HANCOCK'S ODD LAWS AND INCONGRUOUS POLICE WAYS

(Mail Correspondence.) Hancock, Mich., July 31.—Socialism is growing rapidly, and so at this northernmost copper country the working class are embracing its doctrines and becoming more and more reconciled to the fact that to do what is best for their own class, the producing class, is to unite and announce to the world their belief in Socialism.

The strongest Socialist local at Hancock is composed of Finnish people, and Saturday and Sunday they had set for a convention and picnic. Some weeks ago our law-abiding common council enacted an ordinance prohibiting the carrying of the "red flag of anarchy," as they termed it, with a fine for noncompliance of \$100, or ninety days in the county jail, or both.

As you will notice by a clipping I send you, taken from our local paper, a capitalist journal propped up by the plutocrats and doing their bidding, and opposed to the working class. So much for the ordinance; now for the balance of the story.

The Finnish Socialists had arranged to parade to their picnic ground carrying the United States flag and wearing red badges and carrying a red flag with the word "Socialism" thereon. No sooner had they formed in line than the regular police force, together with a number of deputized thugs, such as a big saloonkeeper, who lives off the spoils of the working fools, and several other saloon bums, who only work when the drinks are not coming freely, pounced upon the parading workers.

Some Incidents. For instance, we have a number of streets and walks that need attention. A rotten old wooden bridge over Front street ravine, which has been condemned by this same worthy council, is still used.

DYNAMITE TO BLOW PRISON

(United Press Association Cable.) Odessa, Russia, July 31.—By the narrowest kind of a margin the authorities today nipped the bud a plot to blow up a crowded political prison here.

Information was brought to the prison authorities of the plot and an examination of the cells proved the truth of the report. Large quantities of dynamite and sulphur were found in several cells, having been smuggled in. The ringleaders in the plot have been placed in solitary confinement.
