

MAX STEUER ROUNDLY REBUKED BY COURT

Counsel for Hyde Feels Lash of Judge's Scorn After Assertion.

Max D. Steuer, attorney for Charles Hyram Hyde, former City Chamberlain, charged with bribery, was vigorously reprimanded yesterday by Chief Justice Ingraham of the Appellate Division of the First Judicial Department, when Steuer made the assertion that District Attorney Whitman had been allowed to select Justice Davis to preside at the trial of Hyde.

Justice Ingraham's rebuke of Steuer came soon after Steuer began his plea. The lawyer picked up District Attorney Whitman's statement that Hyde's action in the habeas corpus case was "brazen effrontery."

"It was brazen effrontery for Mr. Hyde to initiate his cause of action," Steuer said to the court. "I'd like to ask if it is not more brazen effrontery for the District Attorney to select such a particular judge to—"

"He got no further," Chief Justice Ingraham leaped to his feet and cried, "What's that you say? What's that you say?" "I think you misunderstood me, your honor," Steuer said humbly.

"Be a little careful!" the chief justice thundered. "I want you to understand that this court selected the judge in question and will bear with no such implication as you have just made."

"It is a remarkable thing that a defendant under indictment for a serious crime can refuse to go before a judge who is properly selected for him. If that time comes when a defendant is allowed to select his own judge, it will be time for every decent man to resign his place in the Supreme Court. I have been sitting in this court a good many years, but this is the first time that any such proceeding has come before me. You may be satisfied that no influence of any kind can affect the decision of this court."

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The four Senators from the new States of Arizona and New Mexico were sworn into office this afternoon. Senator Catron, of New Mexico, and Senator Ashurst, of Arizona, were chosen to serve until 1917. Senator Fell until 1915 and Senator Smith until 1915.

RAVAGES OF FLOODS ON THE INCREASE

Congress Passes Appropriation to Combat Mississippi's Rising Waters.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Emphasizing the fact that unless the government takes immediate steps to prevent the Mississippi dykes from giving way under the highest floods on record, millions of dollars and many lives may be lost, President Taft today asked Congress in a special message for an emergency appropriation of \$500,000. He recommended that this sum be placed at the disposal of army engineers now patrolling the levees.

ST. LOUIS, April 2.—With Hickman, Ky., under twenty feet of water and 3,000 persons without shelter, with reports of broken levees at Commerce, in Scott County, Mo., Birds Hill, back of Birds Point, Mo., the entire town of McClure, Ill., under water, with an unconfirmed report from Memphis, Tenn., stating New Madrid, Mo., has been swept away by waters from the Mississippi, and with a portion of the City of Memphis itself under six feet of water, the Mississippi and Ohio rivers at their confluence today reached the highest mark in their history, and reports indicate there will still be greater flood, bringing the greatest floor danger in history.

F. A. B. Stamford, Conn.—To avoid any difficulty in the future you should immediately make application to be naturalized. Only two years would have to elapse before you could obtain your citizenship papers, inasmuch as you have been a resident of the United States for over five years. The fact that you have voted a number of times would not seem to help the situation for you apparently had no legal right to vote when you did, as later developments have shown. The fact that you were brought up in a State institution would not of itself seem to admit you to citizenship. As much as you were born outside of the United States, you can acquire citizenship in the usual way.
