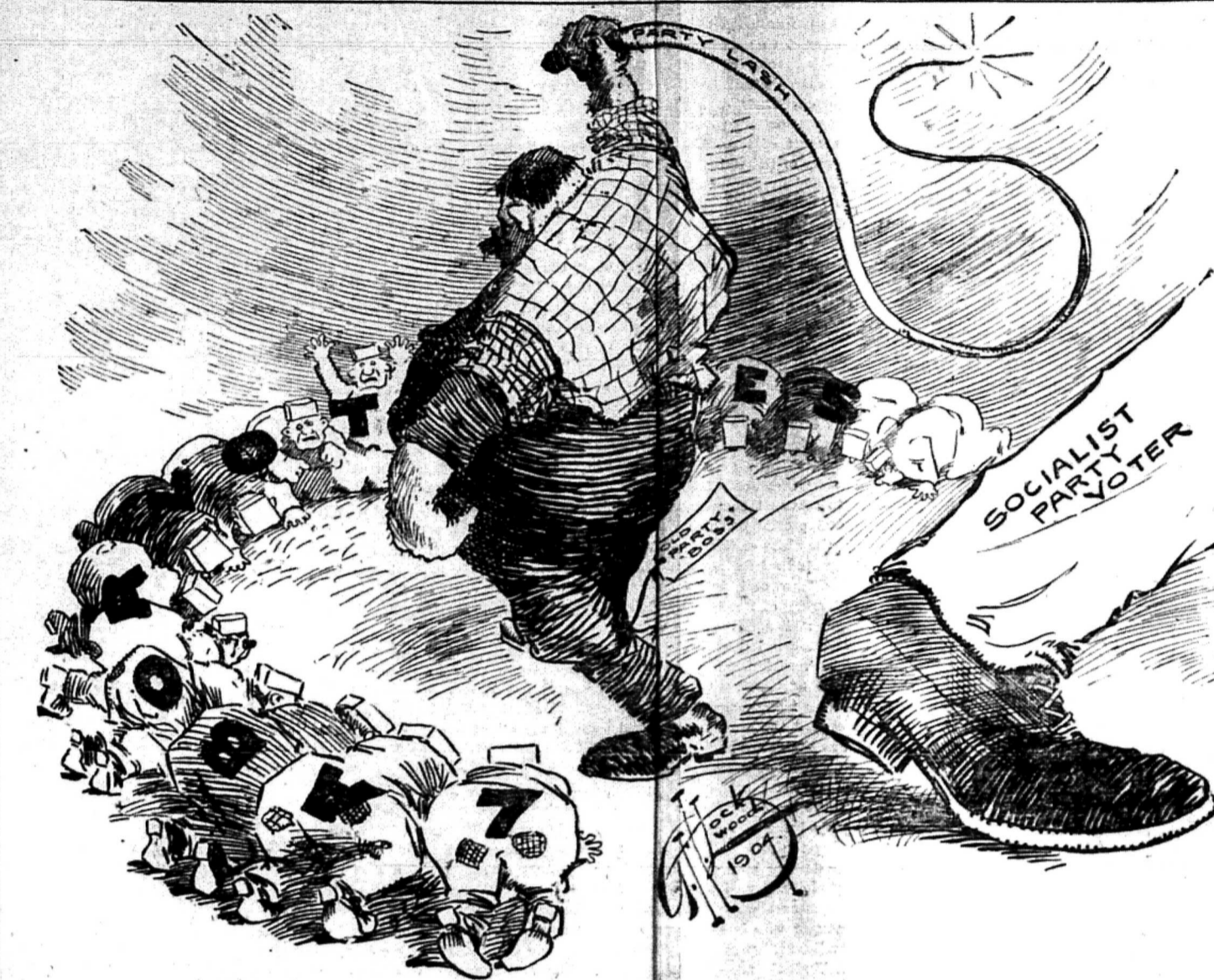
Capitalism will receive a blow from the Convention DAILY, don't you know?

DRIVEN FROM THEIR HOMES

Eighty Unarmed Miners Driven from Telluride Last Friday in Face of Judge Stevens' Injunction—Law Ignored by the Citizen's Alliance and the State Militia.

Special Telegram to Appeal to Reason. Pueblo, Colo., April 9.—Eighty of the miners and Socialists who were exiled from Telluride by the Citizens' Alliance toughs, returned to that city last night under the protection of the injunction granted by District Judge Theron Stevens, which injunction restrained the citizens of Telluride or the militia from interfering in any manner with the deported men should they return.

From Telluride Relate Brutal Treatment of Un-armed Miners by Citizen's Alliance Mob.

Pueblo, Colo., April 11.—Latest advices from Telluride say that the mob of military and citizens under the leadership of Sherman Bell, adjutant general of Colorado, and a military captain and mine superintendent named Buckley Wells, have brutally beaten the unarmed miners who returned to their homes under the protection of the Stevens injunction.
