GIANT MERGER OF CITY ROADS

Story Emphasized That Chicago Surface and "L" Lines Will Combine

Chicago traction and the elevated roads are being drawn toward a gigantic combine, according to Walter L. Fisher, counsel for the city council committee on local transportation. In an interview with the Daily Socialist this morning, Fisher declared that the most strenuous efforts are being made to consolidate the traction companies under a holding company, and that the organization of the elevated railways into a similar combine was but the step toward a merger of the surface and elevated roads under one control.

Unable to Absorb Rival? Fisher declared that he doubts if the City Railway company will ever absorb its rival, the Chicago Railways company, but asserted that both companies will be combined through a holding company, which will call in the stock of the holding company in its place.

A definite adjustment will be needed in this matter, says Fisher. The streetcar engineers, Fisher stated, is well equipped to furnish figures which will form a basis on which to form the company. The \$25,000,000 elevated merger which is being brought to completion, Fisher declared, is another step in the movement which will make it possible for the holding company controlling the elevated lines to be taken over by another holding company which shall control the entire traction and elevated railway situation in Chicago.

Had to Iron Out Tangles The consolidation of the street railways would have taken place before this had it not been necessary to iron out the tangles in the Union Traction affairs. They were in such shape that consolidation at the time of the passage of the ordinance was impossible, said Fisher.

Value of Lines \$50,000,000 "A special order of the city council will be necessary. The City Railway in the ordinance is valued at \$21,000,000 and the Chicago Railway company at \$29,000,000. Those values, plus the cost of rehabilitation, will be the basis of the capital of the holding company. This company will be formed by the stockholders of the two companies voting in their stock or depositing it in the City Railway, which will take the Chicago Railways company, but I do not think that a holding or leasing company will be formed which will absorb both lines, take over their stock and issue its own stock instead. The payment for the merger can be given in stock or in whatever other way the city shall decide.

Leading Magnates Scatter The traction fuss after its abrupt close yesterday continued quiet today. John M. Roach, president of the Chicago Railways company, and Henry Blair, head of the board of directors, both having left for Florida last night for a fishing trip, while Bion J. Arnold has gone to New York to continue his inspection of the subway, and E. T. Mitten, president of the Chicago City Railway company, left yesterday for Chicago, where there is a traction fight on and his presence is needed.

Pays Check on Pine Block Cincinnati, Ohio, March 12.—The Fourth National bank yesterday paid check for 83 cents written on a block of pine wood one inch thick, one foot long and six inches wide. A Cincinnati real estate dealer became engaged in a dispute with a tenant over a broken window pane, and the tenant, being compelled to pay the expense, wrote the check on the pine block.

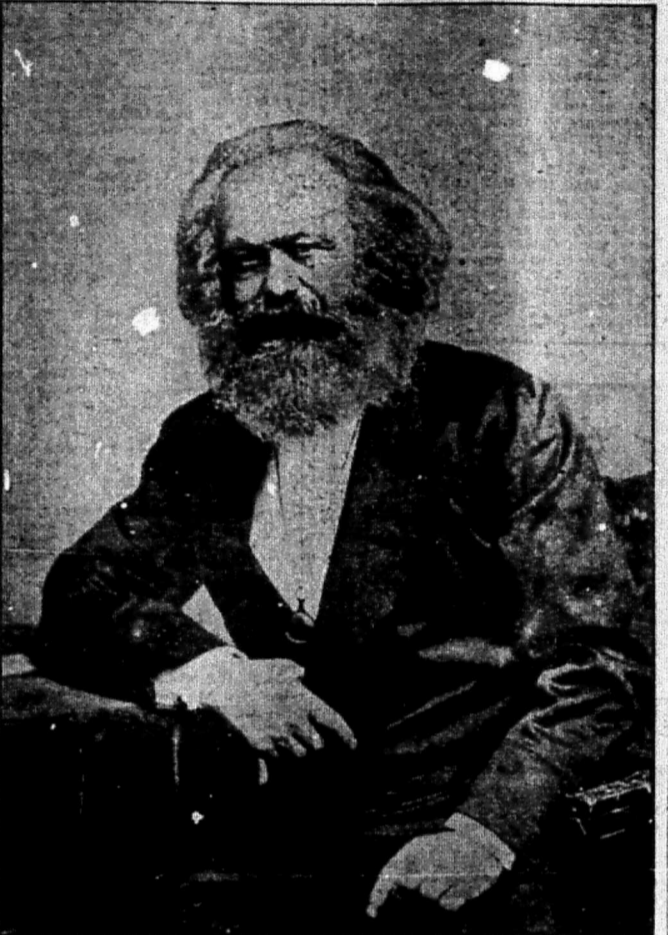
