- 1. The Communist International. The organ of the Executive Committee of the Communist International. Petrograd. Founded May 1st, 1919. Issued simultaneously in the Russian, French, German, and English languages under the editorship of G. Zinoviev.
- 2. The Bulletin of the Temporary International Soviet of the Red Workers' International. Moscow. Founded in 1920. Issued in 4 languages.
- 3. The Peoples of the East. The organ of the Soviet of Propaganda and Action of the East. Baku. Founded in October 1920. Issued in the Russian, Turkish, Persian, and Arab languages.
- 4. The Jugend-Internationale. (International of the Youth), the organ of the Communist International of Youth. German edition: Berlin. Founded in 1919. The Russian edition is issued in Moscow and the Swedish in Stockholm.
- 5. Internationale Jugend Korrespondez. (International Correspondence of Youth). Edition of the Executive Committee of the Communist International of Youth. German edition: Berlin. Founded in 1920. Issued thrice monthly.
- 6. Der Junge Genosse. (The Young Comrade), edited by the Executive Committee of the Communist International of Youth. Berlin. Founded January 1st, 1921. Edwin Hernie. Issued twice monthly.

Great Britain.

The Communist. Organ of the Third (Commu-

nist) International. Published by the Executive Committee of the Communist Party. London. Founded July 1920. Weekly circulation 15,000.

US America.

- 1. The Communist. Official Organ of the United Communist Party. Founded 1920. Published bimonthly in English, Hungarian, Jewish [Yiddish], Lettish [Latvian], Polish, Russian, Finnish, Croatian languages.
- 2. The Class Struggle. Theoretical magazine. Monthly.
 - 3. Voice of Labor.
- 4. *The Communist.* The Organ of the Communist Party of America. Published bi-monthly underground. Circulation 8,000 copies.
- 5. Novyi Mir. [The New World.] Organ of the Communist Party of America. Founded by L. Deutsch in 1912. In 1916-1917 the Russian Bolsheviki took part in it, from the beginning of 1920 went into a half-legal existence and from June has been published illegally.
- 6. Rot Fahne. (The Red Flag.) Yiddish Organ of the Communist Party of America. Underground. Circulation 3,000.

Besides the above mentioned papers, the Communist Party of America is publishing underground papers in Lettish [Latvian], Ukrainian, and Polish languages, each one of which has a circulation of about 10,000 copies.

7. Communist Unity. Published from the middle of January [1921] by a group of active Communists

of both parties. Published simultaneously in Russian, English, and Yiddish. Circulation 5,000.

- 13. *Molot.* [The Hammer.] In Ukrainian. Weekly.
- 14. Soviet Russia. Weekly. Dedicated to spread the truth about Russia. Official organ of the Russian Soviet Government Bureau. New York. Founded Nov. 1919.
