The following bill will be introduced in the Illinois state legislature by the Woman's Trade Union League: "A bill for an act to regulate and limit the hours of employment of females in any manufacturing, mercantile or mechanical establishment, laundry, hotel or restaurant in order to safeguard the health of such employees; to provide for its enforcement and a penalty for its violation."
