As promised last week we print below a review of the Milwaukee Health department under the management of Dr. Kraft.

When Dr. Kraft took up his work he added several new departments among which are the following: First: Factory inspection. Five factory inspectors are now guarding the sanitary condition of the working class in the factories and shops of the city.

Second: A child welfare department has been added which is giving special attention and instruction to working class mothers in the care of young children.

Fourth: The department has been unusually active in the inspection of the meat supply. During the month of February, 118 carcasses of animals, many of which were immature calves, were condemned and confiscated.

One of the lying reports sent out from Milwaukee was that there is an epidemic of scarlet fever in the city and that Dr. Kraft is not handling it. This is absolutely false.
