WARREN TELLS OF BIG FIGHT

Events at New Castle Are Described by an Eye Witness

(By Fred D. Warren (Managing Editor of Appeal to Reason)) New Castle, Pa., one of Mr. Carnegie's most profitable centers of wealth production, will not soon forget Sunday, June 19. The thousands of visitors, with red banners and crimson banners, the march through the streets, the moon meeting in front of Socialist headquarters, the Cascade Park demonstration, the refusal of the mounted police to permit the speakers to talk, the he-gira to the apple orchard a few hundred feet distant, and then the grand march from the park back to New Castle, are all incidents that will serve to fix the date in the minds of all the present inhabitants of the big mill town.

It was a fitting climax to the six days' stubbornly fought trial, in which many old law books brought into use by the prosecution in the effort to fasten the crime of seditious libel on the members of the publishing committee of the New Castle Free Press, a weekly proletarian paper.

DIAZ USES IRON HAND

Mexican Despot Fills Jails Before Election in Sister Republic

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.) Washington, D. C., June 21.—While the congressional investigation of the acts of United States agents, including marshals, district attorneys and secret service men in aiding Diaz, the Mexican despot, to capture and harass his foes, has been passed on till the next session of congress, after a brief and sensational hearing, dispatches state that Cananea, Mexico, and other Mexican cities are under martial law and that, with the presidential election due Sunday, June 28, uprisings against Diaz' usurpation of government are threatened.

All political meetings in Lomora, Mexico, have been stopped, as the following dispatches tell. Champ Clark, minority leader of the house of representatives, has announced that at the next session of the United States congress he will push the investigation of aid for Diaz.

Browne Case Nears Jury; Character Witnesses Weak in Evidence

The case of Representative Lee O'Neil Browne, charged with bribing Representative Charles A. White to vote for Lorimer as the United States senator of Illinois, will probably go to the jury early this week. The defense seems to have exhausted all its ammunition in the desperate fight to keep Browne from the penitentiary.

DEAD BOYS \$100 EACH

For the deaths of four trapper boys in the Cherry mine disaster lines aggregating \$400 were assessed against the St. Paul Coal company at Princeton, Ill., yesterday. Additional fines amounting to \$600 were assessed in the cases of six other trapper boys who escaped.

MANY WORKERS IN FIRE TRAP

Four hundred employees fled in panic from the four-story building of the Greiss-Fieger Tanning company at North Halsted street and the north branch of the Chicago river when flames attacked the structure shortly before 10 a. m. yesterday, and spread so fast that within twenty minutes the walls began to fall. The north wall crashed into the ruins of the building at 10:15 a. m. and it was feared that several firemen and employees of the place had been caught in the debris of the wall and killed or injured. Search was at once begun for them.

TWO YEARS' HIGH SCHOOL FOR CHILDREN OF WORKERS

PENROSE MACHINE STARTS WITH WHEELS WELL GREASED

(By United Press Associations.) Harrisburg, Pa., June 21.—With the ways well greased for the launching of a good, old-fashioned Penrose machine ticket at tomorrow's Republican state convention, every delegation arriving here today fell in line for the organization state. Even Mayor Magee of Pittsburg and his disgruntled band of anti-Penrosites, with their exploded Knox boom, are set expected to throw any sand in the well-oiled machinery.

After placing a series of "character" witnesses on the stand, the defense called in Charles B. Osgood, a night clerk in the Briggs house, and W. L. Stermer, assistant manager of the hotel, where Browne and White have stopped many times, and Fred Zentner, a salesman.

Charles B. Osgood was the first witness to testify today. He identified the transfer book of the hotel, which will be used in an effort to refute some of White's testimony. He testified that White was registered at the hotel between August 15 and August 24, 1909, and that Browne was registered there between August 14 and August 19, of the same year, but admitted on cross-examination that the rooms were probably not occupied during that period.

"Did you see it?" asked Attorney Charles E. Erbstein, of the counsel for the defense. "I don't know if I said it or somebody else said it," the witness replied.

HARBOR STEAL SQUARELY UP TO MAYOR BUSSE NOW

James A. Pugh and the Chicago Canal and Dock company has been granted a permit by the United States war department to construct a commercial harbor in the navigable waters of Lake Michigan immediately north of the Chicago river. The first intimation of this came at the session of the city council meeting by the announcement of the fact by Mayor Busse. The Pugh company, it is said, is now at liberty to go ahead with the construction of the piers and breakwaters without the consent of the city council or authorities.
