

WORLD CUP THE BATTLE OF HANDSWORTH

HURD FLEES ANGRY YOUTH

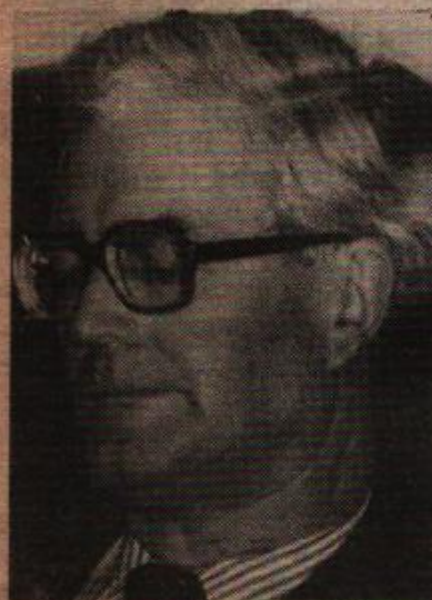
BELFAST came to Birmingham yesterday as hundreds of youth defied para-military riot police on the streets of England's second largest city.

Running battles raged all afternoon in Handsworth after a night of clashes in an area scarred by years of neglect and chronic mass unemployment.

Councillors and community leaders blamed police methods for the unrest in which two people were burned to death in an Asian-owned shop.

The signal for renewed violence yesterday was a provocative visit to Lozells Road by new Tory Home Secretary Douglas Hurd.

As soon as the former Ulster Secretary stepped from his car he was surrounded by a hostile crowd protesting angrily

over police harassment and intimidation.

Within seconds Hurd and West Midlands chief constable Geoffrey Dear faced a barrage of rocks and bottles. Amid pandemonium the Tory minister was bundled into a police transit van and whisked away.

But his visit had lit the fuse for further violent clashes. As firemen picked their way through the smouldering ruins of gutted shops, youth again starting throwing missiles from side streets.

They overturned cars

and then erected burning barricades as reinforcements of riot police were drafted into the area.

Shops in Heathfield road, which runs parallel to Lozells Road, soon became targets and premises belonging to building contractors were set on fire.

The youth, some of them wearing police riot helmets and coats captured the night before, then headed off down towards Perry Barr.

They melted away into the housing estates, but the police did make one particularly brutal arrest.

A young West Indian youth with dreadlocks was cornered by a riot squad in a back garden. As we approached, one of the officers yelled to his colleague: 'Okay Geoff, that'll do, you've made the arrest.'

With blood pouring from his head and mouth, the youth was led away in handcuffs. For a moment he managed to free himself and ran off, but was immediately re-arrested and subjected to further brutality.

Last night police chiefs aggravated the tense atmosphere by deploying squads of riot police outside the Villa Cross pub and the popular Acapulco cafe.

Both premises were raided two weeks ago by police allegedly hunting for drugs — an action which enraged the local population and added to the clamour for an end to police provocation.

County Councillor James Hunte, a prominent member of the West Indian community in Birmingham, has angrily condemned the police for failing to heed his warning that a riot could erupt because of their ruthless tactics.

He urged the police on Monday night to release a man who had been handcuffed, beaten up and told that he would be pushed under a bus during his arrest.

Hunte, a member of the council's police committee, said: 'I told police to let him go if they wanted to avoid trouble. They could have charged him if they wanted to, but to keep him there when everyone said he was being beaten up was madness.'

'This riot could have been avoided if we had police who were more understanding.' He added: 'I will resign from the police committee. I am disgusted by the attitude of the new Chief Constable towards blacks.'

Gus Williams, a black community worker, also bitterly attacked Dear's tough methods.

'His insensitive policing has destroyed the good race relations we have built up over the last 10 years.'

Strangle the apartheid regime

PRESIDENT Reagan's sanctions and those imposed yesterday by the Common Market foreign ministers are an obscene hypocrisy. They would not harm a white flea and they are not intended to.

The White House and Luxembourg announcements are the clearest demonstration that the imperialist powers stand, albeit with various degrees of discomfort, with the racist dictatorship of President Botha.

Even the tamest black leader, Bishop Desmond Tutu, was obliged to remark that Washington's measures were so lame that the apartheid regime would be 'quite happy'.

He added that Reagan 'doesn't care two beans about black people in South Africa. I don't think he cares at all. That is why I call him a crypto-racist'.

The multi-racial reformist United Democratic Front (UDF) was equally scathing. It described Reagan's measures as 'an imperialist ploy' to give the Botha regime breathing space.

US House of Representatives Speaker Thomas O'Neill, a reactionary Democrat, said the president's executive order was 'chock full of loopholes' and would have 'little impact'.

Because of his own domestic crisis, Reagan made a sharp about-turn after months of saying that he was opposed to sanctions and would veto any move by Congress to introduce them. Monday's presidential statement was designed to pre-empt this week's congressional vote on legislation imposing partial sanctions by law.

According to Reagan and the Common Market ministers the ban on computer and nuclear technology sales will hit the racist state and its forces of repression. This is a pathetic lie.

The United Nations declared an arms embargo on the racist republic 22 years ago. Where does it stand today? It is self-sufficient in arms and has become an armaments exporter!

Only a few days ago, Defence Minister General Magnus Malan boasted about the regime's military strength saying that it had become 'a super power in the context of Africa'.

OPEC declared an oil embargo in 1977 yet the regime has developed a clandestine network of suppliers — reputedly the Thatcher government and the Norwegian government. Now it has vast stockpiles of oil in unused mines.

Those who recall Harold Wilson's much-vaunted 'blockade' against the Smith regime in Rhodesia will be aware that imperialist sanctions are a reactionary farce. Ten years after sanctions were imposed, the Salisbury regime brazenly reported that it had attained a 7 per cent annual growth rate. How was this achieved? By wholesale sanctions-busting organised with the full knowledge and active collusion of the Foreign Office and the Ministry of Defence.

Imperialist sanctions are a fiction to create the impression that 'at least something is being done' when the reality is that nothing is being done!

They will provide a smokescreen for the reactionary inactivity of the British trade union leaders who are as silent on the gathering revolutionary struggle in South Africa as Thatcher and the ruling class.

We demand that the TUC leaders immediately impose a complete boycott on all goods to and from South Africa. This means industrial action at all Britain's ports and airports.

When Thatcher hypocritically claims that sanctions will hurt the black working class, we quote the reply of black American writer James Baldwin: 'This pretension is scarcely worth noting, much less answering.'

WHILE the Thatcher government and the police have put down the street battles in Handsworth to 'criminals', the events of yesterday afternoon prove the highly political content of the fighting in the Birmingham area.

Newly appointed Tory Home Secretary Douglas Hurd was able to spend only five minutes in the area before angry youth launched themselves on him and his escort. Hurd

was bundled uncereemoniously into a police van and was driven rapidly to the relative safety of a police station.

In a single week of the new Thatcherite team of ministers, three have now sanctioned fresh assaults on the working class.

THREE MONTHS FOR SCAB FOULSTONE

SCAB miner Ken Foulstone from Manton colliery, South Yorkshire area, was jailed yesterday on a burglary charge.

One of the two men responsible for the court case which led to the seizure of NUM assets, Foulstone was sentenced to three months jail with a further nine months suspended for two years.

Foulstone, who told a Lincoln Crown Court that he was under police protection for his role during the miners' strike, had denied three offences dating back to 1977.

He was cleared of burglary at Serlby, the home of Lady Galloway, north Nottinghamshire, and another raid at Cantley Hall, owned by the the Derby family.

But the jury found him guilty of a third charge of burglary at a private bungalow in Bawtry Road, Doncaster. It is under-

stood he intends to appeal.

The five-day trial heard that Foulstone's criminal past was brought into the open by his estranged family from Harley, near Rotherham.

Foulstone, of Milton, near Tuxford, Nottinghamshire, left them in 1979 and later divorced wife Jean to remarry.

Son Stephen, 19, said Foulstone, 45, told him all about the burglary soon after it was committed.

He told the court he was appalled when Foulstone

appeared on television 'making statements about how the law should be obeyed. I thought it was about time to let people know about his past'.

Daughter Sharon, 22, said she did not hate her father but was disgusted with his law and order statements when she knew he had been a burglar.

Police began their investigations after his ex-wife and family tipped off the 'Daily Mirror'.

After the verdict, defending lawyer Oliver Blunt said Foulstone would 'from this day forward have to carry the shame of the conviction against him'.

His son Stephen, who has changed his name to Newton, said justice had been seen to be done, and he felt no remorse about unmasking his father.

US treasury told 'borrow more'

WASHINGTON — The US Treasury Department yesterday issued an urgent call on Congress to raise its borrowing ceiling to \$2 trillion (\$2,000 billion).

Without a \$255-billion increase to a record \$2.078 trillion the government would run out of money next month, congressmen were warned.

Acting Treasury Secretary John Niehenke said October 15 was the deadline to keep the government from running into the red.

Niehenke told a Senate finance subcommittee hearing yesterday: 'The word for that would be bankrupt.'

He admitted that the federal debt had doubled

in slightly less than five years.

Subcommittee chairman John Chafee, referring to the age of the American state, observed: 'It took 189 years to reach a trillion.'

The Treasury also asked to be allowed to sell \$50 in long-term bonds without regard to a legal interest payment limit of 4.25 per cent, in addition to the increase in the borrowing ceiling.

Treasury would prefer that this interest limit be abolished for its borrowing requirements, Niehenke told the subcommittee.

Greens occupy embassy

PRETORIA — Eight members of West Germany's radical Greens party occupied Bonn's embassy in the South African administrative capital yesterday in support of immediate economic sanctions by the Kohl government.

An embassy spokesman said the eight Greens members planned to stay put for 48 hours.

In Bonn, a Greens statement said six mem-

bers of the West German parliament were among the group, including Petra Kelly, the party's best-known MP abroad.

The Greens' protest was the first such action of its kind in the mounting wave of demands internationally on governments to boycott trade with Pretoria.

Unions back council

SHOP stewards representing Liverpool corporation workers yesterday pledged support — including all-out strike action — for council leaders who have been surcharged.

The following resolution was passed by Liverpool corporation workers joint shop stewards' committee executive:

'This joint stewards' committee deplores the decision by the district auditor to issue Labour councillors in Liverpool and Lambeth with surcharge certificates.

We pledge our full support for those Labour councillors who have stood firm in the fight to defend jobs and services. We therefore resolve to:

1. Raise the necessary finance to conduct an appeal against the arbitrary decision of the auditor;
2. Call on all Liverpool city council workers to support a 24-hour strike on Wednesday September 25, 1985;
3. Call on the National Local Authorities Coordinating Committee to support the 24-hour strike;
4. Call for a regional General Strike on Merseyside on September 25;

Schools shut

INDUSTRIAL action by NALGO local government workers in Liverpool closed 11 schools in the city yesterday when teachers and cleaners refused to cross picket lines.

The 24-hour strike action by 350 NALGO members was called because the council has not implemented a pay award. The council say they have been unable to find the cash.

The union is to have further talks this week, but has warned it will ballot members on indefinite strike action if no solution is found.

Army shows off its links with police

THE MILITARY top brass yesterday invited dignitaries and the press to Aldershot to show off its fast-developing operational links with the police. It was all part of the two-week national war exercise called 'Brave Defender'.

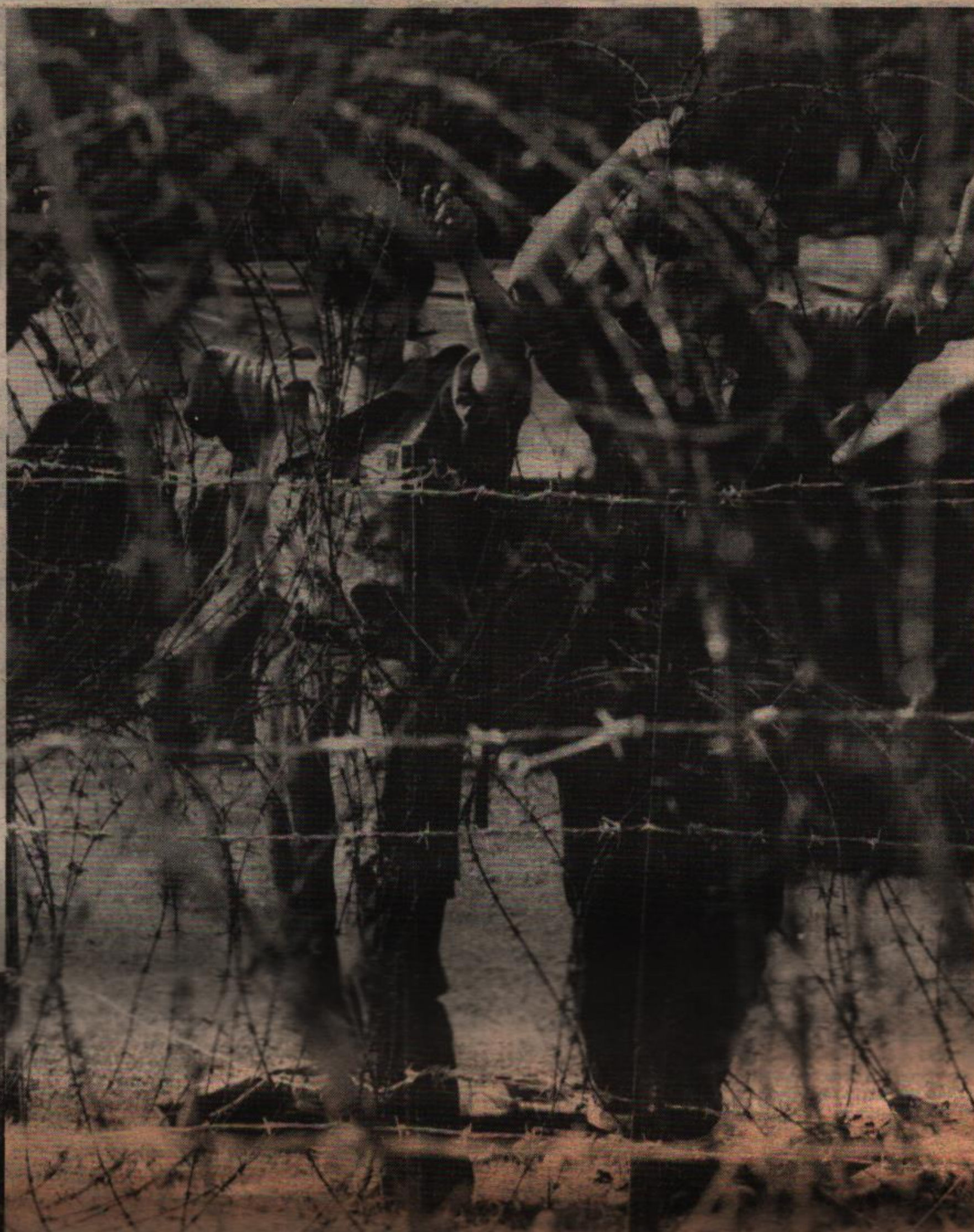
In yesterday's operation at Aldershot, army units had to flush out four groups of Spetsnaz (Soviet) special forces hidden in the undergrowth of the Surrey Downs on their way to sabotaging a so-called 'key point'. The police had the role of working with civilians to locate the hostile forces before the army went in.

In a briefing before the exercise, a Colonel Webster emphasised several times that in this kind of operation the army would not act without the police and that it was the police who were in charge.

Under the new Joint Tactical Doctrine, agreed in secret by the Tory Cabinet in July, this situation will be reversed and the army will have control over the police.

The 'Brave Defender' exercise which lasts two weeks is approaching its final phase. Officially it is concerned with guarding and protecting several hundred 'key points' throughout the country against enemy attack.

But in its pre-occupation with civilian unrest and demonstrations, its main concern is evidently with the organisation of police-army repression during a national emergency or a General Strike. In addition to yesterday's exercise, the press were shown a prisoner-of-war concentration camp, complete with masses of barbed wire, watch-towers and inmates.

Support for Scots teachers

CALLS for action by teachers to be intensified will be heard today as more than 40,000 members of Scotland's largest teachers' union take part in a one-day strike.

Demonstrations are being held in Aberdeen, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Kirkcaldy, Falkirk in a show of strength by the union, the Educational Institute of Scotland.

But there is a growing

feeling that action in the protracted dispute must be stepped up. At the Glasgow rally in particular, calls are expected for escalation — as well as for official approaches to other public sector unions for support and joint action.

John Pollock, EIS general secretary, said yesterday that support for today's stoppage was pouring in.

SDP rocked by bitter rows

IN BETWEEN 'blazing rows' between its leaders, the SDP yesterday declared itself a 'classless party' that backed a 'negotiated freeze' in nuclear weapons deployment.

But SDP leader David Owen's public quarrel with Liberal Party leader David Steel dominated the Social Democrats' Torquay conference yesterday.

Owen clashed with SDP president Shirley Williams after she asserted that Steel was likely to lead the Alliance after the next general election.

The clash broke out on Sunday, when Williams forecast that Steel would emerge leader because the the Liberals were likely to gain more seats in parliament.

Williams was forced to backtrack after a furious

exchange with both Owen and Steel repudiating her predictions.

But the row flared again yesterday, when Williams disclosed in her presidential address to delegates that she had had 'two blazing rows' with Owen since the SDP was founded in 1981.

Owen later had sharp words for Roy Jenkins, who he ousted as leader and who has delivered

veiled warnings about Owen taking the party too far to the right.

Jenkins had said that the party had to win votes 'in Durham as well as Devon', where Owen's Plymouth Devonport constituency lies.

Later in the conference, the SDP declared itself an 'open, radical and classless party' pledged to luring Labour votes.

REJECT BRITISH RAIL BLACKMAIL

STATEMENT OF THE ALL
TRADES UNIONS ALLIANCE

TOMORROW'S emergency conference of the NUR is totally unprecedented — not least because the British Railways Board has set out to frame the agenda, and dictate how the delegates will vote.

Through BR, the Tory state is attempting to manipulate NUR official policy.

Holding hostage the guards it has dismissed, BR bosses have declared that reinstatement of these guards is conditional on the conference scrapping union opposition to driver-only operation (DOO).

The policy to fight DOO was firmly taken at the union's annual general meeting, held in Ayr in June, only three months ago.

But the NUR must not allow itself to be drawn into talks or be blackmailed by BR into changing union policy. It is a trap to believe that concessions on productivity will result in reinstatement for sacked guards and the end of a turbulent episode.

As the guards have themselves stressed since this is no episode, and the present confrontation was NEVER just about DOO. Behind it has always been the whole Thatcherite drive to smash the effectiveness of trade unions — with the public sector unions in the front line.

This aim is linked to the intention of the 'road lobby' around Thatcher to implement the most extreme form of the Serpell plan, and destroy all but a tiny fraction of the rail network.

Full reinstatement of every sacked guard is without doubt the 100 per cent priority of the NUR. These guards were sacked for taking a courageous stand in defence of their union. They were locked out for resisting local imposition of DOO and the tearing up of national agreements in the industry.

But to now comply with the surrender terms demanded by BR would mean the sacked guards having made their sacrifice for nothing — and the union being left wide open to the real Tory-dictated strategy of BR.

The Tories, under provisions laid out by the now Transport Minister Nicholas Ridley before they came to office, have set up a network of scab lorry firms to meet a rail strike and to advance the ending of rail transport altogether.

By encouraging non-union long distance lorry and coach transport, the Tories and the 'road lobby' have undermined the hard-won rates for freight and passenger transport work.

The Tories now boast of equalling costs for coal transport on rail and road, especially since they introduced legislation to permit 38-tonne trucks onto British roads in May 1984.

Plans

The Road Haulage Association, in agreement with the Tory government, has contingency plans to permit three times the current freight carriage on the road. Employers would work lorries 24 hours-a-day, drawing on unemployed workers with HGV licences.

Passenger transport is geared for a similar assault on the railways. The Thatcher government has promoted 'cow-boy' operation to shift the balance in favour of road carriage. Only in London is the ratio of train commuters to car and bus commuters high enough to have caused the Tories concern.

But prior to the ballot, large companies had already taken up contracts with coach firms to bring commuters into the capital. It is clear that the future of the railways and its unions lie with an integrated transport policy under a Workers Revolutionary Government. Outside a planned socialist economy under workers' control, one section of the transport industry is used in turns to destroy the conditions and wages of the other sectors of the industry.

Thus it is essential for the rail unions not only to take action to defend themselves against DOO — which will in turn be used to drive down rates and conditions of other transport workers — but to seek an immediate and wide alliance in the transport industry to prevent strike-breaking.

Such an alliance will be vital to combat the corporatist policy being forced on all unions through the TUC right-wing majority on the general council.

It is also central to the struggle to organise the General Strike against the Thatcher dictatorship.

Corporatism (of which secret ballots are an integral development) is at the centre of rail management policy which must be resisted by the NUR. Jimmy Knapp has accused BR of brutal intimidation. This is not

new, but it proved successful this time through a weapon adopted by the union itself, the secret ballot. It was Knapp's personal intervention which swung last June's NUR conference into voting 40-to-36 in favour of adopting ballots.

Ballots

He told the conference: 'The Tories have got ballots like a sword hanging over us. Let's grab that sword out of their hands and smite them with it, use it to our own advantage, and slit them down the middle.'

Events were to prove otherwise. The treacherous theory of the 'democracy' of a ballot, backed assiduously by Labour leader Neil Kinnock, was seized on by BR, the Fleet Street press and the Thatcher government to beat the guards over the head.

There was, of course, nothing 'secret' about the national ballot in August. In fact it must have been the one of the most unsecret ballots ever held.

In the run-up to the ballot, BR consciously began provocations, scrapping the industry's negotiating procedure, locking out guards at selected depots — and posting them their P45s. Plans were put into operation to recruit a scab force in their place.

At huge cost, advertisements were placed in local and national newspapers to influence the result of the ballot. All guards also received, at their homes, at least two letters putting management's anti-union case.

BR bosses went on TV and radio to urge guards to vote 'No'. That, they said, would be the democratic to do. However, in the event of the ballot returning a 'Yes' vote, then this would be thoroughly undemocratic.

Furthermore, BR threatened, any guards implementing action decided upon as a result of the ballot would face the sack, and other railway workers would be locked out.

When the union tried to place its own advertisements in the national newspapers, the proprietors refused. So much for the 'democracy' of ballots.

Prior to the ballot, News Line commented on the sackings in this way: 'Union leaders may express some surprise at these developments, but

the concession on the Tory ballots only encouraged a board which takes its marching orders from Thatcher's Bonapartist regime.'

Terms

'The anti-union laws are designed to make trade unions subordinate to the Bonapartist state. Acceptance of British Rail terms for organising an industrial dispute immediately presented management with an initiative.' ('This Morning' column, Tuesday, August 20).

The same column stated: 'The NUR leaders must not restrict the struggle to the guards, but call every member

out on strike immediately behind their locked out and sacked colleagues. NUR general secretary Jimmy Knapp must then appeal to other unions to mobilise their members in all-out strike action alongside his unions. The NUR cannot be allowed to fight alone.'

In the aftermath of the ballot, the ATUA, industrial department of the Workers Revolutionary Party, calls on delegates to:

- THROW out the adoption of ballots and reject all Tory anti-union laws
- CALL all-out strike action of the whole membership to win reinstatement of all sacked guards.
- REJECT all productivity plans, including DOO.

Bradford teachers strike

TWO THOUSAND members of the Bradford and district and Kirklees branches of the National Union of Teachers responded to a half-day strike call yesterday.

Nearly all schools in the area were affected, with teachers in the NUT walking out at lunchtime to attend a mass rally and march in Bradford city centre.

The rally was addressed by Bob Richardson,

senior vice president of the NUT, who said: 'I come to assure you of the resolve and commitment of the executive to pursue the campaign. Your executive did not embark on a long and hard campaign for only a cost-of-living rise.'

Reaffirming the union's commitment to a flat-rate increase, he said: 'What we have asked for is £1,200 flat rate.'

The demand for the

flat-rate increase was stressed by several speakers from the floor, including Dennis Farrell, from Buttershaw upper school, who said: 'The importance of a flat-rate increase is reflected in the vote we have been getting. We have not been voting for higher pay rises for those who already earn more.'

Also backing strike action was Mark Pattison from Shelley high school,

Kirklees. He said: 'The school I'm in is fairly traditional but we've been out every week for at least a day.'

'From tomorrow we will be doing no more cover. We have to involve teachers in all areas.'

Roger Keeney, from Honley high school, said: 'It is very important that we support the present action but it does not go far enough.'

Eaton goes to hospital

MICHAEL EATON, the chief Coal Board spokesman during the miners' strike, was taken to hospital yesterday shortly after a surprise announcement of his retirement.

Eaton, 51, was taken from his home in South Aston, Yorkshire, to Pontefract general infirmary.

Eaton's sudden departure from the NCB is thought to be linked to his disquiet over Coal Board plans to shut 50 pits in the next 12 months.

The fresh closure threat is understood to be favoured by NCB chairman Ian MacGregor and will involve the Board's abandonment of the agreement made with NACODS deputies in September 1984 to allow independent assessors to pass judgement on closure decisions.

In an unusual personal tribute — one not given to former NCB spokesman Geoffrey Kirk even when he was drowned in a boating accident — Prime Minister Thatcher heaped praise on Eaton yesterday.

While he was lying on a hospital bed, Thatcher issued a statement, saying: 'I thought Michael Eaton did a superb job during the coal strike in communicating the Board's case.'

'He is such a nice person and everyone knew that he knew the industry thoroughly. He was the sort of man that people said "if he says it, it's true".'

Strike call to NACODS

A STRIKE call to the 3,700 NACODS mining deputies in Nottinghamshire and the Midlands was issued yesterday.

The area's 100-strong council met in Nottingham yesterday and unanimously accepted an executive recommendation for strike action, which is to be tested in a ballot on October 8.

The dispute concerns the Coal Board's failure to remove former overman Jack Cowley who was expelled from NACODS last month after refusing to accept union discipline for breaking the deputies' overtime ban in May.

Polmaise reprieve but jobs to go

A PLAN which will destroy 150 jobs at Polmaise colliery, near Stirling, was welcomed by George Bolton, Scottish vice-president of the National Union of Mineworkers, yesterday.

'I've got to say that as a mining union we are delighted that Polmaise will be retained. It is good news for Polmaise, good news for Longannet complex and good news for the Scottish coalfield. It's got to be,' said Bolton. Shortly before, Coal

Board officials had arrived at Polmaise — the last village pit in Scotland — to announce that its threatened closure was being shelved.

However, only 110 jobs will be available there, said John Loudon, NCB

Scottish area director. The other 150 jobs at Polmaise will be go, either through redundancy or transfers to the Longannet mining complex.

Complex

Under the scheme for Polmaise, once new development work is com-

pleted conveyor belts will link up the pit with the complex from where coal will be brought to the surface.

A further 500 jobs are to be lost at Ayrshire's two remaining pits — Killoch and Barony. The board is to spend £6 million on an underground link tunnel, joining one with the other.

Opposition to the jobs loss is believed to be greater at Killoch pit, where the struggle during the miners strike was particularly bitter.

The so-called survival plan involves the Killoch workforce transferring to Barony, and Killoch being used for bringing out coal deposits.

Horden lobby against closure

MINERS from the closure-threatened Horden colliery in County Durham yesterday lobbied the National Coal Board headquarters in London on the first day of the preliminary review procedure into its closure.

Yesterday's hearing was one of several sets of talks beginning this week under the review procedure into the closure of pits.

Pit delegate Tommy Chesterfield told News Line: 'We are the first colliery to go through the new procedure.'

'What they are doing is closing us on grounds of exhaustion.'

'We've lost 1,000 men. We have 850 left. Our production is soaring, our output per man is higher than it has been for years, yet the Coal Board say we

are losing money.'

John Williams, 37, started at Horden when he was 16 years old. 'I've seen what's happening on the other side of Durham. Where pits have already closed, shops have closed and it's just died.'

'We've already lost a colliery next door — Blackhall — five years ago. When that shut, we got the water problems

from it.

'If they shut Horden down our water troubles will travel through into Easington, which will put costs upon Easington, probably one of the pits I would be transferred to.'

'And other pits in turn would be affected by Easington. It's like a domino effect.'

Pit closures in the area have already led to the springing up of dozens of sweat shops concentrating on paying low wages to a cheap labour youth force, Williams said.

Form

'One man I know aged around 45 applied for a job. The man in front of him was only 28, yet when the interviewer got his application form, she said he was too old. He tore up his application form, and so did the man I know.'

'That's what it's like there.'

Hearings into Bates colliery, in the north east, also began yesterday and tomorrow the review begins into St John's colliery, South Wales.

Councillor John Moynes welcomed the marchers on behalf of the City Council, and condemned the anti-strike counter-demonstration.

Sacked strikers march in Glasgow

GLASGOW — A wave of attacks on unions in the furniture industry is being encouraged by the Tory government and their anti-union laws, strikers from Morris's were told yesterday.

'Laws are being introduced to curtail the means by which trades unionists defend their basic rights — but there is no legislation to prevent employers from imposing conditions and agreements in defiance of union principles,' Jim Kooy-

man of the FTAT furniture union said.

He was speaking to the 27 sacked Morris workers, who have been on strike for 15 weeks and who led a demonstration from the factory to Glasgow's city chambers.

Kooyman warned there is a growing body of employers who enforced new working conditions by sacking trades unionists who even questioned them.

Britain's largest bedding manufacturer,

Silentnight of Lancashire, has used similar tactics and sacked more than 500 workers — a delegation of whom were on yesterday's march through Glasgow's city centre.

The sacked Morris workers, with their wives and families, led the way. Banners representing Glasgow's Labour councillors, the Upper Clyde Shipyards, Yarrows shop stewards, Manchester FTAT and the Young Socialists were also present.

When the march reached the City Chambers, Morris — who has refused to meet Glasgow Lord Provost Bob Gray to discuss why he had sacked trades unionists — was there, leading a provocative demonstration of more than 100 scabs.

Court rule for scab law

BONN — The Federal Labour Court ruled yesterday that the West German state can order civil servants to take over striking workers' jobs during disputes in the public sector. This ended a five-year legal battle by the Postal Workers Union against the use of civil servants in 1980 to break a strike over conditions for shift workers. There is no right of appeal.

US arms sales approved

WASHINGTON — The Defence Department has approved more than \$100 million in US arms sales to Pakistan, and a \$178 million sale of combat helicopters to South Korea. The Pakistani regime is buying 88 tracked, self-propelled howitzers at a cost of \$78 million.

GM forecasts record sales

DETROIT — Car industry leader General Motors Corporation expects 1985 US car and truck sales to reach a record 15.4 million vehicles, chairman Roger Smith said. A cut-rate 7.7 per cent financing for selected customers would provide a big boost in sales he said.

EEC discusses changes

LUXEMBOURG — The European Community has launched a debate aimed at streamlining some of its cumbersome procedures ahead of the entry of Spain and Portugal. A special conference was held to consider changes in the founding treaty signed 27 years ago.

Peking troops die in raid

HO CHI MINH CITY — Nearly 200 Chinese troops were killed after they entered Vietnam and attacked several areas up to one mile from the border, the official Vietnam News Agency reported yesterday. It said these 'serious acts of war' exposed China's 'deceitfulness' in calling for friendly relations.

Reagan 'reply' ridiculed

SAN FRANCISCO — Georgiy Arbatov, often called the Kremlin's chief expert on the United States, made light of calls for President Reagan to be given a chance to express his views directly to the Soviet people. These calls were 'a new gimmick' to discredit Gorbachev's interview with 'Time' magazine a week ago he said.

Soviet offensive is over

ISLAMABAD — A big Soviet offensive against guerrillas in Afghanistan's Paktia province appears to be over with heavy Soviet casualties, western diplomats said. Pakistan-based guerrilla groups said earlier they had sent reinforcements to Paktia for a second counter-offensive.

China jails two as spies

PEKING — Two men accused of spying for Taiwan have been sentenced to up to 13 years in jail. The two men, both 29, were arrested in March and jailed in Peking last Friday. The case was the latest in a series in recent months in which people have been charged with spying for the Taiwan regime.

Syrian tanks ring camps

BEIRUT — Syrian tanks took up positions around Palestinian refugee camps in the civil war-torn Lebanese capital yesterday under a ceasefire agreement to end a week of savage fighting.

Sponsored by the regime of Syrian President Hafez al-Assad, the agreement between the Palestine National Salvation Front and the Amal, provides for five observer teams of Syrians, pro-Damascus Palestinians and pro-Amal Shi'ites.

The Amal-Syrian-PNSF forces formed a 'frontline' around the Bourj al-Barajneh, Sabra and Shatila Palestinian refugee camps in Beirut's southern suburbs early yesterday.

Bourj al-Barajneh has been under heavy artillery fire from Shi'ite Amal militia who have also waged war on the Druze Progressive Socialist Party militia.

At least 17 Palestinians have been summarily executed in the most bitter warring provoked by the Amal since the Israeli invasion of 1982.

State-owned Beirut Radio said the situation was 'tense but calm' at the Bourj al-Barajneh camp, the largest of the Palestinian sanctuaries near Beirut.

But automatic gunfire continued in the early hours of the morning, according to reports from Lebanese authorities.

Lebanese newspapers said more than 50 people have been killed and about 250 wounded in the fighting that started on September 3.

BY A FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT

About 60 Palestinian wounded were trapped in Bourj al-Barajneh yesterday. They refused to be evacuated unless firm guarantees were given that the ceasefire had been firmly established, the newspapers said.

A Damascus-backed accord in June ended a bloody five-week siege of all three camps that resulted in more than 700 killed and 2,500 wounded and maimed.

The Amal took over Sunni Muslim-controlled west Beirut in the wake of the Israeli withdrawal from most of occupied south Lebanon but have clashed heavily with the Druze Progressive Socialist Party.

Some of the recent street battles between their forces have been among the fiercest in recent months.

Amal and Druze militia have also agreed to shut down their offices in the western sector, take their men off the streets and purge their ranks of 'troublemakers'.

Israeli President pardons terrorist

TEL AVIV — Israeli President Chaim Herzog has pardoned one of 25 Zionist settlers jailed for anti-Arab activities in the occupied West Bank.

Herzog's office yesterday said the President had made the decision late on Monday.

The pardoned prisoner, Uri Meir, had six months of his prison term cancelled and went free yesterday.

The statement, read on state radio, said Herzog had granted the pardon

because Meir had 'recognised his mistake and publicly expressed regret'.

Meir was sentenced to 30 months in prison for his involvement in a Zionist underground organisation that plotted and carried out the murder of three Palestinian students in a 1983 attack on a Hebron college.

He was arrested along with 24 other members of the terror unit in April 1984. All were convicted but two army officers are

still awaiting trial in a military court.

The terrorist group carried out car bombings that maimed two Palestinian mayors in 1980. They also plotted to blow up the Dome of the Rock Mosque, Islam's holiest shrine in Jerusalem.

● In Tokyo, Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone urged visiting Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir to talk with the Palestine Liberation Organisation to negotiate a Middle East peace.

A Japanese Foreign Ministry official quoted Nakasone saying: 'The PLO is thinking earnestly about how to achieve peace and it is very important that Israel meet and discuss with them.'

Impudent

The impudent reply from Shamir, on a five-day trip, was that his government could not discuss peace with the PLO because it was 'a terrorist organisation' that did not recognise Israel's right to exist.

● At Atlit, the Israeli army freed the last of more than 10,000 Arab prisoners it captured during its three-year occupation of Lebanon.

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Bolivia strike goes on

LA PAZ — The Bolivian Workers' Confederation (COB) has voted to extend its six-day general strike indefinitely, until the government relents on its programme of cuts demanded by Western banks.

'The government measures will not be enforced while unions are free,' declared COB secretary general Walter Delgadillo after union leaders decided to continue the strike, which was due to end at midnight on Monday.

The strike was called

last Wednesday to protest against the 90 per cent devaluation in the peso, and the public sector pay freeze.

The measures were dictated by the International Monetary Fund, and announced by President Victor Paz Estenssoro.

Paz Estenssoro's government has declared the strike illegal and has deployed military units at oil installations.

They are under orders to take over the installations and to try to break the oil production and distribution workers' strike.

COB members across the country have been warned that they face up to six months imprisonment if they do not return to work immediately. The threats have had no response.

The Paz Estenssoro government has been desperately trying to persuade foreign banks to allow it more time to pay its debts.

The government has asked for 15 years to repay \$892 million of debt principal, according to Planning Minister Guillermo Bedregal.

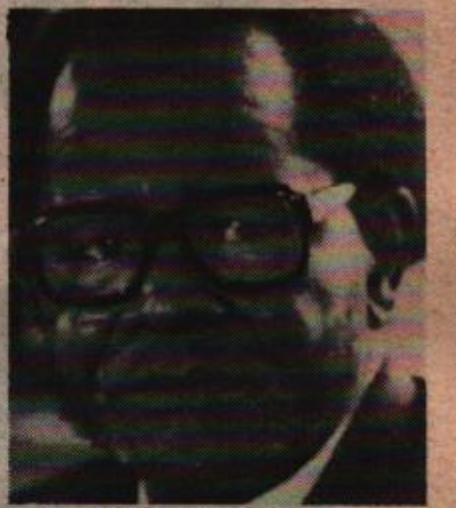
Bedregal told the senate: 'Bolivia will pay the debt, but will not pay it immediately because of its tremendous crisis.'

He said Bolivia, which has total foreign debts of \$3.6 billion, also wanted a ten-year period of grace in which to pay off the amounts due on interest.

He added that he did not believe the country should be forced to pay more than 6 per cent interest on loans, and should not be subjected to payments based on a floating foreign exchange rate.

TAMBO ATTEMPTS TO FRIGHTEN WHITES

OLIVER TAMBO, president of the African National Congress, is pursuing a policy of 'war propaganda' to pressure the Botha regime into negotiations over dismantling apartheid.

His threat to carry the black revolt into white areas is not based on the armed struggle to liberate the black working class from the racist dictatorship but to 'open the eyes of our white compatriots'.

In a special broadcast from Radio Freedom in Addis Ababa, Tambo said: 'The time has now come that so-called white South Africa must feel the heat of the war that has been going on for more than a year now in the black townships.'

'They must now realise that by continuing to applaud the fascist Botha and his henchmen, as they did in Natal recently, they are only applauding and supporting a clique of men who are leading them to disaster.'

'Our purpose in spreading the war into the white areas should be to bring to the minds of our white compatriots that the Botha regime can no longer assure their safety and privileges for ever.'

'To guarantee its own security, white South Africa has to come over to the side of the forces fighting for a democratic and non-racial society.'

'The alternative that Botha offers them, that of pitting themselves against the overwhelming majority of the people of our country, is nothing but a death trap. Nothing will come of it except grief for the whole of white South Africa.'

While he calls for the extension of the war into white areas, Tambo is working towards a meeting in Lusaka, the Zambian capital, with top leaders of the white business community.

Reports in the South African press say the white delegation will be led by Gavin Relly, chairman of Anglo American, the country's biggest mining corporation, and Fred du Plessis, chairman of South African National Life Assurance Company.

Others mentioned as part of the Pretoria business team are: Bob Abrahamson, chief of the financially-embattled Nedbank, Mike Rosholt of Barlows, Chris Ball,

chairman of Barclays, and IBM chairman Ken Gilling.

A spokesman for the Zambian government told reporters last weekend that President Kaunda was not calling on Botha to announce a programme towards one-man, one-vote.

Detail

'That is a detail that could be negotiated,' the spokesman said. 'What is needed now is a statement of intent that "whites and blacks have a common future in South Africa and we are building towards it".'

'Big business has enough leverage to persuade Mr Botha to move. Unless Botha moves, dialogue can go on until doomsday without result.'

'These business people do not want chaos. If they can take the lead effectively they can mobilise support from right across the political spectrum — the Nats (Botha's National Party), the Liberals, the United Democratic Front, even the ANC.'

Tambo's policy of using dire threats to frighten the white minority into negotiations differs sharply from last month's statement by Nelson Mandela from his prison cell in Pollsmoor, Cape Town.

The jailed ANC leader said the idea of a national convention was a thing of the past and he ruled out a peaceful transition saying that the only question was the transfer of power from the Botha regime to the black majority.

Campaigners against conscription arrested

JOHANNESBURG — Police have raided the offices of the End Conscription Campaign in Natal detaining two women members of the organisation.

Sue Britton and Anita Kromberg were arrested under Section 29 of the Internal Security Act.

Crackdown

Two others linked with ECC, Richard Steel and Michael Evans, have also been arrested.

The crackdown on the anti-conscription group follows last week's report that a small group of white conscripts had gone

missing without leave.

Pockets of dissension have grown in the South African Defence Force since soldiers were rushed to assist the police in the front-line of the fight against the black workers' revolt.

Teachers' organisations in the western Cape have protested against the government decision to close indefinitely more than 500 'coloured' schools.

The Concerned Teachers Coordinating Committee, representing secondary and primary school teachers, said the closure decision was 'high-handed and autocratic'.

The statement by 'coloured' Education Minister Carter Ebrahim that he was concerned about the safety of children was 'laughable to say the least'.

'His silence while students and teachers were being raped, gassed, held at gunpoint and even killed is contemptible. We demand that the schools be reopened and do not recognise the right of Mr Carter Ebrahim to close them,' the statement added.

Lock-out

A two-day strike against the state lock-out of half a million 'coloured' students began yesterday. Illegal leaflets were handing out calling on all non-whites to Cape Town to cripple Cape Town's commercial life.

Pretoria's Minister of Home Affairs, Stoffel Botha, has announced the restriction on immigration to South Africa to whites only is to be lifted.

Although many objections had been made in the past as regards the Indian and Chinese people, legislation to remove all restrictions on immigration based on race and colour would be introduced in parliament next year, he said.

Failed coup leaders flee

BANGKOK — The leader of Thailand's failed military coup, and his brother, fled possible execution as Prime Minister Prem Tinsulanonda said all those involved would be 'investigated under the law'.

Ex-Colonel Manoon Roopkhachorn and his brother Wing Comman-

der Manas, boarded a plane for Singapore on Monday night.

Deputy army commander General Thienchai Sirisamphan told a press conference that all captured leaders of Thailand's 15th coup since 1932 would be executed because of the bloodshed.

Army chief of staff

General Serm Na Nakhon, former deputy army chief of staff General Yos Thephasdin and air force chief Marshal Praphan Dhupatemiya were implicated.

General Prem flew home from talks with Indonesian dictator General Suharto in Jakarta after the coup was crushed.

French bombers for Iraq

BAGHDAD — The Iraqi regime has announced the delivery of new French-made Mirage F-1 fighter bombers as fierce ground fighting flared with Iranian troops along the northern border.

Iraqi deputy Prime Minister Tariq Aziz said five French Super Etendard jets that Baghdad had been leasing would now be returned.

'We do not need them any more because the F-

1s fulfil the same task, have the same characteristics and carry the same missiles,' he said.

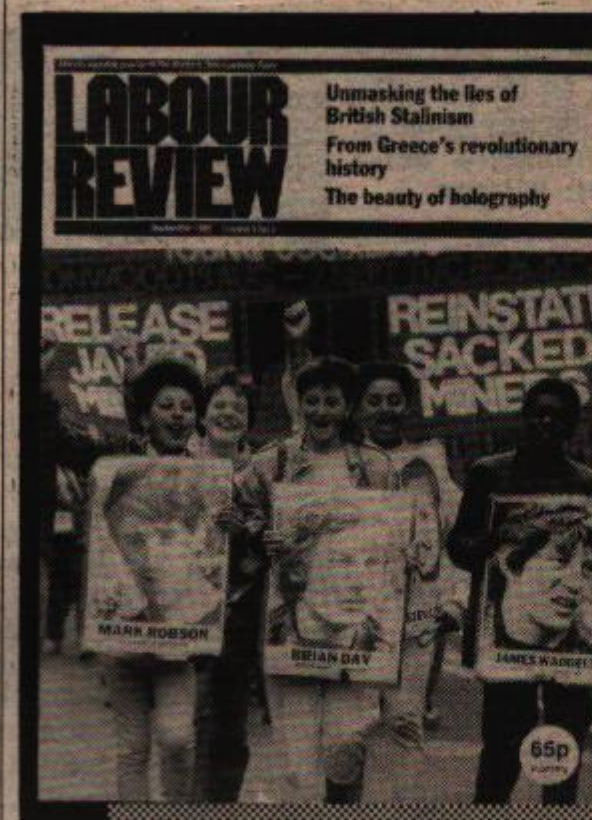
Azziz did not reveal how many of the latest Mirages had been received. But the London-based Institute for Strategic Studies reported that the Ba'athist regime had 39 on order.

Military spokesmen in Baghdad and Tehran reported savage casualties in fighting in northern

Kurdistan.

An Iraqi official said on television: 'Our troops went harvesting their enemies in thousands, tearing up their bodies and destroying their equipment.'

Not surprisingly, an Iranian communique gave a very different picture. It said Iranian forces had captured 180 square miles of mountainous territory inside Iraq.

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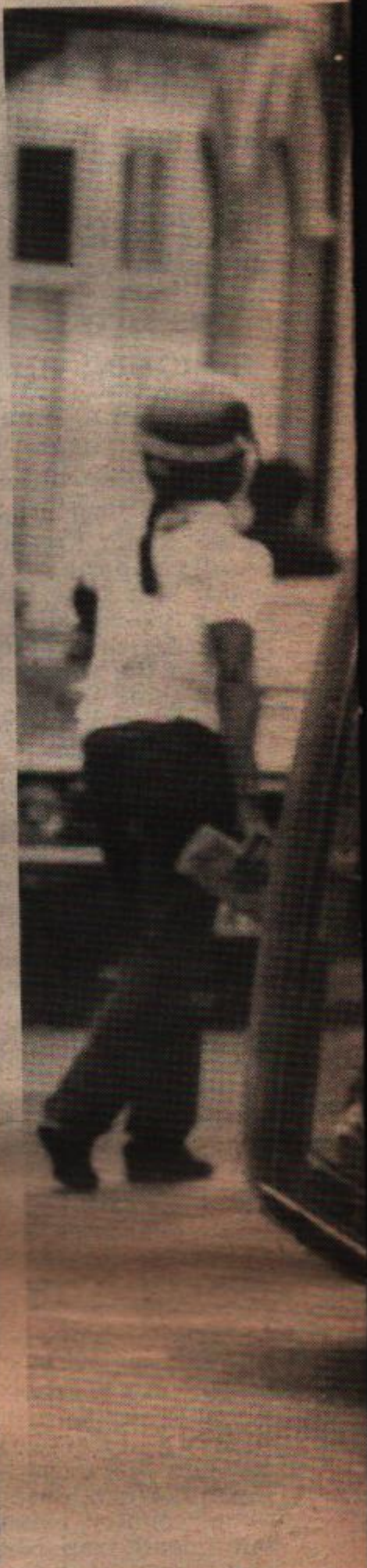

Tories howl for harsher policing

THE TORY government and the police yesterday seized on the Handsworth street clashes to launch a determined campaign for harsher policing and more recruitment.

The 'law and order' lobby was greatly assisted by Labour Party leaders who joined in a chorus of hysterical denunciations of the Birmingham teenagers who took part.

Labour's deputy leader Roy Hattersley called the clashes 'an act of criminality' that deserved the strongest police response.

Prime Minister Thatcher dismissed any link between chronic unemployment and the outbreak of youth unrest.

'I don't see why you should accuse people who are unemployed of turning violent in that way, and I think it is grossly insulting to them to do so,' she said.

Unemployment in Handsworth at the beginning of this year was 35.8 per cent compared with

20 per cent for the rest of Birmingham. Of those out of work, 55.9 per cent have been without a job for more than a year.

An Environment Department analysis said that 70 per cent of Handsworth's residents were 'seriously deprived' and 15.6 per cent were living in overcrowded classified as overcrowded compared with 6 per cent in the city as a whole.

Leslie Curtis, Police Federation chairman, arrogantly claimed the clashes had little to do with race and everything to do with crime.

'The West Midlands police, although the second largest force in Britain, is trying to tackle huge commitments with too few officers to meet all requirements.

'Economy cuts and a policy of not recruiting to replace wastage must now be reversed.'

John Butcher, Tory MP for Coventry South West and a former Birmingham City councillor, said: 'The riot has no

thing to do with unemployment.

'It is a celebration of lawlessness and anarchy, pure and simple.'

Tory 'law and order' specialist Sir Eldon Griffiths, a Norfolk pig farmer, issued a statement saying: 'No amount of speculation about unemployment or social deprivation or racial prejudice can hide the central — and brutal — facts.

'First, that those who engage in murder, arson, looting and wholesale attacks on the police and fire services are violent criminals.

'Second, that for their actions there can be neither excuse nor alibi.

'Third, that those who mount such an assault on the fabric of our civilised society must be pursued relentlessly and when

convicted must be subject to exemplary punishment.

'Now, indeed, is the time for all good men to go to the aid of the police. If necessary, the National Reporting Centre should be activated.'

The NRC is the police surveillance headquarters in Scotland Yard which was the nerve centre of the police operations against picketing miners during the 1984-85 strike.

At the SDP conference in Torquay, a black member of the party's national committee, Roy Evans, praised the West Midlands police which was recently involved in the shooting of a six-year-old boy.

The new chief constable (Geoffrey Dear) has a well-deserved reputa-

tion for being one of the most enlightened policemen in the force, who has firmly committed himself to a policy of community-based policing.'

The much-publicised Dear told reporters yesterday the unrest had been 'pre-planned'. They had been driven by a 'blood-lust', he said, and he described the participants as representing 'the worst elements in society'.

He claimed it was possible that the participants had been encouraged by recent television pictures of black unrest in South Africa.

SDP president Shirley Williams told delegates in Torquay that television coverage of the miners' strike may have contributed to the outbreak on the streets of Handsworth.

Referring to Home Secretary Douglas Hurd's five-minute appearance on the streets, Williams said: 'It was a brave act, and, as a party, I am sure we commend it.'

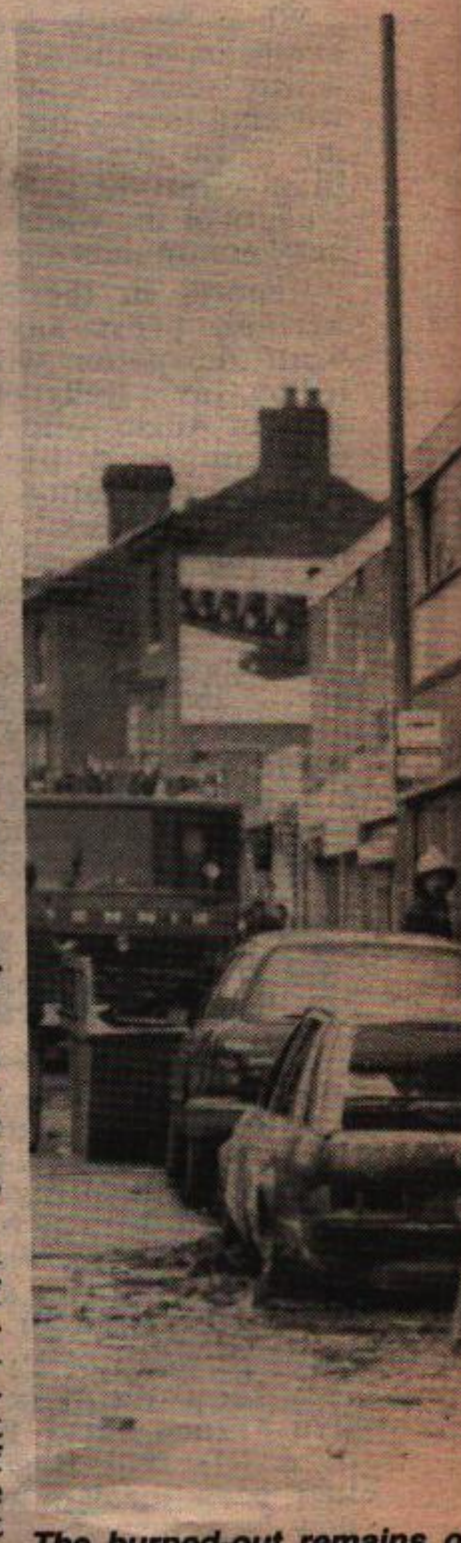
Manchester's 'hard-line' Chief Constable James Anderton who has been in conflict with the council's police committee said Birmingham's street clashes were 'an awful tragedy'.

He said that last Friday the police committee had voiced 'bitter and critical' opposition to his contingency plans and tactics for dealing with public disorder.

Youth unemployment, disillusionment and a sense of not belonging in society were behind the Birmingham disturbances, said Labour's race relations spokesman Alf Dubs.

'I do not for a second condone this sort of violence but we have to understand the frustrations which give rise to it,' he said.

Speaking at the Vintners Hall in the City of London last night Chancellor Nigel Lawson pompously claimed that prospects for unemployment in the second half of Thatcher's term of office were better than the first

Asian leader blames Thatcher

A MOSLEM community leader yesterday blamed the police and the government for Monday night's clashes in the streets of Handsworth.

'I don't blame the West Indians,' said Mirza Mohammed Zaman, chairman of the Moslem Welfare Defence Council.

'I blame the police and the government. There's a political situation behind this.'

Zaman said that when trouble broke out in Lozells Road at 7 o'clock he telephoned the police. But they did not arrive until 11.30, he claimed.

He saw the attack on a sub-post office where the bodies of two men were found early yesterday.

A group of young men aged under 24 broke down the door and poured into the building. He heard

one of the inhabitants scream: 'We are innocent, we have got no money' and 'We are all coloured together'.

Mr Zaman, 39, said: 'They must have been trying to force the brothers to hand over the keys to the safe. From the cries, they must have been terribly beaten. They were left unconscious to die.'

He said the victims were a family called Molidina, two brothers who came from Kenya about six years ago with their wives and children.

He said the far right National Front had stirred up trouble in the area for several years. The increased activity of the NF coincided with the departure from Handsworth of police superintendent Mick Burton who sponsored liaison between community leaders.

Relationship

Mr Mushtaq Rabbani, an Asian community spokesman, said there was a good relationship between Asians and West Indians in the area, but this did not extend to the police.

'More money is needed to be spent on housing, jobs and social amenities,' he said.

Labour deputy leader Roy Hattersley faced a hostile reception from community leaders who wanted to know what the Labour Party was going to do about police harassment.

But Hattersley appeared to dismiss their protests saying that what had happened was 'mayhem'. 'This is one set of deprived people making life more difficult for another set of deprived people.'

He admitted that Handsworth was an area of deprivation with male unemployment of 50 per cent. 'There is not enough money for housing and social services,' Hattersley said, 'but that does not justify what happened here last night.'

Police ignored community warning

AT 7p.m. on Monday night Labour County Councillor James Hunte and Taj Khan walked into Thornhill Road police station to voice local anger over the arrest of two men.

The detained men had been picked up by police apparently after an altercation with a traffic warden.

Hunte told the police the tension was rising in the area and urged them to defuse it by releasing one of the men who had been beaten up during his arrest.

Visitor

Khan, a lay visitor to the police station, told News Line last night: 'They would not listen to us even though we said that violence could result. Almost within minutes a local bingo hall was set on fire.'

As police poured into the area the whole of Lozells Road became a

blazing inferno as shops were gutted by fire.

The Tory press is doing its utmost to drive a wedge between the West Indian and Asian communities by labelling the clashes: 'Race riots'.

But that was rejected yesterday by John Turley who has been on the dole for the last three years.

He told News Line: 'How can that be the case when you've got white people, West Indians and Asians involved in this?'

'It's unemployment. That's the main cause along with the way the police have treated us over the years. It's got worse and worse recently.'

Norinder Rajput, who has been out of work for four years, said: 'We're not against each other, we're against the Thatcher government which won't give us jobs.'

Inquiry

'There's got to be a public inquiry into this because no one — Asians, West Indians or whites — trusts the police around here. They are really hated.'

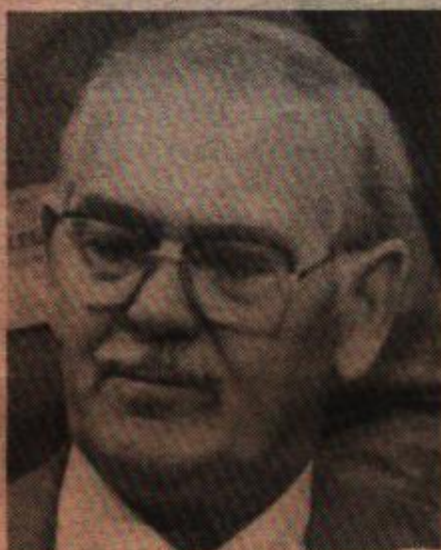
One black youth, who asked not to be named, said: 'If you want to know the cause look at what's happening in South Africa — that's our cause.'

How the AUEW leaders grabbed the Tory cash

THE right wing clique which dominates the executive council of the AUEW conspired against the rules and democratic procedures of the union for several years in order to foist their policy of accepting Tory money for secret ballots onto the membership.

They were assisted by the so-called lefts and Communist Party members on the National Committee of the union, who, although protesting from time to time at the manoeuvres of the right wing, themselves actually support the policy of secret ballots.

In 1983, the National Committee of the AUEW, the policy-making body of the union, decisively re-

jected the policy proposed by the executive council to accept government money for postal ballots.

In 1984, Terry Duffy devoted a major part of his presidential address to the question of taking the money and he called for a reversal of union policy. In the end however, opposition was so great that the EC did not press the matter onto the order paper so as to avoid a humiliating defeat.

On October 23, 1984, two sections of the union which had previously retained a certain autonomy within the union finally merged. These were the Foundry and

Construction sections. Their overall membership was only a tiny fraction of the membership as a whole, but the rules of the union were changed in order to give them some representation on the National Committee.

On November 5, 1984, the government laid before parliament the terms under which unions could claim money for postal ballots under the 1980 Employment Act. These terms included the requirement that money for ballots held from 1980 until January 1, 1984, had to be made before February 4, 1985.

Ballot

On November 29, 1984, AUEW general secretary Gavin Laird, writing on behalf of the Executive Committee to all branch secretaries and district secretaries of the union, declared:

'Since 23rd October, we have no policy body and therefore, unlike previous periods we cannot "recall" our National Committee because no such body exists until February 1985 when the new committee is elected.

'In view of the foregoing, Executive Council has therefore decided to implement provisions of Rule 2, Clause 27 and ballot out members on whether or not to apply for the monies available under the Employment Act.'

The letter went on to call for 'all union activists to campaign for a "yes" vote'.

It should be noted that Rule 2, Clause 27, empowers the EC to call a ballot on matters affecting the interests of the union, but it does not provide for the results of such a ballot to be used by the EC to overthrow National Committee policy.

Following a 12-1 vote in the ballot in favour of accepting Tory cash, the EC then applied to the government for £1.2 million.

At about the same time, another issue began to emerge. Joint meetings had been taking place between the executives of the AUEW and the EETPU electricians' union. These were supposedly to develop a joint training programme in new technology, particularly with machine tools and robots.

However, it seems

clear that much more was being discussed. AUEW branch secretaries were informed that in future, because of the close working relationship between the two executives, any inter-union disputes with the EETPU should not be dealt with through the TUC's Bridlington agreement, but referred straight to the Executive Council.

Such moves were seen throughout the union as being geared towards a possible merger with the EETPU, and were extremely unpopular.

Opposition

The new National Committee met from April 15 to May 10, 1985. Opposition to the EC position was expressed by the fact that there were no less than 36 resolutions calling for non-compliance with the Tory Employment Act submitted to the National Committee.

Nine of these called for the union to stand by the provisions of the TUC's 1982 Wembley special conference decision, and 13 specifically called on the union not to take any money for ballots.

Only one resolution called on the union to take Tory money. In addition there were two resolutions against any merger with the EETPU — even though such a development was still no more than an informed guess, and a rumour which had not been confirmed by the EC.

In his presidential address, Duffy, referring to the EC's acceptance of Tory money for ballots, said: 'We have no qualms

of conscience. We did what we had to do to protect our union's finances. Indeed, we support that part of the legislation.'

On the ninth day of the National Committee meeting, the discussion on the Employment Act, and a possible merger both took place. Although only one of the two anti-merger resolutions was debated, the resolution was passed unanimously, to the obvious displeasure of the EC.

On the issue of taking money for secret ballots, the EC selected just one motion for debate. It read as follows:

'This National Committee instructs Executive Council to seek assurances that any future Labour government will repeal all Tory government anti-union legisla-

tion and will re-establish the Employment Protection Act in full and further that National Committee instructs Executive Council not to seek or participate in the funding of postal ballots from the Tory government.'

The resolution was from Tyneside, and was moved by J. A. Crystal, seconded by A. Robson.

Money

An amendment calling for the return of the money already taken was moved from the floor, but was lost.

But it was at this point that the real nature of the opposition of the so-called 'left' on the National Committee emerged. An addendum was moved by W. Tynan from Hamilton, Scotland, and seconded

by W. H. Goffin from Plymouth.

It read: 'However, National Committee, acknowledging the members' decision, further instructs Executive Council to conduct a further ballot of all the membership stating the arguments for and against on the ballot paper.'

This addendum was then accepted by the mover and seconder of the main resolution, ensuring that no discussion took place on it.

Indeed, no discussion took place on the main resolution either, because it was then moved, and passed, that the resolution and its addendum be put to the vote.

Vote

The resolution and the addendum were passed in a single vote by all but one member of the National Committee, the lone dissenter abstained.

From 36 resolutions calling for non-compliance with the Tory Employment Act, the National Committee had now voted to comply with the act if a secret ballot said so. The only complaint, as far as the National Committee were concerned, was over the wording on the original ballot paper!

This was hardly the intention of the huge majority of resolutions submitted to the National Committee.

The National Committee had at the same time voted to accept that their own powers as the policy-making body of the union could be overruled by a postal ballot, thus already complying with Tory legislation.

The position taken by the National Committee has now been taken up by the general council of the TUC itself. The TUC general council has agreed to defer any action against the AUEW to await the result of the second ballot called for by the National Committee.

Attack on NI bus pass policy

THE government's consumer watchdog yesterday attacked as 'grossly unfair' discrimination against women pensioners on Northern Ireland's trains and buses.

'It is grossly unfair to women pensioners aged between 60 and 65 that the half price fare on Northern Ireland buses and trains for senior citizens is denied to them,' said Michael Montague, chairman of the National Consumer Council.

'The concessionary fare is not meant as a badge of age but a recognition that people on a pension tend to have less money than the rest of us,' he told the General

Consumer Council of Northern Ireland in Belfast.

'In the rest of the UK,

under new rules introduced by British Rail this year, pensioners of either sex can get reduced price travel at the age of 60. I hope Northern Ireland Railways will feel able to follow suit.'

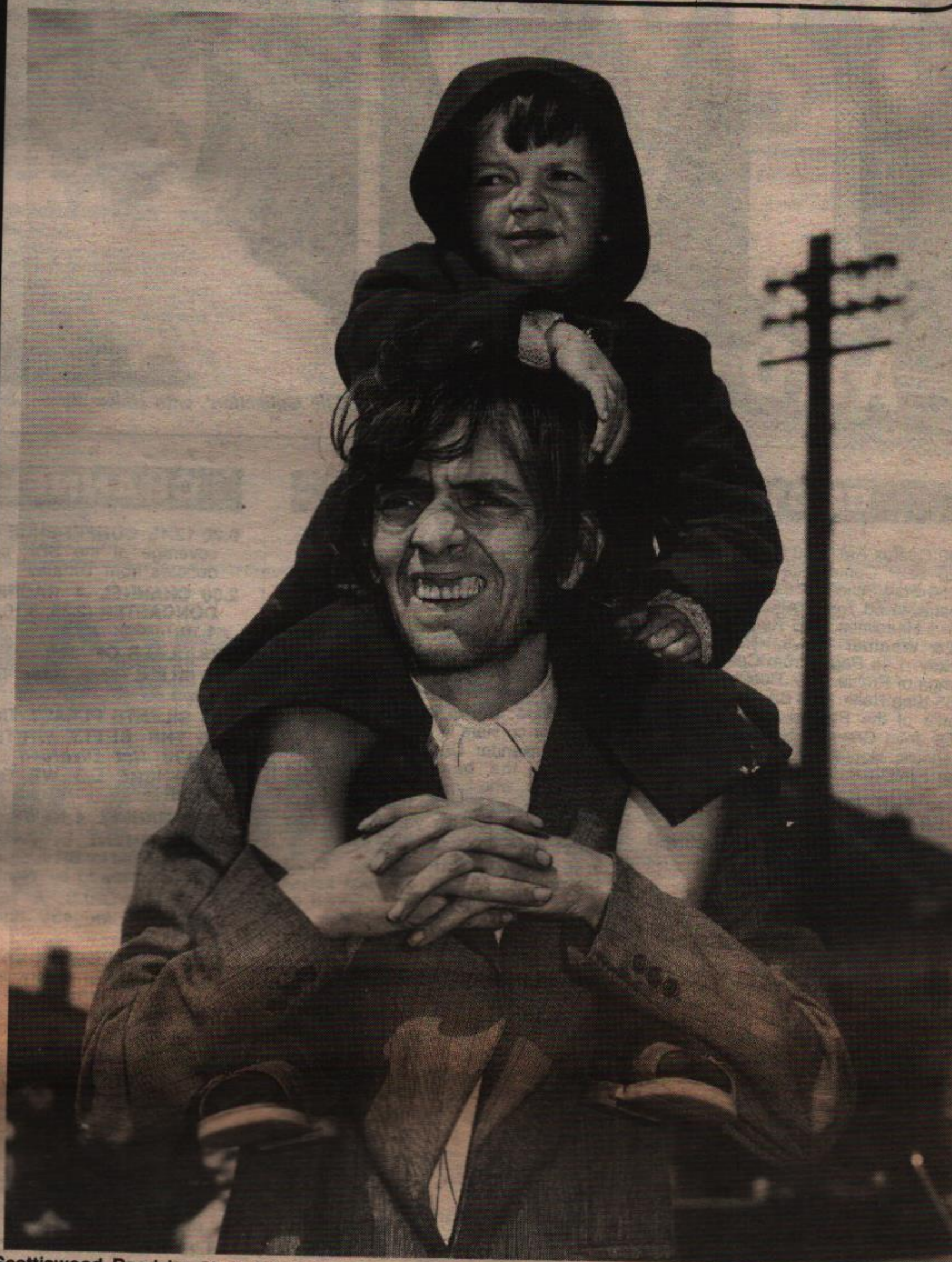

Another Country

An exhibition of photographs of the communities of the North-East of England is currently showing at the Serpentine Gallery in Kensington Gardens.

The exhibition, aptly titled *Another Country*, brings together the work of two photographers, Chris Killip and Graham Smith, who have set out in their different ways, to document the social catastrophe that lies behind the so-called 'economic decline' of the North-East.

Executed in the best traditions of social documentary photography, the people are shown living or trying to live in a barren land of run-down factories and the dole.

Nothing is arranged or sensationalised — images are recorded and the viewer is taken round on a tour of an urban slum, a million miles

from Kensington Gardens.

Graham Smith's pictures are mainly of the area he grew up in, South Bank, on the edge of Middlesbrough. He focuses especially on the world of pub, betting shop and club in a tiny area known locally as Giro Corner.

Chris Killip's work concentrates on two communities, the sea-coalers of Lynemouth and the fishing village of Skillingrove — and it includes one or two of the best photos to come out of the miners' strike.

Both these photographers use large-format cameras for most of their pictures, enabling very large high quality prints to be made — and what an impact this has.

SWITCH SOUTH AFRICAN G.P.

WORLD motor racing champion Niki Lauda has called for the cancellation of the South African Grand Prix 'circus' at Kyalami on October 19. 'It bothers me how Formula One is hanging on to the Kyalami race when there are such acute problems in South Africa,' the 36-year-old Au-

striar said.

'There are more important things to do there than organise such a circus, which could be held at Hockenheim, Imola or somewhere else. I am not a political man, but I think a race in South Africa is wrong,' said Lauda, who announced last month

that he would retire from grand prix racing at the end of the year.

Lauda said he had discussed the issue with Jean-Marie Balestre, president of FISA, the sports governing body, but was told the race would not be cancelled.

Belfry course pleases chiefs

EUROPEAN captain Tony Jacklin played down prospects of a victory against the United States when he spoke to the press yesterday before the Ryder Cup match at the Belfry, Sutton Coldfield, on Friday.

'I don't see us as favourites at all,' he said. 'The Americans are very experienced fellows and they are going to be extremely tough.'

Europe lost by one point in America two years ago and he said: 'It is very easy to get carried away by a wave of enthusiasm, because of 1983, and the fact that we have a home-bred Open champion, Sandy Lyle, the US Masters golfer Bernhard Langer and the greatest player in the world, Severiano Ballesteros, in the team.'

'But they are only three players in a team of 12. It is easy to get things out of perspective, but when you look down the record, we haven't fared at all well over the years.'

Jacklin hopes the warm, sunny conditions will last for a couple of days to make the fairways a little firmer than they are at present.

'I am pleasantly sur-

prised by the condition of the course. It looks American and it is an American-type course. But this is just how I wanted it.'

The course also pleased non-playing American captain Lee Trevino. 'I have played in six Ryder Cup matches and the Belfry is the most Americanised course I have seen in Britain.'

'I played on it last year and my team are going to be extremely pleased with what they see,' he said on arrival on Concorde at Birmingham airport.

All the 12-strong American team had checked in by Monday night. Lyle and Nick Faldo had arrived too, but most of the European team were still to arrive yesterday.

Jacklin is giving nothing away at this stage about his possible pairings for the fourfours and fourballs, although it seems probable that the highly-successful combination of Ballesteros

the help of Bernard Gallagher to inspire and cheer on the European squad.

'This is the first match Bernard has missed since 1969 and I didn't want him to feel out of it,' said Jacklin.

Apart from two-way radios, Jacklin's buggy will also be equipped with a small television unit.

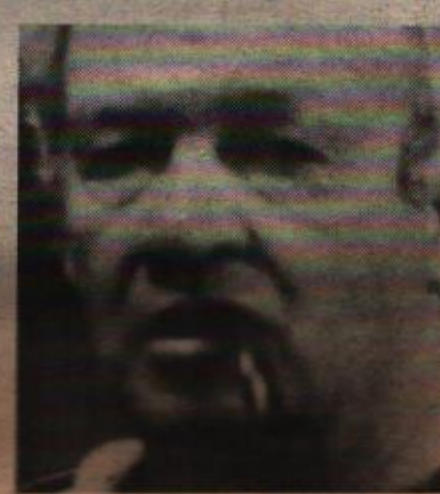
PAT JENNINGS, Northern Ireland's goalkeeper, arrived in Turkey after a harrowing 11-hour journey aiming to postpone his well-earned retirement for a few more weeks.

At 40 years and 91 days, Jennings tonight collects his 111th cap in his 1,088th first-class match with the pressure increasing on him all the time.

The shock defection of Newcastle winger Ian Stewart, sent home lacking match fitness just a couple of hours before the plane left Heathrow, added to manager Billy Bingham's headaches as he plots the vital World Cup win.

With two other frontliners already missing — strikers Norman Whiteside and Billy Hamilton — the odds have lengthened against Jennings having the chance to stretch his career over a full 24th season and into next summer's World Cup finals in Mexico.

Jennings, who left Arsenal at the end of last season, but has kept his hand in by turning out for Spurs' re-

'He obviously realises he needs that extra work-out and I wouldn't have any hesitation asking him to play.'

THE REPUBLIC of Ireland manager Eoin Hand knows his job and the team's dream of reaching the World Cup finals in Mexico next year rest on tonight's clash with Switzerland in Berne.

Hand said that every team in the group was in with a good chance of qualifying, but he realises that Ireland must win tonight for his own and the team's sake.

'If we lose, it will be the end of the road to Mexico for us — and also for me as the manager,' he admitted.

Hand has given newcomer Tony Cascarino of Third Division Gillingham his first cap. The 23-year-old will link up with Frank Stapleton of League leaders Manchester United.

He has decided not to risk midfielder Tony Grealish, who is recovering from a dislocated shoulder, and Mark Lawrenson will take his place.

Tottenham's Chris Hughton comes in at right back for the injured Oxford player Dave Langham.

The Swiss are unbeaten in six home matches this year and Ireland's poor away record in World Cup

qualifying ties does no augur well for their chances.

Both teams have five points from five matches although the Irish have a far superior goal difference. Denmark, who head group six, with six points from four games, are favourites to qualify along with the Soviet Union, who play their last three games at home.

On paper, though, the Republic has an extremely strong team. The recent form of QPR pair, midfielder Gary Waddock and striker John Byrne, plus the inclusion 100-per-cent winner Paul McGrath are standing by on the bench.

Exciting chase in Sri Lanka Test

THE SECOND cricket Test between India and Sri Lanka appears poised for an exciting finish after home skipper Duleep Mendis set the touring team a challenging target on the fourth day yesterday.

When bad light stopped play, India, chasing a victory target of 348 runs in 333 minutes, plus 20 overs, were 16 without loss.

A superb third wicket stand of 132 in almost even time between Roy Dias and Aravinda de Silva enabled Sri Lanka to declare their second innings closed at 206 for three, an overall lead of 347.

Dias and de Silva came together with Sri Lanka 48 for two and desperately in need of quick runs. But at tea, the pair had added only a further 48 against the tight Indian bowling attack. After the interval, however, they exploded into action scoring 64 off the first six overs.

De Silva, 19, collected his maiden half century in a dazzling knock of 75 in 150

minutes. The youngster, who took 33 minutes to get off the mark, slammed two sixes and nine fours.

Dias, who made 95 in the

Sri Lankan first innings, notched up his second half century of the match with an unbeaten 60 when Mendis declared.

'Rebels' ban ignored

AUSTRALIAN state cricket authorities are split on a plan to sidestep bans imposed on the 16 players who have joined the planned 'rebel' tour of South Africa.

The Victorian Cricket Association (VCA) on Monday amended its rules to allow players banned by the Australian Cricket Board to play in local club or district matches.

But VCA vice-president Ron Botwell said the ban should be enforced. 'I cannot accept that we should alter our articles to give these boys a pat on the back in any way,' he said.

The ACB ban stops the players, led by former Test captain Kim Hughes, from playing Test cricket for three years and major inter-state Sheffield Shield

matches for two years.

Victoria's chairman of selectors John Chambers defended his association's move saying extending the ban would deprive young players of learning from the state's four rebels — Rodney Hogg, Graham Yallop, Michael Taylor and Rod McCurdy.

The Queensland association believes it is not bound by the ACB rule and expects to see its three rebels on the field for the summer, association secretary Grantley Evans said.

The New South Wales association said it too was holding a special meeting to discuss the ban, while the Western Australian association expects to see the 'rebels' play.

WALTER BANNED FOR ST. LEGER

AN APPEAL to the Jockey Club by Walter Swinburn has cost him a four-day riding ban and all his mounts at this week's big St Leger meeting at Doncaster. Swinburn and trainer Michael Stoute had gone to Portman Square to appeal against the disqualification of Shadari, first past the post in the Great Voltigeur Stakes at York on August 21.

But the disciplinary committee not only threw out the appeals, but also stood down Swinburn for four days for careless riding. The ban starts today.

Stoute and Swinburn stormed away from the hour-long hearing. The trainer would only say: 'I have no comment to make at the moment.'

Incident

Shadari, owned by the Aga Khan, won his race by a neck, but bumped Damister close home, an incident which the local stewards felt could have affected the result.

At the time Stoute said he thought the result had not been affected and that the best horse on the day was Shadari. Swinburn was then quoted as saying: 'There is simply no justice.'

Swinburn is bound to reiterate those sentiments after a decision which will cost him several plum rides at Doncaster.

It is the second time this season he has incurred the

wrath of the disciplinary committee. In May they suspended him for 21 days for reckless riding causing him to miss the first two classics, including the winning ride of 2000 Guineas winner Shadeed.

ONLY SEVEN runners were declared at yesterday's four-day stage for Saturday's St Leger at Doncaster. They are: Khodzar, Lanfranco, Nemain, Phardante, Troy Fair, Kilinski and Oh So Sharp. Should any of the first be withdrawn at Friday's overnight state, it will be the smallest St Leger field for nearly 70 years.

OLYMPICS 100 metres champion Carl Lewis and world record holder Calvin Smith will lead the United States against the Soviet Union and Japan at a star-studded meeting on September 21-22, organisers said yesterday. The US team for the 21 men's events also includes Olympic 200 metres silver medallist Kirk Baptiste, 5000 metres runner Doug Padilla, the new grand prix champion, former world record holder Tom Petranoff in the javelin and triple jump world record holder Willie Banks.

The Soviet team is likely to include their own top performers, including pole vault world champion Sergei Bubka and holder of the world hammer mark Yuri Sedykh.

LICENCE TO SKILL

GLENN HODDLE faces the biggest challenge of his international career as England attempt to crack Rumania's resistance at Wembley tonight with a combination of strength and subtlety.

England's manager has picked a young team with less world experience than usual, but wants Hoddle's skills to complement the midfield power of Peter Reid and Bryan Robson to produce the victory that will allow him to start planning for the World Cup finals in Mexico next year.

Ray Wilkins is the biggest casualty of Robson's strategy, losing his place after playing in all five World Cup qualifying matches so far.

'It was a real wrench leaving Ray out,' admitted Robson. 'At the beginning of last season he was one of the nucleus of the side and you would not have considered leaving him out.'

'But I have selected a team specifically for this game. I have gone for Reid and Robson together because I want two ball winners in that midfield. That's why Wilkins is not in and why Hoddle is not in that position.'

'I'm utilising his talents in a slightly different area. Glenn will play basically on the right but in his quest for the ball, I will give him a licence to wander.'

Hoddle was given a similar job when he teamed up with Reid and Robson for the emphatic 3-0 win over

West Germany during last summer's Mexican tour.

It is not his club position, but the challenge holds no fears for him.

'It's a position I was playing for Tottenham when we won the FA Cup twice. And if the system works half as well as it did against West Germany, we will have no problem,' said Hoddle.

'I will have to do my share of battling. I need to get the ball as often as I can because the idea is for me to create things for people going forward.'

'So if I'm stuck on the edge of my own penalty area, that's not going to be beneficial to me or the team.'

'It's very important to get the balance right.'

No fewer than four of the England team will be starting a World Cup match for the first time — the Ever-

ton trio of Reid, Gary Stevens and Gary Lineker, together with Tottenham's Chris Waddle.

Reid made his England debut at the age of 29 during the summer tour and his selection for such an important match is the ultimate tribute to his efforts in helping Everton to win the League championship and European Cup Winners' Cup last season.

He said: 'It's the highest personal honour you can have to play for England, especially in a World Cup game.'

Lineker won the contest to partner Mark Hateley in attack on the strength of his current goal-scoring form.

Tony Woodcock, also back to his best, is among the substitutes but there is no room even on the bench for Trevor Francis or Kerry Dixon.

Stevens looks set for a long run at right back if he can maintain the form which won him so much praise in Mexico three months ago.

Robson expects Rumania to pack their defence and play for a draw, a result they have achieved on their two previous visits to Wembley.

But if things do not go England's way, Robson has considerable strength in depth among his substitutes and he regards the current squad as the strongest he has assembled in his three years as England manager.
