STANDARD OILOLOGY AS IT'S REWRITTEN UP TO DATE

What Judge Landis' Stupendous Fight Turned Loose—Novel Things Brought Out by Court's Penalty.

After all, the public will pay the price. The big fine of the Standard Oil company imposed by Judge Landis, being \$29,240,000, must come from the pockets of the consumers of oil and its by-products.

A dispatch from Cleveland, Ohio, asserts that C. D. Chamberlain, secretary of the National Petroleum association, has received information that the Standard even now is planning a clear advance of 10 per cent which it puts into effect this month, and that before the year is concluded it will have advanced the price 25 per cent.

What It Did. The imposition of the fine, the mammoth penalty in all history, peculiarly speaking, has brought out many novel incidents and features. Included are the following:

Increase of the prices of oil and by-products as stated above. Statement attributed to John D. Rockefeller that Judge Landis would deal a long time before the fine is paid. Standard, which is the largest purchaser of crude oil, plans a bear movement in southern Illinois, Ohio and West Virginia, where the bulk of the better grades of oil are produced.

Standard Oil's big fine has set the stock market going. Prices started off at lower ranges as soon as the gong sounded, and had it not been for prompt support of the Standard Oil crowd, the market might have become seriously injured.

The market opened at general decline. Reading started 11-2 lower; St. Paul, 1-4; B. R. T., 2 points in all; Anaconda, 1 point; Amalgamated, Smelting and Atchison, 7-8; Union Pacific, 1-4; Steel common, 1-2 and the preferred 3-8; Colorado Fuel and Pennsylvania, 1-8, and Southern Pacific 3-4 lower.

Chicago & Alton, which closed Saturday at 54, broke to 50-1-2. A rally retrieved about half the losses up to noon.

Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 6.—Arkansas will appeal at once from United States Circuit Judge Vandeventer's decision at St. Paul yesterday, temporarily restraining the state from annulling the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad's charter within its border for violation of the law prohibiting the transfer of suits against it by Arkansas citizens from the state to the federal courts.

New York, Aug. 6.—In spite of rumors to the contrary, no official statement was given out by the Standard Oil company here today.

When questioned about the report just published by Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of corporations, C. K. Clark, the Standard's man, laughed and said: "Good little Sir, he has earned his salary at any rate."

Then, in a more serious vein: "You cannot expect us to answer or even comment on a statement which has taken a year's preparation upon the various points of publication. Why should we trouble when the fine is not going to be paid any way?"

When asked the inevitable question: "Is oil going up?" Clark replied: "How should I know. As I said before, 'son-of-a-bitch' is going all along the line." Then he stepped into his automobile with Rev. Mr. Wilson, whom he entertained at dinner.

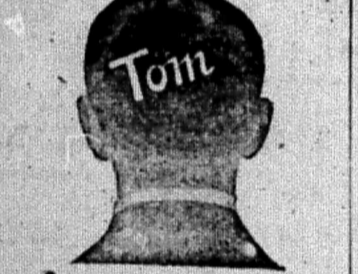

ORGANIZED LABOR TO MAKE HARD FIGHT FOR SCHOOLS

Federation Finds That Busse Removed Board Men Because They Were Progressive; Report on Defense.

"In the name of the Western Federation of Miners I want to thank the Chicago Daily Socialist and other trade union and Socialist papers in the city and throughout the nation for the magnificent support given the cause of justice during the trial of Bill Haywood."

This spoke J. Edward Morgan, representative of the Western Federation of Miners, at Sunday's meeting of the Chicago Federation of Labor. In a voice trembling with suppressed emotion the miner thanked the federation and its affiliated bodies for the financial and moral support during the darkest hours of the Idaho conspiracy to railroad Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone to the gallows.

Cried for Blood. "The capitalist press cried for the blood of our brothers, declaring them guilty of every crime on the calendar," continued Morgan. "Intense feeling against this man was created. The governors of several states pronounced our leaders guilty without a trial. Governor Gooding of Idaho declared they should never leave the state alive. The pulpit came to the support of the mine owners in many instances. Theodore Roosevelt brazenly Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone as 'undesirable citizens.'"

Unfair Attitude. The report dealt at length with the vicious unfair attitude of the capitalist press and drew attention to the inconsistency of the same papers which demanded Haywood's blood as an arch criminal before the trial now seeking to appease the working people with the assurance that justice had been done. The first meeting of the Moyer-Haywood conference in Chicago was held Feb. 20, 1907, and the Chicago Federation of Labor affiliated the first meeting of the following March. At this time but thirty organizations were affiliated with the conference. At the last meeting the number had swelled to 146, more than 100 being labor unions.

HAYWOOD AT WORK AGAIN

Denver, Colo., Aug. 6.—Haywood appeared at his old desk this morning and began the task of answering telegrams and letters of congratulation which have poured into the federation office since his acquittal. A local resort offered Haywood \$1,000 for two speeches per day for a week. Haywood said: "I'm not a dime museum freak; I prefer to give out my message free of charge."

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TURKISH TROOPS KILL CHRISTIAN

Bombard Village and Slay Women and Children; Destroy Town. (By United Press Associations.) Teheran, Persia, Aug. 6.—A massacre of Christians by Turkish troops has just occurred in the little Persian village of Maybhe. An official report states that eighteen men and sixty women and children lost their lives. The Turks forced a small Persian garrison defending the town to evacuate their camp and then bombarded the village, completely destroying it. The massacre of Christians followed. An official report reaching here says that six thousand Persian cavalry have joined a Turkish force in threatening the town of Urumiah.

KILLED IN RACE WAR

New York, Aug. 6.—John McCue, white, died today and Matthew Murteth, also white, is dying as the result of the fierce race riot ever known in Harlem's "Little Africa" and it all started over an umpire's decision at a ball game. More than fifty whites and blacks were badly hurt, and fifteen are under arrest. At first baseball bats were the chief weapons, but soon razors, beer bottles, knives and brass knuckles were used with bloody effect.

How Adam Could Have Been As Rich As John D.

If Adam had, on his first arrival on earth, secured a position which paid him \$450 a day, worked at it steadily all these years and never purchased Eve any other raiment than that which was considered proper in those early days, he would have just the same size pile as John D. Rockefeller is reputed to have—\$1,000,000,000. No less a person than Governor Cummins of Iowa is responsible for these figures. In an address before the Will county Chautauque assembly at Plainfield yesterday afternoon, he set forth the calculations for this discovery by dint of much figuring. These figures were used as the basis for the assertion that no man could become as rich as John D. without practicing dishonesty. He did not point out that machinery created this vast wealth when utilized by brain and manual workers.

DISCIPLE OF REITMAN DIES ON THE ROAD

Boy's Mother Now Says She Will War on Trampdom. Because he tried to imitate Dr. Ben L. Reitman, founder of the Brotherhood Welfare association, William J. F. McHain-Evers of 1331 Belmont avenue, met death. At least this is the statement made by his mother, who says she will devote the rest of her life to a campaign against boys tramping the country in order that other mothers may be spared the pain and distress of seeing their sons killed and maimed on trains. "Young McHain-Evers was killed in a railroad wreck at Eau Claire, Mich., July 24, and his mother says he was driven to the road by his love of Dr. Ben Reitman's stories of trampdom.
