Now, the municipal buildings now lighted by gas and those lighted by electricity at high retail prises cost the city about \$50,000 per year, and a saving could be effected at \$25,000 per year in this case if electric current were purchased at wholesele, making an additional saving, bringing the total over a million dollars.
