Gifts of Money Lords to 1904 Fund Kept Close Secret

The World refers to the editorial answer to the New York Evening Post, in which Roosevelt said: "Mr. Cortelyou is familiar with the facts," referring to the Harriman negotiations. The editorial continues: "If the national government is to control any business carried on in various states, which practically means all business, if the president of the United States is to be the 'steward of the public welfare' in the regulation of business, and if you are to be president of the United States, the country has a right to know how this stewardship will be exercised. It has no means of judging the future but by the past."

He Was Muzzled

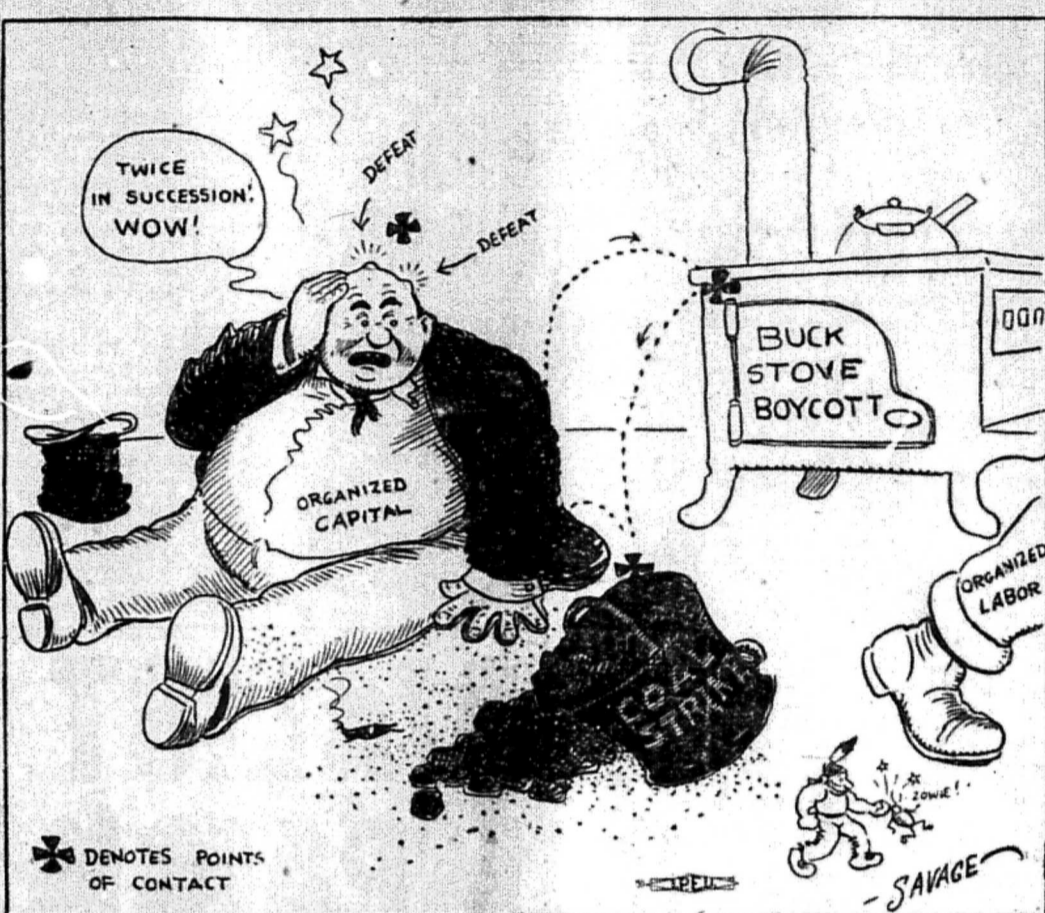
MASKED BANDITS HOLD UP AUTOISTS ON PUBLIC ROAD
