Another one of the well-known remedies or compromises which is pointed to is diffusion of stock ownership. Why, the number of security owners, stock holders, bond holders is growing every day. I don't know how many there are. You are a better situated class. But there are others besides you. I know them and I tell you of them in confidence. I know 40,000 cloak workers in this city not one of whom is a stockholder or a bond holder in any corporation. I know of millions of workers in the United States who are not and never can be stockholders or bond holders, for the simple reason the wage is insufficient

to afford them an ordinary living. If we ever envisage a general distribution of the stock among all em-ployes, among the consuming public at the same time to the extent that each corporation will become a cocoperative enterprise, oh, then you have solved the problem undoubtedly.
