NEW BLOW FOR NOTTS SCABS

TORY-BACKED plans for a breakaway organisation of miners in Nottinghamshire are coming badly unstuck.

There has been a dramatic change of heart among Notts miners since area NUM president Ray Chadburn was locked out of his offices in Berry Hill. The change is reflected in a public opinion poll conducted in the last few days.

'The decision to lock Ray Chadburn out of his offices has got the backs up of people who carried on working throughout the strike,' Ollerton NUM treasurer Mick McGinty told News Line yesterday.

Board's haste upsets NACODS

THE pit deputies' union NACODS yesterday accused the Coal Board of acting with 'unnecessary haste' to recognise the scab breakaway union in Nottinghamshire.

NACODS has been given just 14 days by the NCB to present its views on the plans of the Notts scabs, particularly the possible effect on national consultation and pay bargaining.

The NCB ultimatum came in a letter dated July 9 from the board's personnel member, Merrick Spanton.

But NACODS general secretary Peter McNesary said yesterday: 'The board are pushing too hard. Any joint machinery with the Notts area would present problems for the deputies' union, he added.

Under its rules NACODS is only allowed to co-operate with unions that are affiliated to the TUC, but McNesary has said the deputies' attitude to the breakaway will not be decided until later this month.

LEADERS of the NUM's white-collar section COSA yesterday delayed a decision on whether to join the Notts scabs. They resolved to consult their 16,000 members at branch level before reaching a decision.

'People are coming up and saying — we didn't vote this Lynk into the position of general secretary, and what right has he got to throw Ray Chadburn out. He is the elected president of our area and we don't like what is happening.'

The position is worsening for Nottinghamshire area NUM acting secretary Roy Lynk. The COSA clerical section of the union has decided to keep its distance from the breakaway group — at least for the present.

And NACODS, the deputies' union, accused the Coal Board of 'unnecessary haste' in recognising the breakaway.

Management at some Nottinghamshire pits have already distributed forms urging NUM members to join the scab organisation.

But the NCB and Tory actions to assist the breakaway have stirred a mood of distrust among miners in the county.

McGinty said that unofficial polls carried out in the area are showing that the majority of Nottinghamshire miners wish to remain in the national union.

'Ray Chadburn was a very respected chap. When he was locked out people have responded, and I think that from the point of view of Lynk and (acting treasurer David) Prendergast it was a very bad mistake.

'People are saying they need a national union not just to fight closures, but to gain a lot of other things. A pit-top worker told me today he was very upset to see a friend of his retire on a surface rate after spending most of his life as a face-worker.

'He was saying to me that the only way to get this is through a national union, not through any breakaway.

'For the first time they have been forced into a ballot vote by the court action. Most branches throughout the area were

denied the right to vote on the rule changes in the Nottinghamshire area.

Members are also disturbed by the fact that Lynk and Prendergast appeared to have signed a contract for themselves to work for the Nottinghamshire area.

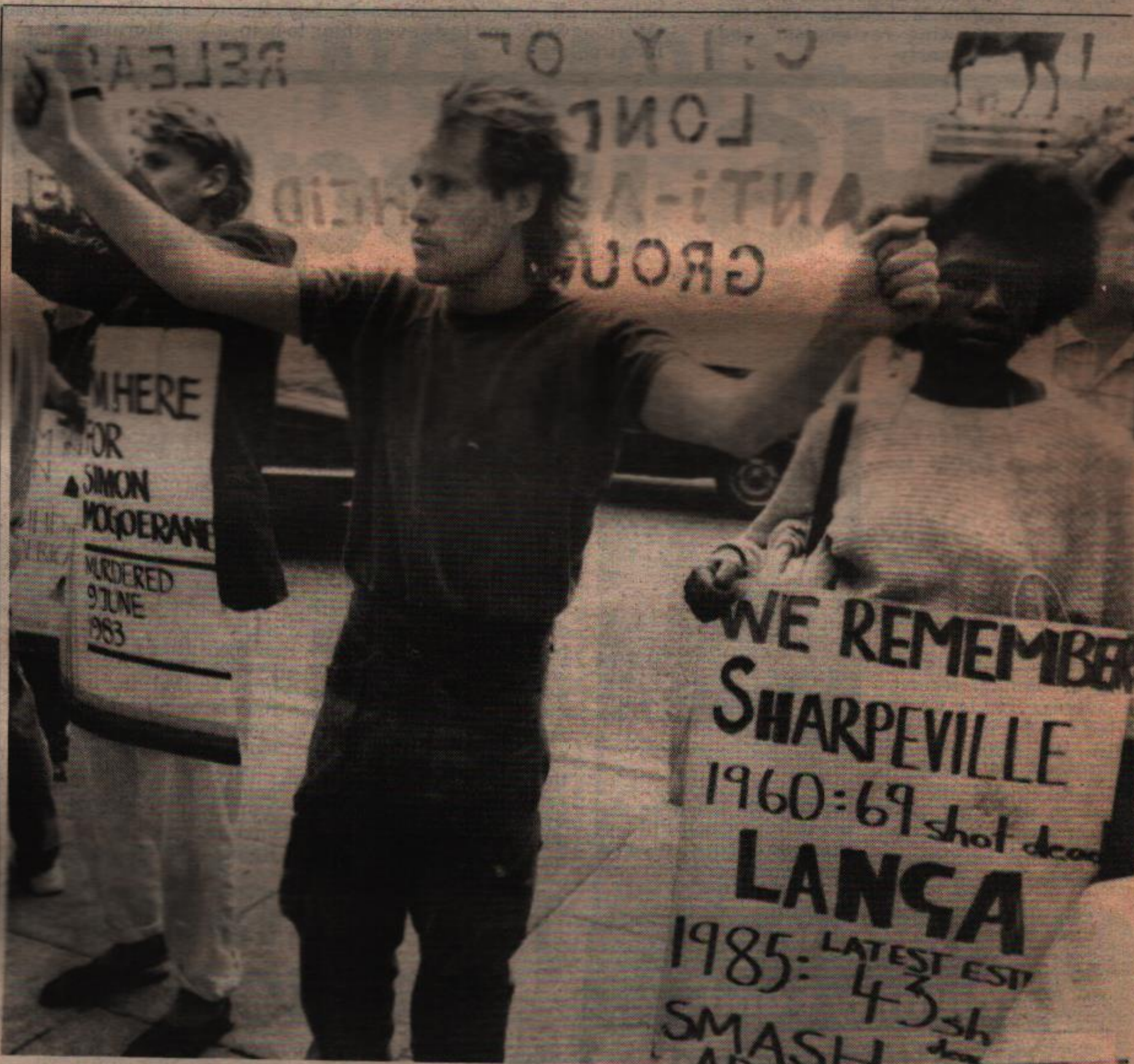
'When this was raised after our last branch meeting, we were told we could not move reference back on it, and we couldn't do anything about it.'

McGinty's remarks were backed up by Clipstone miner and ex-delegate Jim Downen. 'This farcical, Chaplinesque escapade going on at Berry Hill has really got people wondering. I've not heard one person say they relish being under Lynk and Prendergast.'

'Recent events have sickened all those who worked during the strike, as it has those of us who were out on strike.'

Downen spoke of a large spontaneous pit-bottom meeting at Clipstone on Thursday, at which many miners on the shift said they mistrusted plans by the Lynk leadership to seek a breakaway through amalgamation.

'Our bitterest opponents during the strike were shocked to hear that Lynk and Prendergast have got life posts, and they were never even elected!'

Poor trading figures hit dollar

THE US dollar was hit yesterday following bad figures on domestic sales and foreign trade.

US retailers reported weaker sales for the second successive month in June.

Considered a key indicator of economic behaviour, sales fell 0.8 per cent in June after a 0.5 per cent fall in May.

Meanwhile, the US

trade deficit in 1985 is projected to be \$140 billion to \$160 billion by most forecasters, an increase from a previous estimate, the Commerce Department said.

This means it would easily pass last year's

record of \$123.3 billion, which was nearly double the 1983 level.

Even if the dollar declines in 1985, as it has been doing lately, the gains in price competitiveness for US exports would not help trade this year.

Increasing deficits will turn the US into a debtor nation this year, meaning America owes more to foreigners than they owe to the United States.

Shortly after the announcements, the dollar fell sharply against the deutschmark and then the pound.

Fifteen 'hardline' leaders to be expelled

KEN Gill, general secretary of the draughtsmen's union TASS, is listed for expulsion at this weekend's meeting of the Communist Party executive.

Gill, a member of the TUC General Council, is facing disciplinary charges because of his support for the 'Morning Star' faction in the split within British Stalinism.

He and 15 other long-standing members of the Communist Party are on charges of 'anti-party activities' and violations of the constitution.

Others on the purge list are: Mary Rosser, chief executive of the People's Press Printing Society, PPPS treasurer Les Burt, 'Morning Star' circulation manager Joe Berry and Midlands 'Morning Star' organiser Derek Robinson, the victimised BL Longbridge convenor.

Another veteran party member facing expulsion is Jim Arnison from the North West district who has been a virulent critic of 'Euro-Stalinism'.

Arnison, a 'Morning Star' industrial correspondent, wrote a pamphlet entitled 'Stop the Rot' in which he accused general secretary Gordon McLennan and the 'Euros' of 'right-wing revisionism' and liquidation of the party.

All those on disciplinary charges have the right to submit written appeals and to make oral appeals to the two-day executive meeting starting today.

One group on the executive want to expel Rosser and company but only suspend or censure Gill because of his high profile position in the trade unions. But the aggressive 'Euros' are saying that the only good 'hardliner' is an expelled 'hardliner'.

The main political report will be given by 'Marxism Today' editor Martin Jacques who is the leader of the pro-SDP, pro-state 'Euros'. Jacques has written a 20-page document which refers to the 'defeat' of the miners and examines the role of the Communist Party in the wake of the loss of the 'Morning Star' to the hardliners' faction.

The executive will hear a recommendation by Nina Temple for the launch of a party weekly newspaper in mid-October. It will replace the existing 'Focus' and will come out under a new name.

The meeting will also issue a new interpretation of the party's Rule 15 (b) which obliges all party members to buy the 'Morning Star' and to do everything to help its circulation.

In future, party members will be told not to help its circulation because it is no longer the paper of the party. This is going to place crippling financial burdens on the 'Morning Star' which is already losing sales and suffering cash problems.

NHS inequality

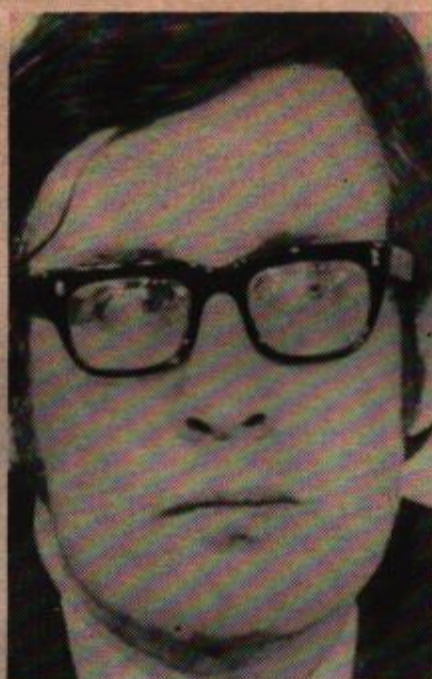
RESIDENTS of Hampstead get three times more cash value from the National Health Service than residents of Oldham, hitherto unpublished DHSS figures show.

The figures are taken from official performance indexes passed to Labour social services spokesman Michael Meacher, who is MP for Oldham West.

They show that the residents of Oldham receive on average £52.14 worth of NHS services a year, while the residents of Hampstead get £155.65.

Meacher said the figures showed 'the real scale of inequality in the British health service'.

He added: 'People liv-

ing in eight northern districts have access to less than £59 of NHS services, while southerners in only

four areas are in that disadvantaged position.

'At the top end, people living in 23 southern areas (21 of them in and around London) have access to between £100 and £155 worth of the NHS each year, while people in only two northern areas get that amount.

'Both of these are at the bottom of the range with Harrogate at £116.84 and north-west Durham at £100.34 a year.'

Meacher said: 'The NHS is not funded through some sort of local rate. It is paid for equally by people living throughout England and people have a right to expect

that they will receive treatment on the basis of need, not where they live.'

He said this was the first such survey by the DHSS. He added:

'The Tories are very proud of their ½ per cent real terms rise in NHS funding since they came to office.'

Service

'What they haven't told people throughout England is that the service that is being provided is nowhere near targets set over a decade ago.'

'Nor have they told the people of Oldham, Bolton, Aylesbury, West Lancashire, Salisbury, Milton Keynes, North Staffs, St

Helens and Knowsley, Peterborough, Lancaster, Chorley or Scarborough that they are getting one-third the NHS provision that is being given to the people of Hampstead, and one-half of that being given to those, predominantly, living in London and the Home Counties.'

Meacher went on: 'It is about time the government published these figures, as they were urged to do by their own working group, and officially recognised that without a substantial increase in NHS funding, in real terms, those citizens who are currently receiving disadvantaged and drastically unequal NHS service will continue to do so well into the next century.'

HATTERSLEY REJECTS PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

ROY HATTERSLEY, the deputy Labour leader, yesterday attacked plans for nationalising the banks and unveiled his own 'balance sheet approach' to financing the public sector.

Hattersley told Channel Four's programme 'A week in Politics' that he did not believe the nationalisation plan put forward by Tony Benn and Eric Heffer would work.

He said: 'The Labour Party conference, year after year, has said that the clearing banks will remain the private sector for institutional reasons concerning the pattern of trade union membership.'

Earlier the Labour deputy leader said the party's policy was aimed to ensure that public sector industry did not miss out on prudent or profitable investment opportunities.

He announced this titanic objective at a conference in the luxurious London Intercontinental Hotel organised by the 'Financial Times' newspaper.

He said that if he became Chancellor of the Exchequer (he currently occupies the shadow Chancellor's post), he would publish a public sector balance sheet.

Its purpose would be to provide information and reassurance to the City and public opinion alike (no doubt in that order too).

Inflation at 7%

THE annual rate of inflation held steady at 7 per cent in June. According to figures published yesterday by the Department of Employment, inflation rose by 0.2 per cent in June, compared to 0.5 per cent during May. This puts the annual rate at 7 per cent, unchanged compared with previous months.

Uranium ends up in Tel Aviv

LUXEMBOURG — More than 40 tonnes of depleted uranium — a material used in the manufacture of nuclear bombs — has reached Israel, according to inspectors from Euratom, the Common Market's nuclear agency.

The Euratom inspectors, working with the Vienna-based International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), say the material had reached Israel via Luxembourg from Britain.

British officials yesterday confirmed that nuclear material shipped from Britain to Luxembourg under an export licence had found its way to Israel in contravention of international agreements.

They said London had not formally protested to Luxembourg.

The Luxembourg government has confirmed that depleted uranium was exported to Israel but denies that the export of the material broke international rules.

The discovery has sparked angry protests from Arab governments

and the five-country Islamic Conference Organisation.

ICO's Pakistani-born secretary-general Sharifuddin Pirzada said the matter would be discussed by the organisation's next summit.

Pirzada said: 'This is really a source of great concern for the Muslim countries.'

Israelis want hospital closed

From WAFA THE ISRAELI authorities have issued an order to close the hospital in the Austrian Hospice, via Dolorosa, in the occupied West Bank, without any official reason.

It is the only government hospital under Arab administration and of great importance to the Palestinian people.

The decision is another face of the inhuman practices of Israel in its treatment of Palestinians.

Black box off to India

THE TWO black box flight recorders from the Air India Jumbo jet which crashed into the Atlantic off Ireland last month were brought into London yesterday for their transfer and subsequent examination in Bombay.

They were flown into Heathrow on a scheduled Aer Lingus flight from Cork and were then transferred by baggage handlers to the Air India cargo area where they are expected to be flown out over the next few days.

Investigators forecast that it could be weeks before the cause of the disaster which killed 329 passengers and crew is known.

The cockpit voice recorder and the second box, recording instrument and control settings, were scooped from the ocean, one mile down, by a Scarab robot mini-submarine.

Top security surrounded the hand-over to crash investigators of the flight recorders.

To avoid reporters and photographers waiting on Cork quayside the transfer was carried out in mid-harbour as the French vessel 'Leon Thevenin', that recovered the so-called black box's units, neared the Irish port.

An Irish naval craft then took the devices to her base at nearby Haulbowline where a party of Indian officials were waiting.

Indian experts backed up by representatives from Canada — the starting point of the final flight of the crashed Jumbo — were due to begin examining the aircraft's voice and digital recorders in Bombay this weekend.

Mob attacks on Catholic homes

THE POLICE and military were out in force in several areas of the north of Ireland early yesterday as tens of thousands of Orangemen took to the streets.

They were marking the 295th anniversary of the victory of King William of Orange at the Battle of the Boyne.

Seventeen RUC policemen were injured — none seriously — during clashes hours before the parades began.

Police, who now have the power to ban marches in sensitive areas, ignored requests from the Catholic community in Ballynahinch and allowed a parade of several hundred of the right-wing

Loyalists to go through a housing estate.

As many people had feared and predicted, windows in Catholic homes were smashed and business premises and cars attacked by mobs. One person was arrested.

Rally

The market town of Portadown, Co. Armagh, was sealed off by a ring of army and police before the Orange rally being held in protest against the re-routing of their traditional parade.

The unionists were protesting against a police decision preventing them from marching through

the Nationalist Obins Street area of the town.

Army marksmen were on rooftops and street corners scanning the area with high-power optics.

Five police Land-Rovers sat side by side across Woodhouse Street which leads to Obins Street, known locally as the tunnel. Behind them four more Land-Rovers were grouped and further down two army armoured personnel carriers were waiting.

In the town centre, RUC officers patrolled the streets.

As the Orange parade passed through Portadown's main streets, a crowd of civilians started

throwing bottles, stones and cans at police guarding the Obins Street area.

Crowds who ignored the parade shouted abuse at the uniformed officers, which included a number of high-ranking men.

Clashes

Every available policeman and soldier was on duty yesterday for the big Orange demonstrations in over 20 cities.

The clashes in Maghera, Co. Derry, went on until 4 am. Large reinforcements of police were brought in when fighting broke out between Protestants and Catholics.

At Cookstown, Co. Tyrone, youths gathered round a bonfire on the

Killymoon Road and threw a petrol bomb at a police Land-Rover. Stones were also thrown, injuring one policeman.

At Annalong, police again moved in, allegedly to keep Catholic and Protestant crowds apart.

In the nearby village of Kilkeel, Loyalists attacked police with missiles, injuring one officer.

In Belfast at Westland Road in the north of the city youths tried to erect a makeshift barricade. Police were petrol-bombed and stoned and there were several arrests.

At a parade in Articlave, near Castlerock, County Derry, seven people were injured after a car ploughed into a crowd following a band.

Johnson Matthey profits

JOHNSON Matthey, the gold and silver dealer whose fringe bank was nationalised overnight in a Bank of England rescue, showed pre-tax profits of £20.1 million yesterday.

The figure was well down on last year's £36.6 million, but still £4 million higher than expected and the news sent Johnson Matthey shares soaring 13p to 96p.

A statement from the board said: 'In the absence of any unforeseen factors, the board is confident that the group has turned round from the trauma of the past and is well placed to maintain its position at the forefront of precious metals technology.'

Rescue

The Bank of England and the Tory government spent more than £250 million of public money to rescue Johnson Matthey Bankers which collapsed last autumn.

The government has refused to publish a secret report on the affair by accountants Price Waterhouse. Labour MP Denis Skinner charged in the Commons earlier this week that this was because 'some of those City crooks are a little too close for comfort'.

NO MORE MONEY

says Joseph

TORY Education Secretary Sir Keith Joseph yesterday re-iterated that 'the government is not prepared to make any more money available for teachers in 1985-1986'.

Joseph was speaking after Thursday's teachers' pay talks were adjourned until next Tuesday.

No agreement was reached after 11 hours of talks in the Burnham pay negotiating committee. Instead both sides went away to discuss 'fresh ideas'.

A new pay package is to be put by the local authority employers to Tuesday's Burnham meeting.

The package is an advance on the previous informal 5.8 per cent proposal rejected at Thursday's meeting.

The new proposal involves a three-stage offer which would give all teachers a 7½ per cent rise. Some of the 35,000 teachers at the top of the lowest grade could get increases of as much as 11 per cent.

But the new package would require the approval of Joseph and the promise of extra government money.

Employers' spokesman John Pearman said that although Joseph had made it clear there could be no extra money this year, he believed Joseph had indicated there was Cabinet support for extra money for teachers next year.

But Joseph has always insisted that this would have to come alongside changes in conditions of service.

Up to now the teachers have rejected any pay rise linked to attacks on conditions.

POLICE IN HUNT FOR SHIP BOMBERS

WELLINGTON — Police said yesterday they had recovered an inflatable boat abandoned on a beach shortly before bombs sank the Greenpeace flagship 'Rainbow Warrior' in Auckland Harbour and killed one of the crew.

Spokesman Trevor Tozer said residents saw a man haul the rubber dinghy out of the water and abandon it about two hours before two explosions ripped through the converted trawler at its dockside mooring on Wednesday night.

He said they were looking for a Frenchman who visited the 'Rainbow Warrior' just before the bombing and was thought to be heading for Tahiti.

Police in the French colony have been asked to interview the man.

'Naturally we want to speak to him,' he said, adding however that police were seeking everyone who visited the ship and the Frenchman was 'no more or less suspect than anyone else'.

Meanwhile, one of Greenpeace's seven world directors said the bombs which sank the protest ship, killing photographer Fernando Pereira of Portugal, might have been aimed at the environmental group's leadership.

Dr Patrick Moore also said he believed members of an unnamed 'non-government extremist organisation with paramilitary overtones' might

have planted the bombs, but he gave no details.

Moore said the full directorship had been in Auckland for a meeting and all seven directors had planned to sleep on the 'Rainbow Warrior' but changed their minds at a late stage.

'All of us are feeling quite lucky,' he said. 'If

they wanted to intimidate us by killing one of our people it will only increase our resolve.'

The ship, with its history of clashes with governments and other powerful sector groups, had been planning to lead a 'peace flotilla' to the French nuclear test site at Mururoa Atoll.

Stateless in Britain

A 58-YEAR-OLD woman found herself officially 'stateless' following a High Court ruling in London yesterday. Mr Justice Mann rejected an appeal against the Home Office's refusal to allow Mrs Mahaboob Bibi to enter the UK.

The judge ruled that she was not a British overseas citizen as she had claimed, and was therefore not allowed to enter. According to the evidence, he said, she was a citizen of Mauritius. But the authorities in that country have also turned her away. Mrs Bibi now faces deportation to India, where she last stayed.

CLEARED — AFTER 15 YEARS

A MAN who served four years of a seven-year jail sentence for killing an elderly coin dealer yesterday had his conviction quashed by the Court of Appeal.

The Lord Chief Justice (Lord Lane) said it would be an understatement to describe the case of Keith Fellowes, a 22-year-old taxi driver at the time of the killing in 1970, as extremely disturbing.

Important evidence gathered by police hunting the killer of 67-year-old Harold Parkinson at his home near Morecambe, Lancs, was not made available to counsel at Fellowes' trial at Lancaster.

Lord Lane said: 'It is now clear that, despite that apparently strong case against him at trial, he could not have committed the crime of which he was convicted.'

Fellowes, 37, a businessman, from Binfield, Berks, convicted on June 29, 1970, of Parkinson's manslaughter, had his conviction quashed and sentence set aside.

He had been released on parole in 1974 and the case referred to the Appeal Court by Home Secretary Leon Brittan, after a police 'supergrass' had sparked off a new investigation into the case.

Giving judgement, Lord Lane, who sat with Justice Skinner and Justice MacPherson, told a

packed court: 'This is not a case of a verdict being unsafe or unsatisfactory. It has been proved conclusively, to the satisfaction of this court, that this man did not commit this crime.'

Trial

Lord Lane said Fellowes' conviction was not really surprising. The trial had coincided with the break-up of his first marriage and he was 'psychologically fragile' at the time.

His lawyers felt that he would cut a sorry figure if called to give evidence, and he never left the dock to do so. His trial was impeccably conducted by Justice Caulfield.

The Crown had claimed that Fellowes' motive was that Parkinson, who lived in Main Street, Overton, and who was also a part-time private detective, had been investigating his marital affairs.

That was supported by a reference in a book found at Parkinson's house to Fellowes' then mother-in-law.

But counsel were not made aware of the fact that the entry related to Parkinson's debt-collecting agency and was in respect of an unpaid coal bill.

It had also been inferred that Fellowes had removed incriminating evidence of taxi log entries. But it was now clear that

there was documentary evidence that he could not have done so.

Evidence tending to support the defence given by Parkinson's cleaner was also not fully explored.

Lord Lane said these were aspects of the 'disturbing mysteries' of the case.

Activities

They might have never come to light, but for the activities of police 'supergrass' Leonard Pilot. His revelations on serious crime in the north-west of England included details of the trussing up and eventual suffocation of Parkinson.

The police were led to a

man named William Clark, and he stood trial at Manchester in April this year for the coin dealer's killing. He admitted going to the house to steal and punching the dealer after he came on the scene.

But Clark claimed he was alive when he left, and he was eventually acquitted of manslaughter.

The Manchester jury were told that Fellowes' conviction was 'a tragic mistake' said Lord Lane, but their acquittal of Clark was understandable.

But it was either that some aspects of the original police investigation could be attributed to slovenliness, or that statements had been deliberately withheld.

Lord Lane queried whether there had been any disciplinary procedures, but expected that it was now too late.

Counsel said that some 800 statements had been collected, and he was concerned about the apparent lack of disclosure of some of them to counsel involved in the Lancaster trial.

Counsel

Lord Lane said that it should never be left to the police to decide what statements should be made available to counsel. They should all be made available.

Afterwards, a fit and suntanned Fellowes, who sat in court holding the hand of his wife Coral

throughout yesterday's hearing, said he was 'ecstatic'.

Bearded and wearing a light grey suit, he said: 'It's the fulfilment of a dream.'

Fellowes said it had been 'horrific' in prison, particularly in Wakefield.

'Unless you're in this position and these circumstances you can never manage to understand the trauma of serving a sentence, of being completely incarcerated, by the system yet knowing you are totally innocent. But bitterness — no.'

He added: 'I came home in 1974 a totally broken man. I was in a worse state than when I went in. I have had to completely rebuild my life.'

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Cereal bill mounts

THE COST of handling Europe's record cereals mountain will rocket to £5,000 million a year by the end of the decade unless drastic measures are taken immediately, warns a report published yesterday.

Common Market Farm Ministers should cut the price of cereals by as much as a third if future increases in supply are to be avoided, said AGRA Europe, the Brussels-based agricultural intelligence service.

'Unless this is done then the higher VAT-based contributions recently agreed by member states will continue to be swallowed up by financing the community's agricultural policy.'

Varsity chiefs angered

THE government's limits on spending on universities is driving them towards insolvency, Dr Anthony Kelly, vice-chancellor of the University of Surrey, said yesterday.

The government's Green Paper on the development of higher education, suggested universities should raise more money from private sources.

He said nearly 50 per cent of Surrey University income came from sources other than the university grant.

Lecturers lobby over job cuts

TRADE unionists and Labour Party members in South Glamorgan are bitterly opposing education committee proposals to sack ten lecturers from the School of Maritime Studies in Cardiff.

At an angry lobby of a county Labour Party meeting on Thursday councillors faced accusations that the Labour Group were reneging on recent local election pledges to fight for jobs and fight Tory cuts.

Mary Crimmins, secretary of NUPE local authority branch, told the councillors how she and

other Labour Party activists had campaigned during the local elections, persuading people to vote Labour on the basis of their policy of no redundancies.

She couldn't believe that a Labour council was seeking to carry out Tory cuts and warned that the unions were united in opposition to these cuts.

Dave Hutchinson, NATFHE member and Cardiff city councillor, said that lecturers in his college

were absolutely shattered when they heard that the education committee had made these proposals.

He said officers of the education authority and the education committee had broken local and national agreements between NATFHE and local authorities which ensured consultation and strict procedures over the question of redeployment and redundancies.

He cited that although the principal of the col-

lege had shown it was possible to redeploy or retrain these ten lecturers, the education committee wanted the £150,000 the job losses would provide.

Hutchinson reported that this dispute had already become a national issue.

'NATFHE's 76,000 members have pledged support to us. No local authority has ever made people redundant in further education or higher education.'

Dublin shop workers still out against apartheid

YOUNG women workers at Dunnes store in Dublin have been on strike for a year in solidarity with black workers fighting the apartheid regime in South Africa.

The women went on strike after being suspended for taking a principled stand in refusing to handle South African goods.

A delegation of strikers was due to visit South Africa following an invitation by Bishop Desmond Tutu, but they were refused permission to enter the country by the racist Pretoria regime.

The decision to bar the women drew a protest from Inez McCormack, Northern Ireland Regional Officer of the National Union of Public Employees.

She sent a telegram to the South African embassies in Dublin and London in which she said that NUPE 'deplores the extension of apartheid to Irish citizens critical of your government and supports the right of all South Africans to live, love and work'.

NUPE said that the attempt to impose visa regulations which did not normally apply to Irish citizens visiting South Africa was 'a blatant attempt to apply the odious principles of apartheid to non-South African citizens'.

'The fact that this happened at Heathrow and involved staff of the South African embassy in London as well as staff of British Airways makes it a matter for British concern,' McCormack said.

She demanded that the British TUC and leaders of the Labour Party express their disapproval of what happened at Heathrow and enquire into the part played by the Thatcher government and British Airways officials.

Fear

McCormack added: 'The reaction of the South African embassy indicates the fear of the South

African government of the links which are being forged between South African non-racial unions and the international working class, and is a testimony to the effectiveness of a handful of young but determined female trade unionists in Ireland.'

She stressed that the Dunne's strikers had fought for union policy for a year in spite of a lack of publicity about their struggle.

'It is only recently that their sacrifice has caught the imagination of the international community.'

McCormack called on trade unionists to back the Irish Trade Union Congress demand for a boycott of Dunne's stores and to step up financial assistance to the strikers.

Critical

But the women at Dunne's are bitterly critical of the failure of the Irish

trade union leaders to organise wider action in support of their strike.

While the strikers have been subjected to verbal and physical abuse from Gardai (Irish police) and thugs on the picket line, trade union bureaucrats have made mealy-mouthed protests.

It took nine months for the ICTU leaders to make any statement of support for the strike. This treachery has been supplemented by the actions

of the Stalinist Workers' Party and a variety of revisionist groups.

They have combined to attempt to bury the class issues at stake to turn the question of handling South African goods into one of 'individual conscience'.

Defiant

But the women at Dunne's store remain defiant and adamant that their principled battle will go on.

Tories condemned over deportation

A CYPRIOT couple who lived in a London church for three months in their fight against deportation said yesterday they would leave Britain on Monday with their heads held high.

Cyprus Airways has offered to provide free air tickets to Vassilis Nicola, 35, and his wife, Katerina, 38, to return to Cyprus from where they fled the Turkish invasion in 1975.

The couple, who came to Britain in 1976, are leaving after a High Court judge earlier this week refused to allow them to seek a judicial review of the Home Secretary's decision not to revoke a deportation order.

Speaking from their sanctuary at St Mary's Church, Eversholt Street, Camden, north London, the couple said: 'We are deeply hurt at the attitude and decision of the British government.

'We leave believing that once again we become refugees, knowing that true justice is hard to find in Britain.'

Mr Nicola added: 'It's a bitter blow that we have been thrown out of England. We hope to stay with relatives in Cyprus, but they have their own problems and I'm not sure what we are going to do.'

The north London Cypriot community has provided food for the couple, who have been sleeping on camp beds in St

Mary's since April — with the approval of the vicar, Rev Philip Dyson.

St Mary's churchwarden Laud Dieah, commenting on the government position yesterday, said: 'I am sorry that the Christian virtues of mercy, love and fair play which are the background for civilised nations have not been shown on this occasion.'

George Eugeniou, leader of the north London Cypriot community, said he was disappointed the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr Robert Runcie, has not interceded personally as had been hoped.

Eugeniou said with possible arrest awaiting the couple if they stepped out of the church, the Nicolas had been very careful about leaving St Mary's.

He said: 'They have hardly been outside at all and then just for a bit of fresh air.'

He added that the Home Office had said the couple could now, finally leave the church and stay at an address for ten days provided they reported to a police station daily.

50 arrested on £750,000 charges

MORE than 50 people were arrested by detectives in Yorkshire yesterday for alleged burglaries and robberies of old and infirm people involving £750,000. The dawn raids were centred on Leeds but arrests were also made in Scarborough, Selby and Knaresborough.

The arrests follow investigations into some 400 offences committed in West Yorkshire, Lancashire, North Yorkshire, Durham, Humberside, Lincolnshire, South Yorkshire, Leicestershire, London and the Home Counties.

A West Yorkshire police spokesman said: 'The operation relates to crimes directed against the aged and infirm where offenders have been posing as officials from the gas and electricity boards, telecommunications, rating officers, DHSS officials and police officers, and have committed burglary and robbery.'

Building societies merger

PLANS were announced yesterday for a new giant building society with assets of £14.7 billion.

Two of the top five building societies — the Nationwide and Woolwich — are to merge to form a new society to be called the Woolwich Nationwide.

The merger, if it is recommended and approved by members of both societies, will be the biggest ever in the industry.

Recent experience with other proposed mergers in the industry has shown that there are tough hurdles to be overcome.

A planned merger of the Alliance

and Leicester has met strong staff opposition, while a merger between the Leeds Permanent and Leeds and Holbeck was called off after lengthy talks.

Figures from the Building Societies Association yesterday showed that net receipts in June — the money deposited by savers less withdrawals — were £401 million.

This compared with receipts of £615 million in May and £630 million in June last year.

It is also well below the estimated £800 million a month needed to meet mortgage demand.

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Briefly ...

ZAPU member's suicide

HARARE — An official of the ZAPU-PF party, Matiengo Nyamwema, of Highfield, has committed suicide, according to Zimbabwe's main opposition leader Joshua Nkomo. Nyamwema poured paraffin on himself and set it alight after being threatened with death by a gang of supporters of Prime Minister Robert Mugabe's ZANU-PF party, he said.

Ethiopian leader killed

ADDIS ABABA — Berhane Ezkiel, a member of the Workers' Party of Ethiopia Central Committee, has been killed. The senior party official was leading a counter-insurgency against the Eritrean Liberation Front's liberation fighters. The official radio said Ezkiel died 'while on duty fighting for Ethiopia's revolution and unity'.

Marcos orders probe

MANILA — President Ferdinand Marcos has ordered a probe into charges that Philippine government officials and businessmen sent money abroad illegally for US property and other investments. Prominent Filipinos, including Marcos, his wife and some of their closest associates are alleged to have property in the US worth millions of dollars.

East German-China deal

PEKING — The East German and Chinese governments have agreed on a major long-term pact. The five-year agreement is due to be signed on Monday when East Germany's visiting economic planning chief Gerhard Schuerer returns to Peking after a provincial tour.

Dumas and Mubarak meet

CAIRO — French External Relations Minister Roland Dumas has had two hours of talks with Egypt's President Hosni Mubarak. They discussed the Middle East and other international issues, according to an official statement. Dumas carried a personal message from President Mitterrand.

Bhopal workers protest

BHOPAL — Angry workers yesterday continued a sit-in protest campaign for jobs at the pesticides plant that caused the world's worst industrial catastrophe last December. The plant was officially closed down on Thursday by the American-owned Union Carbide Corporation. The closure leaves most of its 632 employees jobless in an economically-depressed part of central India.

Nixon, Carter for Turkey

ANKARA — Former US Presidents Carter and Nixon will soon make private visits to Turkey, according to statements by the military junta of General Kenan Evren. Carter is scheduled to visit Istanbul on Thursday next week and Nixon is due to tour in September, officials in the state capital said.

Lebanese leaders moved

KUWAIT — Inaam Raad has been removed from all leading positions in the Syrian National Socialist Party, one of Lebanon's nationalist groups. The party's leader, Issam al-Mahayri, has also been replaced.

Mitterrand provokes constitutional storm

PARIS — President Mitterrand has provoked a constitutional storm by saying he will not resign if the right-wing wins next year's General Elections.

Mitterrand said he not only planned to remain in office until the end of his mandate in 1988 but also aimed to keep defence and foreign policy as his exclusive preserve.

'If foreign policy were removed (from my control) by a change in majority, that would be a coup d'état,' he said.

His statement has sparked off a stormy debate on how to define the president's powers as set down by the law.

It has also fuelled mounting public concern that France is heading for a constitutional crisis next year.

Under the constitution drawn up by General de Gaulle in 1958, the presidential term was set at seven years and the legislative term at five.

But since the system began, a president has never faced a parliamentary majority of a different political colouring.

Mitterrand said he was prepared for 'cohabitation' with a right-wing prime minister after the 1986 National Assembly elections.

'If cohabitation means living in the same type of republic as we do now, then I say yes to it. But if there was political confusion, I would say no.'

'We cohabit when we

are adversaries, but if we consider ourselves as enemies, then there is nothing left but to bring out the rifles.'

Jacques Toubon, secretary-general of the mainstream neo-Gaullist RPR party, accused Mitterrand of twisting the law to suit his own ends instead of referring to the 'functions of the state laid down by the constitution and its practice'.

Toubon said: 'It is inadmissible that a man, faced with a popular vote against him, should decide on his own whim how the state should operate.'

Power

The prickly question of how to share out power between the president and the prime minister previously had been avoided.

Mitterrand, referring to a chapter of the constitution which defines the president as 'the guarantor of national independence and territorial integrity', sees his

role as supreme defence and foreign policy-maker.

The row highlights the anomaly between the legislative and presidential terms written into the constitution as well as the ambiguities left by de Gaulle.

The president, for example, is constitutionally defined as the 'chief of the armed forces' but the prime minister remains responsible for 'national defence' and 'government action'.

To further confuse matters, an amendment introduced in 1964 gives the president the power to push the button that will launch France's nuclear weapons.

The situation remains unclear also in the area of foreign policy. A strict interpretation such as Toubon's would put foreign affairs under the heading 'government action', which means it is the domain of the prime minister.

According to the tradi-

tion set by de Gaulle, however, major foreign policy options have since 1958 been left in the hands of the President.

Referring to Mitterrand's dilemma, 'Le Monde' said:

'Will he force de Gaulle

to turn over in his tomb by contenting himself with opening flower-shows?

'Nobody could seriously believe Mitterrand had developed a passion for horticulture so late in life.'

Marchais accuses Socialists of forming right-wing alliance

PARIS — French Communist Party leader Georges Marchais yesterday accused the ruling Socialist Party of plotting with the right-wing to alternate power.

Marchais said the Socialists were heading for next year's parliamentary elections already beaten.

The Stalinist leader, who rarely writes editorials, took his views on to the front page of the party daily 'L'Humanité' this week.

The signed editorial said both the Socialists and the right-wing wanted an alternating system in which each would run the country for a term 'to practise the same capitalist policy'.

Proof of the scheme was the fact that the Socialists had admitted publicly this week they were expecting to win only 170 seats in the 579-seat National Assembly, Marchais said.

At present, President Mitterrand's ruling party has 285 of a total 491 seats in the National Assembly.

Marchais said: 'This is unprecedented in our his-

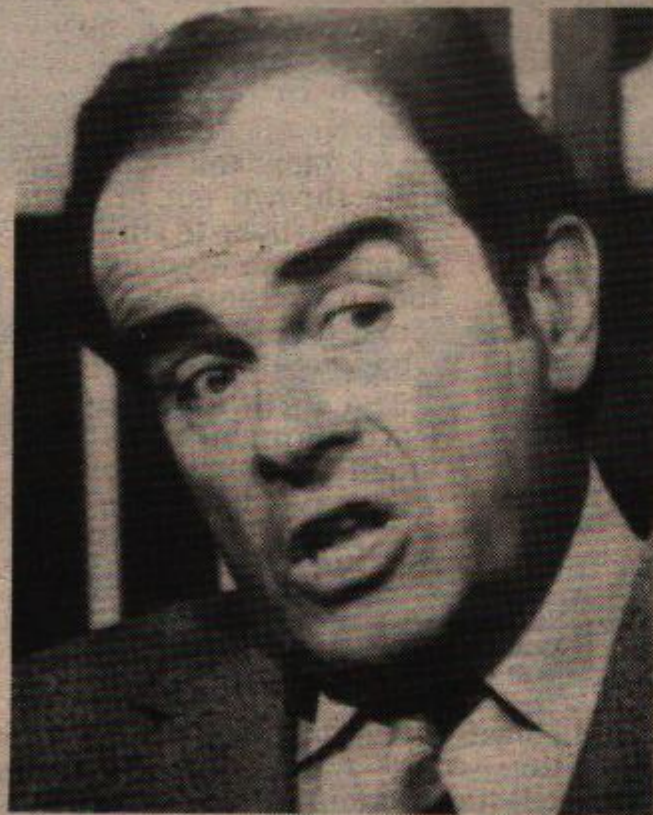
tory. A party which wields total power, which holds the Presidency, the Cabinet, and a parliamentary, is computing its own defeat before even fighting.'

He described the Socialists' attitude as a 'defeatist scenario'.

Stung

One of the reasons Marchais has been stung into action is that Socialist Party secretary-general Lionel Jospin this week accused the Stalinists of being a 'sectarian' and 'isolated' movement.

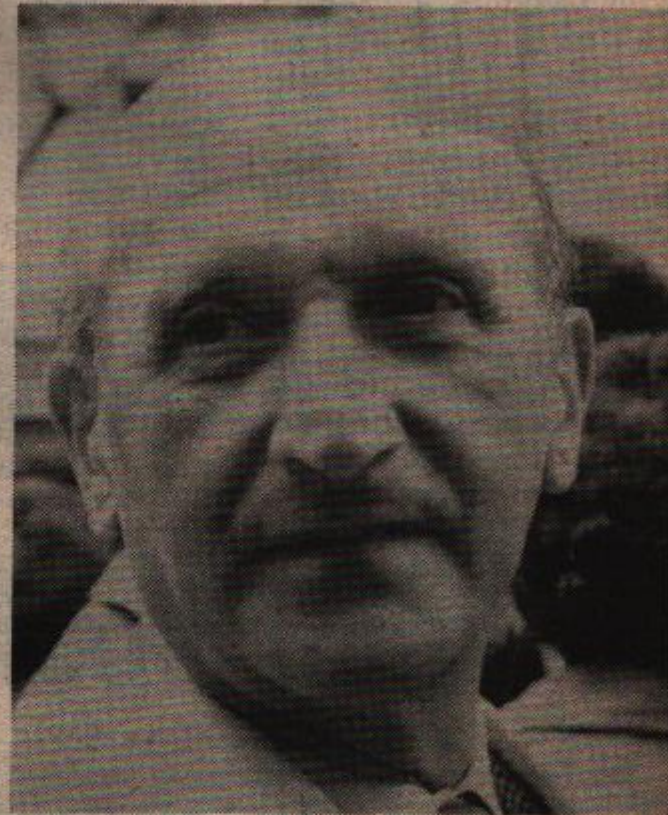
Marchais has been fighting a long battle since before this year's congress against several factions that want a 'democratising' of the party and a separation

from the policies of Moscow, particularly in relation to Afghanistan, Poland's Solidarity movement and arms control.

More recently Marchais has been challenged by no less a senior Stalinist official than the influential general secretary of the Confederation

Generale du Travail (CGT) Henri Krasucki.

Krasucki, a senior member of the Politburo, has declared his leadership of the CGT unilaterally independent and has pursued policies in conflict with the official party.

The French Communist Party last year fell to its

lowest ebb since 1928 by drawing only 11 per cent of the vote in local elections.

The Stalinists were junior partners in government with the Socialists until July last year, when they pulled out over disagreements with Mitterrand's economic policies.

Iraqis
hit
Turkish
tanker

BAHRAIN — The Iraqi authorities yesterday said they hit a second Turkish supertanker in the Gulf.

The Turkish supertanker 'M. Ceyhan' was hit south of Iran's Kharg Island oil export terminal, according to Gulf shipping spokesmen.

They said the vessel was believed to be a sister ship of the 188,868-gross-tonne 'M. Vatan', hit in an Iraqi air strike on Tuesday.

In Baghdad, a military spokesman said Iraqi jets had hit a 'large naval target' south of Kharg and reported a ground attack on Iranian positions in the Gulf's war sector.

The two attacks were clearly aimed at disrupting Iran's special export shuttle operation from Kharg to the lower reaches of the waterway to avoid Iraqi strikes.

The Bahrain shipping spokesmen said the 'M. Ceyhan' was ablaze after being hit in the engine room on the starboard side by an air-fired missile.

They said dense smoke was hampering fire-fighting operations but that all crew members had been plucked to safety from life rafts at the scene.

The vessels' Istanbul-based owners said both ships had been leased to Iran in April for six months to help shuttle oil from Kharg Island, inside the Iraqi-imposed war zone, to a makeshift export terminal off Sirri Island, 330 miles to the south-east.

Four tankers involved in the shuttle to Sirri, near the entrance of the Gulf and outside the apparent range of Iraqi jets, have been confirmed hit in three months, jeopardising the operation which began in February.

KUWAIT MOURNING
SEAFRONT CARNAGE

KUWAIT — The Kuwaiti government declared a national day of mourning yesterday as a man-hunt continued for the bombers behind two restaurant blasts that killed 11 people and injured 89 others.

The Cabinet met in continuous emergency session and General Yousuf Bader al-Kharafi, an undersecretary of the Interior Ministry, dismissed

reports that arrests had already been made.

There were unconfirmed reports that one of the people killed in the blasts was a senior police interrogation officer who apparently was visiting one of the cafes.

State-controlled radio and television dropped scheduled programmes and instead broadcast readings from the Koran.

KUNA, the Kuwait news agency, said most of the dead and injured were

believed to be Kuwaitis and nearly all the rest were Arab nationals.

No light has been shed on the identity of the bombers or the motive for the attacks, which came several weeks after a failed suicide car-bomb bid on the life of the Emir, Sheikh Jaber al-Ahmed al-Sabah, who escaped with scratches.

The bombs ripped through the two seafont restaurants, packed with families relaxing on the

eve of the Muslim holy day, in the late evening on Thursday.

One bomb exploded at al-Sharq, central Kuwait, near the Sief Palace which houses the Council of Ministers and close to the site of the May 25 attack on the Emir.

The other, which like the first was planted among trees adorning the area, went off several miles south in the fashionable residential suburb of Salmiya.

The 'Al-Anba' daily newspaper estimated the size of the central city bomb at between 33lbs and 44 lbs. The blast wrecked the building, tearing bodies apart, KUNA said.

Limbs flew through the air and blood sprayed a wide area around the cafe as victims screamed for help, according to an eyewitness quoted by KUNA. One of the cafes was engulfed by fire.

The atmosphere in the city was so tense that rumours spread quickly yesterday morning of another blast, which General Kharafi denied and attributed to a sonic boom by a passing jet.

Another daily, 'al-Qabas' said naval patrol craft had drawn a tight security net down the Gulf state's 140-mile coastline to help seal off escape routes. Land border crossings were shut after the blasts.

Gorbachev to
wield the axe

MOSCOW — 'Pravda', the Soviet Communist Party daily, yesterday issued a blunt call for what it described as radical changes in the economy and warned that workers who did not co-operate would either have their wages cut or be sacked.

System

The call was published a day after Communist Party chief Mikhail Gorbachev hinted at a new system of 'flexible management' by the end of the year.

Gorbachev made public his plan while addressing party officials in Minsk, the capital of Byelorussia, the western Soviet republic.

In a front-page editorial echoing Gorbachev's demands, the paper said: 'The country needs not just any renewal but a full rearmament of the whole technological chain...'

'If you want to improve your own and your collective's material standards and gain the respect of society, boldly modernise technology, save resources, cut down on losses, learn to walk in step with life, move forward more quickly.'

'If you don't want to or can't act like this, don't hope to receive your wage or the average salary just the same or to keep your job.'

Gorbachev's Minsk speech did not give details but, combined with 'Pravda's' curt warning, the remarks are the

clearest indication that the Kremlin plans to experiment with a range of as yet uncharted 'economic reforms'.

Top functionaries, both in the regions and in Moscow, are likely to be discreetly sacked.

Clique

Such removals are a common practice among the ruling clique in the Stalinist bureaucracy; to shift blame for economic and political crises on to functionaries and safeguard its political and material privileges.

Gorbachev himself repeatedly pledged in his Minsk speech to speed up development but never spelled out how he planned to boost the centrally-planned economy which rests on nationalised property.

According to a report by Tass, the official news agency, he said: 'In the current year we plan to work out... the integrated system of a more flexible and up-to-date economic mechanism.'

The party boss said such a 'mechanism' was aimed at increasing the initiative and responsibility of each enterprise, removing barriers in the way of scientific and technical progress and raising labour productivity.

Tasks

Gorbachev also criticised 'certain leaders', who he did not name, saying they were failing to adapt to new tasks he had set since taking office in March.

He charged them with being too attached to 'formal methods of work' and of 'irresponsibility'.

The trip to Byelorussia was Gorbachev's third provincial trip since March.

ISLAMABAD — About 600 people were arrested and large quantities of arms seized in the western city of Quetta, the Pakistani military authorities said yesterday.

They alleged the sloop followed Shi'ite unrest in which at least 27 people are reported to have been killed.

About 450 of those arrested in a house-to-house search of Quetta's curfew-bound Marriabad district were Afghan refugees who would be expelled, government spokesmen said.

But they asked not to be named and denied press reports in Quetta that six people were killed in gun battles with the authorities on Thursday.

Quetta has been under draconian paramilitary control since Tuesday.

Judge demands gag
on Murphy comment

SYDNEY — A senior Australian judge has demanded a gag on public comments on the conviction last week of High Court judge Lionel Murphy, a former Labour Attorney General.

Judge David Yeldham of the New South Wales Supreme Court singled out Foreign Minister Bill Hayden. He said the Cabinet minister's remarks were 'grossly improper'.

The court last week found Murphy guilty of attempting to pervert the course of justice.

Murphy, Australia's third-highest-ranking judge, is due to be sentenced next Thursday after conviction on one of two charges of attempting to pervert the course of justice.

He is the first Australian

judge to be tried and convicted of a criminal offence and faces a maximum penalty of two years' jail.

Hayden, a senior Cabinet member of the Labour government of Prime Minister Bob Hawke, is one of a number of politicians and academics to comment on the verdict.

Reports

He said he believed Murphy was innocent. 'I know the man,' Hayden insisted in press reports.

Yeldham claimed in a prepared statement at the end of an unrelated criminal trial on Thursday that a number of comments on Murphy's verdict had been 'lamentable and grossly improper'.

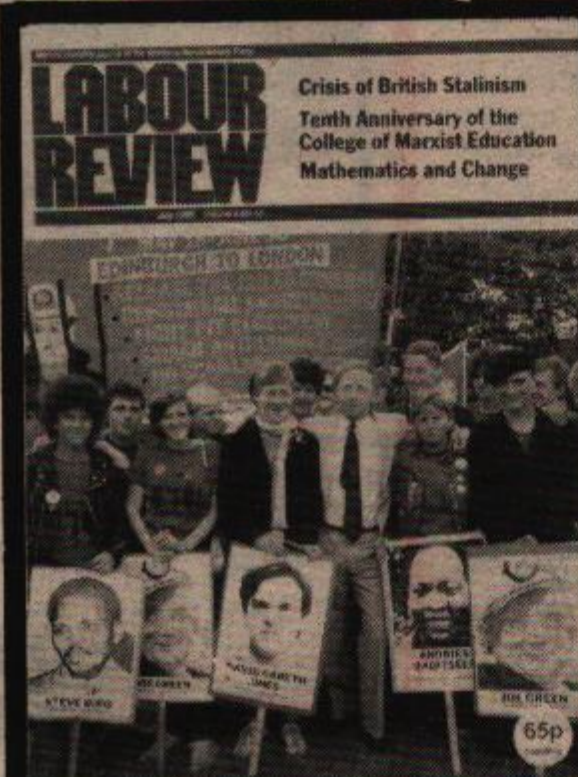
He said: 'We have had

the sorry spectacle of a senior member of the government saying that in his opinion and notwithstanding the verdict of the jury, the accused at the trial was innocent.'

Yeldham claimed few, if any, of the politicians who had commented on the Murphy trial had any real knowledge of criminal law.

The foreman of the Murphy jury has also made an unprecedented and emotional public defence of himself and his co-jurors.

The unidentified man said on a Sydney radio station: 'I don't think anybody who has commented has any idea of the month out of our lives, the anguish, the heartache we went through to do what was required of us.'

Euros join Thatcher against the NUM

IT WAS entirely predictable that Tory ministers in Thatcher's regime and the capitalist press would howl with fury over the rule changes decided by last week's National Union of Mineworkers' conference in Sheffield.

What enraged Employment Minister Peter Bottomley was the fact that the NUM conference, four months after the historic year-long strike, expressed the undefeated strength of the miners and the union's fighting unity.

Bottomley complained bitterly about the conference decision to repel all state interference in the union's elections and to initiate a rule change which had the effect of confirming Arthur Scargill as president.

And who should come to the aid of the Tory witch-hunters but the Euro-Stalinists who dominate and control the Communist Party of Great Britain.

The Stalinists' four-page 'Focus' (25p) has a front-page headline which sets the loathsome tone of the article itself: 'Disturbing divisions in the miners' union'. ('Focus', July 11, 1985)

What 'disturbing divisions'? The conference was united. A tiny clique of Notts scabs walked out and have now formed a state-organised breakaway which is nothing more than a company union on behalf of Thatcher and MacGregor.

After insisting at length that the miners have been 'defeated' — a crucial argument for all those demanding an end to any industrial fight against pit closures — CP executive committee member Dave Priscott rounds on the NUM leaders:

'What disturbed me most about the conference was the failure to face up to defeat and to accept the need for a critical examination of the tactics. In the end this must be put down to a failure of leadership.'

He then goes on to attack the rule changes, thus stating a desire to expose the NUM to the anti-union legislation. 'At the moment, I am not convinced that a tightening up of the rule-book will achieve the unity we all so much desire.'

Coming from a Stalinist whose party is split down the middle (and sideways as well) Priscott is in no position to offer advice on 'unity'!

Speaking of the Stalinists' alleged devotion to the 'principle that all trade union officers without exception should stand for regular election', Priscott writes: 'Many of us would have been happier if the conference had made clear its attachment to that principle.'

This is thoroughly dishonest and a despicable Tory-motivated attack on the NUM. There was never any amendment to the rules demanding the regular re-election of national officers, so the conference never even had the opportunity to do what Priscott demands so self-righteously.

There was however a right-wing amendment from the Leicestershire area which by giving a casting vote to the president would have opened up the internal election procedure of the union to direct state attack.

The only inference to be drawn from Priscott's article is that the Communist Party Stalinists favoured the Leicestershire proposal.

As for Scargill himself, Priscott wrote: 'A big question at the conference was Arthur Scargill's own position, and here I must admit to some disquiet.' He accuses the NUM president of 'making tactical and strategical mistakes', but does not say what they were. He then snidely targets Scargill as a possible victim of the 'cult of the personality'.

To put this kind of slanderous attack on the front-page of 'the Communist Party weekly' is to echo the foul smears of Thatcher's Cabinet ministers and the Tory press.

Priscott will be at this weekend's CP executive committee meeting in London. So will NUM vice president Mick McGahey. Will McGahey demand a retraction of the front-page 'Focus' article and a censure of Priscott and the 'Focus' editor?



Release Jailed Miners

DURHAM'S 'BIG

THOUSANDS of miners, their families, and members of women's support groups from throughout the British coalfield will throng the streets of Durham today during the annual gala. 'The Big Meeting', traditionally the largest gathering of miners anywhere in the country, will be addressed by NUM president Arthur Scargill, Labour leader Neil Kinnock and other union leaders.

Kinnock nearly earned the distinction of becoming the first Labour leader in history to be refused an invitation to the gala for his hostile stance during the miners' year-long strike.

The Durham NUM executive initially recommended that he be banned because he had opposed the miners' fight for jobs. He was eventually granted an invitation by the narrowest of margins after consultation with the branches.

This year's gala takes place under the shadow of new closure proposals from the Coal Board. It has already doomed Horden pit and there are plans for further drastic cutbacks.

But NUM area secretary Tom Callan told the NUM conference last week that the coalfield was gearing itself for another battle to defend communities.

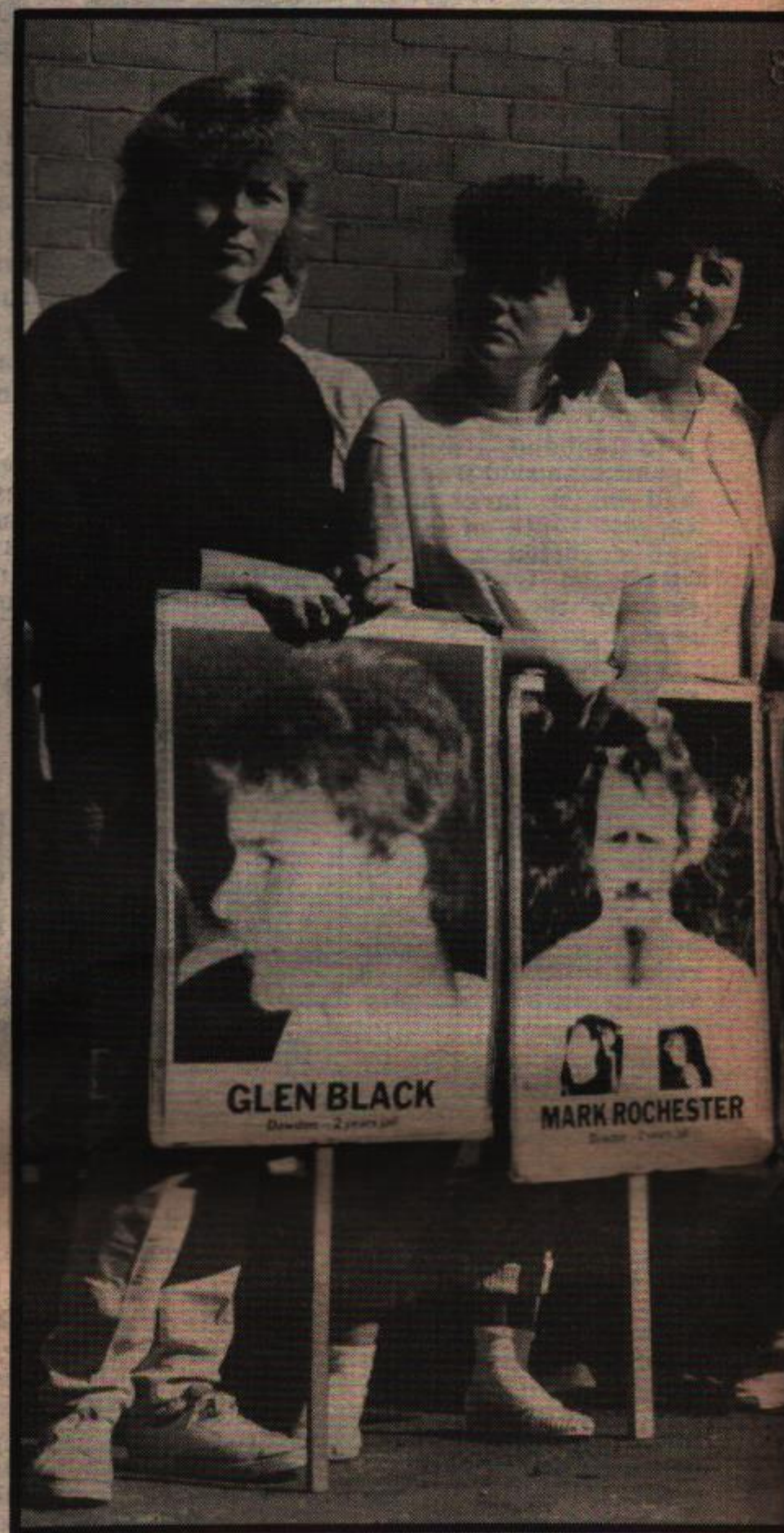

1. From the History of Philosophy

Kant had a dualistic starting point – for him consciousness was the subject of knowledge, whilst the world of 'things in themselves' was unknowable – He therefore transformed the opposition between subject and object into an absolute.

Hegel's conception of the objective world was equated to his 'absolute idea' as a product of thought. His dialectical, idealist, dualist method repudiated Kantian Scepticism, which he correctly claimed 'did not dare affirm "it is"', whilst Kant's 'modern idealism did not dare to regard cognition as a knowledge of the Thing in itself'. (Lenin's *Collected Works*, Volume 38, p.130-131). His conception of knowledge consisted of abstractions from his 'absolute idea' which accounts for their objective dialectical idealist origin.

As Marx and Engels explained: '... In Hegel's *Phenomenologie* the material, sensuously perceptible, objective foundations of the various estranged forms of human self-consciousness are allowed to remain. The whole destructive work results in the most conservative philosophy because it thinks it has overcome the objective world, the sensuously perceptible real world, by transforming it into a "thing of thought", a mere determinateness of self-consciousness, and can therefore also dissolve its opponent, which has become ethereal, in the "ether of pure thought". The *Phenomenologie* is therefore quite consistent in that it ends by replacing human reality by "absolute knowledge" ... The whole of the *Phenomenologie* is intended to prove that self-consciousness is the only reality and all reality.' (See Volume 4, *Collected Works of Marx and Engels*: 'The Holy Family or Critique of Critical Critique')

Engels, together with Marx, characterised nature as the proof of dialectics. To them practice was the basis of the verification of dialectical knowledge and not Hegel's 'absolute idea' which Engels described in *Anti-Duhring* as 'a colossal miscarriage' – the role of theory as a guide to practice explained.

READING: *Anti-Duhring*: Introduction-General (Engels), *Dialectical Materialism – The History of Philosophy* (Theodore Oizerman).

2. Practice and Cognition

'Sense-perception' (see Feuerbach) must be the basis of all science. Only when it proceeds from sense-perception in the twofold form of sensuous consciousness and **sensuous need** – that is, only when science proceeds from nature – is it true science. All history is the history of preparing and developing "man" to become the object of **sensuous consciousness**, and turning the requirements of "man as man" into his needs. History itself is a real part of **natural history** – of nature developing into man. Natural science will in time incorporate into itself the science of man, just as the science of man will incorporate into itself natural science; there will be **one science**. (See Volume 3, *Collected Works of Marx and Engels*: 'Economic and Philosophic Manuscripts of 1844').

The Individual, Particular and Universal I-P-U categories as a syllogism formed in the course of practice. 'Identical opposites' ... 'the individual exists only in the connection that leads to the universal. The universal exists only in the individual and through the individual. Every individual is (in one way or another) a universal.' (Lenin's *Collected Works*, Volume 38, p.361)

'My general consciousness is only the **theoretical** shape of that of which the **living** shape is the real community, the social fabric, although at the present day **general** consciousness is an abstraction from real life and as such confronts it with hostility. The **activity** of my general consciousness, as an activity, is therefore also my **theoretical** existence as a social being.

'Above all we must avoid postulating "society" again as an abstraction vis-a-vis the individual. The individual is the **social being**. His manifestations of life – even if they may not appear in the direct form of communal manifestations of life carried out in association with others are therefore an expression and confirmation of social life.' 'Thinking and Being are thus certainly **distinct**, but at the same time they are in unity with each other.' (Volume 3, *Collected Works of Marx and Engels*, *ibid*)

'The abolition of private property is therefore the complete **emancipation** of all human senses and qualities, but it is this emancipation precisely because these senses and attributes have become, subjectively and objectively, human.' (*ibid*)

The struggle against bourgeois idealist pressure in the everyday work of the Party – Dangers of a reluctance to analyse the results of the Party's practice – The negative role of administration and routine departmental work as things in themselves – The need for a constant struggle against 'blind activism', which without critical analysis relays bourgeois ideology into the Party. (See Political Letters Nos.7 and 3/7)



The theory of the Workers Revolutionary Party and tactics in the British socialist revolution

TUTOR PETER JONES

1. A study of Lenin's 'What is to be Done?'

a) The struggle for revolutionary theory versus 'freedom of criticism' The slogan 'freedom of criticism' as a 'veritable war-cry' (Lenin's *Collected Works*, Volume 5, p.350) – a declaration of war on democratic centralism and revolutionary theory. 'Freedom of criticism' is the beginning of the opportunist liquidation of the revolutionary movement.

'He who does not deliberately close his eyes cannot fail to see that the new "critical" trend in socialism is nothing more nor less than a new variety of **opportunism**. And if we judge people, not by the glittering uniforms they don or by the high-sounding appellations they give themselves, but by their actions and by what they actually advocate, it will be clear that "freedom of criticism" means freedom for an opportunist trend in Social-Democracy, freedom to convert Social-Democracy into a democratic party of reform, freedom to introduce bourgeois ideas and bourgeois elements into socialism.' (Volume 5, p.354-335)

Lenin explains how 'the very same social and political content of modern international opportunism reveals itself in a variety of ways according to national peculiarities'. (Volume 5, p.360)

The importance of the theoretical struggle – opposition to theory ('anti-theory') as capitulation to bourgeois ideology.

'Without revolutionary theory there can be no revolutionary movement. This idea cannot be insisted upon too strongly at a time when the fashionable preaching of opportunism goes hand in hand with an infatuation for the narrowest forms of practical activity.' (Volume 5, p.369)

b) The spontaneity of the masses and revolutionary consciousness Lenin explains that 'the "spontaneous element", in essence, represents nothing more nor less than consciousness in an **embryonic form**'. (Volume 5, p.374)

The spontaneous movement represents 'the class struggle in embryo, but only in embryo'. (Volume 5, p.375)

'We have said that there could not have been Social-Democratic consciousness among the workers. It would have to be brought to them from without. The history of all countries shows that the working class, exclusively by its own effort, is able to develop only trade-union consciousness, i.e., the conviction that it is necessary to combine in unions, fight the employers, and strive to compel the government to pass necessary labour legislation etc. The theory of socialism, however, grew out of the philosophic, historical, and economic theories elaborated by educated representatives of the propertied classes, by intellectuals. By their social status, the founders of modern scientific socialism, Marx and Engels, themselves belonged to the bourgeois intelligentsia.' (Volume 5, p.375)

The revolutionary situation in Britain and the dangers of 'bowing to spontaneity'.

'And so, we have become convinced that the fundamental error committed by the "new trend" in Russian Social-Democracy is its bowing to spontaneity and its failure to understand that the spontaneity of the masses demands a high degree of consciousness from us Social-Democrats. The greater the spontaneous upsurge of the masses and the more widespread the movement, the more rapid, incomparably so, the demand for greater consciousness in the theoretical, political, and organisational work of Social-Democracy.' (Volume 5, p.396)

2. The Workers Revolutionary Party and the United Front tactic

a) The revolutionary identity of the Party is the heart of the United Front

The task of the Communist Party is to lead the proletarian revolution. In order to summon the proletariat for the direct conquest of power and to achieve it the Communist Party must base itself on the overwhelming majority of the working class. So long as it does not hold this majority, the Party must fight to win it. The Party can achieve this only by remaining an absolutely independent organisation with a clear programme and strict internal discipline.' ('On the United Front', in *First Five Years of the Communist International*, Volume 2, p.91)

b) The United Front tactic: 'the most important method in the struggle for the masses'. (Trotsky's *Writings on Britain*, Volume 2)

The United Front tactic is a method for building the WRP in struggle against reformism and Stalinism:

'A basic principle of this tactic is: "With the masses – always; with the vacillating leaders – sometimes, but only so long as they stand at the head of the masses." It is necessary to make use of vacillating leaders while the masses are pushing them ahead, without for a moment abandoning criticism of these leaders. And it is necessary to break with them at the right time when they turn from vacillation to hostile action and betrayal. It is necessary to use the occasion of the break to expose the traitorous leaders and to contrast their position to that of the masses. It is precisely in this that the revolutionary essence of the United Front policy consists. Without this, the struggle for the masses always threatens to turn into an opportunist kowtowing to spontaneity covered up by an in-no-way-binding criticism of opportunism in words alone.' (Trotsky's *Writings on Britain*, Volume 2, p.191)

The revolutionary tactic of the United Front versus Stalinist 'social fascism' and 'Popular Frontism'.

The significance and lessons of the National March to Release the Jailed Miners for the campaign for the United Front today.

Health service round-up

COHSE celebrates 75th anniversary

THE Confederation of Health Service Employees (COHSE) held its 75th anniversary this week in The Mason's Arms, Whitefield, north Manchester, in the very same rooms where COHSE's forerunner, the National Asylum Workers Union, was founded 75 years ago.

On July 9, 1910, eight charge attendants from Lancashire Asylums held a protest meeting at the Mason's Arms.

They were fighting against the 1909 Asylum Officers Superannuation Act, which ended the non-contributory pension scheme and forced workers to make contributions from their meagre wages.

This fight spearheaded the campaign to create a permanent and national trade union organisation. It marked the break from the employer-dominated Asylum Workers' Association, which was the chief instigator of the hated Act.

David William, COHSE general secretary told News Line: 'Our history is a history of struggle. It started 75 years ago with 12 members meeting in this room and to date our union numbers 250,000.'

Present at the anniversary was one of the union's oldest members, Herbert Hough, who had been branch secretary during the Radcliffe strike and occupation in 1922.

Dispute

He said: 'I first worked at Radcliffe Mental Hospital. I joined there in January 1921. I was on second-year probation when the dispute started.'

'The employers wanted to cut our wages by four shillings a week and increase hours of production from 60 to 66.'

Before World War I working hours had been 80 hours a week, he added.

'In the rural areas our wages were based on the agricultural workers' wages,' said Hough.

The union members had resisted the wage cuts and increase in working hours, 'but the employers refused arbitration and just told us to accept it. We prepared for a strike and occupation.'

'We had keys made to jam the locks, then some of the men buckled, but the 55 girls, who were magnificent, and 25 men stood firm.'

'The girls included the kitchen staff and laundry.'

'In the afternoon of April 5 the Battle of Radcliffe took place. Sixty-seven uniformed policemen broke their way in with hammers and crowbars.'

'The staff fought to repel the invaders for four

hours. Side by side with us fought the patients.'

'But finally we were overpowered and we were told we would be arrested, if we tried to re-enter the building.'

Hough smiled ironically when he told how he was presented with a special certificate by the authorities when he returned to the hospital last year after 62 years.

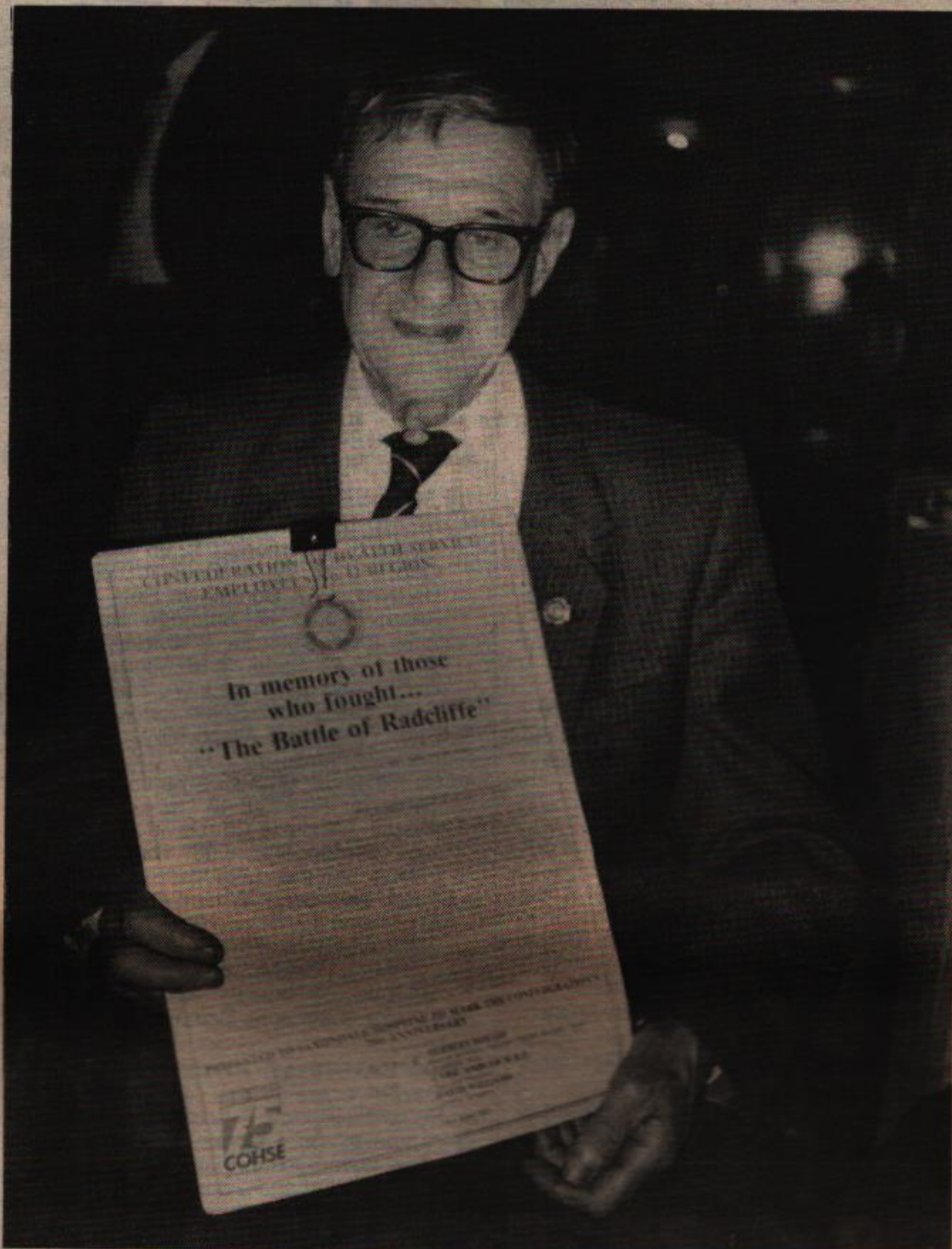
Bob Quick, regional secretary of COHSE in Sheffield, said Hough was 'one of the first militants who led the first hospital occupation in defence of health workers.'

'There is a lesson for every worker today in struggle against Thatcher's attack on the National Health Service,' Quick emphasised.

Occupations of hospitals would again become necessary in the fight against the Tory government, he warned.

John Mack joined the National Asylum Workers' Union in 1922 and worked for 35 years on the nursing staff at Prestwich hospital.

'At the top of our union membership cards is the imprint, "All for one and one for all". That's what trade unionism is all about,' he said.

Make cuts or we'll sack you!

TORY Health Minister, Kenneth Clarke, has ordered West Lambeth Health Authority members to make cuts or be expelled from office.

Clarke threatened that if they fail to make the £1 million cuts dictated by the government, authority members could be disqualified and government commissioners would be sent in to make the cuts.

The health authority has refused to make the cuts demanded by the Thatcher regime. It would mean axing 100 beds at St Thomas's hospital by October and it would also stop the opening of an old people's home in Streatham.

West Lambeth has already agreed to close the Tooting Bec and South Western hospitals within ten years to meet £11 million cuts in its annual budget being demanded by government.

But the savings from this would still fall short and officers told health authority members on Monday, in a secret report, that another 160 beds would have to go at St Thomas's.

One of those threatened with disqualification is Lambeth councillor, Stephen Bubb, who is already threatened with surcharge and disqualification for the council's stand against ratecapping.



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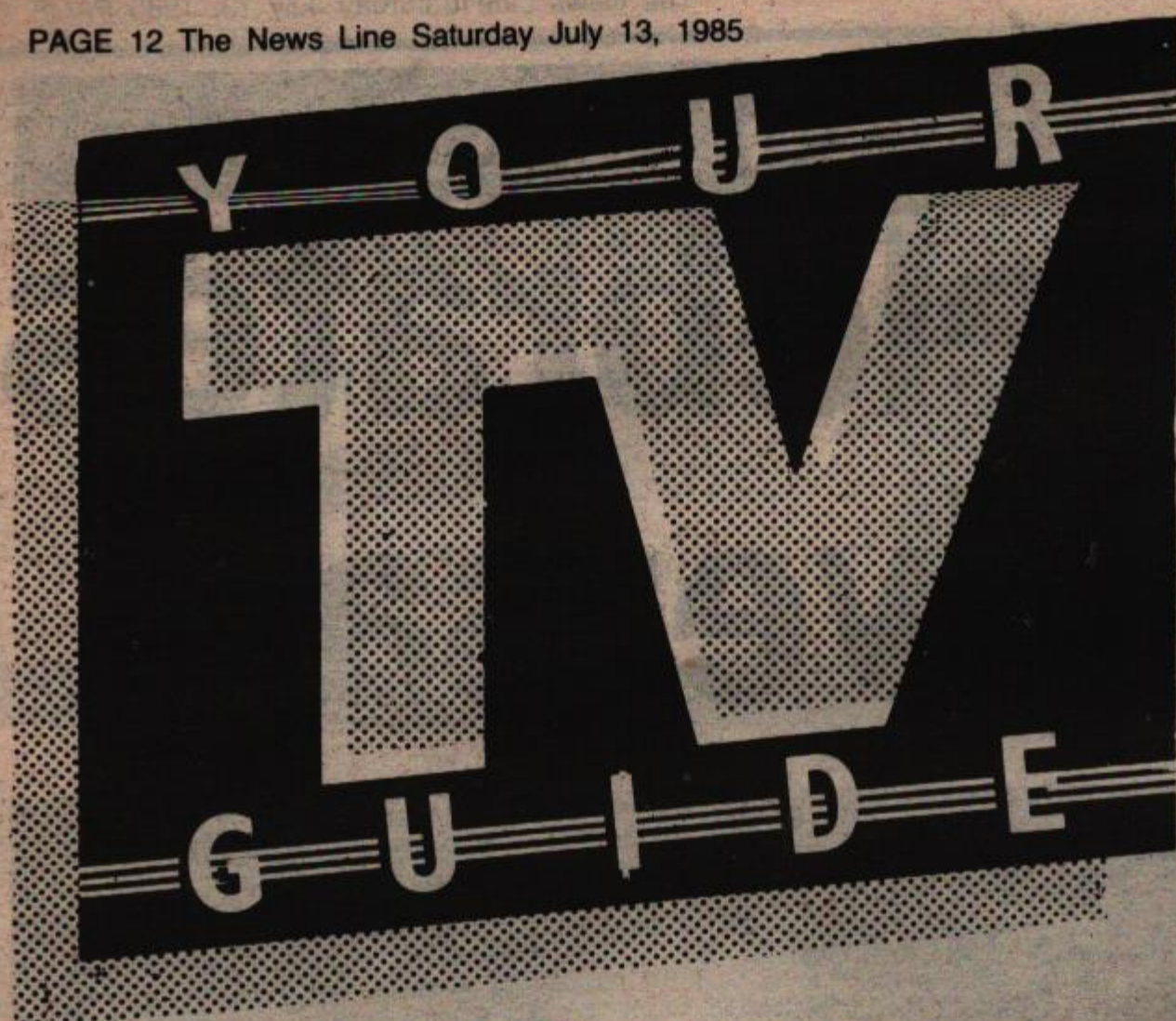

ALL BLACKS COURT PLEA

THE New Zealand Rugby Union has made a plea to the High Court in Wellington to refuse an injunction that would stop the All Blacks from leaving the country this coming Wednesday for a tour of racist South Africa.

The Rugby Union told the High Court yesterday their tour of racist South Africa would have to be abandoned if the court delays the All Blacks' departure.

An interim injunction would effectively mean that the tour would not go ahead, their lawyers said. 'The lead-in time for the new arrangements would mean the tour could not take place,'

Douglas White told the court.

The injunction is being sought by two rugby-playing lawyers from Auckland who are contesting the validity of the tour and are seeking an order to prevent the side leaving before the High Court

decides if the tour is valid or not.

They have asked the court to rule that the Rugby Union's decision to go ahead with the apartheid tour contravenes the Rugby Union's own constitution requiring its actions

to foster and develop the sport.

IN Port Elizabeth, South Africa, black car workers at Volkswagen's plant were in the third day yesterday of a protest against the company's plan to lend 12 mini buses for the tour.

RACIST RUGBY TOUR UN says 'think deeply'

THE CHAIRMAN of the United Nations committee against apartheid yesterday urged New Zealand's rugby players 'to think deeply' before deciding to tour with the All Blacks in racist South Africa.

In a direct appeal to the players, Joseph Garba of Nigeria said Africa looked to New Zealand and the Commonwealth for help to end oppression.

Garba spoke yesterday

of shared common beliefs in the traditional ideals of sportsmanship, fair play and equal treatment on and off the field.

'I know it would not be easy to decline the very great honour of representing your country at your chosen sport,' he said in his message, 'especially after all the hard work that has gone into your reaching the top.'

But by refusing to play rugby with South Africa, the New Zealanders would be sending the clearest message possible to the South African regime and its supporters, Garba said.

Help for the tennis kids

THE International Tennis Federation has acted at last and stopped players under 14 from burning themselves out on the professional circuit.

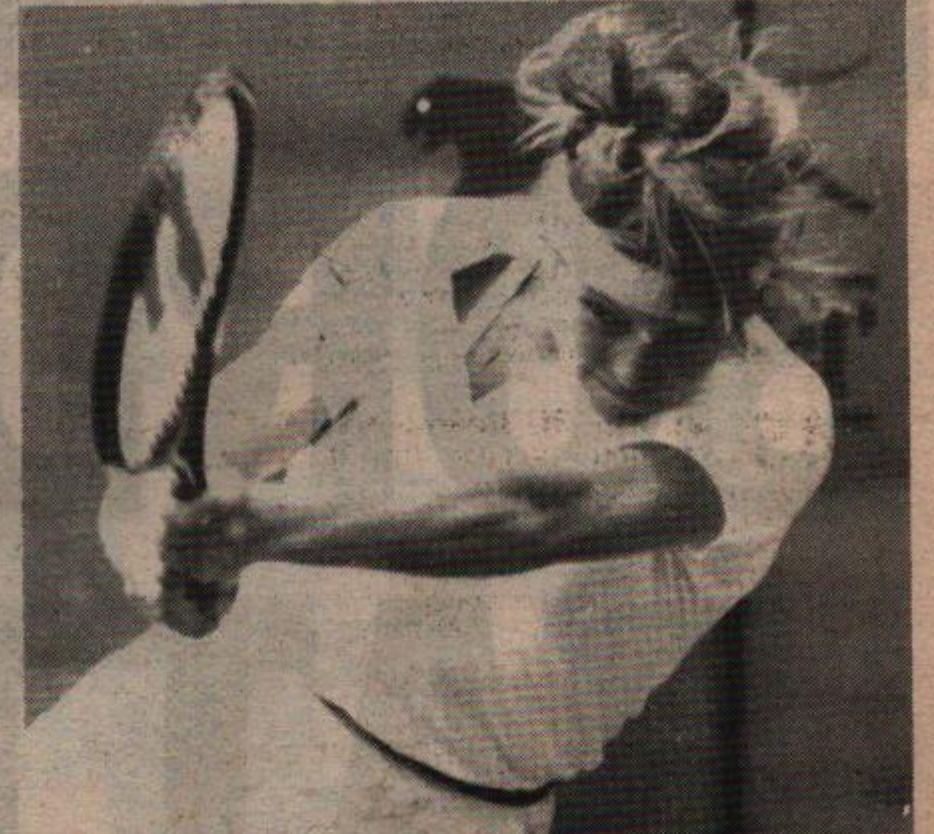
At their annual meeting, the ITF decided that players aged 14-15 would be allowed a maximum of eight pro tournaments a year, including four of the major competitions.

Players aged 15-16 can compete in 12 events, including eight majors. The new rules take effect from January 1 next year.

The ITF also decided to end international competitions for players under 12, and Philippe Chatrier of France, who was re-elected president, said: 'We hope to raise this to age 14.'

But young players, like Argentina's Gabriela Sabatini, already competing in major tournaments will not be affected by the new rules.

In another move, the ITF decided unanimously to lobby for all players to take part in the Olympics without age discrimination, though this will require approval by the Olympic Committee,

which meets in October next year.

The Federation also established an African group for the Davis Cup to include Kenya, Nigeria, Senegal and Libya.

The ITF has changed the rules for the increasing number of young players trying to make it on the professional tennis circuit because they run the risk of suffering too much from the rigours of travelling from one tennis tournament to another,

often hundreds or thousands of miles away, all the year round.

This non-stop tennis has already forced two of the top women tennis players, Andrea Jaeger and Tracy Austin, into early retirement.

The only young player who appears to have survived her gruelling time in international tennis is Kathy Rinaldi, who was the youngest player ever at Wimbledon in 1981 when she was 14.

Chris fits the bill

SOUTHAMPTON yesterday appointed Chris Nicholl as team manager. The former Northern Ireland centre half has signed a three-year contract.

Nicholl, 38, has spent the last two years as

assistant manager at Grimsby, and becomes the second successive manager recruited by Southampton from Grimsby, following Laurie McMenemy.

yesterday: 'We wanted someone with character and intelligence and steeped in football knowledge.'

'Hopefully he will follow our previous managers in becoming a first class leader.'

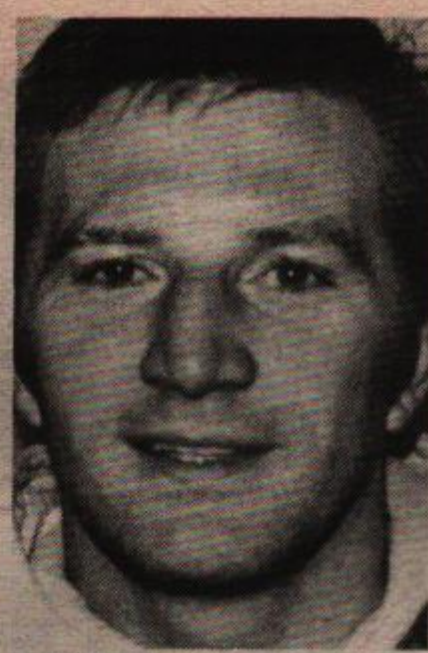

COLIN JONES who returns to the ring in September, hopes to get a fourth world title fight against the winner of Sunday's fight in Monte Carlo between welterweight champion Milton McCrory and Panama's Carlos Trujillo.

twice for the WBC version of the title in 1983, for a draw and then a split decision in favour of the American. In January this year, in a sell-out at the NEC Birmingham, he was stopped with a badly cut nose by Don Curry, the WBA champion.

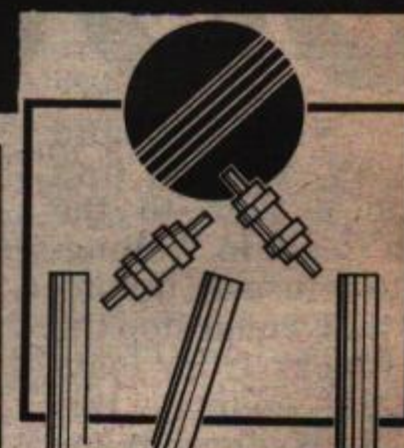
In deciding to carry on

ENGLAND lost the initiative as Australia fought back strongly on the second day of the third Test at Nottingham.

England captain David Gower expressed hopes on Thursday night of a 600 plus first innings total. But those hopes were dismissed as England collapsed to 456 all out, losing their last eight wickets for only 91 runs yesterday.

Then the Australians, requiring 257 to avoid the follow-on, responded with an opening stand of 87 between Graeme Wood and Andrew Hilditch.

Although Paul Allott captured Hilditch lbw for 47, at the close the tourists, on 94 for one, were only 163 runs short of their follow-on target.

It was a disappointing ending to the day for Gower who had battled elegantly for 166, his highest score against Australia and his third largest for England.

But if fulfilled his grim prediction, that with the Trent Bridge wicket containing few obvious grem-

lins a long dour struggle lay ahead.

England's demise from a healthy 279 for two overnight was totally unexpected and began in bizarre fashion.

For the first hour Gower, resuming on 107 and Mike Gatting, on 53, played with caution adding just 21 runs as the Australian pacemen, aided by a new ball after eight overs, found their line for the first time in the match.

As the danger subsided Gower launched into a series of vintage cover drives — initially off the back foot but later as his timing improved, increasingly off the front foot.

All the while Gatting was patiently and securely working his way towards what would have been his first Test 100 in this country.

With the gates closed 40 minutes after the start the packed Nottingham crowd anticipated a mammoth score by England, but with lunch approaching Gatting on 74 was out to an unlucky dismissal.

Gower aimed a fierce back foot drive straight back at spinner Bob Holland and the bowler deflected the ball onto the stumps with Gatting stranded after a third wicket stand of 187.

His partner followed just two overs later. After six and a half hours at the crease with 17 boundaries Gower received a devious leg cutter from Simon O'Donnell and for once could be forgiven for edging a catch behind.

Immediately after lunch Ian Botham (38) and Allan Lamb (17) added 51 for the fifth wicket wicket in well under even time but the prolonged flourish England required failed to materialise.

Lamb was trapped leg before, Botham miscued into the covers and as the tail folded the hard-working Geoff Lawson finished with five for 103 from an exhausting 39 overs.

Towards the end of the England innings and perhaps with less able batsmen at the crease the ball appeared to deviate for the first time in the match.

High humidity and cloud cover offered Gower's bowling attack hope, but Wood and Hilditch, after a winter facing the West Indians, found little menace in Ian Botham, Arnold Sidebottom, who was none too accurate on his debut, and Allott.

At the end of the day spinners John Emburey and Phil Edmonds were working in tandem but with the pitch refusing, as yet, to respond to their guile a draw is a strong possibility.

WILLIE BANKS plans a record busting show at the Kodak AAA Championships at Crystal Palace today.

The American showman has brought the triple jump out of the shadows into centre stage with his flamboyant performances, and always performs well in London.

This summer he has at last fulfilled his massive potential, smashing the 10-year-old world record with a prodigious leap of 17.97 metres.

Now Banks can go for the UK All-Comers record of 17.46 metres set two years ago in the same arena by Australian Ken Lorraway.

He admits that Crystal Palace is one of his favourite venues. The jumping maestro, Olympic silver medalist in Los Angeles, always puts on a dazzling display in front of the main grandstand, and is looking for his first AAA title.

Record

'It would be good to break another record and I can think of no better place than Crystal Palace,' said Banks.

'I have had a problem with my knees since breaking the world record, but I am feeling good and the crowd always helps me here.'

Steve Cram returns refreshed after a two week break in the 800 metres, the title he won last year, and said: 'I've been able to have a week of solid training without any pain from my calf. Staying away has given me the break I needed.'

Lincoln Asquith and Linford Christie, who scored a notable 100 metres one-two against East Germany last weekend, will have their work cut out staying with American Darwin Cook, credited with 10.19 seconds in Lausanne this week.

Birmingham gets Olympics bid

BIRMINGHAM was yesterday chosen as candidate for the British bid to host the 1992 Olympic Games.

The city easily beat off challenges from Manchester and London at a British Olympic Association meeting to become the country's nomination.

Birmingham took 25 votes, Manchester five and London just two when the bids were considered.

'Birmingham was clearly the best of the bids,' said BOA chairman Charles Palmer.

'Then we had to decide if they were worthy to be put forward to the International Olympic Committee selection in October 1986 and it was decided unanimously that they should go forward.'

Paris, Barcelona and Brisbane are clear leaders in the race to host the Games, but Birmingham will next week launch an international campaign to seek support.

'We hope the whole of Britain will support the city of Birmingham in its quest to stage the 1992 Games,' said Palmer.

Lesotho says no

LESOTHO has banned the New Zealand All Blacks rugby team from visiting the country during its tour of racist South Africa due to start next week, information minister Desmond Sixshe said yesterday.
