Minutes of the Central Executive Committee, WPA: Chicago, IL — May 2-3, 1924.

May 2, 1924.

Present — Comrades A bern, Burman, Bittelman, Browder, Dunne, Cannon, Halonen, Lore, Lovestone, Engdahl, and R uthenberg. Absent — Bedacht and G itlow.[†]

Comrade B rowder elected chairman.

Motion (by Comrade Lore): That we send a telegram of gr eetings to the Lawr ence, Mass. German branch, which has been in existence as a branch for the past fifty y ears and functioning as part of the revolutionary movement of this country in its various manifestations in the SLP, SP, and Communist P arty

Motion carried unanimously.

Executive Secretary's Report.

Executive Secretary [C.E. R uthenberg] submitted a report on the progress of the F armer-Labor P arty campaign, outlining the organization work initiated in the states of M assachusetts, N ew York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Oklahoma, California, Kansas, Nebraska, and O regon. Also membership meetings w ere arranged in most of the large P arty centers to mobiliz e the Party membership; a special leaflet on June 17th issued; several circular letters sent to each Party unit — all in an effort to arouse the Party membership in the F armer-Labor P arty campaign.

Report by Comrade Hathaway.

Comrade [Clar ence] Hathaway, secretary of the

Minnesota Arrangements Committee [for pr eparation of the June 17th Convention of the FLP] r eported that 40,000 calls for the convention had been placed in the mails and that the letters inquiring about the convention from all over the country showed a great interest in the June 17th convention. Up-to-date, ho wever, only 16 credentials had been r eceived. This has, however, been due to the fact that the calls hav e just gone out. O therwise, the arrangements ar e proceeding smoothly.

Policy in the June 17th Convention.

Comrade R uthenberg submitted the follo wing motion in regard to our policy in the J une 17th convention and in the State of Pennsylvania.

Motion (by Comrade Ruthenberg):

1. Should the June 17th be dominated by the delegates r epresenting industrial workers and exploited farmers, we shall endeavor to organize a Farmer-Labor Party on the basis of the constitution adopted by the convention at which the Federated F armer-Labor Party was authorized [Chicago: J uly 3-5, 1923]. We shall intensify our propaganda for organization of such a party.

2. If such a Farmer-Labor P arty is organiz ed by the June 17th convention, we will merge the F ederated F armer-Labor P arty in it, the F ederated going out of existence as a separate organization.

3. Should the June 17th convention not be dominated by the class elements, but ther e is in the conven-

†- This plenum of the CEC included two temporary substitute members: the Finnish Federationist George Halonen (for Foster) and the tardy Max Bedacht (for Pepper). These two regular members of the CEC, along with M.J. Olgin, were in Moscow, attempting to win the support of the Comintern for their various policies with respect to the Farmer-Labor Party and the general Third Party movement in America. The first 7 named in the list of those attending were of the majority Foster-Cannon faction, the last 3 (plus the absent Gitlow and tardy Bedacht) were members of the minority Pepper-Ruthenberg faction. Ludwig Lore headed a small "third faction" which was in alliance with the Foster-Cannon group. tion such a strong admixtur e of other than representatives of industrial wor kers and exploited farmers, so that the party if formed would not be a class par ty of industrial workers and farmers, then w e shall not make a fight for the organization of a par ty, but accept a loose coalition for the election campaign.

4. If the conditions in point 3 prevail, we shall maintain the Federated F armer-Labor P arty as the expression of the class party of industrial workers and farmers and seek to affiliate with it all such elements. The Federated under these conditions will form part of the coalition and during the election campaign shall seek to organize itself.

5. We shall submit to the J une 17th convention a clear-cut class pr ogram and make a fight for its adoption. A Committee of thr ee shall be elected for the purpose of drafting this pr ogram.

6. The same committee shall draft a statement on the question of the candidacy of LaF ollette, which shall be read to the convention after his nomination, if he is nominated, pledging our suppor t but stating our Communist attitude to ward LaF ollette.

7. We shall nominate in the convention a candidate in opposition to LaF ollette and cast our v otes for such a candidate. We must, however, be careful to see to it that this maneuv er does not defeat LaF ollette, for to nominate another candidate and permit LaF ollette to become the candidate of the J uly 4th convention in opposition to our nominee would be to destr oy the class Farmer-Labor P arty as a mass organization.

8. In view of the contingency that w e shall have to maintain the Federated after the J une 17th convention, it is our interest to strengthen the Federated through affiliation of the state parties wherever possible, and our delegates in the state convention shall be instructed to affiliate the state parties with the Federated wherever that can be done without causing a split.

9. We shall endeav or to arrange a confer ence between [William] Mahoney and his group before the June 17th convention to agree upon the organization of the convention and the program to be put thr ough. We must seek to keep the chairmanship of the convention in our hands. We shall propose that the Committee of Arrangements shall act as a cr edential committee and bring in a r eport of the cr edentials submitted immediately upon opening the convention. 10. The group which is looming as a danger to the domination of the conv ention by the class elements is the Committee of 48, which is cr eating dummy organizations and will endeav or to flood the conv ention with delegates fr om these. O ur members on the Committee of Arrangements should car efully sift cr edentials from this group and bar all delegates not r epresenting bona fide organizations.

11. State Policies:

(a) [1.] In the Pennsylvania Farmer-Labor P arty convention we shall offer a r esolution to endorse and send delegates to the J une 17th convention and against July 4th.

[2.] Our action if this resolution is defeated must depend upon the character of the conv ention. If it is representative of the labor movement of P ennsylvania, we shall make a statement in the conv ention pledging our support to June 17th and against July 4th, declaring that we shall seek to have delegates sent from all local unions and central bodies to the J une 17th convention but will support the Farmer-Labor P arty in Pennsylvania, provided it makes independent nominations for state offices.

[3.] Should the convention not be a representative convention but merely the shell of the old F armer-Labor Party, we shall split after our r esolution is voted down and shall form an organization committee to call a later convention pledged to J une 17th from those delegates who suppor t our viewpoint.

(b) In Massachusetts, N ew York, Ohio, and Illinois, we shall seek to affiliate the parties formed with the Federated, if it can be done without a split. The new parties formed, ho wever, shall not take the name "Federated F armer-Labor P arty."

Comrade B ittelman submitted the follo wing addition:

Amendment (by Comrade Bittelman): The following shall be the Party policy in the state conv ention of the state of *Pennsylvania*:

1. No fight shall be made against the probable proposal of James Maurer to seat as delegates to the Farmer-Labor P arty convention all those who are delegates to the convention of the Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor.

2. The resolution in favor of the June 17th to be introduced by our delegates shall also deal with J uly

4th in a manner that will show the utter futility fr om the point of view of independent action in the formation of the class party at the J uly 4th convention.

3. Our delegates shall also raise the issue of independent political action in the state of P ennsylvania, severely criticizing J ames Maurer and his associates for sabotaging and practically killing the F armer-Labor Party in Pennsylvania. The resolutions which shall be introduced shall incorporate such criticism and commit the convention to place a F armer-Labor P arty ticket in the coming local and state elections in the state of P ennsylvania.

4. Our delegates shall attempt to secure in the organization of the state F armer-Labor P arty of P enn-sylvania as many positions as possible.

5. In case the convention endorses the J uly 4th convention, we will make an attempt to hav e the convention send delegates also to the J une 17th convention in the capacity of obser vers. Our delegates acting in favor of June 17th shall be organized in a body to be known as the June 17th Propaganda Committee.

6. We shall attempt to hav e Hathaway and Mahoney addr ess the Pennsylvania convention.

Michigan: That we instruct the DEC in D etroit to engage temporarily the ser vices of a suitable comrade for the F armer-Labor P arty campaign in M ichigan and that the CEC make a payment of \$150 out of the Federation dues r efund in addition to r egular payment to finance this organiz er.

Socialist Party:

1. That the CEC addr ess an open letter to the Socialist Party calling upon it to disassociate itself with the July 4th convention and to join the June 17th convention.

2. That we instruct the Executive Secretary of the Party to utilize the services of Comrades [H arry] Winitsky and [H arry] Wicks for our Farmer-Labor Party organization campaign betw een now and June 17th and that they also be employed by the FSR for relief work during this period.

Addition to R uthenberg motion by Comrade Lore:

Amendment (by Comrade Lore): That if the June 17th conference is not dominated by the class elements, a confer ence of all Left Wing delegates to the St. Paul convention shall be called under the auspices of the F ederated F armer-Labor P arty immediately after the conv ention, at which a Farmer-Labor Party shall be organiz ed which will be representative of the Left Wing elements and which will be the permanent Farmer-Labor P arty.

Vote on Lore amendment — voting in favor: Halonen, Engdahl, Lore, Ruthenberg, Bittelman, Cannon, Dunne, Abern, and Browder.

Voting against: Lo vestone.

[Amendment carried.]

Bittelman motions adopted unanimously with the exception of the motion that both M ahoney and Hathaway go to the P ennsylvania convention. Voting in favor of [this section of] the motion: A bern, Burman, Browder, Bittelman, Cannon, and Lor e.

Voting against [this section]: B edacht, Lo vestone, and Ruthenberg.

[Amendment carried.]

Ruthenberg motions adopted unanimously with the exception of:

Point 3 on state policies in regard to Pennsylvania. Voting in favor of point 3: Bedacht, Engdahl, Ruthenberg, and Lo vestone.

Voting against: A bern, Burman, Bittelman, Cannon, Dunne, and Browder.

[Point 3 of Ruthenberg PA Amendment — calling for a split of the Pennsylvania FLP if the convention was not of a "class" nature — failed.]

Point 6 of Ruthenberg motion. Voting in favor of point 6: Dunne, Engdahl, Cannon, Ruthenberg, Lovestone, and Burman.'

Voting against: A bern, Browder, Bittelman, Halonen, and Lore.

Point 6 [— pledging critical support of LaFollette if he is nominated by the June 17th convention —] was carried.

Point 7 of Ruthenberg motion. Voting in favor of point 7: Dunne, Engdahl, Cannon, Ruthenberg, Lovestone.

Voting against: A bern, Burman, Bittelman, Browder, Halonen, and Lore.

Point 7 [— calling for the nomination of a candidate in opposition to LaFollette at the June 17 convention, but not allowing this candidate to actually win the nomination in opposition to LaFollette —] was lost.

Point 3 of Ruthenberg motion. Voting in fa-

vor: All members of the Committee ex cept Comrade Lore.

[Point 3 — to accept a loose coalition instead of the immediate formation of a par ty if the J une 17 convention was not a "class" convention — was carried.]

Congress of the Communist International.

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That we reconsider our former action and designate for follo wing as delegates to the Congr ess — Foster, Olgin, Pepper, Amter, Sect. [Ruthenberg], and E dwards.

Amendment (by Comrade Lovestone): That the previous list of delegates stand.

Amendment (by Comrade Browder): That Tim Buck be added to the delegation.

Amendment (by Comrade Lore): That we offer to pay \$100 to wards sending a N egro delegate to the Conference if the Comrade can raise the balance.

Lore amendment lost — 5 in favor, 6 against. *[Amendment failed.]*

Browder amendment lost — 1 in favor, 6 against [4 not voting].

[Amendment failed.]

Lovestone amendment: Voting in favor: Lovestone and Engdahl. All others v oting against.

[Amendment failed.]

Cannon Motion: Voting in favor: All members of the Committee. Comrade Lovestone against.

[Motion carried.]

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That CI Congress delegates be our delegates to the P rofintern Congress.

Carried unanimously.

Wilga Appeal.

Executive Secretary submitted a r eport on submission of documents to handwriting exper t stating that after examination of the documents the handwriting expert refused to v enture an opinion as to the genuineness of the signatur es.

Motion (by Comrade Lore): That we submit the documents to another handwriting expert.

Amendment (by Comrade Lovestone): That the

case be closed.

Voting in favor of Lovestone amendment: Lovestone, Engdahl, and Ruthenberg.

Voting against: All members r emaining. *[Amendment failed.]*

Voting for the Lor e motion: All members of the Committee but Lo vestone, Engdahl, and R uthenberg. *[Motion carried.]*

Motion (by Comrade Ruthenberg): That the matter of securing another handwriting expert to examine the documents be placed in the hands of Comrade Cannon.

Amendment (by Comrade Bittelman): That the opinion of the handwriting expert be placed in the hands of Comrades R uthenberg and Cannon.

Amendment (by Comrade Lovestone): That the new expert be informed of the opinion r endered by the previous handwriting expert.

Amendment (by Comrade Cannon): That the negotiations with the handwriting expert be carried on jointly by Comrades Cannon and R uthenberg.

Voting in favor of the Cannon amendment: Abern, Browder, Bittelman, Burman, Cannon, Dunne, and Lore.

Voting against: E ngdahl, Lo vestone, and R uthenberg.

[Amendment carried.]

Voting for the Lo vestone amendment: E ngdahl, Lovestone, and R uthenberg.

Voting against: Abern, Burman, Cannon, Dunne.

[Not voting: Bittelman, Browder, and Lore.] [Motion failed.]

Broms Appeal.

Statement of Allen S. B roms in regard to the charges made against him on the basis of which the investigating committee r ecommended his expulsion, which was confirmed b y the CEC of the P arty last year was read.

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That we refer the appeal to the secr etariat for r eport to the Political Committee as to whether the inv estigations should be reopened.

Motion lost.

Motion (by Comrade Lovestone): That in view of the fact that ther e is no new evidence submitted in the appeal by Broms that we inform him that we cannot reopen the case.

Motion (by Comrade Ruthenberg): That we read Broms' appeal.

Motion carried.

Motion (by Comrade Lore): That the case against Broms be reopened and a new investigation committee be appointed.

This motion was later withdrawn.

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That a subcommittee be elected to examine the document and decide the question whether the case shall be r eopened.

Voting in favor of the Cannon motion: A bern, Lore, Halonen, Cannon, and Browder.

Voting against: Burman, Engdahl, Lovestone, Ruthenberg, and Bittelman.

[On a tie vote] motion lost.

Vote on Lovestone motion resulted similarly.

Chairman [Browder] ther eupon ruled that the decision stood as pr eviously, that no new fact has been submitted to the Committee warranting r eopening of the case.

Committee then adjourned.

Motion (by Comrade Ruthenberg): That we proceed to elect Committee to draft a statement r e-garding the LaF ollette candidacy and the full platform for the June 17th convention.

Comrades Cannon, R uthenberg, and B ittelman elected.

Wicks' Assignment. †

Motion (by Comrade Bittelman):

[1.] That all Party institutions and their subdivisions are under the dir ect control and supervision of the respective Party committees.

[2.] All speakers and r esponsible workers employed by Party institutions must first be appr oved by the respective Party committees.

[3.] DOs be informed of this decision and notified that they will be held r esponsible for carrying it out.

Amendment (by Comrade Lovestone): That all activities of the P arty which are national in their character are subject to the contr ol of the CEC.

Voting in favor of Lovestone amendment: B edacht, Lovestone, Engdahl, and R uthenberg.

Voting against: A bern, Browder, Bittelman, Dunne, Cannon, Burman, and Halonen.

[Motion failed.]

Motion by Bittelman was carried by the same v ote, 7 in favor and 4 opposed.

District 3 [Philadelphia] Statement.

Motion (by Comrade Bittelman): That District 3 [Philadelphia] be advised that Comrade Cannon will addr ess a membership meeting and the DEC of D istrict 3 and take up all questions raised in their statement.

Amendment (by Comrade Ruthenberg): That the District 3 statement be published in the P arty press.

Voting in favor of the Ruthenberg amendment: Bedacht, Engdahl, Lovestone, and Ruthenberg.

Voting against: A bern, Burman, Bittelman, Browder, Dunne, Cannon, and Lore.

Comrade H alonen not voting.

[Motion failed.]

Bittelman motion was carried by the same sev en voting in favor and four opposed.

Comrade H alonen not voting.

[†]- The meaning of this set of motions and their relationship to Harry Wicks is not explained in the minutes. It was clearly an issue of direct factional concern, spurring two votes which divided the CEC along strict factional lines.

Amendment (by Comrade Halonen): That District 3 statement not be published immediately but that Comrade Cannon pr esent the matter to the DEC and membership meeting [and] that if they insist the statement shall be published.

Voting in favor: Comrade H alonen.

All other members of the Committee v oting against.

[Motion failed.]

Daily Worker.

Letter r ead fr om Comrade [M atti] Tenhunen in regard to the organization of the *Daily Worker*, making recommendations that a management committee of five be appointed.

Motion (by Comrade Ruthenberg):

1. That we extend to Comrade Tenhunen our appreciation for his services in assisting to establish the Daily Worker Printing Plant.

2. That we appoint a management committee of three members.

Amendment (by Comrade Lore): That the management committee study the ways and means of bringing other Party publications under the management of the Daily Worker.

Motion (by Comrade Halonen):

[1.] That the *Daily Worker* is financially and administratively an independent institution although under Party control.

[2.] That an administration boar d of 5 members be elected r esponsible to the CEC and which shall have full power to decide all curr ent affairs of the Company ex cept editorial policies, the manager to be one member on this board and such manager to be the one to carry out the decisions of the committee.

[3.] That the administrative board prepare and report to the CEC a plan accor ding to which the literature department of the P arty and the v arious Party publications can be coordinated under one management of the D aily Worker Publishing Company.

Amendment (by Comrade Ruthenberg): That point 1 of Halonen's motion be changed to r ead that the Daily Worker is a department of the CEC with its separate financial and administrative organs.

The Halonen motions were considered as a sub-

stitute for the R uthenberg-Lore motions and were adopted unanimously, with the amendment to point 1 as made by Comrade R uthenberg.

[Halonen motions carried.]

Nominations for Management Committee.

Comrades B rowder, Ruthenberg, D unne, [Moritz] Loeb, Tenhunen, and Engdahl nominated.

Vote taken resulted as follo ws:

The Committee ther efore consists of Browder, Ruthenberg, Dunne, Loeb, and Tenhunen.

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That Comrade Burman act as a substitute for Comrade Tenhunen, who will only attend meetings of special impor tance of the D aily Worker.

Motion adopted.

Motion: That the *Daily Worker* go to press at 6 pm and that the I talian Daily go to press at 2 pm. *Motions carried unanimously.*

FSR and IRA.

Comrade R uthenberg reported the various communications in regard to the policy in r eference to continuation of the International Workers Relief and the establishment of I nternational Red Aid, r eading in connection therewith a letter fr om Comrade Amter [in Moscow] urging the establishment of an IRA Section in the FSR [F riends of S oviet Russia] and also cables received by the FSR in r eference to continuation of relief work.

Comrade R uthenberg submitted the follo wing motions.

Motion (by Comrade Ruthenberg):

1. That we establish an International Red Aid section in the FSR , which, however, during the next

six weeks, until the question of policy is definitely settled, shall only conduct pr opaganda work and shall not issue any direct appeal for aid.

2. That we accept the proposal of the representative of the International Workers Relief that during the period 20% of the money r emitted to the IWR in Berlin shall be turned over to the IRA.

3. That we accept the proposal of the IRA in reference to the organization of a separate moving picture department, a minimum of 20% of the proceeds of which shall be turned over to the Workers Party.

Motion (by Comrade Bittelman):

1. That the present German Relief Campaign be concluded by July 1st [1924].

2. That the FSR shall immediately establish an IRA Section to function for the pr esent as a publicity or propaganda agency in pr eparation for the futur e Red Aid Campaign.

3. That the Soviet Russia Pictorial shall be continued as a pictorial magazine dir ecting from now on more attention to the R ed Aid matters. B usiness management shall be conducted as far as possible on a selfsustaining basis.

4. That the FSR shall be placed dir ectly in charge of the O rganization Committee of the P arty.

Voting in favor of point 4 of Bittelman's motion: Abern, Browder, Bittelman, Burman, Cannon, Dunne, and Lore.

Voting against: Bedacht, Engdahl, Halonen, Ruthenberg, and Lo vestone.

[Bittelman point 4 carried.]

Voting in favor of point 3: All members of the Committee.

[Bittelman point 3 carried.]

Voting in favor of point 2: All members of the Committee.

[Bittelman point 2 carried.]

Voting in favor of point 1: Abern, Browder, Bittelman, Burman, Cannon, Dunne, and Lore.

Voting against: Engdahl, Bedacht, Lovestone, and Ruthenberg.

Halonen not voting. [Bittelman point 1 carried.]

Voting in favor of point 3 of R uthenberg's mo-

tion: All members of the Committee. [Ruthenberg point 3 carried.] Voting in favor of point 2 of R uthenberg's motion: All members of the Committee. [Ruthenberg point 2 carried.]

Motion (by Comrade Bedacht): That all subsidiary organizations of the P arty are under the direct control of the O rganization Committee and all national committees ar e abolished.

On being put to vote, no member of the Committee v oted for the motion.

[Motion failed.]

Upon the question being raised whether the action of the Committee in placing the FSR in dir ect control of the O rganization Committee abolished the National Executive Committee of the FSR, Comrade Cannon moved:

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That the Organization Committee [of the WPA] supplant the present National Executive Committee [of the FSR].

Amendment (by Comrade Bedacht): That this applies to all other subsidiar y organizations of the P arty.

Voting in favor of Bedacht amendment: N o one. *[Amendment failed.]*

Voting in favor of Cannon's motion: Abern, Browder, Bittelman, Burman, Cannon, Dunne, Lore.

Voting against: B edacht, E ngdahl, R uthenberg, and Lo vestone.

Halonen not voting.

[Motion carried.]

Question by Comrade Lo vestone: "Has the NEC of the FSR been abolished?"

Answer by chairman [Cannon]: "The motions speak for themselv es."

Motion (by Comrade Browder): That a place be found for Comrade Ov ergaard in the employ of the FSR while carrying on the Metal Trades work.

Voting in favor of the motion: A bern, Burman, Browder, Bittelman, Cannon, D unne, and Lore.

Not voting: Engdahl, Lo vestone, Bedacht, and Halonen.

Philippine Islands.

Comrade Lo vestone submitted a series of motions in regard to our Policy in relation to the Philippine Islands. (See attached.)†

Motion (by Comrade Bittelman): To refer to the Political Committee.

Motion carried by a vote of A bern Browder, Bittelman, Burman, Cannon, and Lor e in favor.

Bedacht, Engdahl, Ruthenberg, and Lovestone against.

Halonen not voting.

American Imperialism and Pan-American Bureau.

Comrade Lo vestone submitted a series of motions in regard to P an-American I mperialism and the organization of the P an-American Bureau. (See attached.)[†]

Motion (by Comrade Bittelman): To refer to the Political Committee.

Carried b y a vote of A bern, Browder, Burman, Bittelman, Cannon, and D unne in favor.

Lovestone, Ruthenberg, Engdahl, Bedacht opposed.

Not voting: Halonen. [Motion carried.]

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That we take up the question of a delegate to the congress of the CI in reference to the Pan-American Bureau.

Motion adopted.

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That all material gathered by Comrade Lo vestone in relation to the formation of the P an-American B ureau be sent to our delegates at the F ifth Congress [of the Comintern] for the purpose of taking the matter up with the E xecutive Committee of the Communist I nternational and that no delegate be sent.

Voting in favor: Abern, Browder, Bittelman, Cannon, Dunne, and Lore.

Voting against: E ngdahl, R uthenberg, Lo vestone, Bedacht.

Halonen not voting. [Motion carried.]

Freiheit Letters.

Motion to refer the *Freiheit* letter in regard to financial affairs to the S ecretariat for attention. *Motion carried unanimously.*

Jewish Youth Paper.

Motion (by Comrade Abern): That we reconsider our action in regard to the establishment of a Jewish Youth Paper.

Amendment (b y Comrade R uthenberg): That the Freiheit be instructed to set aside space in the F reiheit for the Jewish Youth material and that w e do not authorized the publication of a paper.

Voting in favor of Ruthenberg amendment: B edacht, Engdahl, Lor e, Ruthenberg, and Lo vestone.

Voting against: A bern, Cannon, Bittelman, and Dunne.

Browder and H alonen not voting. *Amendment carried.*

CEC Alternates.

Comrade H alonen submitted the follo wing statement:

"I wish to record in the minutes my protest against the way the alternates w ere selected and called into the CEC because my interpr etation of the convention decision was that the alternates w ere to be called in accordance to the highest v otes and not on any kind of possible factional consideration. The CEC decision on alternates was against the interpr etation of the decision of the convention."

No action taken.

May Day Assessment.

Motion (by Comrade Dunne): That all Party workers on Party payr oll turn over their wages for M ay Day to the D aily Workers.

Motion adopted unanimously.

Cannon Membership Tour.

Motion (by Comrade Bittelman): That we add Buffalo, Clev eland, Pittsburgh to the Cannon membership meeting tour.

Amendment (by Comrade Ruthenberg): That a charge be made to the v arious party units for this tour in order to meet the expenses of the meetings.

Motion and amendment carried unanimously.

Educational Work.

Comrade Lor e raised the question of the N ew York educational work and was informed that Comrade [Juliet] Poyntz had been appointed educational director of the Workers School, which meant in charge of the educational work in District 2 [N ew York], and that the CEC had v oted \$100 per month to wards maintaining this school, paying the salar y of the educational director.

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That we elect a sub-committee of thr ee which shall have charge of educational work.

Motion adopted unanimously.

Bittelman, Bedacht, and Cannon ther efore comprise the committee.

Motion (by Comrade Cannon): That Comrade Poyntz shall submit her plan for wor k to the Educational Committee and go to wor k at once.

Motion (by Comrade Lovestone): That we read the letter from the Workers School in regard to the controversy over the educational work in New York

Amendment by Comrade Cannon): To refer the letter to the E ducational Committee.

Amendment carried. †

District 9 — Minnesota.

Motion (by Comrade Halonen): That a committee of 2 be appointed b y the CEC to pr esent the CEC policies to the membership meeting in D istrict 9 [Minneapolis].

Motion that Comrades H athaway and H alonen submit the CEC policy to the membership meeting and make a r eport to the CEC.

Motions carried unanimously.

Committee then adjourned.
