NEW CASTLE, PA., has accomplished much under the Socialist administration. This is a city of 38,000 population and was the first in the state of Pennsylvania to be carried by Socialists.

The strike was lost after sixteen months of battle, but at the next election Socialists elected a mayor and nine out of the twenty-four councilmen, winning by a plurality of about five hundred.

The police department under the charge of Comrade Norris Mitchell has been very efficient, being brought under a better system than ever before.

Improving Public Health. FOR years this city's health department had been operated by a sanitary committee of councilmen, which employed a man who was a tailor by trade to act as health officer.

The city of New Castle has some 63 miles of sanitary sewer and in a year there have been installed over 500 sanitary closets and about that many outside closets abated, besides making 12,000 inspections.

On last December the contract for street lighting and domestic and commercial lighting in this city expired.

side the legal limit of indebtedness; in four months' time, city warrants which had been discounted all the way from 20 to 30 per centum, passed at 95 per cent and in eight months they were passing at par. They are still at par.

By thus bringing general warrants of the city to par we increased the amount of money wages actually received by every city employe. They can now get the face value of their warrants at any store in the city; whereas, under former administrations, they could realize only 70 or 80 per cent of that value.

Benefit the Workers. While thus improving the municipal credit, we also adopted policies calculated to benefit the working class in other ways. We started and are carrying out a well-planned program of municipal improvements.

Some people, at first, were inclined to resent such official activity. We were patient, preferring to educate public sentiment rather than to coerce it; but obdurate offenders, after repeated warnings, were haled before our Socialist police magistrate and fined.

Bringing Contractors to Terms. Our method of getting such improvements done at much smaller cost, was to reject the bids submitted by contractors, who, formerly, stood in with the city officers, and to undertake the work by the city direct—hiring the workmen at union wages and putting the city engineer in charge of the construction.

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tion would see that the work was well done and in compliance with specifications, and that when done the value of property in those districts was greatly increased.

All this has meant more and steadier employment for the workers in all crafts, and especially for the common laborers, and at union scale of wages. Thus while the city, under Socialist policies, during our first term, was run at \$200,000 less expense than it had been run by our two immediate predecessors, the working men of the city actually received more employment and more wages, and the tax payers got more public service for their taxes.

The Socialist administration attacked these conditions at once and have kept vigilantly on the job ever since. We began with a complete municipal cleaning up. Commencing on the outskirts in the working class districts, the street and alley crews worked toward the center of the city, and in one month's time citizens were all remarking the great improvement.

We procured union-made garbage and ash cans in car-load lots, and sold them to owners of property at the actual cost of delivery. We required every property owner to furnish adequate number of these cans for each family living on the property, and we organized the city into garbage collection districts which were covered regularly and thoroughly.

At the same time we began and have maintained strict, scientific and vigilant inspection of milk and meat and all other food products sold in the city. We have required that stores, restaurants, hotels, boarding houses, etc., where food stuffs are sold or prepared for sale shall be kept in clean and sanitary conditions.

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It was the same in respect of milk, meat and food inspections. Milk dealers and meat vendors, who under old party government had been accustomed to do pretty much as they pleased by buying off the inspectors, found themselves up against a new game.

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The Socialist administration put a stop to all this at once. We refused to derive any city revenue from this blood-money, and dismissed policemen convicted of such grafting.

One of our first orders was to close every dance hall in the district, to suppress all music and brilliant lights to attract trade, to keep messenger boys out of the district and to discontinue the electric messenger calls.

Up to last year, the fire laddies of Butte were on duty twenty-four hours, one day off each month, and ten days' vacation on pay each year. The Socialists introduced and succeeded in passing an ordinance to institute the two-platoon system, which requires the men to be on duty only twelve hours.

On the other hand, the restricted district is more orderly than ever before. We have installed additional arc lights there, and required landlords to put in adequate toilet facilities for the patrons of the district and to have running hot and cold water in every room and crib.

We have introduced an ordinance which has the endorsement of the electrical workers' union and which is designed to enforce safer working conditions for linemen.

For many years there has been a restricted (red-light) district in Butte. Under old party administrations the keepers and women of this district were required to pay monthly tribute to the city. In addition to this, some of the police and detectives were accustomed to make easy money by black-mailing the women and taking graft for protection.

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The Appeal's Real Mission

The real mission of the Appeal is to help the working class emancipate itself from the industrial slavery of today.

The rescue of a Coffman; the opening of the doors of the prisons of West Virginia; the deposing of a few corrupt federal judges; the saving of three labor leaders from the gallows; the cleaning out of a federal penitentiary; the defense of crippled miners, like Frank Lane and John Whitman; all these are but incidents in the great work the Appeal has pledged itself to accomplish.

The Appeal claims little credit for these accomplishments—the credit is due entirely to its loyal band of supporters—the Appeal Army, who have never yet failed to respond when the Appeal pointed the way.

The next big fight is for Pat Quinlan, our valiant comrade who played an important part in the great Paterson strike. This case will be stubbornly contested by the Paterson plutocrats, but they are not as formidable as the United States Army.

Socialists in office aided instead of beating strikers. Gave refuge to strikers evicted from neighboring city, Paterson. Prevented a bond issue that was unnecessary and meant graft. Created a commission to line the streets with rows of shade trees.

Several comrades and I went for weeks every morning and night on the picket line to keep everything orderly so that the county officials would have no excuse to send constables into our borough as the manufacturers wanted. We have six mills in our borough and had no trouble during the whole strike until the mill owners imported outsiders to create trouble. This did not amount to anything, as they arrested three or four innocent people, who were set free when they came before a judge.

Two special marshals, comrades, and I were arrested one night in our homes by the hiredings of the mill owners, but the judge would not take the complaint. On May 23d I had to appear before the Passaic county grand jury to answer charges made against me, by bosses and politicians on account of my strike activity. I proved to the jury that there was no harm done and I had only acted according to law in giving people the right of free assemblage and free speech. As the jury could prove nothing against me, there was no indictment, as the bosses had hoped to see. They wanted to oust me out of office, as I would not give them ten or twenty uniformed men with big night sticks to "protect their property," as they called it, but really to break the strikers' heads and force them back to work.

But later on, July 21st, I was indicted without a hearing for malfeasance in office and put under \$2,000 bail. This case is not settled yet and I expect it to be tried in a short while. I presented a \$10,000 bond issue for the extension of water mains. We have our own municipal water works. The water works is seven years in existence and some of the houses on the outskirts have no water yet. We held a public meeting for this purpose and received only one application for water.

I created a shade tree commission and a number of other minor improvements such as itemizing financial reports. I also recommended that the water works superintendent whose job is a snap should have his salary reduced while his assistant who did the work should have his wages raised \$250 a year.
