 French Open championships was a qualifying event last weekend, failed to dominate the net, while 33-year-old Moor played a solid all-round game in posting a 4-6 6-3 6-4 victory in a third-round match.

Moor's victory was a mild upset, at Forest Hills, New York, although he was seeded ninth and Noah was unseeded. Moor, who earned the decisive service break in the ninth game of the third set and then held in the 10th at love, is ranked 42nd while Noah is rated 20th.

McEnroe, who is seeking his third straight Tournament of Champions crown at the Forest Hills, New York championships, routed Martin Jaite, an Argentine who lives in Spain 6-2 6-1.

Seed

Jaite, the 13th seed, was constantly drawn out of position by McEnroe. The second-seeded Lendl crushed Victor Pecci of Paraguay, who was seeded 11th by the same score.

Joining McEnroe, Lendl and Moor in the quarter-finals were Claudio Panatta of Italy and Americans Aaron Krickstein, Brad Gilbert and Lawson Duncan.

Panatta, the victim of a bad call in a first-set tiebreaker game, ran off a string of eight games on his way to a 6-7 (4-7) 6-1 6-3 upset over eighth-seeded David Pate of the US.

Panatta dominated the final two sets with accurate passing shots from the backhand side.

Krickstein, the 17-year-old American who is ranked seventh in the world and seeded third here, overcame Marty Davis 2-6 7-6 (8-6) 6-0.

Davis double-faulted at game point while serving for a 5-3 lead in the second set. The break rejuvenated the teenager, who took advantage of some loose points in the tiebreaker and then dominated the third set.

Their League Championship is only a formality and they have already won several trophies.

They are also very experienced in the WFA Cup, having won it in 1983 and losing in the final last year.

It became obvious from an early stage of this season's competition that Doncaster and Fulham were the teams to beat if you wanted to reach the final.

Path

While Doncaster had a slightly easier path — although their fans will argue this point — their form was never short of impressive throughout.

After knocking 34 (yes 34!) goals past the hapless Leek Leaders in the first round, they advanced at the expense of Daresbury, who withdrew, Kilmhurst (2-0), C&C Southwick (5-2) and Broadoak (3-0) before turning in a stunning performance when they defeated Norwich Ladies in East Anglia 5-0 in the semi-finals.

Fulham began their campaign in the second round after receiving a bye by beating Swindon away 9-0. Then came the tie of the second round when they met their London arch-rivals Millwall Lionesses.

On a damp, blustery October afternoon, Fulham took the Lionesses apart winning 4-1 in a magnificent cup tie.

The third round appeared to be just as hard on paper when the London club were drawn to meet Southampton, seven times winners of the WFA Cup, away.

Goals

They made light work of this, however, winning well with three well-taken goals.

After that it was fairly clear sailing to the final with comfortable wins over Newbury (4-0 away) and Town & County (5-0 away).

There certainly won't be any shortage of firepower in the final with Doncaster having notched 49 goals on their way to Craven Cottage and Fulham having accumulated 25.

While both teams possess players in abundance who can find the back of the net, the final could very well be decided in defence.

In this department Fulham would appear to possess the better players.

Their goalkeeper Terry Wiseman is, without doubt, the best in Britain and one of the leading women's keepers in the world.

Even if their sturdy defence does let Doncaster through, then Wiseman has to be beaten — and that's no mean feat in women's football today.

The only grey area in the Fulham side is how they will react on the big day. Will Cup Final nerves get the better of some of their players?

Doncaster are very much a proven force in this respect, having appeared in the past two finals.

Fulham will rely on the experience of Wiseman and centre-back Sallie Jackson in this area, as both were in the Howbury Grange side that defeated Doncaster in last season's final.

While the Doncaster defence are a formidable quartet, they lack the ver-

satility of their London counterparts.

Fulham's midfield, a mixture of talented youngsters and experienced players, will possibly find the going tough against an uncompromising Doncaster outfit where Jackie Sherard will prove to be key motivator despite her tender years.

Doncaster's greatest threat will come from their England striker Lorraine Hanson who netted a hat-trick against Norwich in the semi-finals.

If Hanson gets the support she needs as a striker then the Fulham defence could be in for a torrid afternoon.

Flair

Realistically, however, I cannot see Fulham losing.

Those youngsters, Marieanne Spacey and Brenda Sempare (both England internationals) and Fiona Curli have the flair, skill and enthusiasm to carry the London club to an historic treble.

It should be quite a final tomorrow and I take Fulham to win 3-1.

CHAMPIONS Aberdeen aim to go out in a blaze of glory today as the curtain falls on the League season in Scotland.

Alex Ferguson's side can smash two more Premier Division records at the expense of relegated Morton at Cappielow — but still aim to strengthen their squad next season.

They look poised to land Scottish international midfielder player Jim Bett, who joined Belgian club Lokeren from Rangers two years ago.

The £300,000-rated player said from his Belgian home yesterday: 'If Aberdeen can agree a fee then I will talk about a

mover with Alex Ferguson. As it stands I can see no problems.'

Aberdeen require just one point from today's match to beat their own record of 47 points, and a four goal win would overtake Dundee United's record of 90 goals set three seasons ago.

Dundee, waiting to pounce if St Mirren stumble, face local rivals and Scottish Cup finalists Dundee United with defender Jim Smith likely to be fit after a toe injury.

Manager Archie Knox admitted: 'This is our

most important game for a long time — the most crucial one since our League Cup final with Dundee United five years ago.'

Meanwhile, Dundee United received a welcome boost yesterday when captain Paul Hegarty was passed fit after a four week absence. Also clear of injuries are John Holt, Dave Narey and Richard Gough, while Davie Dodds completes a three-match suspension.

The other Cup finalists Celtic, are still without their suspended captain Danny McGrain.
