The "Westminster Gazette" (July 29th, 1914) decribed an interview with a Russian gentleman, who said: "The Russian people are eager for war." On July 28th the "Times" said: "Thousands of people (in Russia) read the news of the declaration of War (by Austria against Serbia). The greatest enthusiasm and patriotic fervour prevailed." And on July 30th: "An extraordinary wave of enthusiasm is sweeping over the country. It will be a popular War." So are the peoples, unenlightened by moral principles, deceived by their rulers into war. But never again !




