OUR CONVENTION

The convention and general party meeting of the Socialist Party was held last Sunday and it was really one of the great events of the season. It was the best convention ever held in this city by the Party both in attendance and in the methods of conducting the important business of nominating candidates.

It was interesting to note the number of candidates proposed for mayor, over half a dozen names being placed in nomination. A few years ago we had a hard job to find a real live candidate to accept the nomination. The nominee for this office is Stephen J. Mahoney is a young man, full of energy and, ambition, with a good knowledge of the Socialist philosophy.

A RAW DEAL

The rawest deal that has ever been handed out to any body of workers is the work of Mayor Fuhrmann who was supposed to have been an impartial member of the board of arbitration in the case between the street ear men and the International Railway.

Mr. Fuhrmann has been so partial: his dealings that it would have been better for the men if Connette or Penny had been the third man. It would have saved time, and neither of them could not have offered a worse proposal than did Fuhrmann in his so-called "naward."

"award."

The wonder is that Fuhrmann didn't offer to reduce the wages of the men in order to recompense the company for its losses during the strike. Maybe Fuhrmann will call in Mr. Jones before long and come to some agreement whereby the men may be assessed enough to pay the expense of the strike and the lawyers fees. Penny needs the money for the luxuries he is "entitled" to and which, according to him, the men "do not deserve," and it would place Louie higher in the estimation of the company.

Of course, Mr. Fuhrmann and Mr. Penny are entitled to five or ten thousand oldiars a year for living expenses, but men who do useful work must live on ten or twelve dollars a week which the new scale means.

scale means.

With the one cent an hour raise, a man receives the munificent sum of 23 cents an hour for his labor. Figuring that the man works sixth hours a week, which is twelve hours at least more than he should work, his salary will amount to the enormous sum of 13.80.

\$13.80 for a week's work. What a lot of money to place in the hands of a man after working a whole week.

Arbitration has proved to be a bad thing for the workers That being the case, let the losses arbitrate among themselves to their hearts content, but when a question between capital and labor is involved, let the workers make their demands and stick to them to the last ditch.

If experience is anything of a teacher then the case of the street ear men should be a lesson never to be forgotten by labor leaders and members of labor unions, in fact, any body of workers who depend on a weekly or monthly wage for their living.

Figuring from any angle the workers must lose where a board arbitration is depended on to settle a controversy between capital labor, for the simple reason that labor is always counted out capital has the best of the argument by two to one from the be-

Labor has the choice of one arbitrator, capital the choice of e, the third to be chosen by the two, and in most cases failing to tree on the third, some nice man who is controlled by the capitalist iss is forced upon the board through the influence of the corpora-in which is to benefit by that man being placed there.

Though the third man is supposed to be a disinterested party, never fails that the capitalist class wins in the selection of the d man, and equally sure is it that the capitalist class will win in point that effects the profits of the concern involved.
