As far as we can see, and as far as history can teach us anything in this respect; it has always been the legitimate purpose of political parties to conquer the powers of the state in order to use them for the realization of the principles and interests those parties represent, advocate and strive for. The Socialist Party is no exception to this rule. Its object is political power, not as an end in itself, but as a means to an end, and this end is the establishment of economic, social and political democracy. But in order to conquer the state, the Socialists must first of all conquer the masses of the working people, that is; they must conquer the heads and hearts of the men and women whose material and intellectual interests find their most comprehensive expression in Socialism.


