W' 'T IS LOVE? Something on earth—that is its start, Something of heaven—that is its goal; Something human—that is the heart; Something divine—that is the soul.

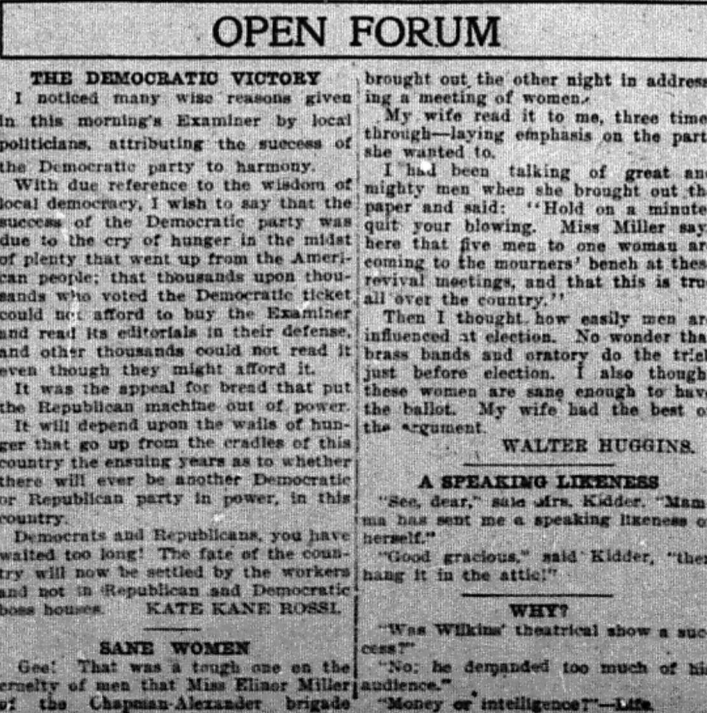
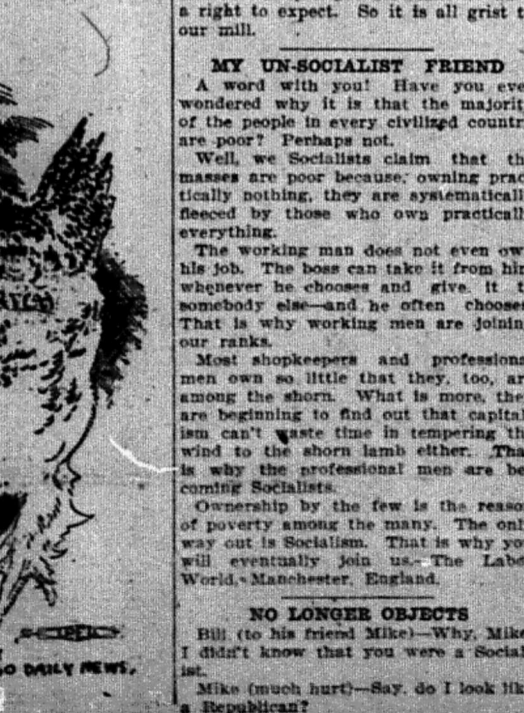

## BIG AND GRAVE PROBLEMS FACE A. F. OF L. CONGRESS

### Large Gathering of Labor Begins Work in St. Louis.

(By United Press Associations.)  
St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 14.—When Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, called the thirtieth convention of that body here to order today union labor in America buckled down to consideration of the gravest set of problems it has faced in years.

### Aloof From Politics

The most vital of these problems is whether unionism shall stand aloof from politics or whether it shall choose the newly elected Socialist congressman, Victor L. Berger of Milwaukee, as its president, and thus make the labor hosts a part of the Socialist movement.

### May Displace Gompers

That Berger is to make a try to displace Gompers at the head of the federation is believed certain, though his activity today among the more than 500 delegates already in attendance for the two weeks' convention.

### Gompers' Report

Today's session of the convention will be consumed by opening routine and the annual report of President Gompers, the reading of which will take up the greater part of the afternoon.

### Active Organization

Mr. Weber says that there is need of active organization work in every city in the country and that as the American Federation now keeps organizers in big cities like Chicago, New York and Philadelphia it is no more than right that organizers should be put in cities the size of Milwaukee and Detroit.

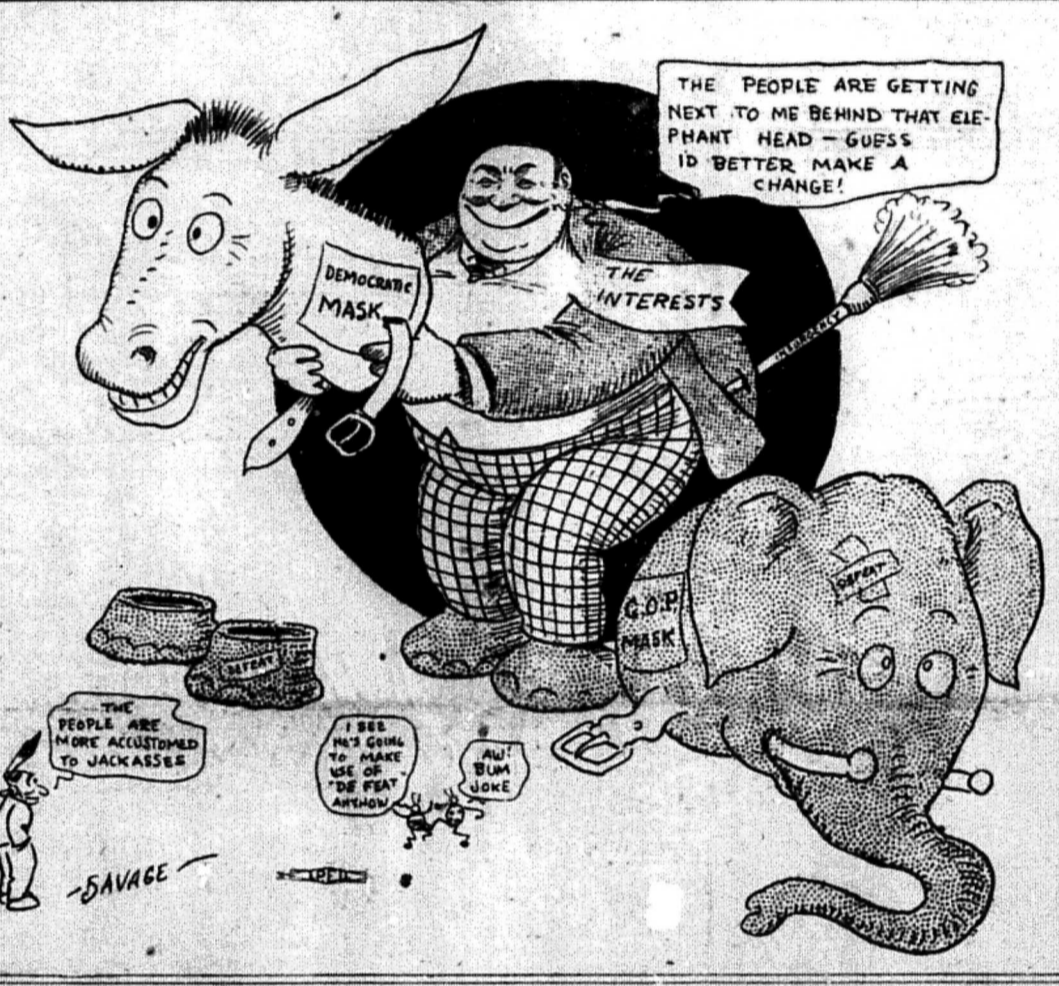
