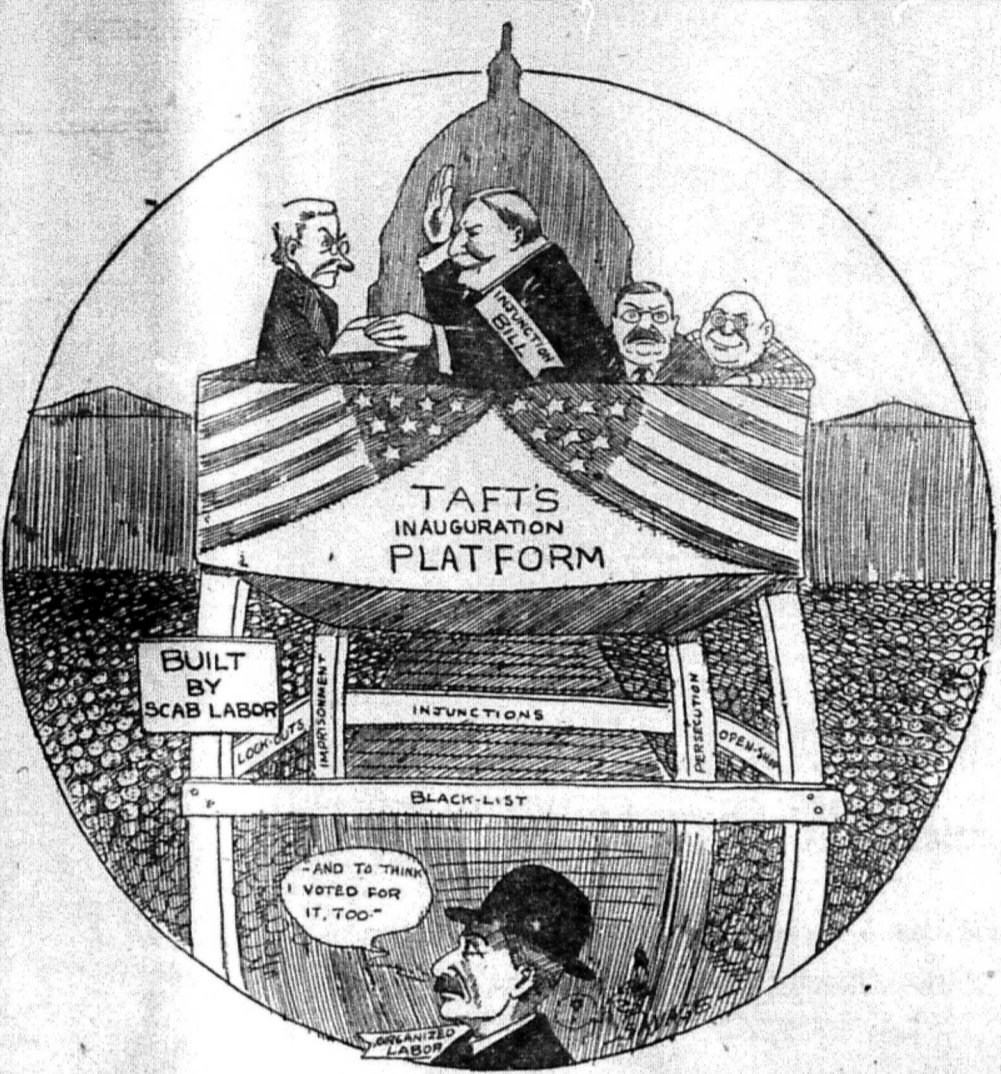
Statement of February Prices According to that authority the February index figure is 102.2, a gain of 3.4 per cent over January, and of 15.3 per cent over June 1, 1908.

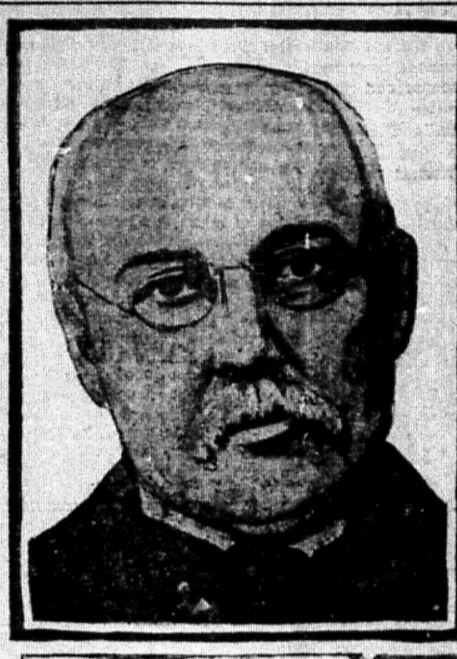

SELF-TRANSFERABLE EMBROIDERY DESIGN. Directions for using: Place pattern face downward on the material and press with a hot iron, being careful that the material to be stamped is laid on a smooth surface and is free from all wrinkles.

No. 525. Design to be transferred to center piece, measuring 18x18 inches, to be applied to heavy linen, thin cambric, lawn, hairnet, batiste, silk or messaline, according to taste. The scalloped edge should be heavily padded, so that the design will stand out in high relief, while the scrolls may be worked with outline stitch, both being done with mercerized cotton or heavy embroidery floss, according to the material used in the development.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Clear as You Go. Saucerpanes are much easier to wash if done directly they are finished with. At that stage of the proceedings nothing has time to dry on. Try it and see how it works.
- To Clean Kid and Satin Shoes. Dancing shoes which have become soiled can be successfully renovated by rubbing them with benzine on a piece of clean, soft dannel. After cleaning, place the shoes in the air till the disagreeable odor has gone off.
- To Remove Dirt From Brown Boots. Dissolve a little saddle soap in warm soft water. Put the boots in this and with a piece of sponge wash the boots thoroughly, making the leather very wet. Wash off the soapy water in plain soft water, and dry in the air. Then polish the boots in the usual way.
- When Choosing a Hat. I have one rule for most women when choosing a hat, says a well-known milliner. I match the hat to the hair. The result is always good. Of course, if the woman is old, with white hair, it is not satisfactory. But the woman with brown hair should wear a brown hat, and the woman with red hair should wear a red hat in dark red tones, and so on. If you are going to buy a hat match your hair. The second best thing is to buy a hat to the eyes. The woman with big brown eyes should wear a big, arched hat. LADIES SEMI-FITTING DRESSING SACK. Paris Pattern No. 2824. All Bonas Allowed. Developed in lilac albatross, this dainty little garment may be worn during breakfast and morning hours, as it is both dainty and becoming. The small revers which trim the "V"-shaped neck are of all-over embroidery or lace, with a ruffle of edging. Insertions of similar lace hide the side-front and side-back seams as well as being used as a trimming around the lower edge, above the P.M. This edge is finished with narrow lace, matching the insertion. The following sleeves are also inset with the insertion and finished with the edging, and a tie of lilac messaline finishes the neck. If desired, the sack may be made perfectly plain and is adaptable to such materials as lawn, batiste, challis or cambric. The pattern is in 7 sizes—22 to 44 inches bust measurements. For 22 bust the sack requires 3/4 yards of material 39 inches wide, 2 1/2 yards 27 inches wide, 1 1/2 yards 36 inches wide, or 1 1/2 yards 36 inches wide. Price of Pattern, 15 cents.
